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
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
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Football patrons have long

in the shadow of the bomb-shattered high school, he called on Clinton to become a symbol of Christian love and understanding. An estimated 2,500 persons jammed into the undamaged gymnasium of the racially integrated school. They included a few Negroes. Another 1,500 persons heard the evangelist via loud-speakers in a nearby grade school and a church.

Three dynamite blasts last Oct. 5 did extensive damage to the school

"As Southerners, we must not allow integration or segregation to be our gospel." Graham declared. "We must stand on the Gospel of Christ.

"We must recognize that love of mankind cannot be enforced by bayonets alone. The law in itself is powerless to change the human heart. Only love can do that and only Christ can bring that love.' Columnist - commentator Drew Pearson presented a check for \$27,000 to R. G. Crossno, a member of the Anderson County School Board. It represents donations from all parts of the country to help rebuild the school

In addition to the private dona tions, the board has received \$45, 000 in federal aid and \$73,000 in insurance money - a total of \$145,000. Damage to the building has been estimated at from \$70, 000 to \$210,000.

The service ended with an estimated 150 persons answering Graham's call for "decisions for Christ.

### Little Ones Here To Stay?

Comes the news that a Washington imports of foreign cars is expected to parking lot owner has come to the conclusion that since smaller cars use a smaller space they should pay a smaller parking fee.

Suiting his action to his words, the man now stows away 42 smaller cars - nothing over 6.5x14 feet - where twenty of the larger size formerly reposed.

He calls it "pure economics." A housewife, he says, wouldn't be expected to buy a whole extra yard of material she'd never use for making a dress, so "Why should anyone be expected to pay for an extra yard of valuable downtown real estate they never need for parking their automobile?'

A traffic study commission in New York viewed the little vs. big car controversy from another angle not long ago. It pointed out that some new cars came out this year four inches wider than last, and noted that this meant two extra inches on each side to sideswipe other cars with. On narrow subsidiary roads this could mean a lot more sideswipings.

Big cars will always be in demand: it remains to be seen whether the smaller fry continues popular. Sheer economics and the dwindling road-and parking-space may force the issue sooner than we think. Most motorists have become habituated to the comfort of the larger cars, and as long as they have the money they are apt to favor them. Someone has pointed out that the little car in city streets and on short hauls is one thing, but if you're going somewhere, as Texans in particular usually are, it's something else again.

As of now, one can guess that the era of the smaller car is upon us. It will find its largest market among families able to afford two cars, but not



#### Test Of Civil Rights Law

The U. S. Supreme Court has always of local election officials to produce cershied clear of election disputes in the several states involving purely local or state elections, and on occasion has shown no great stomach for stepping in even when congressional election disputes arose. That was in recognition of the paramount role of the states in handling their own election affairs. Such details as setting the qualification of voters, time and place of primaries, and settling disputes between rival claimants have traditionally been regarded as no concern of the federal government.

But times change, and the Supreme Court changes with them; so there is no telling how the high court will act if such incidents as that which occurred in Montgomery, Ala., this month, should ever reach that august tribunal.

But it isn't hard to guess, for now for the first time there is a federal civil rights law, passed by the last Congress. and any controversy regarding the vottain records and documents bearing on the alleged denial of voting rights to Negro citizens. The matter was handed directly to the Justice Department, so a showdown is certain.

Except in a new isolated instances, denial of voting rights to Negro citizens in Texas has long been a thing of the past. So far as we know there has been virtually none of it in West Texas where the Negro population is small; it may be otherwise where the colored population is greater - in some counties in East Texas, they outnumber the whites. What is taken as a matter of course in most of Texas - that is, that as a taxpaying, duly qualified citizen, the Negro should enjoy the untrammeled right to vote - the situation is quite otherwise in parts of the Deep South where the Negro population is predominant. ### J. A. Livingston Russian Achievements In Science

It is well for Americans to remind themselves that Boris Pasternak was not the only Russian to win a Nobel prize this year. The award for physics was divided among P. A. Cherenkov, I. M. Frank, and Igor Tamm for their work with highspeed subatomic particles.

It is also well for Americans to remember that this achievement in science is as much attributable to old Russia and old Russian traits as to the spurt in education and science under Communism.

When the Russians achieve a scientific breakthrough, such as the sputnik, or when U. S. industrialists return from the Soviet Union surprised at Soviet technological knowhow, Americans often panic. We have been so unaware of Russian history we don't view Soviet achievements in perspective.

Peter the Great, whom Russians are still permitted to admire even though he was a czar, urged his people "to learn and study." and introduced European techniques of shipbuilding and metal-working into Russia in the last years of the 17th century. Catherine the Great encouraged learning and imported scientists, philosophers and writers from Europe at a period when fledgling America was breaking loose from George III of Britain.

Frank Pace Jr., president of General Dynamics, is fond of pointing out that America has been proficient in turning the discoveries of German, British and French scientists to practical purposes-for making automobiles, chemicals, steel mills, machine tools, etc.

