**Thomas Urges Frequent Inspection Of Stored Grain to Avoid Losses**

To the many farmers of Castro county who have grain stored on their farms, Doyle Thomas of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, urges frequent and careful inspection of the grain.

He points out specifically that grain lost or reduced in quality through carelessness and neglect while in storage deprives the farmer of the protection he expected to receive when he took out a Commodity Credit Corporation loan. At settlement time the farmer is credited with grain of the quality and amount at the time the loan is paid or the grain delivered, regardless of what the quality and amount might have been when the loan was taken out.

Frequent inspection of farm-stored grain, the secretary points out, plus immediate action to correct whatever may be revealed by the inspection is the only way to be safe.

Heating, insects, birds, and rodents are particularly to be guarded against. He cautions that cold weather is no protection against heating and that heating often provides favorable conditions for grain-damaging insects. Heating usually results when the moisture content of the stored grain is too high.

Birds and rodents do their damage when the storage structure is not tight enough to keep them out. Keeping bins in good repair will keep out the birds and modern poisons are available to take care of the rats.

Thomas suggests that the county extension agent is a good source of information on the most effective means for preparing structures in which Carl E. Kemp is plaintiff and the parties to whom this writ is directed are defendants.

## WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

### WHEAT

Since wheat is one of the major supports of our economy in the Panhandle, I thought it might be appropriate to point out a few of the interesting facts about its history. Its earliest ancestor, Einkorn, was first domesticated in Eastern Iraq and was one of the earliest plants cultivated by man. Recently wheat kernels were found in Eastern Iraq under conditions indicating that they were 6500 to 7000 years old, and it was observed that the resemblance between these early kernels and modern grain is remarkable.

It has been interesting to notice that all civilizations have founded on wheat or wheat and a combination of the other cereals such as rye, barley, oats, rice, and corn. In both the old world and the new, the science of astronomy was invented by the cereal growers as a part of their planning for the planting and the harvest seasons. Out of this science, the calendar and a system of arithmetic was developed. Cereal cultivation has created sufficient food supplies to permit some leisure for the people. Leisure, in turn, fostered the development of arts, crafts, and sciences. I am glad that the people in the early days did not consider surpluses as sinful. Had they followed such a philosophy, it could logically be concluded that there would have been no beginning to many of the arts, crafts and sciences.

Wheat first served as a food with no more being done to it than merely the parching of the grain. The second stage was the grinding and soaking of the parched grains. It is probable that this method was pursued for some centuries before bread came into being.

## Castro Cotton Acreage Allotments To Be in Mail Soon Thomas Says

Castro County growers will receive official notice of their 1955 farm acreage allotments for cotton in the next few days. The notices are now being mailed by the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee office.

The county allotment has been set at 54,386 acres. Cotton acreage allotments for County farms were determined by the County ASC Committee in accordance with the law and the regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. They are based upon the national acreage allotment of 18.1 million acres which the Secretary of Agriculture proclaimed for upland cotton on October 14. The national allotment is first apportioned among States and the State allotments among counties. The county allotments are distributed largely among farms on which cotton was planted in any one of the past 3 years. A small acreage reserve is available for specified uses.

Farmers who do not intend to operate a farm for which a 1955 cotton allotment is established should immediately return the official notice to the County ASC office so that it can be sent to the person who will operate the farm next year.

Any changes in the land to be included in the farm for which the allotment is made should be reported to the County ASC Committee. Or if there is any question about the farm on which the allotment is established, the farm operator is asked to check with the County Committee.

## FEDERAL PAYROLL

According to reports to the Committee on the Reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures, the number of civilian employees in the Executive agencies of the Federal Government totaled 2,323,029 for the month of October, 1954. Of this total, 1,182,058 employees were working for civilian agencies, and 1,140,971 were working for military agencies. This is an increase of 5,464, compared with the preceding month of September.

