## **Ghana Leader** Has Dream Of Strong Africa

ACCRA, Ghana (AP) - Prime Minister Kwame Nkrumah, proudly called the "show boy" of this young nation, is hitting the trail to Washington.

The 49-year-old American-edu cated leader, who pronounces his name Kwah'-mee Nee-kroo'-mah. wants to explain what he calls the new force of "African personality" in world affairs, and to unfold plans to turn this country of

cocoa plantations and mud huts into a great industrial nation. His 10 - day visit, on invita-tion of President Eisenhower, starts Wednesday. The term African personality wraps up Nkrumah's ambition to play a leading role in raising the

whole of Africa to a point at which no world problem could be solved without its participation. He dreams of a United States of West Africa, now that his dream of an independent Gold Coast (the former name for Ghana) has come true. He wants Western help in building up a strong band of newly independent African states which would be respected in world affairs.

SOME PROGRESS A step in this direction was the conference here last April of eight independent African states -Ghana, Liberia, Tunisia, Morocco, Libya, Ethiopia, Sudan and Egypt of the United Arab Repub-

Financially, Nkrumah wants American assistance for the 840million-dollar project to harness the Volta River for hydroelectric power for an aluminum industry. Nkrumah is prepared to argue that Ghana must have Western help if she is to avoid turning to the Soviet bloc and getting involved in a Communist web. He says American assistance would demonstrate to other African states that the West is ready to

help them. Nkrumah told Vice President Nixon when he was here in March 1957, for Ghana's independence celebrations, that this country would never be neutral in the

East-West struggle. Born the son of a goldsmith in 1909 in a primitive bush-village, Nkrumah first went to Catholic mission schools. With the aid of an uncle who had made money in diamond prospecting, he went to the United States in 1945 and remained 10 years.

He earned degrees at Lincoln University and at the University

BECOMES LAWYER In 1945 he went to England, stud-ied at the London School of Eco-nomics and enrolled at the Inner Temple to qualify as a barrister

Two years later he returned to Accra to become a general secretary of a new nationalist movement. Soon, he started his own party and launched a program of 'positive action" - strikes and demonstrations for independence. He was sent to jail, but directed his party by instructions written on toilet paper and smuggled out of his cell. In the general election of 1951, his party won an overwhelming majority. Nkrumah was released from jail to form the Gold Coast's first all-African gov-

Finally, the British government pledged independence if Nkru mah's party won a firm majority for that policy in an election.

The hot campaign that followed in 1956 is partially responsible for Nkrumah's reputation as show boy. He capitalized on his jail record by wearing a PG (prison graduate) badge. His followers were schooled by sound truck, and were worked up by the recorded beat of tomtoms and calypso-style



OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)-Oklanoma Democrats choose tomorrow between two political newcomers seeking their party's gubernatorial nomination

Clashing in a runoff primary after a bitter three-week campaign are the men who led a field of 11 in the general primary July 1. Neither received a majority of the votes, forcing the runoff.

They are J. Howard Edmondson, 32-year-old Tulsa County attorney, and W. P. (Bill) Atkinson, 52, millionaire developer who built his home town of Midwest City. The winner will meet Republican Phil Ferguson of Woodward and independent D. A. Bryce, former FBI agent from Lawhuska, in the November election.

## Foster, Saved From Chair, **Begins Vacation**

ATLANTA (AP)—James Fulton Foster headed for Florida today, just like any family man on va-

But it's more than just a vacation for the South Carolina man who was sentenced to die for a murder another man later con-

It is Foster's first real taste of freedom after two years of legal appeals, last-minute stays of execution and jail routine.

Foster, his wife and seven children headed for Daytona Beach where Leo Burschay, a wealthy art dealer, offered them a week's vacation at his expense.

Just two days ago, Foster was granted a new trial at a hearing in Jefferson, Ga., and was allowed to sign his own \$500 bond. The new trial was granted after Charles (Rocky) Rothschild confessed to the 1956 killing of Jefferson merchant Charles Drake. Rothschild is serving a five-year burglary conspiracy sentence in South Carolina.







## Indifference May Decide

Saturday is a doubly important day for members of the Democratic party in Texas. The big show will be the primary in which candidates of the party will be either nominated or perhaps given a lease on life for the grand finale in

Equally important but more apt to go unheeded will be the precinct conventions. Every qualified voter who regards himself as a membr of the party is entitled to participate in these conventions, but only those who take the time to attend the conventions will be exercising their right to determine party policy at the grass roots.

Until recent years a handful of voters went through the motions of a convention, listed some potential names as dele-

gates to the county convention and adjourned. Two years ago, however, the conventions attracted vastly more interest, and that should be the case this

Contending for control of party machinery will be the moderate-conservatives, rallying behind the governor and the state Democratic Executive Committee, and the liberal-labor combine under the

This is a choice which party members can delegate to others only through indifference and failure to take time to attend precinct conventions. It will not be those who participate so much as those who stay away who determine the flavor of the county delegation and possibly the state convention and committee.