To dispel some of the illusions, some of the false complacency, which often entrap Americans about Russian backwardness, Joseph Wastein, a statistician at the Department of Commerce, worked up in his spare time an unpublished paper on the achievements of Russian scientists both in Russia and in the U.S. That paper is the basis for much of what follows. In the 18th century, Michael Lomonos-

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off became renowned as a physicist, chemist, writer, and founder of Moscow University, Lomonosoff anticipated in his poetry Russia's future scientific progress:

#### "Its own Platos "And nimble-minded Newtons

"The Russian land will produce." Other pioneers in Russian culture and science, according to Watstein, were Lobachevski and Chebyshev in mathematics, Mendeleyeff in chemistry, Metchnikoff in bacteriology, Pavolov in physiology, Lebedeff in physics. Sophia Kovalevski, "perhaps the greatest woman mathematician of all time," became a professor of higher mathematics at Stockholm University.

George Gamow, who graduated from the University of Leningrad, participated in the Manhattan Project (A-bomb), has served as consultant to the Navy and Air Force, and writes science fiction

Major Alexander P. de Seversky, a graduate of the Russian Naval Academy, has been a pioneer in the development of aircraft and bombsights. Another air-minded genius who came from Russia is the world-renowned Igor Sikorsky. Vladimir K. Zworykin, scion of a prosperous Russian merchant family, came here in 1919 nearly penniless and helped to father modern television, working first at Westinghouse and later at RCA.

Watstein selected only those who received their basic training in Russia. They include the "father of polymerization." several outstanding electrical and aeronautical engineers, specialists in synthetic fuels and high octane aviation gasoline and an astronomer and astrophysicist. These men are living evidence that Soviet achievements are not attributable solely and conclusively to the Communistic drive for science and education. Lenin, Stalin, Khrushchev and modern Russia have had men of brains and czarist culture, science, and educational institutions to build on.

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### David Lawrence Alabama Officials Within Their Rights

WASHINGTON - Alabama state officials are well within their rights in declining to recognize a blanket subpena to produce records sought by the U.S. Civil Rights Commission.

President Eisenhower made an unfortunate mistake when he was misled into prejudging the case at his news conference. He said that failure to produce the records was "reprehensible." He added that it was a "refusal to comply with the basic laws of the land."

The question of what is or is not the "law of the land" in answering a subpena is by no means clear. Actually, the President's own attorney general in recent weeks has declined to furnish certain records which a Senate committee has been trying to get in its crusade for "freedom of information" in the executive branch of the government. Was this refusal a violation of the "law of the land''

Again and again the question of the scope of a subpena has been before the courts. The Supreme Court of the United States has at one time described the subpena power of Congress as not valid when a committee engages in a "fishing expedition." The courts generally have insisted that, when a subpena is issued. it must specify certain records, and not be merely a blanket demand for records irrespective of their relevancy to the case

Voting is a state matter, especially eligibility. In Georgia, they vote at 18 years of age-in other states at 21

The Alabama state officials contend that there are no laws on the Alabama statute books which deny anyone the right to vote on account of race or color. The question turns entirely on the judgment and efficiency of the local registrars, and it is argued that their records are part of the state judicial process.

Also, is the Civil Rights Commission an arm of Congress or of the executive branch of the government? This has to be settled in a court proceeding.

Most of the recent rulings of the Supreme Court of the United States about the wrongful purposes of subpena power protect Communists and persons with Communist associations who have refused to answer questions of a congressional committee. Thus, in the so-called "Watkins case," the Supreme Court of. the United States, in an opinion rendered by Chief Justice Warren said

tions of the Congress. This was freely conceded by the solicitor general in his argument of this case. Nor is the Congress a law enforcement or trial agency. These are functions of the executive and judicial departments of government. No inquiry is an end in itself; it must be related to and in furtherance of a legitimate task of the Congress."

The Supreme Court stated, morcover, in the Watkins case that Congress cannot constitute itself an inquisitorial body demanding through the subpena power that a witness answer questions which invade his privacy. Certainly states have the same rights of official privacy as individuals have recently claimed in the Communist cases.

It may well be that there are many Negroes in Alabama who ought to be permitted to vote. But there are lots of people in America who are the victims of injustice, and the only way they can get justice is through the proper procedures in the courts. The Department of Justice can, of course, go into court and demand that certain records be produced before the Commission. Some of the state officials might even be held in contempt for refusing to produce the records. But, in the final analysis, the Supreme Court of the United States will have to decide whether it invades the rights of the states. It's too early to condemn American citizens as law violators when they have not as yet been adjudged guilty in a trial.

The basic principle of the "separation of powers" has been in effect ever since the foundation of the republic. President Washington, when asked to supply certain records to Congress, said: 'It is essential to the due administration of the government that the boundaries fixed by the Constitution between the several departments should be preserved. A just regard to the Constitution and to the duty of my office under the circumstances of this case forbids the compliance with your request."

Ever since that day no subpena has ever been served on a President of the United States.


