Supply-Demand Rule Sets Wild Rice Cost

What a delicacy wild rice is! Its delicious, nut-like flavor makes it a favorite stuffing for wild game, especially ducks and geese.

Wild rice commands a premium price because the supply is always limited. Here's why. The crop, as its name implies, is dependent upon the caprices of nature. Ducks, geese and other wild fowl usually get more of the grain every year than we do.

Also, the crop is tedious to harvest with most of it done by hand in the same primitive way used by the Indians when America was first discovered.

The Indians of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Canada still provide a large share of our wild rice. They go among the plants in birch-bark canoes or small flatboats, and from these they gather the seed.

They bend the stalks of the plants over the boat, taking care not to break them, and with light blows from sticks, they knock the grain from the rice heads into the boat. The fully matured seed fall at the slightest touch, so many of them drop into the water before the stalk reaches the boat.

Wild rice is a tall annual grass, distantly related to cultivated rice. It is known by many names. In the northern states, it is called squaw rice, riz du Canada and menomen, while in the southern states it is called water oats, marsh oats and wild rice.

SPICE VOCABULARY

CARAWAY is available in a whole seed which is dark brown in color with light brown stripes. It is caraway which gives rye bread its flavor.

Caraway is compatible with mild cheese spreads, cream cheese, cottage cheese; bread, rolls, buns, muffins, coffee cake, cookies, cooked cabbage, cauliflower, carrots, celery, potatoes, onions, maters, turnips, beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts; salads, cole slaw, cooked sauerkraut; soup; sauerbraten, beef a la mode, roast pork or goose.

Abundant Cabbage Crop Is Prospect For Winter

Supplies of fresh cabbage this fall and winter likely will be larger than a year ago.

Acres of the early fall crop is up only slightly but expected yields are higher, so harvest probably will be up 13 per cent, reports Agricultural Marketing Service. Subtracting cabbage being grown under contract for kraut processing—estimated at 24 per cent more—the net gain of fresh-cabbage is 10 per cent.

The late fall crop, generally only five per cent of the fall total, is expected to be nine per cent larger than last year. Winter cabbage will be 15 per cent more, but much of it, especially that from Texas, may be later than usual.

Cabbage, like other fresh vegetables, is most economical when in season. That's now. You can take advantage of the present abundance and low price of both cabbage and apples in an appetizing scalloped combination that also is hearty enough for a light lunch. Here's a USDA-tested recipe you may like:

Use 1 quart tart sliced apples, 2 quarts shredded cabbage, 2 teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1

teaspoon sugar and 1 cup bread crumbs. Place alternate layers of apples and cabbage in a greased baking dish, seasoning each layer with salt and butter and sprinkling sugar on the apple layers. Spread the bread crumbs on top.

Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until tender. In the final few minutes, remove the cover so crumbs can brown.

Today it's the lean pig that's so highly acclaimed, for homemakers shy away from pork that is too fat. To meet this demand for leaner pork, farmers have been breeding a new type of hog that is now coming to market in increasing numbers.

If you are counting calories and watching for foods low in fat content and high in nutrients, then shop for hams, pork loins, picnics and butts—all distinctive for their low-fat content.

Also, these cuts are rich in the body building nutrients for which pork rates so high. It is one of the best sources of thiamine, protein, iron and the B-vitamins.

Pork liver is an outstanding source of iron, considerably more than beef, chicken, sheep or calves' liver, which also rate high.

Pork prices are declining seasonally, says the Agricultural Marketing Service, as marketings from the spring pig crop increase. Most pork cuts are cheaper now than any time since last spring. Hams, picnics and butts star as bargains at most markets. Select those which are firm, with a small bone and thin rind.

Homemade Mustard Gives 'Plus' Flavor

Good recipes for homemade mustard are hard to find. This one is excellent, but it is given in small quantity because it is really hot.

CANADIAN HOT MUSTARD

Ingredients:
2 tbsps. dry mustard
3 tbsps. cider vinegar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. salad oil

Method:
Put the mustard into a very small container; stir in the vinegar, a teaspoon at a time, until smooth. With a fork beat in salt, sugar and oil until combined. Cover tightly and refrigerate.

Steam Food

You can steam foods two ways: In a heavy pan with a tight-fitting cover with just enough liquid to create steam; or in a perforated vessel over a small amount of boiling water in a covered kettle.

Melt Chocolate

Set squares of chocolate to be melted in a custard cup in a small skillet holding about an inch of hot water. No need to wash a big pan!

