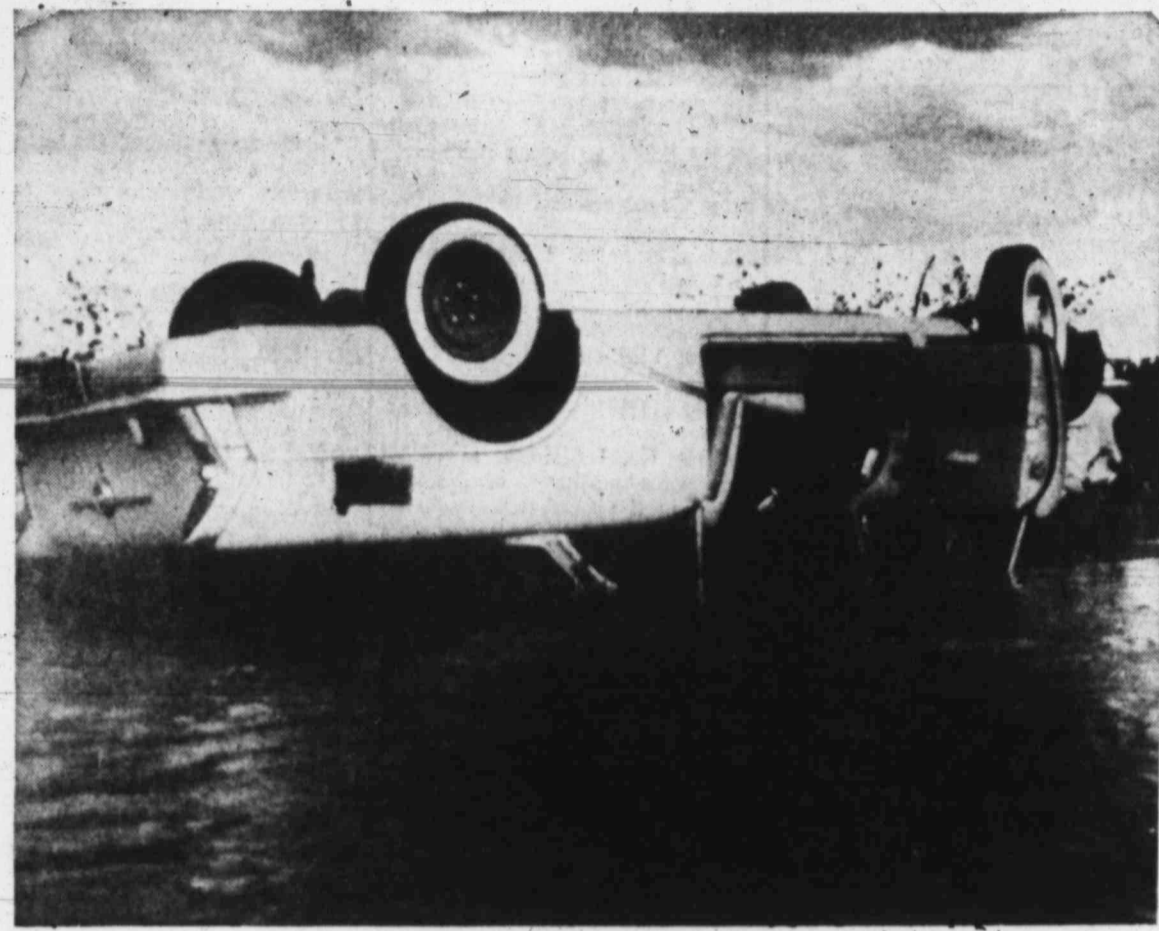

Showers Relieve Some Crops, Others Are Damaged By Hail

The drought which had settled down on Howard County as June ended and as July began was partially broken by scattered showers which struck on Saturday and Sunday. Rainfall totals varied sharply in different parts of the county and some sections missed out entirely. Here in Big Spring, the U. S. Experiment Station gauged .69 inch on Saturday afternoon and an additional 23 inch early Sunday afternoon. This brings the month's total at the station to 1.22—provided by four widely scattered showers. The rains in July as reported by the station were July 5, .02 inch; July 6, .29 inch; July 19, .69 inch and July 20, .23 inch. Much heavier rains fell elsewhere in the county and in the areas north of Coahoma were accompanied by heavy hail. Earl Hull, who lives in that area, said that the hail caused considerable damage to cotton and apparently spread over a considerable part of the district. He reported his gauge showed .90 inch rain for Saturday afternoon. There was no rain Sunday, he said.

