#### A Necessity For The Area

Staying abreast of the demands of three growing West Texas cities is a problem within itself, as E. V. Spence. general manager explained to the board of directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District here Thursday. But staying abreast of the demands, present and potential, of a growing area is correspondingly greater.

In essence this is what the CRMWD is proposing to tackle in authorizing its officials to file for a permit to impound another big lake on the upper Colorado

The rate of growth has been so great among the member cities of Big Spring, Odessa and Snyder that by 1960 the original estimate of 30,000,000 gallons per day from Lake J. B. Thomas will all be required. By 1965 the lake plus the peaking supplies from wells will be taxed, according to consulting engineer's

That means that the CRMWD must be looking ahead once more. But the prob-

lem is one of more than district interest. for this is the last major source of potable water supply left to this area, Mr. Spence reminded. Hence, securing an available supply sufficient to serve the area is extremely important, for the economic chain in this part of West Texas can ill-afford to have weak and constricted links. It has aptly been pointed out that water necessary to sustain the oil and allied industries of West Texis quite important as water for domestic uses. One begets and supports the other,

Doubtless there will be some downstream opposition to granting of a permit for impounding the volume of water contemplated, but this area can show a solid and growing need for it. Even under the current proposal it will be necessary to pump the water uphill some 90 miles: but that is vastly better than letting water go on downstream beyond recall. The expanding future of this area may well depend on this permit and this

#### New Problem For A New Generation

Quite a number of oldtimers have lived out of one century and into the next, but according to mortality conditions two out of three babies born this year will duplicate that feat and live through the first quarter of the Twenty-First Century.

That would not have been the case with those born in 1900. Only two out of five born at the turn of the century had a life expectancy of 65 Today, a young man of 18 has 68

chances in 100 of reaching retirement age of 65. More than 70 of those now in their late thirties and early forties can have a reasonable hope of being alive at age 65. As for those who reach 65, they can hope to live 20 more years-20 per cent for men and 30 per cent for women.

The lifespan has been practically doubled in the lifetime of those now 60. But there is a sort of trick to these figures; the great saving of life has been among infants. In short, more babies are born who will live and grow into men and women than was the case before infant mortality was so sensationally reduced by modern science, techniques and medicine. This improvement has been accompanied by another even more important: fewer women are dying in child-

All this of course is to the good, but it does create problems that add gray hairs to the life insurance, pensions and retirement statisticians. To take up the overload created by a longer lifespan extraordinary measures will have to be taken, revisions made, new rules and regulations worked out, and a host of related problems solved.

Hospitals will have to be expanded and new ones built, for people are not only living longer but taking additional interest in hospital and medical care as health insurance and pension coverages flourish. In the old days hospitals were few and far between and few people could afford them, even when the costs were a fraction of what they are becoming to-

No doubt all these problems-including the probability that retirement age will have to be reduced from 65 to 60 or even lower as technology produces more and more with fewer and fewer workers-but this will be the responsibility of the rising generation, and the rising generation is better equipped to deal with them than their forefathers were.

### David Lawrence France's Problems As Nuclear Power

LONDON — The dispute over how much encouragement should be given to France to become a nuclear power and whether American jet bombers shall be transferred to bases outside France unless permission is given to stockpile atomic bombs in that country is likely to be ironed out satisfactorily. The reason is that there is much merit on both sides, and the only real difficulty is that President De Gaulle has not yet come to grips with some financial facts that lie at the bottom of the controversy.

France, to be sure, has every right to become a nuclear power, as President De Gaulle wishes. But so has the United States a right to consider whether and to what extent she will share her nuclear information with other powers. Similarly, France has the right to say what military units shall be stationed on her soil, especially those which would be used in an atomic war. Great Britain has never surrendered this right, and in the last analysis reserves the privilege of vetoing the use of bombs that are stockpiled on her territory. The assumption is that in an emergency, permission will be forthcoming promptly-but the fact remains that such permission has to be obtained from a parliamentary government and not from a British Army commander stationed at NATO headquarters.

General De Gaulle is a man in whom the passions of an intense nationalism are as deeply ingrained today as they were during World War II when he headed the French government in exile. He has always been a hard man to negotiate with, and he sometimes goes off on a tangent in disregard of the advice of his own close associates. There certainly is no reason why an agreement shouldn't be reached which will retain for France the right to say whether and when atomic bombs and missiles may be launched from French territory.

But NATO cannot in turn give France

nuclear information or the means of becoming a nuclear power. This is something which depends on a vote by the Congress of the United States, which must amend the present law concerning the sharing of nuclear information. It also depends on the practical use that will be made of

Obviously it costs a great deal of money to become a nuclear power, and the French budget-now strained to the utmost, especially by the war in Algeriacannot possibly provide the funds needed to engage in nuclear production. Nor is the United States likely to appropriate such money at a time when world sentiment seems to favor less and less production and distribution of nuclear weapons. Even Britain is feeling the financial strain of the nuclear business, and there is a nation-wide feeling here that tests should be abandoned. This naturally would mean a curtailment of production, too.

