

The following story on the crganization of Castro County was compiled by the students of the sixth grade.

Be it remembered that on Wed- Houston Lust. pesday, the 23rd day of December 1891 A. D. there came on and was oeld a called session of the Commissioners' Court of Castro Counv. Texas, at the temporary court rouse in the town of Dimmitt.

Present and presiding were L Gough, judge; Max Brawnlee. mayor: J. W. Carter, Precinct No. : S. L. Richardson, Precinct No. P: S. F. Flores, Preginct No. 3; Wi'liam Moore, Precinct No. 4: W.

The efforts to settle Castro County took three attempts. The first attempt was made near the historical marker. It was called Castro City. It was abandoned puet, it is reported that Buster and another attempt was made to build a town on the section north of the Cleo school house but failed. The third attemnt was made and it was called Dimmitt and was established in 1891. Castro Counw was established in 1890.

> The first court house was wood. m. It burned in 1906 and was replaced by a brick building in 1909 and 1909. It stood 31 years and was torn down in 1939 and replaced by the beautiful and sparious court house now standing.