Southwest of Big Spring, Hudson Landers reported his place had .50 inch Saturday and none Sunday. There was no rain on the farm of P. O. Hughes, which is in Martin County west and north of Knott. Forsan got 15 Sunday but only a sprinkle Saturday. Arthur Stallings, in the extreme southwest part of the county, said he received no rain either day. The last measurable rain on his farm fell on May 12. That one inch, he said, had been enough to hold his crops "better than one would think," through the hot, windy dry days that have followed. Here in town, the rainfall varied sharply on both Saturday and Sunday. In the southwest part of town Saturday about 21 inch fell. Sunday's shower was slightly above .30 inch. In the Western Hills area, the showers Sunday were accompanied by a brisk fall of hail but no damage resulted. Heaviest reported rain in the area seems to have been at Lee's Store on the Howard-Glasscock line. Two and a half inches were gauged there. Garden City had .30 inch and south of there, farmers and ranchers reported .6 inch; to the northwest of Garden City rain ran from .6 inch to 3 inch. At Elbow, Jack McKinnon reported 1.10 inch and he said even heavier rains fell to the south and southeast. To the west the rain petered out and at Lomax only wind was reported. To the north of Elbow, there were light showers of varying intensity. A few relatively heavy falls were reported—it was said that Herschel Johnson had 1.50 inch at his place on the old San Angelo highway.

Elbow also shared in the light hail but the farmers reported no damage. Bill McIlvain said there was little rain on the Wilkinson ranch west of town. Texas Electric Service Co. reported that Chalk in the southeast part of the county had .50 inch on Sunday and .15 inch on Saturday. Other Texas Electric reports for combined rains on Saturday and Sunday—Big Spring plant .63; Morgan Creek, trace; Sweetwater 23; Iatan 1.00; Wildhorse Creek .72; Colorado City .33; Eskota .33; Lamesa none. No change in the elevation of Lake Colorado City was reported—it stood Monday at 2066.90 the same that it had reported last week. Where rain did fall, it was of great benefit to the crops, farmers said. The dry winds and intense heat have been causing heavy damage to the cotton and feed stuff. Most of the damage has been to the feed but cotton was also suffering. The rains have not been enough to completely cope with the drought situation but they do offer relief in most areas and were welcomed by the farmers. The showers broke the temperature sharply here in town. A 10-degree drop walked on the heels of the Sunday shower and the night was much cooler than has been the average for a number of weeks. High on Sunday was 96 degrees and the low last night was a comfortable 71 degrees. Forecast for today and Tuesday calls for partly cloudy skies and some cooler. There are possibilities of additional thundershowers, the Weather Bureau said.

Election Judge's Letter Returned

Frank Hardesty, county Democratic chairman, said his letter to Cecil Allred, judge for Box No. 13 at Knott, had been returned undelivered. Hardesty said that the address listed was the only one he had for this box.

\$1.2 Million Housing Project Scheduled For S'West Area

Building permits which will aggregate approximately \$1,200,000 were being taken out by Cecil D. McDonald for 100 residences Monday. Applications for the permits filed with the city will cover 180 houses, all to be erected in the Douglass Addition on the old San Angelo Highway just west of the City Park area. Value of the homes will range from about \$11,000 to \$12,000 and some up to \$14,000. Tentatively the permits would include 36 for \$11,000, 55 for \$12,000 and 9 for \$14,000.

There also will be one and two bathrooms included. There will be no less than 90 per cent brick facing in any of the houses built out of a 20-model repertoire. They will be so arranged on the re-platted area that no plan will be repeated more than five times in the entire addition area. The plans also call for built-in ducts for air conditioning and central heating. The air conditioning system is adapted to mechanical conditioning if the owner prefers. The two blocks of the addition next to the old San Angelo road are reserved for development as a shopping center. The residences will be located south and east of these in solid arrangement. This will leave about half the south portion of the addition still to be developed, while the east tier facing the City Park golf course will be held open for more expensive type homes. Streets will be paved throughout the addition, said McDonald, and installation of water and sewer lines will start soon. Kitchens will have built-in washers and will be plumbed for washers, among other things. There will be a number of options available to purchasers, said McDonald. One house, which will be used as an office, is to be erected first and equipped with all items to be found in any of the homes. Work will start on the project as soon as possible, said McDonald. It will be about a half a mile east and south of the Capehart housing project next to Webb AFB and is adjacent to location for the projected M a r c y Elementary school. McDonald recently purchased a tract immediately west of the Douglass Addition and this is available for ultimate development, he said.

Armed Men Block Alabama Race Film

WETUMPKA, Ala. (AP)—Cars blocked the gates of a drive-in theater which advertised it dared to display a movie Sunday night showing a romance between a Negro man and a white woman. A Montgomery Advertiser reporter said some 75 cars arrived at the Dixie drive-in at 8 p.m., shortly after it started showing the movie "Island in the Sun." An estimated 200 persons milled about the gate, but many of them were spectators. A man holding a shotgun sat in one of the cars blocking the gate while other men stopped prospective patrons. One of those halting persons approaching the theater near here said he was from a White Citizens Council. Shortly after the demonstrators arrived, the power line to the drive-in was cut, and the picture was not completed. The men then started allowing the 15 to 25 cars of patrons to leave.

