"To clear up any possibility of misinterpretation of the official Soviet announcement 'relieving' Zhukov of his post, the Russian word used was 'osvobodil.' "This may be translated either

as 'relieving' or 'releasing.' " It is worth noting that the term 'osvobodil' was also used in the announcements concerning Molotov, Kaganovich, Saburov and Pervukin in the course of the past few months."

Anniversary Of Ruthless Example

With nine Russian divisions to back him up, Dictator Janos Kadar saw to it that the people of Hungary observed the first anniversary of their rebellion against Communist tyranny without untoward incident-if you can call several million people going sullenly and silently about their state-directed chores an untoward

Their very silence—the listless way they moved about-their air of gloom was an indictment against the monstrous cruelty of their masters. They had been told bluntly beforehand that any attempt to demonstrate in any way their recognition of the anniversary would bring rifle fire, hand grenades and if necessary tanks-Russian tanks, manned by the pick of the Red Army's terrorists.

The Hungarian Foreign Ministry said it was "a normal day in every way in Budapest." and undoubtedly it was; undoubtedly "peace and order prevailed," just as the announcement said, and in the "normal way" for totalitarian dictatorships-at the end of a bayonet.

It was the sort of "peace and order" that makes a mockery of both peace and justice, an exemplification of the Communist thesis that individual liberty is nothing and the state is everything.

We can only imagine how the freedom-

loving people of Hungary feel about the rest of the world. There is no doubt about their feelings toward communism and the evil power seated in Moscow that holds a bayonet in their backs and forces them to kneel when the masters say kneel. But many of them, whether justified or

not, expected help from the free world in their life and death struggle to throw off the yoke of foreign servitude.

They got the sympathy of the free world and some practical help in the way of relief and relocation for the tens of thousands who fled. Their courage and sacrifice evoked from the United Nations one of the bitterest denunciations of a government and a system of philosophy ever spread on the minute books of a world organization.

But little else. Those who died were the fortunate onces. Those who lived and remained in their native land have undergone humiliation and physical and spiritual punishments that totalitarian governments know only too well how to inflict. Russia made an example of the hapless Hungarians as a warning to other restive peoples under their sway that aspirations of freedom lead only to bayonet, rifle, grenades, machineguns, tanks, and the

Second-Term Cabinet Jitters

In becoming the sixth member of Presi- coalition finally enacted, as well as by dent Eisenhower's Cabinet to resign, Attorney General Herbert Brownell seemed to imply that he was not quitting under fire when he said that the school integration policy as established in Little Rock left him feeling free to return to private law practice.

It could also give his Southern foes the opportunity, if they chose to accept it, to infer that Brownell was taking responsibility for Little Rock, since Southerners had the feeling Ike acted on his attorney general's advice in sending in troops.

His stepping down now averts the stiff congressional questioning of him reputedly planned by members of the Southern bloc when Congress reconvenes. He had earned their displeasure by insisting on a much stiffer civil rights bill than a congressional

allegedly taking the lead in "establishing" a pattern for integration at Little Rock to serve the whole country.

Unreluctant as they may be to see Brownell go, Southerners will find small comfort in the naming of his deputy, William P. Rogers Jr., as his successor, expected momentarily. Mr. Rogers sees eye to eye with Mr. Brownell in integration and civil rights matters.

The rather large turnover in the presidential Cabinet may be a byproduct of the 22nd Amendment, making two terms the limit for any President. Under that amendment a Cabinet post has no future beyond the second term, and since members usually serve at a sacrifice of personal affairs, they may be anxious to pull out before they normally might.

One jeepster used a stick to keep the

"mob" from grabbing.

This effort to create something gracious out of advertising, using news commentators to describe the garish rite as if it were a political convention, could only happen, to my way of thinking, when prosperity had lost its head and hard-headed business men had lost a sense of values. This same loss of sensibility made for tulipmania in Holland, John Law's Mississippi bubble, and the stock market crash in 1929. If Todd's party does nothing but call to the attention of Americans that there ain't no such thing as a free lunch, a free advertising ride, or a sure profit in the stock market, it will have been an

economic success. The recent declines in Wall Street are nothing more than a renewal of contact with reality. For too long, Americans have been living in the wonder world of inflation, Everything must go up. Business will continually expand, because the government can't permit unemployment. Common stocks are the road to riches.

Well, earnings in 1957 are not following the line of least reflection. Higher costs of production, higher costs of sales, higher costs of advertising have squeezed profit margins. Happy-happy projections of earning power, which justified the rise in stocks, now fall as flat as Todd's party. Let that be a lesson to us.

prize eight years ago. Apparently the mere thought of watching Americans eat leaves the good doctor with a case of indigestion and a strong urge to go to the medicine cabinet for a couple of Tums.

Americans partake of their meals on the run or else they belt the booze too often and too long before meal-time. Either one is bad, Lord Orr points out. If the Americans want to slow down and shape their eating habits after a race of people who know and relish the art, look to the Chinese, the British peer suggests. When it comes to chow, the Orientals are cultured, it seems.

