

## Victory Loan Bond Sales Are Lagging

Sale of Bonds in the Victory Loan Drive are lagging, according to a report received today by Mr. Percy Estes, County Victory Loan Chairman. The report, as of November 9, for Castro County was an official tabulation by the Federal Reserve Bank. The report revealed that a total of \$18,864.50 had been invested in bonds in Castro county during the current drive. A breakdown of the total showed E Bonds, \$7,162.50; F Bonds, \$1,702.00 and Tax Notes, Series C, \$10,000.00. Castro County's overall quota in the drive is \$90,000.00.

## Cows Should Be Tested For Bangs Disease

Several requests have been received in the past few days by County Agent King in regard to testing cows for bangs disease. Two methods of testing are available. One method is to sign up in the County Agent's office to have cows tested by the Texas Livestock Commission. This test is free to farmer and this also includes vaccinating all heifers between the ages of 4 and 8 months against bangs disease. The veterinarian who does this work comes to Castro County about three times a year.

Another method of testing is to get a group up and get a veterinarian to come and test the cows at a cost to each farmer. Several farmers have made application at the County Agent's office for this work and it is probable a veterinarian may be brought to Castro County the week of Nov. 26-30. Any farmer wishing cows tested by this method should make application at the County Agent's office as soon as possible.

## Poison Grain Available

R.L. King County Agent this week received a shipment of poison grain from the State rodent control office and has available in his office. This grain is good for the control of prairie dogs, rabbits, rats and mice. This grain is kept for the benefit of farmers who have these pests and may be secured from the County Agent's office at a small charge.

## Cattle Grubs Cause Heavy Losses

Cattle grubs collect a big toll in money from Texas yearly. Grubs also take a heavy toll indirectly from non-farm people. This is in the form of meat which the grubs make unfit for eating. R.L. King, Castro County Agent estimates that grubs levy a tax of about 5 million dollars a year upon Texas cattle growers.

Here's the way he figures it. About 840 thousand of the two million Texas slaughtered yearly are grubby, and these animals are discounted an average of nearly \$4.00 each. This is the main item of loss. But the remainder of the 5 million is in damaged hides, a reduction of 25% in milk flow, and greater expense in feeding cows afflicted by grubs.

And here's what the parasites take from folks who eat the meat: An average of 2 lbs. per infested animal is destroyed. King estimates that this would be sufficient for the meat ration for 4,600 persons. And the leather lost because of damage by the grubs is sufficient to make about one million pairs of shoes. The money represented in the loss of meat and hides falls upon the cattle producers, but during the meat and shoe rationing the consumer also has a large interest in the problem of controlling the parasites.

King says that rotenone is the most effective treatment for grubs. This mixture may be applied as a dust or spray, and as a dip when both grubs and lice are to be controlled. The time that the first treatment for control of grubs should be given in November to December 15.



Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hamm recently received the following letter from their son, Pfc. Melvin Hamm, who was one of the 12 men selected from his regiment to witness the surrender of the Japs on Panay:

Oct. 2, 1945  
Korea

Dearest Folks,  
Well, here I am up here in Korea. Who would have thought I'd be here a year ago. The town looks like nearly any coastal town would back in the states. It is a lot better than anything in the Philippines. There are a lot of modern buildings but some of the homes are not so good. The Koreans look just like Japs. I have an inner urge to knock 'em off but the war's over. There are a lot of Soldiers that have been demobilized still running around in their uniforms.

We had an uneventful trip coming up here, but when we got here night before last it was raining and still is. Just a slow drizzle, and by the way it's just pretty cold. We are staying in a factory and I have been wearing a T shirt under my jacket and while ago they gave us field jackets and it feels darn good. We got off the ship yesterday morn and had about a 5 mile march out here. We got wet and were pretty cold.

This is a textile mill or clothing factory. They made the clothes out of something that looks like flax, I guess. Beings I've never seen any flax. There is machinery here that is really good. It is all run by electricity.

We are not supposed to talk or have anything to do with the natives but we were talking to one that knew a little English and he said the Japs were running this factory. You can tell that they haven't been shut down long. There are air raid shelters all around the place.