In the darkness the demonstrators tried to drive cars into the theater from fields along the side. Employees firing shotguns into the air turned back the cars. Theater owner Max Singleton and his wife drove out of the drive-in through a field, and were chased by three other cars. They went to a nearby house and telephoned officers. The theater has no phone. Singleton was quoted as saying, "We will not attempt to show the show again for our own protection." The theater had advertised: "This is the one that is banned all over the South. While we dare to show it, we do not endorse it. Make up your mind about seeing it."

Summers Lie Test Fails To Pan Out

AUSTIN (AP)—The Board of Pardons said today that a lie detector test given convict Donald Summers indicated his "confession is false and that Summers did not rape or murder Chere Jo Horton." The board also denied a plea for commutation of sentence for former San Antonio Airman Jimmy Shaver. Shaver is scheduled to die in the electric chair early Friday at Huntsville. He was tried and convicted twice for the July 1954 slaying of the San Antonio girl, 3.

Couple Jailed In Death Of Infant

HOUSTON (AP)—A young couple were jailed early today, following the death of their 14-month-old baby boy from what doctors described as numerous cuts and bruises. The wife and the husband each accused the other of whipping, striking and otherwise mistreating the child because he "was slow to walk."

Navy Uncovers Films Taken At High Altitudes

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Two packages of cosmic ray film plates carried to 130,000 feet by a huge plastic balloon were found in southeastern Montana today. The Navy, which sent the balloon up Sunday, was putting finishing touches on a plan to launch a manned balloon Wednesday afternoon. A spokesman for General Mills, Inc., contractor for the flight to collect cosmic ray data, said the 225-pound cargo of research equipment was found near Harlan, Mont., about 50 miles east of Billings. The sheriff at Harlan was reported holding it. The equipment was jettisoned from the balloon Sunday. A tracking plane followed the parachute-borne payload down to an altitude of 10,000 feet, but lost it in the haze. Prof. Marcel Schein of the University of Chicago, a co-sponsor of the flight with the Navy, said the film record from 130,000 feet could constitute a "milestone" in cosmic ray study. Weather permitting, the manned flight will be launched Wednesday from a deep open pit iron mine near Crosby, Minn. The plan is for Navy Cmdr. Malcolm D. Ross and M. Lee Lewis, a former Navy balloonist, to spend about 24 hours in a sealed, aluminum gondola lofted to an altitude of 80,000 to 84,000 feet, just short of the record they set last fall for two men. The huge, gas-filled bag also will carry a small television camera. TV signals will be transmitted back to earth and relayed over a nationwide television network. The flight will be the seventh in a series of Navy strato-lab voyages into the upper atmosphere of the earth. Primary purpose will be to test the gondola and equipment for a planned "Project Mars" flight in November. Cmdr. Ross and Dr. John Strong, a Johns Hopkins University astronomer, hope to make spectrographic photographs of the atmosphere around Mars. The gondola also will bear containers of insects, some inside and some taped to the outside. The Department of Agriculture asked the Navy to take the insects along. The department wants to learn about effects of cosmic rays.

Iraqi Colonel Stages A Coup

LONDON (AP)—A smartly dressed Iraqi colonel staged a polite and smiling coup here today. He ousted his ambassador and top aides and set up a minor diplomat as temporary head of the Iraqi mission to Britain. Col. Abdul Kadir Faik, mustached 35-year-old graduate of a British military staff college, appeared at a news conference to announce that the onetime embassy of the Kingdom of Iraq is now the Embassy of the republic. "The ambassador and minister do not hold their positions now," he explained. The colonel said he had conferred by telephone today with Brig. Abdul Karim Kassem, Premier of the new Iraqi regime, and received his instructions. Col. Faik brushed aside references to the ambassador, Prince Al-Amir Zeid ib Al-Hussein, great uncle of the slain King Faisal and now sole surviving member of the Iraqi royal family. Col. Faik said the Kassem had told him on the telephone: "For God's sake make it clear to the West that we are still their friends. We will be their friends and we should like to continue the former relations between Iraq and the West."