What is disconcerting about the whole episode is that some of the French reliance on bargaining technique is producing a rather unfavorable impression. It is a little outdated as a means of influencing American policy for the French to go on the theory that the United States may be persuaded to give in on the French request for nuclear information if permission for the stockpiling of atomic weapons is refused by the French govern-

There is in the United States considerable sympathy for General De Gaulle's desire to raise the prestige of his country on the military side, but in these days, when a nuclear-war plan requires instant cooperation by all the Western Allies, it would be foolish to build up a cumbersome machinery of consultation and permission-giving. France has been overrun once because she was not adequately prepared or did not have enough help on hand from the outside to maintain her military position. So bungling in the defense preparations now could have disas-

trous effects in the next big emergency. One of the paradoxes in the French situation is that, if nuclear tests are really to be suspended by agreement with the Soviets, there is not much reason to add any new member to the "nuclear

As for bomber bases in France, these relatively speaking, may turn out to be of less and less importance. There are at present air bases available to NATO forces in Britain, Italy and Spain, and before long the entire Mediterranean Sea and the Atlantic and Arctic Oceans will furnish all the invisible bases needed for any nuclear war. For the Polaris missile, which is coming into production soon and can be fired from a submarine within a range of 1,500 miles, would reach all the strategic locations inside any country in Eastern or Western Europe.

#### Inez Robb In Denmark, Be Prepared To Eat!

For the life of me, I cannot imagine a "melancholy Dane." Denmark is full of fun, marvelous food and high spirits. That Hamlet, if you ask me, was a changeling and no true son of Denmark

To tell the truth, Denmark is a land where I sort of rest my feet and let my stomach take over. Oh, it is full of great cathedrals, beautiful castles (Hamlet's Elsinore hasn't an equal anywhere), splendid art, vast museums, some of the world's best modern arts and crafts, the Royal Danish Ballet (second to none) and a delightful countryside through which to

But if the ankles are aching it is perdraw up to the table and give the digestive tract a treat. Let me hymn the glories of the open-faced sandwich. This is a great Danish institution and one of the finest inventions of man. It is a poverty-stricken restaurant whose menu lists no more than a hundred varieties.

The foundation of a Danish open-faced delight is a slab of delicious Danish bread, topped with a quarter inch of rich, yellow butter-more butter than one sees on a gross of sandwiches elsewhere. It's murder for a dame on a diet, which I

Then, on top of the butter goes a quarter inch of mayonnaise, just to make a solid base for the superstructure. From here on, anything goes-on top, of course, By comparison with the Danish openfaced sandwich, the American Dagwood is a puny specimen. One of my favorites is of thin roast beef, rising in rosy layer above rosy layer, interspersed and topped with sheer white curls of fresh, hot horseradish Yum!

The pinnacle of all open-faced sandwiches is a specialty as indigeneous to Denmark as caviar is to Russia. Denmark's trademark is tiny shrimps, nev-

er more than an inch in length. And they are delicate and delicious. At the moment they are in season, and an open-face sandwich piled with hundreds of little shrimp is food for the gods.

When I am in Denmark I immediately become a growing girl once more and the direction is outward bound! The Danes are superb cooks in general, but they have no peers, not even the French. in the great art of pastry.

I want to be as couth as the next fellow. And, to prove that I can be, when I was in Denmark last week I was twice to the ballet and once to the beautiful new concert hall in Tivoli Gardens to hear the Royal Symphony Orchestra and see the Danes present the Sonning prize of 50,000 kroner to Igor Stravinsky.

But my real surprise in Denmark was to eat Danish pastry-light, airy and bearing no relation to that concrete-mix sold in other lands under the misnomer of Danish pastry. Let me urge every American tourist to Denmark this year to drive drive to Kolding, a Danish city that boasts

the world's premier bakery. This institution is known as Saxildhus and is attached to a fine hotel of the same name. In variety, delicacy, texture and flavor, this pastry shop is unrivalled. Plan to spend a day in Kolding eating your way through Saxildhus, and a second day there just digesting.

