### Victory Loan Bond Red Cross Sales Are Lagging

Sale of Bonds in the Victory Loan Drive are lagging, according to a report received today by Mr. Percy Estes, County Victory Loan Chairman. The report, as of November 9, for Castro County was an official tabulation by the Federal Reserve Bank. The report revealed that a total of \$18,864.50 had been invested in bonds in Castro county during the current drive. A breakdown of the total showed E Bonds, \$7,162.50; F Bonds, \$1,702.00 and Tax Notes, Series C, \$10,000.00. Castro County's overall quota in the drive is \$90,000.00.

### Cows Should Be Tested For Bangs Disease

Several requests have been received in the past few days by County Agent King in regard to testing cows for bangs disease. Two methods of testing are available. One method is to sign up in the County Agent's office to have cows tested by the Texas Livestock Comission.