Beirut Is Symbol Of War That Is Not War, Peace That Is Not Peace

By RELMAN MORIN — A Beirut, Lebanon (AP) — A starshell blazes suddenly in the night sky and hangs there bathing the hills outside Beirut in a pale unearthly light—the U.S. Marines are hunting snipers above the airfield. Coming into the city, you pass through that eternal symbol of danger after dark — a sandbag roadblock bristling with Tommy guns. The streets are completely deserted, but along the docks you see all the massive clanking machinery of war—gray-hulled warships, tanks, guns, mortars and rockets, mountains of equipment piled behind barbed wire stockades under the glare of powerful searchlights. By night it all looks painfully familiar, the grim trappings of war. But by day you might as well be in Atlantic City or Long Beach, Calif. Bikinis blossom on the beaches. The white sails of pleasure craft glitter on the sea. "Here, serge, when are we going swimming?" asks a Marine in a mortar position. You want to visit the Lebanese rebels who have brought all this about? All you have to do is walk up the street to that sandbag barricade. They are watching government buildings from there. Or if you want, you can pick up the telephone and talk with their leaders. Why don't government forces walk up the street and clean them out? They have armored cars parked nearby and the Lebanese security forces look tough. So why not wrap this thing up and get it over with? Well, that's a good question. But nobody seems to have the answer. It is lost in the inextricable tan-

Menacing Words Heighten Crisis

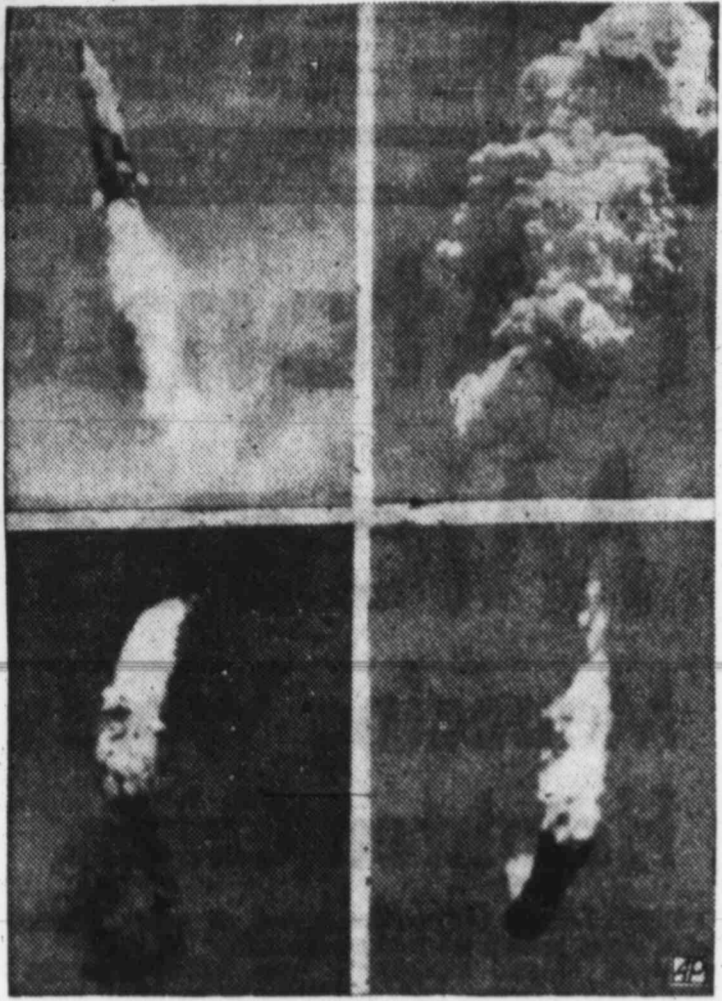
BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The United States brought the menacing words "atomic capability" into the Middle Eastern crisis today. "Any further discussion is a matter of security," he added. He did not say the Marines had brought atomic warheads, but the implication seemed clear. The Marines have landed four 8-inch howitzers which are capable of shooting an atomic shell about 11 miles. The adding of Marines to Lebanese army patrols was described by U.S. briefing officers as an effort to improve liaison with Lebanese army forces in an effort to halt sniping at aircraft and Marine guards. At least 60 planes have been hit. No injuries have resulted. The flight path into Beirut airport takes planes over rebel territory. Jordan has made a complete diplomatic break with Nasser's U.A.R. The Foreign Ministry in Amman announced the break at the same time King Hussein's government received a 125-million-dollar shot in the arm from the United States to aid it over economic hurdles in the present crisis. Nasser had returned to Cairo after a diplomatic expedition that took him to Yugoslavia, the Soviet Union and Syria. Some 1,400 more American troops landed in Beirut, bringing the total in Lebanon to about 9,400. The new arrivals brought in the first heavy artillery as well as cooks, supply and maintenance men that indicated the United States might be getting ready for a long stay. Newsmen Depart Beirut 'War Zone'

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The Beirut office of The Associated Press has been moved away from the "war zone." The telephones went dead early Sunday morning. Lebanese authorities said telephone linemen refused to approach the office to make repairs because it was too close to an insurgent barricade. Rebels are manning a sandbag barrier two blocks up the street within sight of the office front door. They occasionally fire down the street toward some government buildings. So the office was moved into a quieter residential area.