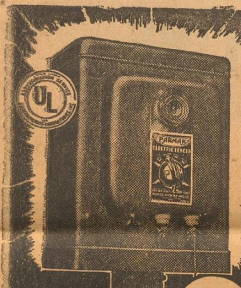

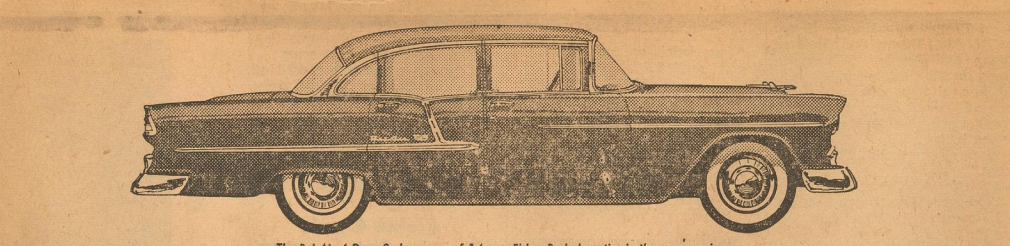

**News of Our Neighbors**  
**TULIA**—(from the Tulia Herald) Tulia school board Monday (Nov. 29) took preliminary steps to call a \$450,000 bond issue with which to institute the 5-point program recently submitted by taxpayers of the district for comment. The action followed a canvass of self-addressed cards which had been returned to the board Monday night. The 5-point program included the construction of eight class rooms, one rest room, and facilities for the school house to be added to East Ward; five classrooms, study hall, book room, and storage room added to the high school building; school auditorium to seat 1,250; repair and modernization including the elimination of bedbugs from the West Ward building; and enlargement of the school cafeteria.  
**LARK**—(from the Earth Sun) As the cotton season is nearing an end, a check with each of the local gins this week showed that so far a total of 34,479 bales of cotton have been ginned. This total comes from the 15,379 bales ginned at the three Springlake gins and 19,100 from the four Earth gins.  
**WELLINGTON**—(from the Wellington Leader) Rev. W. I. Thomas of Mineola has been called as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Wellington and will move his family here in early December. He is a former pastor at Grandview, Texas, and a graduate of Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth.  
**LOCKNEY**—(from the Lockney Beacon) R. L. Knox, Jr., was elected chief of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department in a recent election. He succeeds Lowell Bilbrey who has served in that capacity for several years. Curtis Williams and Truett Bilbrey were named assistant chiefs. Recent donations from gins in the area will be used to buy additional equipment for the department.  
**FARWELL**—(from the State Line Tribune) The 1955 Parmer county cotton allotment has been announced as 43,194 acres. The decrease of 13,000 acres came in spite of considerations from the state totaling over 4,000 acres which moved the original 1955 allotment up considerably.  
 About two-thirds of an estimated nine million dollar cotton crop for Parmer county was safely ginned and trucked off to market the first of the week as ten gins hummed around the clock. County Agent Joe Jones has placed a late estimate of 50,000 bales on the county cotton crop, of which 30,000 has already been ginned.

