BOY SCOUT Week

Plans Completed for Control of City By Boy Scouts on Saturday, Feb. 12

At their regular meeting Wednesday night, the local Boy Scout Troop completed plans to take over the city on Saturday, February 12. It has become the custom to turn the city government over to the Boy Scouts on Boy Scout Week, with all fines collected to be turned over to the Troop Fund. In this way the Scouts themselves collect contributions which will help defray their expenses to the Summer Camp and purchase needed equipment.

Election of officers was as follows: Mayor Bobby Jones, Judge John Gilbreath, Chief of Police Roy Murphy, Justice of Peace Jackie Copeland, Treasurer Dale Maxwell, and Commissioners Wayne Brown and Billy Gregory. All other Scouts will serve as Patrolmen.

 - Impersonating a Boy Scout by acting as Patrolman and blowing police whistles (whistles will be confiscated until the end of the day) 25c
 - Running a red light \$1.00
 - Driving without Driver's License \$1.00
- Offenders who do not pay their fines will be committed to jail for a time appropriate to the seriousness of the offence.

One of the purposes of the program will be to enable the people of the town to become more safety-conscious by obeying all traffic rules of safety. Another purpose is to enable the Scouts to build up their Scout Fund as stated in the first paragraph. Funeral services for Mr. W. C. Copeland were conducted Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. at the Dimmitt First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Earl Landtroop, officiating, assisted by Rev. Horace Brooks, pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist church and Rev. U. S. Sherrill, pastor of the Sudan Methodist church. Interment was made in the Dimmitt cemetery.

Mr. Copeland died Monday at 12:20 a. m. at the Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt following an illness of two years duration. He had just returned from Dallas where he received treatment at Baylor Hospital.

Mr. Copeland had been a prosperous farmer and influential citizen of this community for the past twenty years. He moved here with his family from Oklahoma in 1929 and had farmed in this county since that time. For the past several years they had resided in the Bethel community.

Mr. William Calvin Copeland was born July 19, 1888, in Erath county, Texas, being 60 years, 6 months and 211 days of age at the time of his death. He spent his early childhood in Texas and Oklahoma. He was married to Miss Fannie L. Powell December 8, 1907. They were the parents of two children, Floyd Copeland and Mrs. James Burnam, both of Dimmitt. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. J. W. Copeland of Mangum, Oklahoma; two brothers, Austin Copeland of Santa Maria, California and Lee Copeland of Dennison, Texas; two sisters, Mrs. T. G. Olive of Silverton, Texas and Mrs. D. A. Smith of Mangum, Oklahoma.

Minister Bob Wear, minister of the Hereford Church of Christ, spoke to the Dimmitt Business and Professional Women's Club, Monday evening, Feb. 9. His subject was the "Atomic Age". Bro. Wear, quoting eminent scientists made some most enlightening statements, which he dubbed, "The Atomic Age, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow". Only a small part of the nuclear energy has been released. The bomb dropped on Hiroshima equalled the power of 20,000 tons of TNT, 2,000 times the blast power of the British most powerful bomb, the "Grand Slam". The blast was felt for ten miles. Even then the number of lives taken was probably not as great as the loss would have been had the war continued in the regular way. Many scientists predicted one bomb would destroy the world. The devastation was not as great as had been thought it might be, but no one knows the extent of the damage.

This new release of power can bring a wonderful future of abundant living or it can bring chaos. This will be decided by the people of the world. It seems uncanny that Hitler in his greed for power, his persecution of the Jews, and his aspirations for the 'superior' Aryan race drove from Germany the Jewess scientist, idea of the atomic bomb to the Allies—the one idea which could have made it possible for him to have realized his ambition to rule the world. Perhaps the supreme power will in some way guide the people in the proper use of atomic power, as it steered it from the hands of the German dictator. It is impossible for any country or group of countries to keep the secret of nuclear energy; because if scientists of one country are able to develop the atom bomb, it is not only possible but probable that all other countries will soon be able to do the same, because the nuclear power is said to be omnipresent and inexhaustible.

Decentralization of people and industry have begun because of the danger of nuclear energy in the form of bombs. However if atomic energy is used beneficially, physical toil can be greatly reduced; and some scientists declare it will be abolished. Atomic living may be abundant living, depending on how it is used. No one knows what the future holds. We must work to keep our spiritual, moral and general education development abreast with the development of nuclear energy.

Circulate Air With Fans In Wintertime

Many families do not realize that portable electric fans can be used in the winter as well as the summer. Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. & M. College, points out. "Usually at the end of summer, the fans are put away until the next warm season. But actually they can be put to use in several ways during the winter months."