Oil Firms Accept Valuations Report

Oil companies operating in Howard County have accepted the valuations placed against their properties for tax purposes by the tax engineering firm of Abbott & Pritchard, subject to the customary individual check of each firm's assessment sheet. No protests were registered when the Howard County Commissioners, meeting on Monday as a board of equalization, opened the conference on oil property tax rates for next year. The commissioner's courtroom was filled to overflow capacity by representatives requested an opportunity to hold a private caucus after R. H. Weaver, county judge, had outlined in brief form the developments facing the county and informed the companies that the assessment would be based on 20 per cent of the assessed value. Ghana Leader Has Dream Of Strong Africa

ACCRA, Ghana (AP) — Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah, proudly called the "show boy" of this young nation, is hitting the trail to Washington.

The 49-year-old American-educated leader, who pronounces his name Kwah-mee Nee-kroo-mah, wants to explain what he calls the new force of "African personality" in world affairs, and to unfold plans to turn this country of cocoa plantations and mud huts into a great industrial nation.

His 10-day visit, on invitation of President Eisenhower, starts Wednesday.

The term African personality wraps up Nkrumah's ambition to play a leading role in raising the whole of Africa to a point at which no world problem could be solved without its participation.

He dreams of a United States of West Africa, now that his dream of an independent Gold Coast (the former name for Ghana) has come true. He wants Western help in building up a strong band of newly independent African states which would be respected in world affairs.

SOME PROGRESS
A step in this direction was the conference here last April of eight independent African states—Ghana, Liberia, Tunisia, Morocco, Libya, Ethiopia, Sudan and Egypt of the United Arab Republic.

Financially, Nkrumah wants American assistance for the \$40-million-dollar project to harness the Volta River for hydroelectric power for an aluminum industry.

Nkrumah is prepared to argue that Ghana must have Western help if she is to avoid turning to the Soviet bloc and getting involved in a Communist web. He says American assistance would demonstrate to other African states that the West is ready to help them.

Nkrumah told Vice President Nixon when he was here in March 1957, for Ghana's independence celebrations, that this country would never be neutral in the East-West struggle.

Born the son of a goldsmith in 1909 in a primitive bush-village, Nkrumah first went to Catholic mission schools. With the aid of an uncle who had made money in diamond prospecting, he went to the United States in 1945 and remained 10 years.

He earned degrees at Lincoln University and at the University of Pennsylvania.

BECOMES LAWYER
In 1945 he went to England, studied at the London School of Economics and enrolled at the Inner Temple to qualify as a barrister (lawyer).

Two years later he returned to Accra to become a general secretary of a new nationalist movement. Soon, he started his own party and launched a program of "positive action"—strikes and demonstrations for independence. He was sent to jail, but directed his party by instructions written on toilet paper and smuggled out of his cell. In the general election of 1946, his party won an overwhelming majority. Nkrumah was released from jail to form the Gold Coast's first all-African government.

Finally, the British government pledged independence if Nkrumah's party won a firm majority for that policy in an election.

The hot campaign that followed in 1956 is partially responsible for Nkrumah's reputation as show boy. He capitalized on his jail record by wearing a PG (prison graduate) badge. His followers were schooled by sound truck, and were worked up by the recorded beat of tomtoms and calypso-style rhythm.

Nkrumah's party won 71 of the Legislature's 104 seats.

HOLLYWOOD BEAUTY Tips On Keeping Cool During Hot Weather

HOLLYWOOD—I first met Paula Raymond when she was under contract to MGM. Then she was referred to as a "young Myrna Loy." Not long after our meeting I heard she had retired, so I was surprised to see her the other day on the "Playhouse 90" set at CBS. It was one of those hot days that make the weather a main topic of conversation, but Paula looked so removed from the heat that I asked her secret for keeping cool.

"The most important thing is to dress for hot weather," she replied. "Keep anything away from your throat. I don't wear anything tight or that requires nylon petticoats. A fabric that allows ventilation makes a great difference.

"Don't hurry because that will raise the temperature of the body," Paula continued. "I allow plenty of time so that I can do everything more slowly.

"And I eat very little," she added. As we were talking, a cart with cold drinks and ice cream snacks was brought on the set. Paula chose a lime drink.

"Take lots of liquids on a hot day but don't have them too cold," Paula cautioned. "The technique of not feeling the heat is to minimize, as much as possible, the difference between your body temperature and the air.

"That's why you feel so much hotter after a cold shower than if you'd had a tepid one," she explained. "Evaporation is cooling, so put yourself dry after a shower instead of a brisk rub down.

