The Dimmitt Bobcats became the first team in the history of the School to defeat a College team when they defeated the Wayland Jr. Varsity 50-44 in Plainview last Monday night. The Bobcats defeated the Hale Center Owls the Tuesday of last week in Hale Center 48-34.

In the Hale Center game our undefeated Freshman team played the first half and made a very good showing being behind only 3 points at the half. Then the Bobcat B played the 3rd quarter and could not get started being behind 4 points then the Bobcat A came in and put the game on ice when they gained 18 points. Billy Gregory was the high point man for Dimmitt with 11 points in the last quarter. Nathan Owens had 15 for Hale Center.

The Bobcats and the Wayland drew a large amount of attention from the Plains high school basketball fans. The Jr. Varsity is all but the first 7 men on the Pioneers Squad.

The Bobcats started slow but gained power throughout the game. They began to solve the superior height after being behind 31-24 at the half.

The Bobcats missed a very large percentage of their shots but Billy Gregory hit 14 counters to lead the Dimmitt scoring attack.

Frost and Peavey had 11 each to lead Wayland.



THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW whether or not "your home is your castle" in Texas?

The Courts of Texas have often held that a man's home is his castle in Texas. A man has a right to protect his home, using all force reasonable and necessary under the circumstances to protect his home and his property. The individual has the right to say who may come upon his property, and may deny that right to whomever he so desires. An individual is not required to retreat from his home, to avoid difficulty with another, but he may stand and protect himself and his home using such force as may be necessary in the defense of himself and his home.

The right to one's home as his castle, goes back to medieval days, when the owner of the castle maintained soldiers about his castle to protect the same from enemies. The right to protect the castle was a well established principle in those days, but was dependent more upon the force of soldiers maintained by the owner of the castle, than the Courts. Today we rely upon the Courts to protect our castle for us, but when an emergency should arise, the individual has the right to protect his own castle, until such time as he can take the matter to Court and have the Court issue appropriate and necessary orders to protect him and his property.

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

By Congressman Walter Rogers



MARCH 31, 1952, AN IMPORTANT DATE TO MANY: The 82nd Congress on April 5, 1951, by Public Law 16, extended the date for filing claims under the War Claims Act of 1948, as amended, from March 31, 1952. Therefore, those of you who are entitled to file claims under provisions of the War Claims Act should make immediate arrangements to file your claims. The War Claims Commission is most anxious that everyone having the right under the provisions of such act be fully advised as to the deadline for filing claims. If any of you are in doubt as to your rights to file a claim under this act, please write to me or to the War Claims Commission. Any letters coming to me on the matter will be promptly submitted to the War Claims Commission for full processing and consideration.

IT PAYS TO CHECK THE FACTS: When you hear some story going the rounds that could be dangerous or detrimental either to an individual, an organization, or the government, always be sure to check it for factual basis before repeating it. We all know how dangerous unfounded gossip can be. No one realizes that better than the powers that be in the Kremlin. The entire unrest and confusion that resulted in the downfall of the free governments in many of the satellite countries was commenced by planted gossipers and tale-bearers whose first allegiance was to Moscow. Unfounded gossip is like a prairie fire. It is easy to start and almost impossible to stop. A good example came to my notice the other day. One man had heard a story that disturbed him very much, but instead of repeating it, he wrote me a letter and asked me to find out the facts. I had heard the story before and knew the facts, but did not know that the story was being circulated again. Here it is: On the 1951 feisty-cent piece there is an image of Benjamin Franklin and stamped on his neck are the initials "J.R.S." The story is being circulated that these are the initials of Joe Stalin. Here are the true facts. The initials on the neck of Benjamin Franklin are the initials of John Ray Sinnock, formerly Chief Engraver at the Philadelphia mint. The reason they are on there is because for many years it has been a tradition and a custom for the initials of the designer of the coin to appear on it. In 1946 the initials of the first and last name of Mr. Sinnock, to wit, "J.S.", appeared on ten-cent coins. The story was circulating at that time that they were the initials of Joe Stalin. This story of course created many

protests. In view of these protests and the misunderstandings created by the circulated story, Mr. Sinnock's middle initial, "R", was also placed on the coin so that there could be no further misunderstanding. According to "International Who's Who", published in London, Stalin's full name is Joseph Vissarionovich Stalin. So far as the available records show, Josif Vissarionovich Stalin is still living. According to the American records, Mr. John Ray Sinnock, former Chief Engraver at the Philadelphia mint, is deceased. The American people are entirely too intelligent to be sucked in by wild, unfounded stories, and I am proud that this constituent wrote me concerning this matter when he heard it in Russia the people must depend on gossip because their slightest question concerning any story they might hear could easily result in a quick trip to Siberia. I thank the Almighty Father that such is not the case in this country. Whatever the story might be, you have the right to know the facts behind it, and you may be assured that I will do my best to get them for you.

FARM INCOME: Contrary to the beliefs of many big city folks, the net farm incomes are still far below those of the non-farm

individuals. The per capita income of the American farmers last year from all sources was 1020.00, compared with a per capita income of \$1707.00 for the non-farm population. The income from farming alone amounted to \$806.00 per capita.

MOISTURE AND WIND EROSION CONDITIONS IN TEXAS:

The latest reports from the Soil Conservation Service shows the major part of Texas severely hit by the drought. The hardest hit is the entire southwestern portion of the state, from the lower reaches of the Rio Grande to the western edge of the 18th Congressional District. The northeast corner of the Panhandle appears to be in the best shape for moisture and cover. Those coun-

ties lying below the Caprock are the hardest hit in our section. The entire central portion of Texas is hard hit. Recent rains in Eastern Texas have changed soil moisture and plant cover conditions, and this section is in good shape. Most of the Panhandle seems to have good cover except for a few small areas. These small areas can certainly produce a lot of dust when the wind gets to blowing.

FOREIGN AID: I have recently obtained some figures on foreign economic and military aid since July 1945. I wish I had the space to put them all in, but will have to wait until later to do that. I thought you might be interested in the totals. The total economic aid from July, 1945, to September, 1951, was \$31,191,091-

000. Military aid was \$4,500,799,000. The economic aid includes grants and credits utilized. The biggest sum, as you perhaps suspect, went to the United Kingdom. In economic aid grants it received \$2,370,289,000, plus credits utilized in the amount of \$4,727,836,000. The military aid amounted to \$349,495,000. The total 35 1/2 billion plus was divided among approximately 90 countries and possessions of countries. I will tell you more about it later.