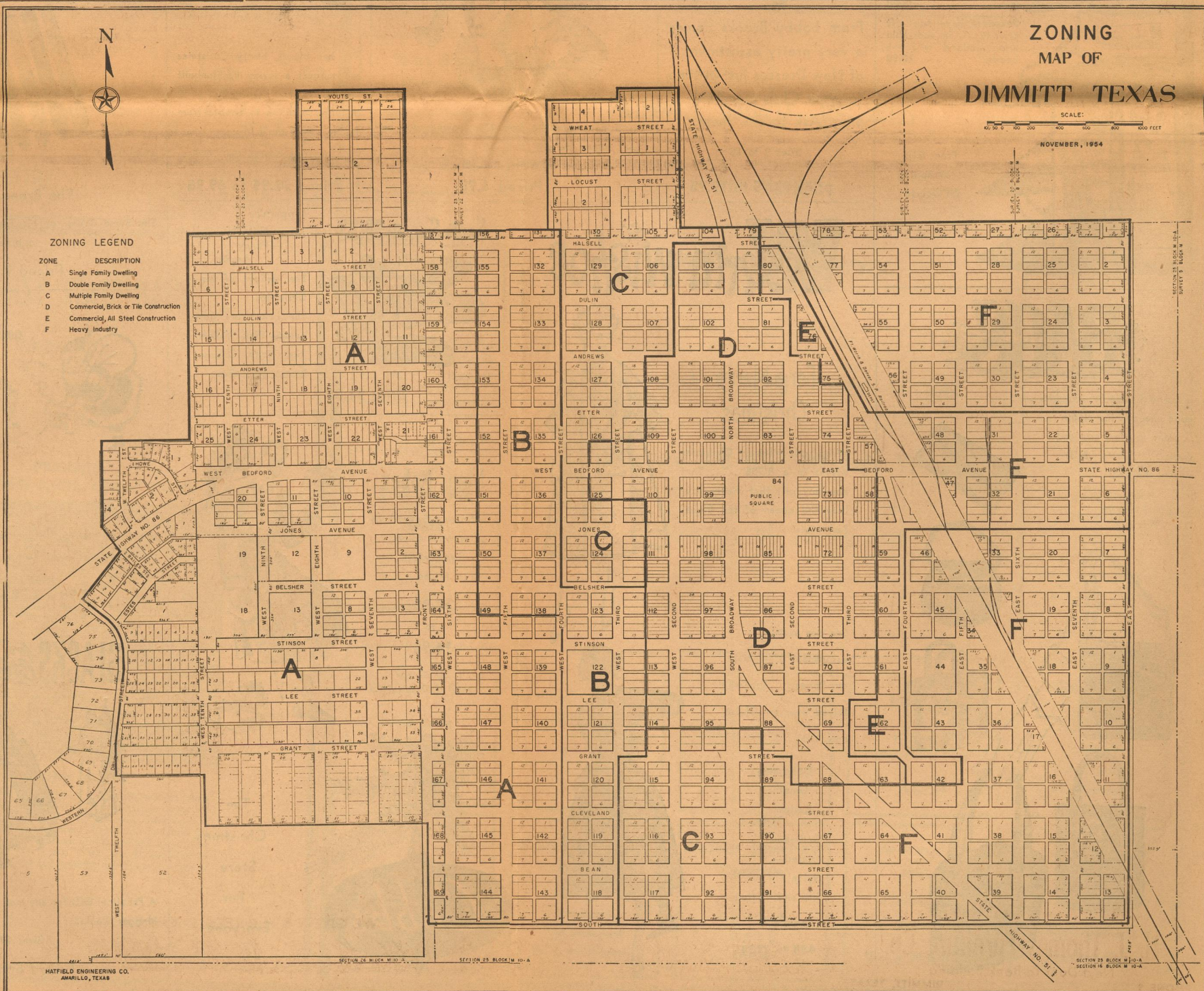

Doyle Turner, Lamb county 4-H boy, not only won top honors in the 1954 Texas Hybrid Corn Production program but set a new all-time yield record in doing it. His Texas Hybrid 30, under irrigation, made a whopping 204.3 bushels an acre. This compares with a state average of 16 bushels an acre.

Other winners by areas, their yields and hybrid used were as follows. In the West and South Texas irrigated area following Turner were second Alphonse

Huseman, Nazareth, 158.9 bushels and Texas Hybrid 28; third Royce Turner, twin brother of Doyle, Lamb county, 158.6 bushels and Texas Hybrid 30; fourth Joe Nelson, Dimmitt, 137.4 and fifth E. L. Hochstein also of Nazareth and both planted Texas Hybrid 28.

The program is sponsored by the Texas Certified Hybrid Seed Corn Growers Association. E. S. Fry, San Antonio, is president; M. D. Lacy, State Department of Agriculture, Austin, secretary-treasurer of the Association and W. B. Coke, extension agronomist supervised the program.