For instance, a house that is improperly insulated is usually unevenly heated, cooler at the floor than near the ceiling. A fan placed near the heater or heating unit, aimed at an adjacent wall toward the ceiling and set at a slow speed, will circulate the warm air around the room.

Another winter use for an electric fan is for drying clothes indoors. Winter weather sometimes makes it difficult to dry clothing even in the house. "Set a fan at one end of the line of clothes," Mrs. Claytor says, "and it will speed the drying process. Or use it to dry coats and overshoes soaked by rain or snow."

Portable electric fans can be used at any season of the year to carry off cooking odors from the kitchen. "If your home does not have a large ventilating fan in the wall or window, you may face a portable fan toward a slightly open window and allow it to run while foods with strong odors are cooking. The odors will go out the window," Mrs. Claytor concludes.

American Historian Writes About West Texas Pioneers

cal writer Charles Roth, it is doubtful if any other subject so close to home is so much misunderstood.

Most of us have a mental picture of a man riding along side a shaggy beast firing his rifle directly into the huge body. This running method was merely a Show-off's way, and only amateur exhibitionists with horseflesh to spare used it.

The professional hunter used a much more prosaic system which made up for its lack of drama by being about 500 times more effective. It was known as "hunting from a stand," and was developed because some smart bird discovered an interesting quirk in buffalo psychology.

First was that far from roaming the plains in herds numbering millions, the buffalo normally was an animal that ran in small groups of 10 or 20 individuals in charge not of a bellowing bull, but of an old cow.

Second was that if you isolated one of these groups and shot the leader through the lungs, so as to make her bleed, the others wouldn't take flight, but just hang around until you could shoot down every member of the gang. It was as exciting as shooting a dairy herd in somebody's barnyard.

The buffalo's disposition didn't help him preserve himself for posterity either. He was about the most stupid animal that crowded into the ark. He had almost no protective equipment. His eyesight was poor, his hearing even poorer, and he couldn't smell. He wasn't pugnacious; his only instinct was to run. And he had such a low animal I.Q. that he didn't even think of running when his mama was shot. So he was doomed.

Support Urged For Heart Week

Throughout the United States the week of February 14 -- 21, will be observed as National Heart Week, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has announced that the State Health Department will cooperate to the fullest extent in stressing to the public the necessity for full information and intelligent action in attempting to control this nation's major killer, heart disease.

From a national level, heart disease is the leading cause of death, and yearly takes a greater total number of lives than the next five leading causes of death combined. One out of every three deaths in the United States is due to diseases of the heart and blood vessels, and it is estimated that one out of every twenty persons suffer from some form of heart or blood vessel disease.

A great amount of research in the causes and treatment of the heart diseases has established the fact that some of them can be materially helped by certain drugs, or even surgery, and it has been proved beyond doubt that the heart patient who places himself early under competent medical care, has by far the best chance of survival. In many instances the patient can, under competent care, lead an almost normal life, with only certain restrictions as to activities and indulgences which might adversely

affect his condition.

"Consult your doctor for a physical check-up at least once a year", Dr. Cox advises. "If heart disease occurs, he will have an opportunity to find it, and begin proper treatment in the early stages, thus assuring you a better chance to finish a normal, comfortable life span."