THANKSGIVING BRUNCH

Brunch Opens The Holiday

That breed of diners who sit down to Thanksgiving dinner at six or seven o'clock will relish a holiday brunch. In view of the meal preparation ahead, we suggest that this combined breakfast and lunch be easy to prepare.
Here's our way with it. Before Thanksgiving, we put fully-cooked boneless rolled ham on our market list. Then we ask a member of our family, or a guest, to heat slices of the meat in a little butter in an electric skillet (or on an electric grill) right at the brunch table.

Before brunch, another helper gets out and butters copiously the dishes in which we stir eggs. At our house these plates are heat-resistant glass individual pie dishes (about six inches in diameter and one inch deep) that are widely available and inexpensive.
Two eggs are carefully broken into each dish so that the yolks are not punctured. Next the eggs are sprinkled with salt and a tablespoon of heavy cream is dripped over their entire surface. Now the eggs are sprinkled with two tablespoons of finely grated Romano cheese so that the yolks are well covered. (We use an exceptionally fine variety of sharp cheese that comes in two sizes of shaker-top glass jars.) A dusting of paprika is the last touch.

The eggs in their small dishes are placed in a preheated slow (325 degrees) oven for 12 to 18 minutes—or until as firm as desired. To finish the eggs, they're garnished with sprigs of watercress or parsley.
For festivity's sake, we like a variety of breads—crusty hard rolls, brioche, croissant, sweet buns—with the ham and eggs.

How about the customary offering of breakfast fruit? Our way is to place attractive individual compotes of sauce dishes of a fresh fruit medley at each person's place. These may be eaten first or last—to individual taste. A tiny bunch of seedless grapes as a topping for each serving of fruit is pretty to look at and fun to nibble.
If you like this Thanksgiving brunch pattern, you can use it on other occasions with scrambled eggs. Years ago we found a way of scrambling eggs that's utterly delectable. It appeared in a cook book whose recipes were those used in a distinguished book lovers' club—Boston's venerable Club of Odd Volumes. This way of scrambling eggs was said to be relished by President Roosevelt when he was present at club suppers.
To prepare them, you melt butter in a skillet and add bits of cream cheese before adding the lightly beaten eggs. In the Odd Volume version, heavy cream is also added, but we find the cheese alone yields a delicate haunting flavor.

Mince-meat Turnovers Are Palatable

The rich fruity flavor of mince-meat is particularly satisfying on these cool invigorating days of early autumn. For a successful finish to a company meal, make mince-meat turnovers and serve them hot.

MINCEMEAT TURNOVERS
Ingredients:
1/2 pound butter or margarine
2 pkgs. (8 ounces each) cream cheese
2 1/4 cups flour (do not sift before measuring)
2 cups (about) moist mince-meat
1 tbsp. (about) light or heavy cream
Method:
Mix butter and cream cheese until blended. Mix in flour until blended. Pat dough down on waxed paper and mark into 4 portions. Chill.
Roll out each quartar of the dough separately on prepared pastry cloth with floured stockinet-covered rolling pin. Dough is rich but use only enough flour during rolling to keep from sticking. Cut each portion of dough into 4 squares (each 4x4 inches).
Place 2 tbsps. of mince-meat near center of each square; fold dough over to make triangle. Press 3 edges of triangle together with tines of a fork. Prick tops of turnovers well. Place, covered, in freezing compartment of refrigerator until firm.
When ready to bake, place on baking sheet; brush tops with cream. Bake in hot (425 degrees) oven until baked through and browned—about 20 minutes. Serve hot.
Makes 16 to 20 turnovers; extra turnovers are cut from scraps of dough left after individual portions of dough are rolled out.

Seven Tomato Crops Yield Year-Round Supply

Did you ever wonder how growers manage to provide fresh tomatoes for your table all year long?
The main reason for the all-year supply is that growers in all parts of the country produce seven major crops a year. These are staggered so some tomatoes are harvested every month, says Agricultural Marketing Service. Right now, California is coming to the end of its early fall season.
Then, on the heels of this crop's most active harvest, Texas and Florida growers contribute the late fall tomatoes. November and December are the big months for this crop and some run as late as January 15.
From January through March, Florida growers will harvest their winter crop. And after that, from April through June, Florida, Texas and California provide early spring tomatoes.
That's the way it goes all 12 months. Mexico ships some to the United States every month but mostly January through May.
June, July and August, with 11, 12 and 10 per cent respectively, are peak tomato marketing months. But February unloads in New York are six per cent of the year's supply, and November, December and January, seven per cent each.