It is always a comforting thought to realize that every time you order a glass of good beer in Denmark, you are aiding the noble cause of the arts and sciences. The country's two largest breweries were left in trust some years ago to support such excellent causes. When you order a glass of suds, you are supporting not your baser nature but a worthy cause. It's enough to drive a prohibitionist

#### Treasury's Fix: Money Got Too High WASHINGTON-"Joe, I don't think expenditures before they can be made.

there is any subject in the world that's So, why okay 'em double? less understood than this." That's what a high Treasury official

said to me just before President Eisenhower sent to Congress his request to raise (1) the debt limit and (2) the allowable interest rate on U. S. bonds. Only a few days before, Mr. Eisenhower, himself, had had a hard time explaining what he wanted at a press conference. He was asked: "Mr. President, in these discussions on

raising the interest rate, will you please tell us what impact this might have on the people generally?" The President replied: "The impact

ought to be well understood, I should think, by all our people if the countryif the nation-cannot borrow money. "As of now, the rate is fixed for any money except below five-year money, and if you put the total \$283,000,000,000 or

\$288,000,000,000 finally in short-range money, then the people will be so badly hurt that we have got to do something." Here's how I'd interpret Mr. Eisenhower: Congress has put a limit on how much money the government can borrow. Right now, the debt limit is \$288,000,000.

000. But on July 1, unless Congress acts.

the limit will slip back to \$283,000,000.000. The Treasury has issued bonds, notes, certificates and bills up to \$286,000,000,-000. These marketbale securities are held by banks, trust companies, corporations, individuals—by you and me, as bank de-positors, as holders of insurance policies, as stockholders, and as owners of E and other bonds.

If Congress doesn't increase the debt limit, think of the absurdity! There'd be three billion of U.S. bonds and notes and bills owned by U. S. citizens, which, technically are "illegal"—above the debt limit. The long-and-short of it is: Congress has no choice-it will raise the debt limit. Politics and Sen Harry Flood Byrd, of Virginia, being what they are, the President refrained from suggesting doing away with the limit entirely. Yet, the limit is illogical. Congress has to authorize

In 1953, the debt limit caused great embarrassment. Taxes came in slowly. Expenses rose. The Treasury couldn't borrow. It held up paying bills. That was hard on companies and persons who had done work for the government and needed to be paid. It was poor business. The richest government in the world was "slow pay."

The debt limit's a secondary problem. The big one, as Mrs. Eisenhower said, is the interst rate. Right now, a bank, an insurance company, a savings institution, and you and I can call up a bond broker and buy government bonds to yield 4.4 per cent or thereabouts. But poor Secretary of the Treasury Anderson can't sell us such a bond. Congress has put a 41/2 per cent ceiling on what he can

Why would you or I buy a new Treasury issue which could return only 4.25 per cent, when we can get 4.4 per cent in the open market? So, if Anderson wants to borrow, he has

to issue what the President called shortrange securities. There's no ceiling on short-term interest rates, only on bonds payable after five years. But the short-term debt is already ex-

cessive. Only 26 per cent of the government's marketable securities matures in more than five years; 32 per cent matures in one to five years; and 42 per cent within a year.

This short-range concentration tends to worsen. Cash-ins of E and H bonds have exceeded sales in 33 of the last 36 months. This can only end in one way. The government has got to become its own best customer. The government has got to buy in its own bonds. It has to retire some of its debt-either (1) by spending less or (2) by taxing more, thus generating a surplus

In the meantime, Congress has no alternative. It must grant Secretary Anderson freedom to finance in the open market. It will have to raise the interest ceiling on bonds above 41/2 per cent-in case he has to use it. Anderson's fix is everybody's fix!

And there that day something happened to Isaiah that was to change his own life and the life of his

to face with God things always happen. This is our need, and this is the great hunger of our hearts, from Job's "O that I knew where I might find him," to Philip's request, "Lord, show us the Father," to your longing and mine to truly know God.

There were many things to see that day-the altar, the brazier, the candles, But Isaiah "saw the Lord, high and lifted up" and that vision filled his heart.

Isaiah saw himself. And seeing himself he was ashamed. "Woe is me! I am a man of unclean lips." We may look at the lives of those about us and be as proud as a pharisee, but to see God as Isaiah did makes us see that we have sinned and come short of the glory of God. Seeing his deep need, Isaiah looked up to God for help. And looking up he experienced the cleansing power which

makes men whole.

Having seen God and himself, he next saw those about him. He saw their sin; he saw their need. "I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips," And he wanted to help. There came the call, "Who will go for us?" And Isaiah's eager response, "Here am I; send

## "There is no heir apparent," Mexican Divorce 'Involved' Minister

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)-A Mexican divorce has ended the marriage of Dr. W. S. McBirnie, Baptist minister who resigned his pastorate after admitting "improper involvement" with a woman member of his congregation.

Judge Eduardo Garza Villasnor of the Court of First Instance granted the divorce June 1 in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, it was learned Thursday.

The divorce was by mutual consent, which is sufficient grounds under Mexican law, Mrs. McBirnie's maiden name, Jane Harvey, was restored. The couple was married in 1940.

The congregation of Trinity Baptist Church accepted the resignation of the 39-year-old minister Wednesday at a meeting attended by 1,200 persons.

The former Mrs. McBirnie declined comment on the divorce. McBirnie's whereabouts are un-