There were rumors, this time, that John Foster Dulles had his way and decided that we had temporized long enough. So, with only slight variations, we went in with guns only figuratively blazing, whereas France and Britain went in with guns literally blazing.

We do not know if either of these rumors had any basis in fact, but the record reflects that Secretary Dulles has never, at any stage, held any illusions as to the threat of Communist world conquest, and has spoken his mind openly

In the Suez affair of 1956 there were and vigorously about it on many occa-

Some of his critics have berated him for being too outspoken, for being so unyieldingly insistent that we not compromise for the sake of appeasing either Russia or her satellites or the so-called "neutrals" or "uncommitted" nations.

Had a weaker and less determined man been in the State Department during these critical years, our situation might be worse than it is-and in all honesty it is bad enough.

This tireless old man has never faltered, though he has had to modify his views and actions at times under pressure. As is the common lot of secretaries of State, he has taken a lot of abuse and even ridicule, mostly in silence and without complaint. In this most critical posture of our foreign relations it is to be prayed he may prove to be a rallying point and a tower of strength.

## U. N. Must Make Decision In Near East

WASHINGTON - The United Nations has failed, in the face of an established record, to act promptly to prevent two member states-Soviet Russia and the Egypt-Syria "republic"-from attempting to impair the territorial integrity and political independence of three other member states-Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq.

The United Nations has for several weeks had its official "observer" team on the spot in Lebanon, but the secretarygeneral, Dag Hammarskjold, split hairs and stated on July 3 that there was no evidence of "mass infiltration." What difference does the degree or extent of an "infiltration" make if it proves effective in gaining its objective? The "observers" conceded in the group's first report on July 4 that they had not been able to gain access to key areas along the border of Syria and Lebanon, and the report was widely criticized as a "guide to dictators." In its latest report, the group states that, as of July 15, it has obtained "full access to all sections of the Lebanese frontier." Meanwhile, the secretary-general's statements have perhaps given unwitting encouragement to the rebel forces in both Lebanon and

Documented evidence of "infiltration" and "indirect aggression" in Lebanon is presented in the formal summary report just submitted to the Senate Foreign Relations and the House Foreign Affairs committees by the State Department - and immediately broadcast to the whole world by the Voice of America.

In the light of the factual record now available, the United Nations has a duty to denounce by resolution, as it did in the case of Korea in 1950, the offending member states-the Soviet Union and its Egyptian-Syrian ally. Because of the influence of the Communists among neutralist states, and their bloc of votes, military action by the U.N. itself, through the procedures prescribed in the charter, will be hard to bring into being, though this is the logical step for the U.N. to take.

The charter of the U.N. deals explicitly with what has occurred. It says:

"All members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state, or in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations."

Certainly the facts show that the Soviet Union and its ally, Egypt-Syria, violated that provision of the charter. But the Soviets have the right to veto in the Security Council any remedial proposals, and the General Assembly itself can do very little. So the situation reverts to the formula of collective action by individual

"Nothing in the present charter shall impair the inherent right of individual or collective self-defense if an armed attack occurs against a member of the United Nations, until the Security Council has taken measures necessary to maintain international peace and security. Measures taken by members in the exercise of this right of self-defense shall be immediately reported to the Security Council and shall not in any way affect the authority and responsibility of the Security Council under the present charter to take at any time such action as it deems necessary in order to maintain or restore international peace and security.

It is under this article that both the United States and Britain have already acted in the emergency this week.

A stalemate is likely to extend for some time now. The British troops in Jordan and the American Marines in Lebanon will stand guard until such time as the dispute is resolved by the U.N., when Britain and America have promised to withdraw their forces. This perhaps may mean months of discussion, with things remaining as they are in the Middle East unless the Soviets choose to complicate matters by sending in troops and supplies to induce the rebels to attack the British and American forces. This seems unlikely, because it might produce a big war. Also it could lead to a much more extensive occupation of the area by British and American and possibly French and Turkish forces.

The Soviets are handicapped because of their geographical position. They have no common border with either Lebanon, Jordan or Iraq, and if any attempts are made to send troops or supplies by sea to the troubled area, they can be detected and stopped by the British and Amer-

The big fact is that America and France and Britain are working together, militarily and politically. This is a dramate example of unity which is very essential at a time like the present. It will favorably influence world opinion. Mostly it will reassure the defenders of freedom everywhere that the U. S., Great Britain and France will not let a Soviet veto in U.N. frustrate defensive action against subversion and invasion of the sovereignty of an independent state.

Out of the whole episode may come a clearer understanding throughout the world in the future of the kind of subversion, instigated by a foreign power, which can deprive a country of its freedom and independence and start a wave of local wars between smaller countries, or even precipitate a big war-the very thing the U.N. was created to prevent. Some of the light-fingered gentry may regard their weakness of taking other people's property as harmless fun. Regrettably, it's no joke to the merchandiser or to the general public, which, in the end, must stand the loss.

