

# **Texas Solves Problem** Through Neighbor Board

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following guest editorial, as it appeared in the Dallas Morning News, was written by Mr. Raymond Moley, columnist for the Dallas Morning News and Contributing Editor of Newsweek Magazine. Mr. Moley's editorial touches on a subject which, after the recent United States Supreme Court's decision on racial segregation, is still fresh in many of our minds. We feel that because of the Supreme Court decision, news of minority group problems will be of special interest to Texans for quite some time. Following is the full text of Mr. Moley's comment on the Texas Good Neighbor Commission.

There are right ways and wrong ways of dealing with racial and nationalistic differences and antagonisms. One of the wrong ways is coercive measures at the federal level. In fact, any coercive measure is likely to be a wrong way. And certainly any federal effort, coercive or noncoercive, is wrong. There remains, however, a means based on common sense, decency, and persuasive suggestion. That can be done by private organizations or by a local or state agency supported by local or state government.

The best example I have seen of a workable and sensible attack upon this problem is the Good Neighbor Commission of the State of Texas. For a great many years—in fact, ever since Texas ceased to be a part of Mexico—there had been recurring problems over the treatment in that state of Mexicans who came across the border in search of opportunities for better economic conditions. Their labor was welcome and the pay was good. But they were denied certain privileges and prerogatives and were often subjected to outbreaks of intolerance.

Finally, during the war, in 1943 when Mexicans were coming in legally in great numbers, the Mexican government began to register sharp diplomatic protests against the treatment of its nationals in Texas. As a result, Gov. Coke Stevenson on his own authority set up a Good Neighbor Commission to give effect to a policy of the state which he declared to be to give full and equal accommodations, advantages, and privileges to Mexicans and other Latin Americans residing or visiting in the state. Four years later this commission was given full legal status by the Legislature.

According to an interesting new history of the first ten years of the Texas Good Neighbor Commission by Nellie Ward Kingrea, Texas Christian University Press, the first two years of the commission were devoted to securing by good offices and persuasion better educational and hea

coercion of either Mexicans or Texans. His motto is eternal vigilance.

Wherever discrimination appears, the good offices of the commission are enlisted. Persuasion rather than threats or pressure is used to iron out even small instances of discrimination. For Penrose well realizes that in matters of racial relations serious results can come from small beginnings. He has fostered through his influence in Texas a great increase in the teaching of Spanish in the schools and also attention to the history of our neighboring Latin-American nations.

An exchange of teachers between Mexico and Texas also has been promoted. Finally, by publicity relating to instances of friendly relations, Penrose has sought to minimize the occasional stories of prejudice and discrimination.

This, it would seem, is an example of the right way to deal with an old and troublesome problem.

### Road Angels

A group of Dimmitt boys, under the sponsorship of the local Lions Club, has formed a safety organization, through which they place as their direct objective a better knowledge of the rules and courtesies of safe driving. The nucleus of this club—a few boys who feel that there is more to driving a car than knowing how to shift gears—are inviting all other boys interested in such a program to become members of the club and attend meetings through which each may contribute a little and learn a lot.

The "Road Angels," as the boys have named their club, met in the District Court Room Tuesday night to draft a constitution and by-laws and elect officers. With this initial meeting the group started what may become one of the most practical organizations in Dimmitt. These boys, through meeting together and studying subjects which to them are interesting, are taking a good step forward in the business of saving human lives.

The Road Angels aren't limiting the knowledge they gain

of saving human lives.

The Road Angels aren't limiting the knowledge they gain in their meetings to themselves; one of the main practices of the club will be to encourage others to drive sensibly. This is where the community could help the boys.

Such a program traditionally belongs only in the "big, rich high schools" of Texas. Do only the "big, rich high schools" of Texas. Do only the "big, rich high schools" but to teach their students methods of safe driving. But do they hold the monopoly on a course which, in some split second in the future, could save a life?

The Road Angels are doing their part, but they can't be expected to obtain all the reading matter and equipment necessary for a thorough job. If the program begun by the Road Angels is to advance, it needs the help of the community and its schools.

**DEFENSE BILL:** Defense appropriations of \$28,861,584,486 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1955, have been recommended by Senate Appropriations Com-

AIRCRAFT: Committee hear-

ings on the defense appropriations bill brought out the fact that airthe Air Force, Army and Navy will account for some 22 per cent of all defense spending in 1955.

of all detense spending in 1950.

This reflects continuing emphasis on building up our air power.

During the current year, aircraft procurement expenditures are 20 per cent of total defense spending. Last year, the figure was 17 per cnt.

By July 1, 1957, it is planned that the Air Force will be organized into 137 wings, of which 126 will be combat wings. The air army of the Navy will include 16 carrier air groups and 15 carrier anti-submarine warfare squadrons. The Marine Corps will have three air wings.

