

They Got Their Wires Crossed

Thank goodness they finally got that settled-and we do refer to the scene of the most famous stabbing in human history, that of Julius Caesar.

It seems that William Shakespeare, the poetdramatist, and Edward Gibbon, who wrote probably the most famous single work of history—The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire"-were both wrong. Shakespeare located the murder spot on Capitol Hill, on the edge of the Forum. Gibbons said the foul deed was done in

the Forum. But the Rome Department of Antiquities settled everything for everybody in a special announcement this week. It had discovered additional ruins of the Theater of Pompey, and it stated without equivocation that Caesar was stabbed to death in that theater on March 15, 44 B. C. The theater stood a good half-mile from the

Forum. How did Shakespeare and Gibbon get their wires crossed?

They knew Caesar had been murdered at the Senate, which was in the Forum. What they did not know, or take into account, was that in 44 B. C. the Senate house was under reconstruction, and that August body was meeting at the Theater of Pompey.

One may be permitted, we hope, to do a bit of speculating on the relationship

between the reconstruction of the Senate house and the assassination of Caesar. If the Senate had been holding sessions in its accustomed place and not in ternporary quarters, we can indulge the thought that perhaps the precautions to safeguard the dictator's person were not as thorough as they would have been in the familiar surroundings of the Senate house itself. There probably was a lot more coming and going in the temporary theater quarters, and this gave the conspirators their big opportunity.

There was a near-tragedy under similar circumstances in recent American history. While the White House was undergoing reconstruction, President Harry Truman and his family occupied temporary accommodations in Blair House across the street, Puerto Rican extremists made a bold frontal assault on Blair House for the purpose of assassinating the President, but his guards - one of whom was killed-were alert and ready, and shot it out with the would-be killers.

The plotters would not even have tried this enterprise had the President been resident in the White House at the time. knowing the odds to be insuperable. One wonders if Caesar's enemies might not have acted pretty much on the same theory with more success.

Mr. Gomulka's Big Mouth

A businessman who had need of borrowing a wad of money from his banker would hardly, as a prelude to negotiating the loan, announce from the housetops that the banker was a tightwad and a crook, and had designs on grabbing everything in sight.

But that is, roughly, what Polish Chief of State Gomulka did the other day. Gomulka came back from a visit to Moscow mouthing that "American imperialists were the cause of world tension.

The United States has provided Poland with \$193 million in surplus food and machinery in the last two years, and only last February the State Department indicated our willingness to discuss additional assistance sometime during the following year.

The Polish bossman had, indeed, requested the start of talks looking to this

Then Gomulka goes over to Moscow, bends an ear to Kremlin orders - and starts parroting the Moscow talk about 'American imperialism.'

Our purpose in granting assistance to Poland was to help her hurdle her economic troubles as she sought greater independence from Moscow. Also, because there is evidence that the U.S. still stands acehigh with the bulk of the Polish people, always our friends before the Communists took over.

What effect will Gomulka's slap in the face have?

The State Department merely notes that the talks leading to further belp have not yet begun, and naturally Gomulka's remarks will be taken into careful conlish relations.

Not As A Candidate, But Ike's Running

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower may not realize it yet but he's "running" in 1960. He isn't a candidate himself, of course, but the main issue before the American people will surely be whether to approve or disapprove the Eisenhower administration's record.

It will not matter much who the Republican or Democratic nominees happen to be-nice personalities or politicians or individuals experienced in national and international affairs. The people will vote "ves" or "no" on the record of the Eisenhower administration

History and precedent tell the story of the way the American electorate reacts in a presidential election. In 1920 it wasn't Warren Harding, the Republican nominee, who was elected. James M. Cox, Democrat, had been three times governor of Ohio and was by far the abler of the two candidates. But the people were bent on voting against the Wilson administration and resented our involvement in World War I Wilson wasn't himself the candidate in 1920, but his record in office was the principal issue.

In 1932, Franklin Roosevelt wasn't elected on his own merits. In reality, the administration of Herbert Hoover, Republican, was defeated. The reason was the depression that began a few months after the inauguration in 1929.

An even more recent example is the election of 1952. While Dwight Eisenhower was a popular personality, the public knew at the time very little about his ability to handle the presidency, and the voters were primarily anxious to repudiate the Truman administration. The Republican slogan of that campaign against the Democrats was "Korea," communism and corruption.'

There have been instances in which the record of an incumbent administration has been enthusiastically endorsed. Thus, in 1906 the Republicans won the presi dency with a relatively unknown candidate. William Howard Taft, but it was the dynamic record made by the out-

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going Republican administration of Theodore Roosevelt which won the big electoral majority for Taft. President Eisenhower has the opportuni-

ty to win the 1960 campaign for his party if he really buckles down to it. He is not the type of man to retreat from a fight. He has pride in achievement-in what his place in history as a president will be. Much will depend on what happens in the next two years. Mr. Eisennower faces a big task-he has to organize his party immediately for the 1960 battle as well as carry on an active leadership in government policies.

First and foremost, the Republicans in Congress will find it necessary to hold a conference of all factions and agree on a set of principles. Once each member has announced his adherence, he would be duty bound not to go off on his own. Something reminiscent of the old system of discipline which the party caucus used to effect will be essential if there is to be a cohesive party to conduct a real battle in the coming two years.