Some merchants will tell you their losses to shop lifters sometimes run as high as one-half of one per cent of their sales. To combat such pillaging, the managers of business concerns must hold reg-

ular briefings with their employes on how to combat such acts. Most everyone who walks into a store is placed under surveillience. But, if you're not guilty of such tendencies, don't worry about it. The 'private eyes' know about who to look for. They are

well acquainted with old offenders, too,

and keep a sharp lookout for them. You might think that most of the people who have a tendency to walk away from a business establishment without paying for the goods they've taken come from the under-privileged or ne'er-do-well

Some do, but by no means, all. The shop-lifters are enlisted from all walks of life, even the very well-to-do.

Shoplifting seems to thrive in selfservice stores, where the guilty are inclined to think that their chances of executing their crimes are much betterbeyond the prying eyes of the attend-

is suspected and even accused. When that occurs, no kind of apology or explanation suffices. The law-abiding customer, in such cases, suffers grievous damage to his pride and, he reasons, to his reputation. He strikes back with the methods at hand-through threat of lawsuit, boycott and a propaganda campaign with his neighbors and his friends.

Working under such a handicap, a difficult job of detecting and seeking out the true offenders becomes much more complex for the merchants.

But a surprising number of property owners forked over the \$75, and within the past few years, the city has begun to enjoy the beauty that trees impart to any landscape. As a result, when the old Third Avenue Elevated came down a few years ago, revealing a broad and handsome thoroughfare, it wasn't difficult for the city to persuade landowners to invest

## Think Of Goldfine As Poet With Money

Some people lack a common, ordinary sense of poetry. They keep money in the bank to draw interest. Or they buy E-bonds or shares in savings and loan associations. Or they purchase stocks to get mercenary, steak-buying dividends. Not so, Bernard Goldfine!

He's a poet with money. No sugar bowls for him; no mattress; no savings deposits, no E-bonds. He discovered the essence of financial simplicity-the art of the treasurer's and the certified check.

A check is a thin piece of paper. Placed in a wallet, it can be carried alongside the heart. It has this drawback. In a wallet, a check gathers no moss. And Goldfine, in thus poetizing with money over the many years that he has been "buying" and storing treasurer's checks, has sacrificed about \$100,000-the interest or dividends he could have earned

But then what's income to Goldfine? Something to pay taxes on? How crass can you get?

Goldfine has had the good grace not to alarm internal revenue agents unduly. They always become irritated with persons who don't use banks, persons who secrete large sums of cash. Maybe such persons have been engaged in tax evasion, private income tax "withholding." Goldfine uses banks. Freely. He has de-

posited the receipts of his companies like any other business man. They're exposed to revenuers' and accountants' eyes and calculating machines. Then, after the money is in the bank, Goldfine yields to a poetic urge to spew \$770,000 forth in treasurer's or certified checks to himself, his companies, and persons he can't

Such checks are special. If you and I issue checks on our accounts, the money stays in the accounts until the checks are cashed. Both certified and treasurer's shecks reduce the balance at once. To et a treasurer's check, you draw a regcheck on your account to the order out its own check payable to you or any- poets!

one else you name. Properly endorsed, it's the equivalent of cash.

To get a certified check, you take one of your checks to the bank and the bank stamps it "certified," meaning the money has been set aside to meet it. Simultaneously, the bank deducts the amount of the check from your balance.

Treasurer's and certified checks are usually used in large real estate transactions when cash or the equivalent is required. They're used in large securities transactions-new issues. When a government or corporation turns over bonds or stocks to a banking syndicate, it wants immediately available cash, Such treasurer's or certified checks are cashed promptly. They aren't usually carried around with loving care.


Whenever a man's eccentricity attracts attention, he picks up critics. So it is with Goldfine. Some persons suggest his love of certified cash is materially prosaic, that his penchant for treasurer's checks could have been a device to save

In drawing a check, he implies an expense, a payment for some service incurred in the ordinary course of business. An internal revenue agent would have to be pretty sharp to prove other-

A \$50,000 treasurer's check would snip apparent earnings by \$50,000, and deprive the income tax collector of \$26,000 at the present 52 per cent corporate rate. In the days of excess profits taxes, when some of the checks were made out, the deprivation would have been greater.

Some persons ask: Why would Goldfine go to all that trouble when a false entry on the books would do? However, there would still be the cash in the bank and the cash balance and surplus on the company's balance sheet. A treasurer's check solves double-entry problems.

Turn into this hot meat shell . . . 2 cups heated and seasoned mixed vegetables (1 pkg. frozen) ... 1 cup cut-up fresh or cooked tomatoes (drained) . . Garnish with green pepper rings (cooked 5 min.) Return to oven; bake 20 min.

#### **Meat-Stuffed Peppers** 4 medium tomatoes,

8 green peppers 1 small onion, chopped chopped pound hamburger 11/2 cups cut, fresh corn 2 tablespoons fat (3 to 4 ears)

Salt and pepper Remove top and seeds from green peppers; parboil 5 minutes; drain. Brown onion and meat in hot fat; add to tomatoes, corn and seasonings; stuff peppers and top with buttered crumbs. Stand upright in greased 11 x 7 x 11/2" baking dish; add small amount water. Cover and bake in 350 degree oven 1 hour. Makes 8 servings.