POTPOURRI

International Recipe Swap Brings Favorites

A feature of last year's Newspaper Food Editors Conference in Chicago was the International Recipe Swap, inaugurated by Aluminum Company of America. Some 65 recipes were contributed by overseas editors who sent along the directions for making a favorite dish.
Alcoa Wrap set their test kitchens to work and published a booklet containing 23 of the recipes which are most easily adapted to American standards and ingredients. The result is a collection of very tempting and exciting recipes which will, in part, appear on this page from time to time.
Even the titles are intriguing. For instance, there is Scheiterhausen from Germany, or pancakes with veal and vegetables; Bobotje, meat custard from South Africa; Viennese Gugelhupf, or coffee cake, from Austria. From Malaya comes Nasi Goreng, fried rice, and from the Philippines, Adobo, a spicy meat dish.
The original recipes call for such exotic but unfamiliar ingredients as ackees, flavored leaves, cassava flour, lentil flour, coriander and ghee.

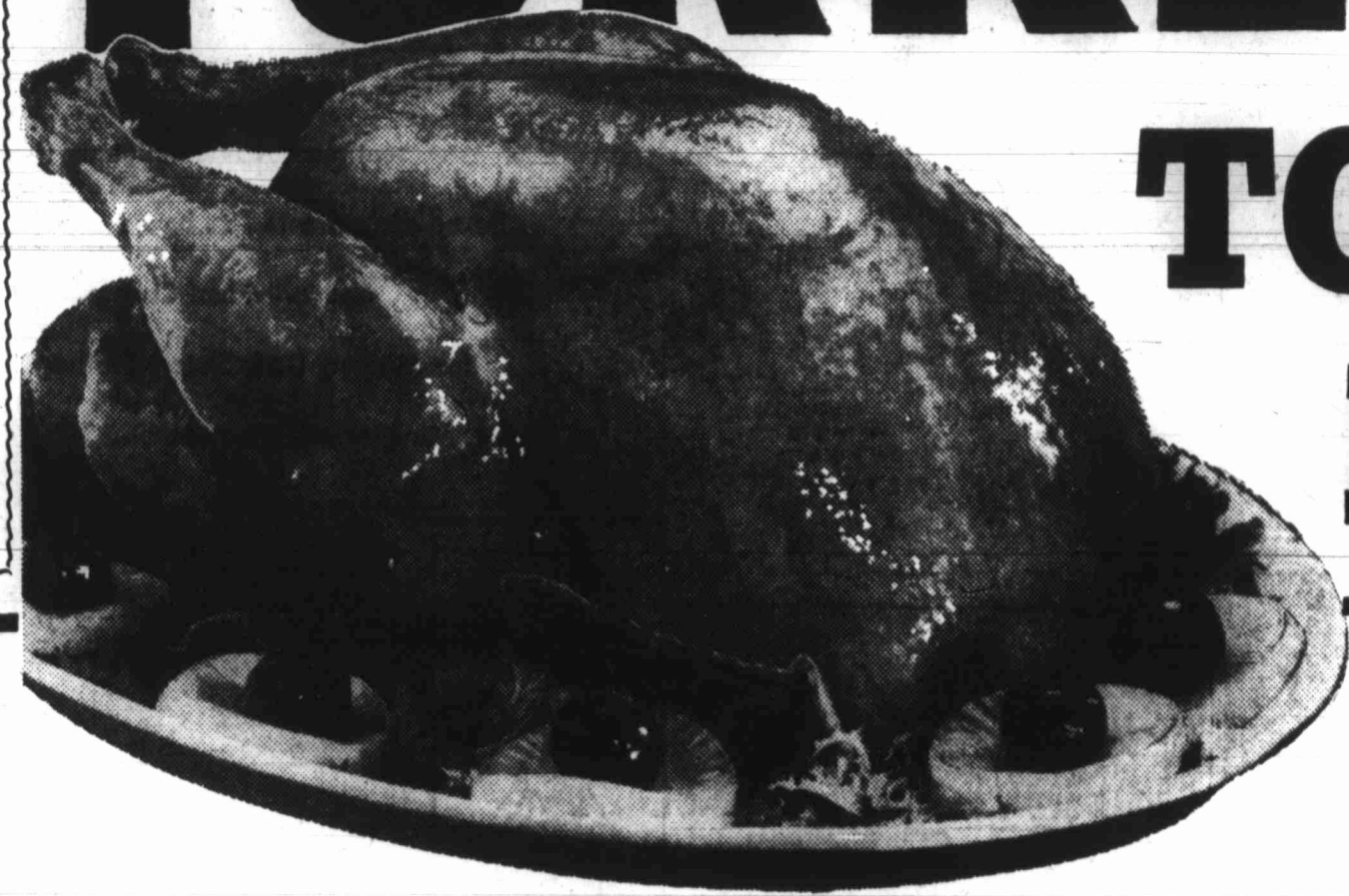