"I carry cologne with me and find it very refreshing to put a little on my wrists and other pulse points," Paula revealed. "When the nights are hot, I fill an ice bag and put it in my bed. You know how hot the sheets can get just from the body's temperature? Well, the ice bag will help to counteract that," she said in parting.

Here's Trick To Promote Good Habit

Little things can encourage a child to be neat and put her things away. A gay laundry bag, for instance, can teach her to put soiled clothes where they belong, so that her mother doesn't have to waste time on washday searching her room for things that need washing.

Here is an idea for a laundry bag that looks like a dress, easy to make from left-over fabric. Just be sure the fabric is washable, advise local sewing center experts.

To make the laundry bag, simply cut two dress-shaped pieces, with short sleeves and round neckline. A good size for the bag is 26 inches long, 16 inches across the body of the bag and 20 inches from the sleeve-tip to sleeve-tip across the shoulder line.

Silt and hem the front opening. Attach a small band collar and bow-tie at the neckline. To disguise its bulge as the laundry piles up, add a small gathered apron. Finish sleeves with bias binding.

Hang the bag on an ordinary wooden hanger in a convenient spot, at a height easy for a child to reach.

Many mothers make these laundry bags to match the fabrics in the room, using material left over from curtains and bedspread. Additional fabric left over from a decorating project may be utilized for garment bags and shoe bags.

The new trial is expected to be held in August and all indications are that Foster will be freed for good.

Texas Campaigns Enter Last 5 Days

With just five campaigning days left, Texas political aspirants seeking offices ranging from public weigher to the governor's mansion and the U.S. Senate Monday swung into the last round of hand-shaking and speechmaking.

There was one exception. Ralph Yarborough, seeking re-election as U.S. senator, flew back to Washington Sunday night and asked his supporters to carry on his campaign.

"I feel that the deepening crisis in the Middle East makes it imperative that I return to Washington," Yarborough said. "I am requesting my friends and supporters to take over and carry on my campaign while I am away. I will return to Texas as soon as possible."

His lone opponent, William A. Blakley of Dallas, Monday headed for Bryan where he had sched-

uled a telecast at night. Tuesday Blakley planned to visit Cameron, Temple, Belton and Killeen with a statewide telecast from Waco.

His schedule called for a swing of Houston and Port Arthur Wednesday, a trip to Corpus Christi and the Rio Grande Valley Thursday and back to Fort Worth for a statewide telecast Friday night.

All four candidates in the Democratic gubernatorial primary planned busy weeks.

State Sen. Henry B. Gonzalez, speaking at a Sunday rally at McAllen, said he would ask the Legislature to set up a state atomic energy commission next January "either as governor of Texas or state senator from Bexar County."

Gonzalez planned to visit Fort Worth Monday, then move on to Dallas Tuesday for a rally and television address. He planned a Wednesday rally and telecast from San Antonio, a trip to Beaumont, Houston, and Galveston Thursday, then back to San Antonio, Austin, Houston and Fort Worth.

Gov. Price Daniel planned a telecast in Dallas Monday night. Traveling Tuesday by plane he scheduled stops at Fort Worth, Shiner, Lufkin and Zavalla.

Wednesday and Thursday he planned to continue his campaign through East Texas with stops at Jasper, Silsbee, Beaumont, Orange, Port Arthur and Port Neches. He is to be at his home in Liberty on election day.

Former Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel resumed his helicopter trip Monday in the Houston area. Tuesday he is to visit in Pasadena, Baytown, La Porte, Texas City, Galveston, Alvin, Sugar Land, and Fairbanks. Wednesday's stops include Richmond, Rosenberg, Wharton, El Campo, Palacios, Edna, Cuero, and Victoria. Thursday he plans to visit Goliad, Beeville, Corpus Christi, Robstown, Falfurrias, and Alice with stops at San Antonio, Seguin, San Marcos and Austin Friday.

Joe A. Erwin took his campaign for governor to the South Plains over the weekend. Starting with a talk at Fort Stockton political rally Saturday, he appeared at a political rally in Littlefield Sunday and was due to talk at Floydada Monday. He planned to be in Texas City Wednesday and Galveston Thursday.

LT. Gov. Ben Ramsey headed for West Texas early this week in his bid for re-election. His opponent, George Nokes of Waco, a former state senator, planned to campaign in Fort Worth and surrounding towns.

The press corps heard the blonde's retort: "Well, how was I to know to make other arrangements?"