This, of course, means switching from tactics of constant defense to a strategy of persistent offense. The President, by the threat to use the veto power-and, indeed, by the actual exercise of the veto on specific pieces of legislation-could be in a position to focus national attention on the issues as they arise in Congress. A namby-pamby attitude could only result in two years of chaos and a worse defeat for the Republicans in 1960 than

The Republican party will find itself compelled to formulate a set of principles that all factions can endorse. Instead of waiting until 1960 to write a platform, it will have to be done early in 1959. The President is the natural person to initiate such a conference and to give his unswerving support to a new declaration. As for the planks of such a platform the most important issue is whether the United States shall let the dollar go down from 50 cents to 25 cents. Inflation means that all persons on pensions or looking forward to social security payments will be deprived of the purchasing power of the dollar which they have had in the past. It means that the prices of the things the farmer and the city housewife

buy will be raised. All other issues become secondary. National solvency transcends everything else. It's an issue on which all factions in the Republican party can unite. If handled effectively, it will give the Republican party a chance for victory two years

hence. The Democrats in both houses of Congress have control of the purse strings. They won it in the last congressional election. The question now is what are they going to do with the purse. The issue is between the spenders and the savers-and certainly to conserve the purchasing power of the American dollar is the heart of conservatism, as well as the essence of true liberalism.

Sweet Delusion Of Stock Split

This was written before the critical meeting of American Telephone & Telegraph Co. on Wednesday. It's an expression of hope that the directors of American Telephone & Telegraph will have the fortitude and good sense to resist the fever of our times and not split the stock.

It's the corporate fashion these days to cater to the propensity of investors to save pieces of paper: The higher number of shares on your stock certificates, the richer you seem. And the excuse for splitting stock is that it will broaden the market, attract more stockholders, reduce the price so that persons of limited means can buy:

Thus, Duquesne Light orders a two-forone split of a \$48 stock; Pet Milk a twofor-one of an \$80 stock; American Hospital Supply of a \$60 stock. How feverish can directors get?

AT&T has more shareholders than any other American corporation-1,600,000more than twice as many as the next, General Motors Corp., (700,000). Obviously AT&T's high price (It rarely sells below \$150 and is now around \$200.) has not deterred investors. AT&T doesn't need low-priced pieces of paper to attain wide ownership

I've owned stocks which have been split. I've felt a mild glow of satisfaction afterwards. Sort of patted myself on the back: What a smart boy am I! Yet I know that 20 shares of a \$30 stock will buy no more groceries than three shares

of a \$200 stock Serious studies of stock splits indicates that subsequent price rises are usually psychologized flurries unless a dividend increase accompanies or follows the split. It's not the split, but the dividend, which boosts the price. Yet a split fools innocents in Wall Street and offers professionals a chance to distribute-unloadstock.

In an era of inflation-mindedness, here is a beforehand hope that the AT&T management will resist stock proliferation for proliferation's sake. By so resisting, AT&T will help stay the inflation fever.

J. H. W., of Wilmington, Del., is annoyed, irritated, vexed, and discombobulated by my recent statement that the Ford Foundation's sale of Ford Motor Co., stock in January, 1956, was "well-timed." "Well-timed for whom?" he demands.

"Not for investors who paid \$64.50 a share and now see the stock selling for \$40; not for investors who hoped for a consistent dividend and saw the quarterly rate cut from 60 cents to 40 cents.'

H. H. W. is so right. The sale was not well-timed for purchasers. But what did J. H. W. expect?

The Ford Foundation wanted to diversify its holdings. It wanted to avoid having all its financial eggs in one basket. And, as events have proved, it was smart to do so. Just prior to the sale, I wrote that Ford stock wouldn't be a bargain. It was a "prosperity sale" at a time that automobile stocks were rising on the boom of a near-8,000,000-car year.

Ford Foundation trustees couldn't underprice their merchandise. They had a responsibility to their trust. They wanted to get all that the market would bear for the Foundation. Caveat to all investors: Sellers sell when they consider the time propitious for them, not for the pur-

"The professional has the bit in his

That helps to explain the recent advance to all-time highs in the stock market. A study by the Commercial and Financial Chronicle reveals that investment trusts have been following up the advance in prices. They have not been deterred by high prices and low yields.

At the end of September, 79 investment companies had 82.1 per cent of their assets in risk securities-common stocks and lower-grade bonds and preferred stocksas against 80 per cent in June. Balanced mutual funds-funds which hold a fair proportion of assets in bonds-had 69.3 per cent in commons, etc., as against 66.7 per cent in June. Those mutual funds which concentrate on common stocks had 91.4 per cent invested in risk securities, versus 89.3 per cent in June.

In contrast, closed - end investment trusts-companies which are not constantly selling shares to the public-reduced their holdings of commons, etc., to 86.3 per cent from 87.5 per cent.

Does that imply that companies which are primarily in the business of investing are less bullish than companies which are in the business of investing plus sell-

Here's our way with it. Before Thanksgiving, we put fully-cook-ed boneless rolled ham on our market list. Then we ask a member of our family, or a guest, to heat slices of the meat in a little butter in an electric skillet (or on an electric grill) right at the brunch table.

Before brunch, another helper gets out and butters copiously the dishes in which we shirr eggs. At our house these plates are heat-resistant glass individual pie dish-es (about six inches in diameter and one inch deep) that are widely available and inexpensive.

Two eggs are carefully broken into each dish so that the yolks are not punctured. Next the eggs are sprinkled with salt and a tablespoon of heavy cream is dripped over their entire surface. Now the eggs are sprinkled with two table-spoons of finely grated Romano cheese so that the yolks are well covered (We use an exceptionally fine variety of sharp cheese that comes in two sizes of shaker-top glass jars.) A dusting of paprika is the last touch.


