SAVINGS BONDS SALES RATHER LOW IN COUNTY

Castro County has contributed a grand total of \$1,759.85 in Savings Stamps and Bonds up to and including Tuesday's sales. When this figure is compared with surrounding county totals, and over the state as a whole, Castro County is sadly lagging in supporting U. S. Defense.

Tom Bice, postmaster, reports \$128.60 worth of Savings Stamps sold and \$468.75 worth of Savings Bonds. The past several weeks has shown a slight increase in sales. Postmaster Bice stated.

First State Bank of Dimmitt reports sales total \$1,162.50 in Savings Bonds, bought largely at one time.