Boy, I never saw the like of ships. They are just packed in the harbor. The tide here rises and lowers 30 feet every 12 hours. The money here is yen of course and fifteen yen is worth one dollar. The Koreans that worked here getting about 20 yen a month so there living standard is pretty low.

We will be moving on inland before long. We are supposed to move 250 miles, and I think we are going by train. They have good railroads and they are wide gauge.

They raise fruits here. I saw some apples when we came through town. I think we will have a better deal here when we get straightened out and get used to the cold. The thermometer read 63 this morning and that was inside.

I sure hope I get some mail before we move on. I'm hoping every thing and everybody is just fine and well.

## Cull Unprofitable Cows Now

Any time is a good time to cull unprofitable cows from the herd. Certainly, at this time when dairymen are confronted with such scarcity of labor, with feed prices high and with a protein concentrate shortage that appears to be more acute than last fall and winter, every cow that is an unprofitable producer should be culled before winter starts, states R.L. King, County Agent, Castro county.

Many dairymen do not have and will not have sufficient roughage to adequately feed all their herd through the winter months. If they follow the all too common practice, they will not feed all the roughage their cows want and need but will limit the amount fed so as to make it last all winter. In thus shorting the cows on roughage they will find that the cows have shorted them at the milk pail. In many instances the dairymen can cull out enough poor producers so that his roughage supply will be sufficient to provide the remaining cows all they need and want and by so doing will get as much milk production and certainly more net returns than he will be spreading the roughage thin and milking poor producers.

With an average butterfat production of less than 150 lbs. per cow per year in Texas, it's apparent that we are milking too high a percentage of "boarder" cows in your herd? If so cull them now don't winter them. You will save feed that the efficient and profitable cows will likely need.

Lets get more milk from fewer and better cows that kind of increased production is profitable as well as patriotic.

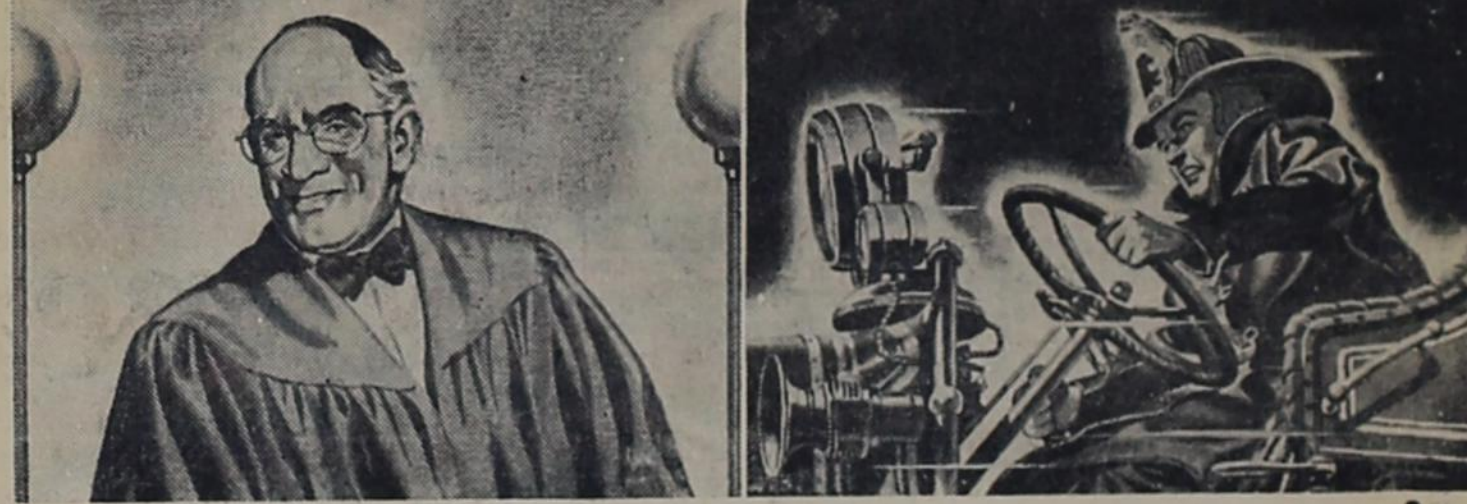