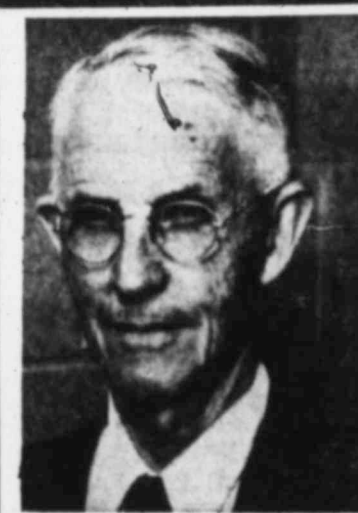

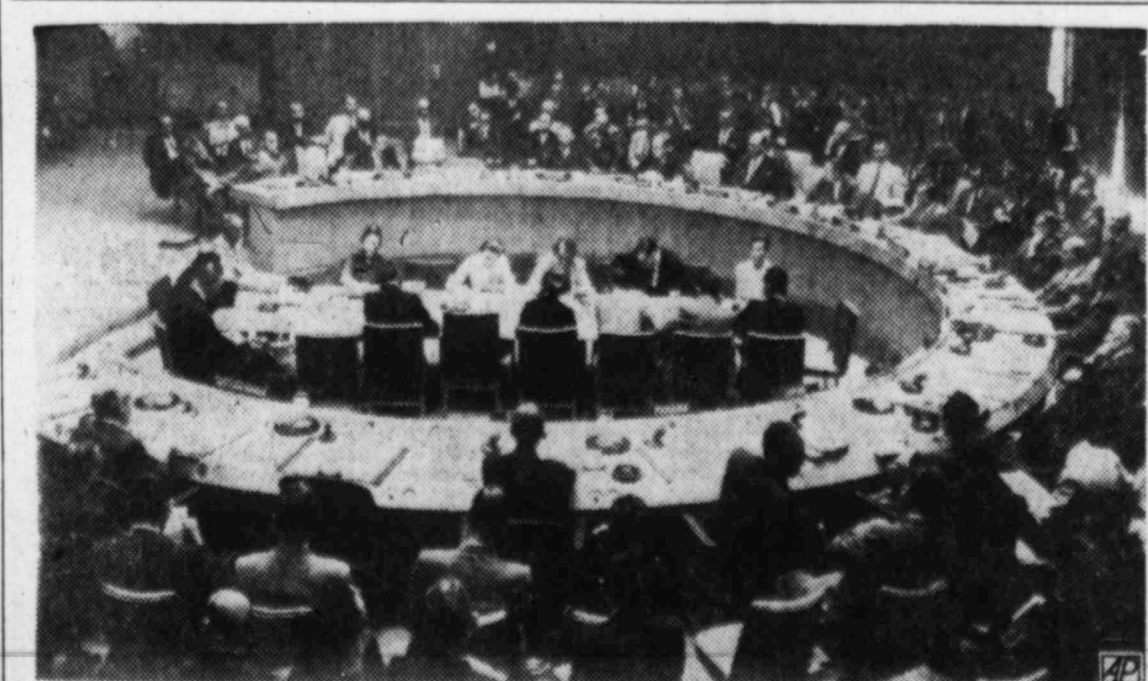

Graham Plans Texas Crusade

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham, his California crusade ended here last night, turned his attention to Texas today.

Attendance at Graham's California talks totaled more than a million. He started them April 27 at San Francisco, continued there for seven weeks, and then went on to Sacramento, Fresno, Santa Barbara, Los Angeles and San Diego.

Insect Control School Is Set Thursday In Coahoma

A short course of Cotton Insect Control is scheduled to get under way in the vocational agriculture department at Coahoma High School at 7 p.m. Thursday.

The course is being organized by Rayburn Foster, Coahoma High School vocational agriculture teacher, and will be conducted with the assistance of H. A. Turney, insect control specialist stationed at Texas A&M College. Entry fee is \$2 and Foster may be reached at Lyric 4-3353.

Main purpose of the short course is to offer training that will enable farmers to develop and carry out more economical and effective cotton insect control programs, Foster said.

Foster explained the three-session program agenda as follows: The first will be devoted to identification to both harmful and beneficial cotton insects; to recognition of the nature and extent of their damages; and to insecticides, kinds, cost, use and application. Field work is to be featured in the second meeting tentatively

scheduled for Friday. Participating farmers will have opportunity determining the nature and extent of damage caused by various insects, and to practice making insect counts as a step in deciding whether or not to poison.

The date and place for the third meeting is yet to be arranged. It is anticipated, however, that the third meeting will cover such things as safety in mixing and applying insecticides, calibrating spraying equipment, kinds of insecticides to use in controlling various insects and combination of insects, frequency of applying poisons, and review of identification and procedure for making insect counts.