They drink very little before meals but sip wine with various menus, then finish off with a glass of fine port.

Around The Rim

Alcohol, Lord Orr states, aids digestion. . . if consumed with food. Stretch out the ritual, the good doctor suggests, too. In other words, don't gulp down your coffee and chew your toast as your wife is dealing them off the arm while you're rushing toward the door to

go to work. If you take your time downing a meal and do it amid pleasant surroundings and chat amiably with your wife and kids, your chances for getting by without an

attack of indigestion are improved. If Junior won't eat his spinach, bat him one, maybe. . .but no arguments. "Better not to eat, than eat under strain or in anger," says the good doctor. "You in America either must slow the pace or go over the precipice. What's your hurry, anyway? Why don't you start enjoying

your enormous wealth?" Incidentally, Lord Orr doesn't abuse the good name of the non-dieters, as do some authorities.

"We're overdoing it," is the way he puts it. "I don't believe in eating to excess but a woman can become too thin for her health's as well as her beauty's sake. Each individual is different. . .some people are healthy with a little fat."

That New Jet Plane Beats A Taxi

tence, I am now a full-fledged member of the authentic Jet Set, a distinction for which I owe as much to an unsung taxi

driver as to a jet jockey. When the telephone rang in my hotel room, a voice at the other end said I could have a ride in the prototype of America's first commercial jet transport, the Boeing 707, if I could get to

Boeing Field in 20 minutes. "If you can make it, you can go up on the last test flight before she's put in the hangar for three weeks of ground work," the voice said.

I made it, all right, but there were moments when I feared the taxi driver would be arrested for low flying and buzzing intersections.

By comparison, the test ride in the jet seemed real cool, even when, a few moments after take off, I casually glanced leftward out of the cockpit of the giant jet and saw the horizon way off yonder tilted at a 90-degree angle. Well, maybe it was only 89 degrees. But to all practical intents and purposes, there was a perpendicular horizon, a sight not calculated to soothe the ganglia.

I was scared to death my slip-scream would show, but I managed to be real cool, too, when the jet keeled over in another rock-and-roll maneuver and the horizon, still cocked at 89 degrees, showed

up on the right. "Handles like a fighter, eh?" crooned Boeing Chief of Flight Test A. M. ("Tex") Johnston, at the controls, to Ern-

est Cutrell, senior test pilot of American Airlines, who was in the co-pilot's seat.

A Bigger Sputnik Coming Next Month?

proach to the Russian moon is still the official line, with speech-makers trying to belittle the Soviet achievement as a stunt. But the tranquilizers administered by spokesmen for the Administration to the public will hardly suffice if the worst

fears of some insiders are confirmed. The date ringed on many calendars here in Washington is November 7, the anniversary of the Red Revolution. Repeated hints have come out of Moscow that on that 50th anniversary the Soviets will advertise to the world another and even more spectacular proof of their scientific-technological ability.

Some of the hints suggest that Russia will send up a much larger sputnik with a direct military usefulness of a high order. This larger sputnik would contain newly perfected photographic devices capable of recording the entire earth's surface every 72 or 96 hours.

What this would mean for the ultimate weapon-the intercontinental ballistic missile-is evident. One of the greatest unsolved problems in aiming the ICBMunsolved presumably for the Soviet Union as well as for the United States-is that accuracy depends upon exact knowledge of the earth's perimeter, and over large areas that knowledge is simply nonexistent.

Take, for example, the major Soviet objective of destroying the Strategic Air Command bases in this country. An ICBM with a nuclear warhead causes total damage in a radius of about seven miles. Trying to pinpoint an air base as a target with a missile traveling 5,000 miles means that an extremely small margin of error. measured in fractions of a degree in the aiming, will cause a miss.

Now suppose Moscow announces on November 7 that the new and bigger sputnik is photographing the earth's surface and transmitting the photographs back to Moscow. A few days later Pravda prints what it purports to be a photograph of the SAC base near Omaha as taken by Sputnik II. The odds are heavily against this being

actually possible. The United States has developed an electronic device that can take 10,000 pictures in three hours from a very great height. What is more, these pictures can be store on a magnetic tape and then transmitted to earth when the airplane carrying the equipment passes over a receiving device.

While an earth satellite sufficiently large to carry this extraordinary phototo guide the satellite back to the point at stations.

> But what those setting the tone of America's reaction seem to fail to realize is that in the current psychological warfare being waged so aggressively by the Russians, an announcement that they had this capability would be just as effective whether they actually had it or not. A faked photograph of the big SAC base near Omaha would cause as much public consternation as the real thing.

> In other words, with the sputnik a visible fact in the sky, the Soviets still have the offensive in the war for prestige and place. There are several other things they might do on November 7, Willie Ley, the distinguished authority on space travel and earth satellites, believes it is quite possible for the Russians to fire a four-stage rocket that will explode on the moon. What Washington lacks, above all, is a

> positive rather than a negative news policy. When Aviation Week magazine broke the story of American radar bases in Turkey, there was indignation in the Administration, the reaction being that even though the Russians knew this, they could now go to the Turks with an official complaint.