Doyle irrigated his crop four times. He followed the recommendations from the A. & M. S. S. Testing Laboratory by using 200 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer at planting time. A side-dressing of nitrogen was also recommended but by date Doyle planned to make the application, the corn was too tall. Three tons of composted cotton burs were plowed under 12 inches deep in January and he spaced the plants 12 inches apart in the row.

He will receive two \$50 awards—one for first place in his area and another for "Champion Corn Grower of the State" and a plaque for top yield under irrigation.

J. H. Moore, Jr. of Bowie county produced 123.8 bushels an acre to top the field in the non-irrigated class. He too used Texas Hybrid 30. No fertilizer was used because soil tests showed none was needed. A crop of vetch and oats was turned under in March prior to planting. He used a 12 inch row spacing. He will receive a \$50 area award and a plaque as the state's top dryland corn grower.

### Polling Places Announced for Cotton Quota Election Scheduled for Tuesday

Cotton growers in Castro county have a red letter day Tuesday, December 14. That day growers will decide whether marketing quotas will continue in effect on the 1955 crop.

Polling places for the election were announced this week by Doyle Thomas, local ASC secretary. They are: Community A—Jumbo Community Center, G. C. Pope, chairman; Community B—

Frio School, A. H. Brown and J. H. Flood, chairmen; Community C—ASC office in Dimmitt, Percy Estes and W. E. Beecher, chairmen; Community D—Dodd Gin office, Oliver Tumell, chairman; and Community E—Hart Legion Hall, Jim Heigh, chairman.

"The decision will affect every cotton grower and it is important that each cast a ballot," says Thomas. All farmers who grew upland cotton this year will be eligible to vote in the referendum, which will be held in every upland cotton growing county in Texas. At least two-thirds of the growers voting in the nationwide poll must approve the quota and acreage allotments for the '55 crop. Such a proclamation must be made under the law when the prospective "total supply" of cotton exceeds the "normal supply."

Under the marketing quota program, growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment may market free of penalty the entire crop from the farm. Growers exceeding their allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 percent of parity on the farm's excess production.

If farmers approve the referendum, the price support on cotton to eligible growers will be between 82.5 and 90 percent of parity.

AN ORDINANCE DECLARING A PUBLIC NECESSITY FOR THE REGULATION OF PARKING IN CERTAIN DESIGNATED AREAS WITHIN THE CITY OF DIMMITT, CASTRO COUNTY, TEXAS, RESTRICTING CERTAIN AREAS WITH PARKING PERMITTED IN PARALLEL ONLY, FIXING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.  
WHEREAS, State Highway 86 traverses the City of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas, along East Bedford Avenue and West Bedford Avenue, and  
WHEREAS, State Highway 51 traverses the City of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas, along North Broadway Street from the north line of the incorporated limits of the City of Dimmitt, thence south to the north line of Bedford Avenue, and continuing south along South Broadway to the north line of East Stinson Street, thence southeasterly along State Highway 51 to the south line of the incorporated limits of Dimmitt, Texas, a part of the south side of Block 39 of the Original Town of Dimmitt and the north line of East South Street; and  
WHEREAS, said highways are heavily traveled, and the preservation of public peace, property, health and safety of the citizens of the city of Dimmitt requires the regulation of parking on said thoroughfares.  
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas:  
I.  
That all vehicles hereafter parking along the curbs of East Bedford and West Bedford Avenues and along the curbs of North Broadway Street from the corporate limits of the town of Dimmitt, Castro County, Texas, thence south along North Broadway and South Broadway to the south line of East Stinson Street, thence southeasterly along State Highway 51, shall park parallel instead of angular parking as has been heretofore done.  
II.  
The owners or drivers of any vehicles parking in any other manner than here specified along said thoroughfares here above described shall be deemed guilty of violating this parking ordinance, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than One & No/100 Dollars (\$1.00) and not more than Twenty-five & No/100 Dollars (\$25.00) for each offense.