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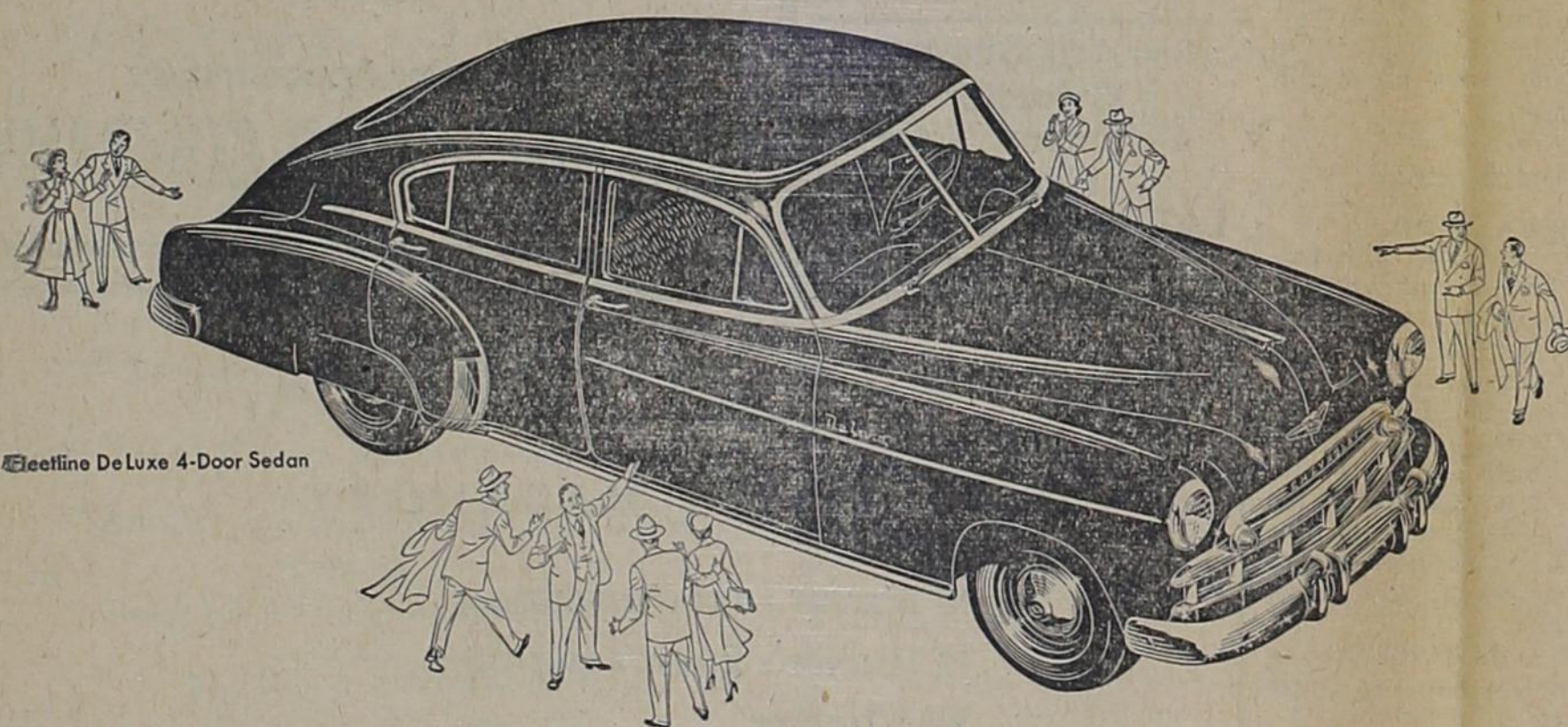

Dimmitt Drug

Tells How To Raise Biggest Garden

College Station, Feb.—Bigger than the neighbor's. That's the ambition of every home gardener. Everybody who grows vegetables for the family table wants to be able to boast the biggest—both in size and yield—in the neighborhood.

In order to do this, J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, suggests getting a big start with even the smallest seed. This calls for seed treatment and inoculation. From the standpoint of the home gardener, the easiest way to treat the seed is to get a packet of seed disinfectant from the local seed store. Then tear the top of the seed packet off, and sprinkle a small amount of the disinfectant inside. Then all you have to do is shake the packets well. Make sure the shaking is thorough enough to cover every seed in the packet.

It's best to plant the treated seed right away. Seed treatment not only destroys certain seed-borne diseases, but helps along the process of germination. There are certain fungus molds that often damage seed at the time of germination, and seed treatment gives a higher percentage of vigorous plants at the soil surface.

Inoculation of legume seed stimulates early growth because of certain bacteria in the soil. So, when you plant English peas in the next few weeks, Rosborough suggests trying this inoculation process to get an early start. Later in the season you might also inoculate your early plantings of beans, as well as the black-eyed peas or purple hulls and cream peas.

The inoculation and seed treatment supplies are available at the local seed store.

These are a couple of ways to get ahead of your neighbors in growing bigger and tastier vegetables. If you start now, you'll have a good chance to get the jump on them.

Home Improvements Program Continued For Texas Club Members

The National 4-H Home Improvement program, first offered three years ago in response to State Club leaders who desired recognition for girls enrolled in this phase of 4-H work, was again accepted by Texas, according to G. L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. The activity is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

4-H girls who have imagination, are handy with a needle, paintbrush—and yes, hammer and saw, too—find the 4-H Home Improvement program a natural for their talents. Supervised and encouraged by their County Extension agent and local 4-H Club leader, the young homemakers plan improvements for beauty, comfort, health and safety. They also learn to know what is enduring in old as well as new furnishings, and are given an opportunity to develop their skills. Through demonstrations they show what can be accomplished.

"Every home cannot be richly furnished, but it can reflect good taste," Club leaders point out.

As an added incentive toward this goal, the Sears-Roebuck Foundation is again proving merit awards amounting to nearly \$10,000. These include four sterling silver medals for winners in each county; an all expense trip to the National Club Congress, Chicago, for state winners, and eight \$300 scholarships to be presented to a blue award group selected from the state winners. The scholarship is increased \$100 over last year. There were 44 county medal winners named in 1948 in Texas.