SHIPS: Under terms of the bill, expenditures for shipbuilding will total approximately one billion dollars next year. That is about the same amount being spent this

year.

At the end of June, 1955, the active fleet of the Navy will consist of 1,080 ships. Of these, 404 will be major combatant types—aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, submarines, and so or—and 676 will be mine warfare, amphibious warfare, patrol, and auxiliary vessels.

PERSONNEL: At the present time, we have approximately 3,330,000 men in our Armed Forces. That is a reduction of about 72,000 since the first of the year. The Defense Department reports that it expects the total to be reduced to 3,047,000 by next June—1,173,000 in the Army, 970,000 in the Arr Force, 689,000 in the Navy, and 215,000 in the Marine Corps. Only the Air Force will show an increase in manpour during the coming year. When I served as Chairman of the Senate Preparedness Committee my investigations convinced me that there was a great waste of military manpower. When the news leaked out that Dewey might not seek re-election as Governor of New York, it was promptly concluded by some that this meant a bid by him for the Presidency. This sort of operation actually creates a situation of confusion between this country and the foreign countries with whom we trade. Many of these foreign countries are presently engaged in trading with Russia, China and the satellites of these two countries. Should this country announce the policy of refusing to trade with any country that was engaged in trade with any of the Red dominated countries, it could cause great confusion in the world markets. However, the possibility of creating confusion should not be an excuse for putting off until tomorrow decisions that should be made today, or this vital issue. None of the Red satellites are self-sustaining and must look to other countries for a major part of their civilian as will as their military needs. The President was reported as saying in a news conference that we should continue to trade with these Red satellites, because it was only by trade that we could woo them over to our side. I sincerely hope that he is right, but I must beg to disagree. Russia intends to keep these satellite countries under her domination by force of arms or otherwise. Therefore, we have very little, if any, outside chance to woo one of these countries into our group without an internal revolution in that country. In the second place, Russia is going to continue the policy of permitting this country to indirectly furnish food and fiber to her satellites countries under the productive powers of herself and these satellite countries to armament. By doing this, she can devote most of the productive powers of herself and these satellite countries have with some of the nations that ere friendly to us provide an excellent opportunity for the Reds to do some wooing of their own, even to the extent of threats. ### Women in Politics

Two Texas women took over prominent spots in the state's political show last week. Mrs. Pat Dougherty will manage the campaign of her husband, Dudley T. Dougherty, for the United States Senate. Mrs. Charles Devall of Kilgore, whose husband is publisher of the Kilgore News Herald, was appointed state chairman of Texas Democratic Women for Shivers.

### Democratic Convention

A decision that will give big city counties who voted Republican in 1952 a strong voice in the Texas Democratic Convention was made by State Democrats in agreeing to count both parties' 1952

votes in deciding their convention strength.

The Democratic Convention convenes in September at Mineral Wells. The committee, meeting in Austin, agreed uranimously on the proposal after being told by its legal committee that the total vote was the correct basis on which to determine delegate strength.

### Insurance Investigations

One Texas insurance firm went into receivership and another

One Texas insurance firm went into receivership and another appeared ready in another week of insurance shake-ups.

Ralph W. Hammonds of Houston, head of the Lloyds of North America Insurance Company, admitted insolvency and his firm went into permanent receivership.

Also caught in the whirling door of insurance investigations was the suspended General American Casualty Company with headuarters in San Antonio. Suspension followed a voluntary request of the firm's president Ralph D. Stokes. Incomplete checks of the company's books showed that it was "approximately one million dollars in debt," Insurance Board Chairman Garland Smith said.

### No Insurance Mess

State Senator George Parkhouse told a meeting of insurance men in Austin that most of the controversy was being played out of true import. He said that most of the trouble was being "generated artificially and unnecessarily to serve the political purposes of a little group of men." He added that the Legislature should, however, patch some present law loopholes and pay examiners better salaries.

### 'Ridiculous' Charges

Charges by a former agent of the State Liquor Board that the liquor industry and politiciars run the board was termed "absolutely ridiculous" by Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr. Stevensor said the accusation of former member Weldon Burney, who called the board corrupt and dominated by politics, was without basis. The San Antonio man resigned May 27. Stevenson said that he had been demoted in grade and appeared dissatisfied when he couldn't get a transfer back to McAllen where he was stationd when Stevenson took office.

### Water Is Big Problem

Water is one of the state's big problems, the president of the Texas Water Conservation Association told Texas University attorneys and water engineers.

Guy C. Jackson Jr., asking for water improvements, called for a "state-wide water plan" and for the state to assume financial responsibility for dams and other water improvements.