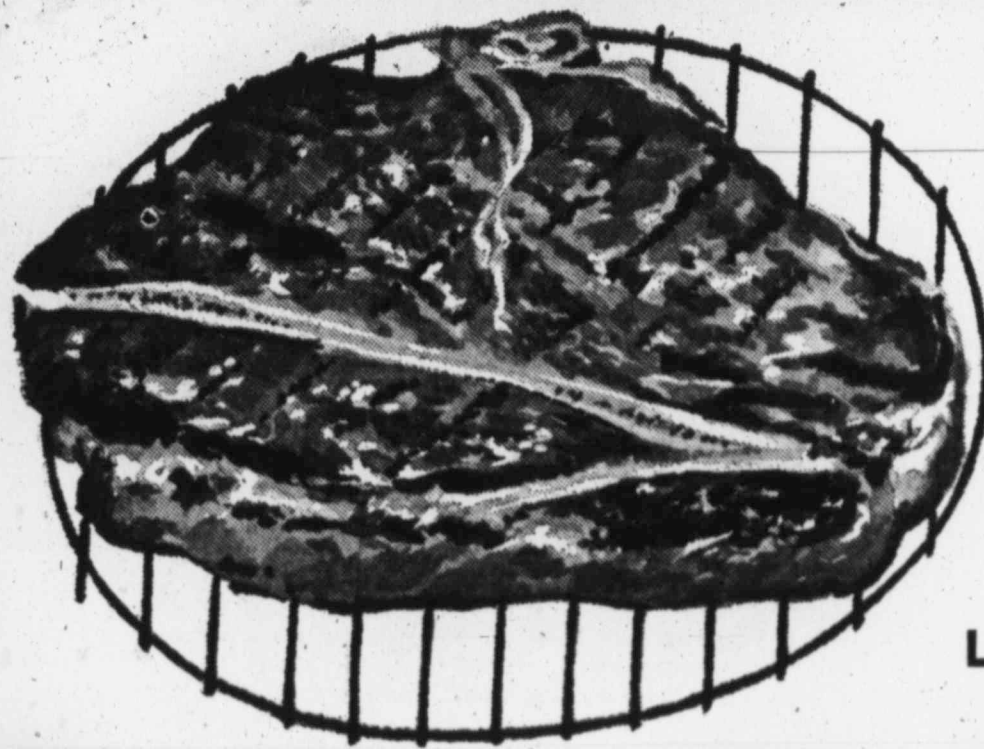

Public Gets First View Of 'Miss Universe' Entries

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—The public has had its first close look at the entrants in this year's Miss Universe contest—and the 79 beauties drew whistling and hand-clapping approval. The occasion was the official pageant parade, viewed by an estimated 250,000 persons yesterday. Each girl rode on her own float, pushed by Army and Navy reservists, who appeared to enjoy their work despite a brilliant sun. The contestants wore bathing suits and some of the fair-skinned girls came away with slight sunburns. A total of 124 elements made up the parade, including 22 bands and several marching units. Thunderstorms Pelt Texas

The front was expected to remain stationary during Monday. Amarillo, Childress and Texarkana reported early morning thunderstorms and there was also scattered thunderstorm activity in North Texas. Congress Postpones Ruling On Atom Power Development

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has postponed for at least a year a decision, and the fight certain to go with it, on how to develop atomic electric power. The 336 million dollar atomic energy authorization bill approved by the House and the Senate last week provides little in the way of new reactor development. President Eisenhower wanted only half that amount approved, he protested, though not too vigorously the bill drafted by

the Democratic-controlled Senate House Atomic Energy Committee. But the Atomic Energy Commission and Republican members of the committee raised little objection to the measure, and the bill sailed through Congress without a call in either house. The ease of passage was in sharp contrast to the bitter bipartisan battles of the previous two years over atomic authorization. It was deliberate. Democratic members of the committee who want an ambitious long-term program of atomic reactor construction deliberately withheld their proposals this year to achieve a monetary truce.

They feel that with Rear Adm. Lewis L. Strauss no longer chairman of the AEC, the commission and Congress might have a better chance of getting together next year. The basic question that arose shortly after World War II remains: Shall the government take the lead in development of atomic energy for power or shall the responsibility be given to private industry? Democrats on the joint committee want the government to take the initiative on the ground that private industry is either unwilling or unable to expend the vast sums which would be required. Republican committee members have expressed fears that government-financed development would provide a foot in the door for public power interests to take over atomic power. The lone large-scale power reactor in operation, at Shippingport, Pa., is owned by the govern-

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — H. Maxwell Goldfine spent less than 24 hours at a hospital where he was treated for multiple self-inflicted razor blade slashes. The 36-year-old son of New England industrialist Bernard Goldfine left the hospital yesterday, picked up by his pretty blonde wife. They drove off to an undisclosed destination. Mrs. Goldfine reportedly had been seeking a divorce, but when asked about it, she said, "All I can say is that everything is all right just now." Goldfine locked himself in a bathroom Saturday morning and inflicted numerous superficial cuts on his body before yielding to pleas to come out. His wife said he was upset by his father's role in congressional investigations probing the elder Goldfine's relations with presidential aide Sherman Adams.