Soil and water conservation problems of Texas and the other Southwestern states will receive special attention during the annual convention of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts in Denver, Colorado, February 15 to 17, according to Mr. Barber Eubanks, chairman of the Runningwater Soil Conservation District.

One full day of the national convention, February 16, will be given over to a train trip into the Rockies in order that delegates from all sections of the country may see the conservation needs of the West. This special train will take the delegates from Denver to the Winter Park area beyond the west portal of the famous Moffat tunnel.

Soil and water conservation grazing land and watershed management, forestry practices, and the Colorado Big Thompson reclamation project all will be discussed informally by the delegates and representatives of federal agencies in charge of these programs.

The three-day session of the national association will be preceded by the one-day meeting of the Colorado Association of Soil Conservation Districts on February 14, Kent Leavitt of Millbrook, N. Y., president of the national association, will open the session on February 15. Mayor Quigg Newton, Denver, will welcome the delegates after which reports will be heard from all state district associations represented. Women guests of the convention will hold a luncheon on February 15. Robert Wilson, vice president of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company and an ardent soil conservationist, will be a dinner speaker.

Following the all-day tour into the Rockies on February 16, Palmer Hoyt, editor and publisher of the Denver Post, will stress the need for world wide conservation on February 17. President Leavitt will discuss national association affairs at the concluding banquet.

Walter A. Groom, president of the Colorado association, is making plans for more than 500 delegates from the 2,000 locally governed soil conservation districts.

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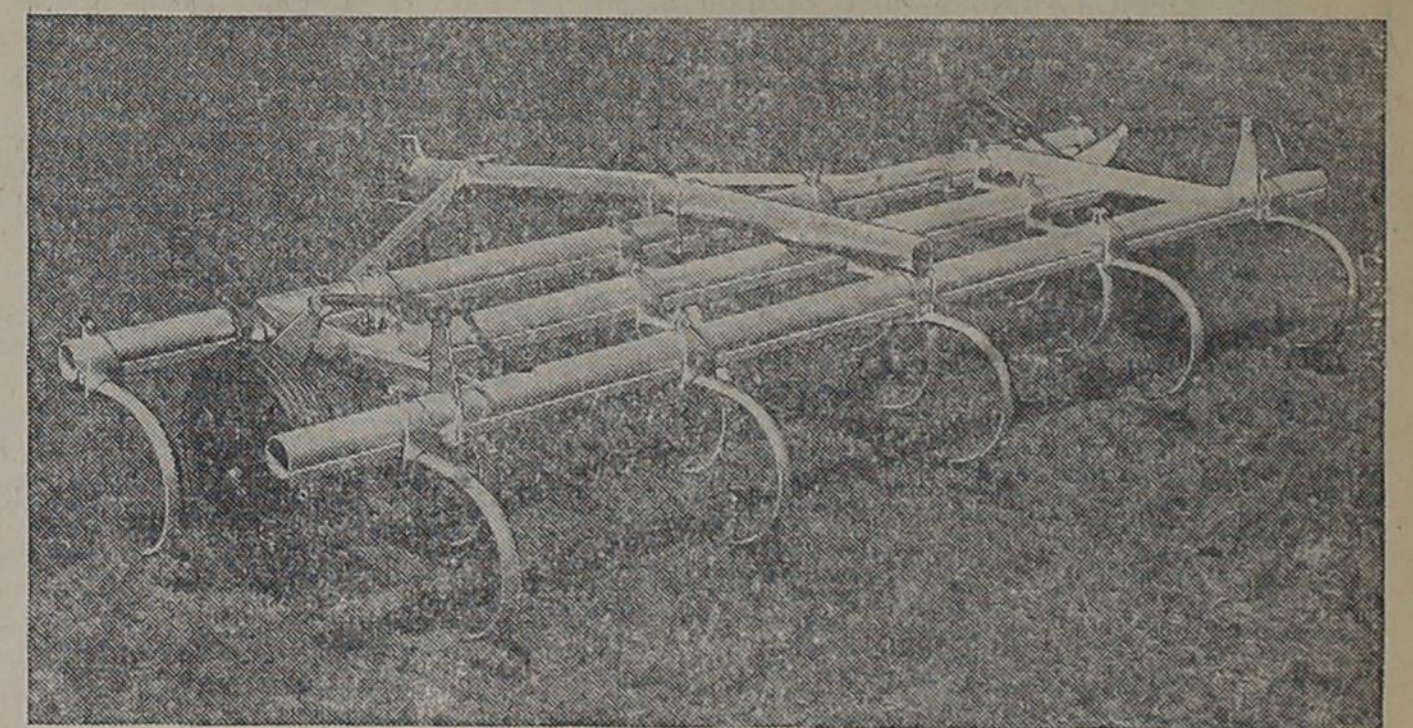
