## Old Editorial Gave Waterway Formula

ROCKPORT (AP)—Residents of the coastal bend were plagued by problems of passes to the open Gulf in the 1870s as much as they are now, says an editorial in the Rockport Transcript. It was edited by C. F. Bailey, ancestor of Travis Bailey who still lives here.

The editorial says in part: "We last week made a few hurried remarks in regard to some work for the permanent improvement of Aransas Bay. . . . It is true that Aransas Bay is in fine order, in fact, more depth of water than there has been in a long time. Yet it is liable to shoal again at any time, and although it can never remain very shoal for any length of time, still the occasional detentions that happen to steamers and sailing vessels are serious inconveniences to the trade of the place, and very damaging to the reputation of the Pass."

And here Editor Bailey gets in some good licks, in a tone strangely reminiscent of a lot of today's curbstone experts here.

"Now the plan proposed by us

was a dam across Corpus Christi Pass and Cedar Bayou, thereby compelling the waters of Corpus Christi Bay, San Antonio Bay, and smaller bays between San Antonio and Aransas Bays to find their sole outlet to the Gulf through Aransas Pass."

This is more or less what had to happen before Aransas Pass could be kept open for ocean traffic.

Anyone acquainted with the area would see, he says, that the volume of water forced through the pass would be doubled or trebled, and this added current would clean away the bar with little trouble, maintaining a depth of from 12 to 15 feet.

Evidently things were cheaper then, or Editor Bailey was overly optimistic, for he continues: "We believe that \$2,000 honestly expended would put a substantial dam across both passes."

"We are not an engineer," he says, in words still frequently heard, "but we do claim to be possessed of common reasoning powers, and confess that no reason presents itself to our mind why the work, once done, would not result in immense bounties to this section."

At this time, Rockport was not quite three years old, having been founded to take care of cattle exports to New Orleans. The Transcript had been published here only about six months.

It was founded at St. Mary's by Geraldo Alonzo Beeman and Bailey, and called "The Vaquero." In 1869 they moved to Rockport, where Beeman sold his interest to Bailey and the name was changed to the Rockport Transcript.

The Vaquero printing plant consisted of a press on which a single five column page could be printed at a time. About 50 pounds of type was included.

For the Transcript, a complete new outfit was purchased, including a Washington hand press, and it was published under that name for many years. Today it is the Rockport Pilot.

## Crude Demand Drop Reported

AUSTIN (AP) — Another drop in demand for Texas oil has been reported by the major crude buying companies.

The companies submitted nominations for July purchases yesterday totaling 2,655,282 barrels, down 62,841 barrels from June.

The July allowable will be set June 18 by the railroad commission. It will consider nominations, Bureau of Mines forecast of demand, current stocks and other factors at monthly prorating hearings.

Nominations dipped in all except three districts: District 5 East Central Texas, up 401 barrels; District 6, East Texas (outside), up 366 barrels; and District 10, Panhandle, 683 barrels.

Decreases in barrels by districts: District 1, Southwest Texas, 827 barrels; 2, Southwest Texas, 1,834 barrels; 3, Gulf Coast, 5,335; 4, Southwest Texas, 6,410; 6, East Texas field, 2,430; 7-B, West Central Texas, 8,350; 7-C, West Central Texas, 7,735; 8, West Texas, 18,620; 9, North Texas, 12,750.

Steele, 62, a stationary engineer, was ordered committed to the California Mental Authority Thursday.

## Oil Leakage Is Basis For Suit

Richard Thompson, who has a place east of here near the Midway road, has filed suit against Coaden Petroleum Corp. in 118th District Court, asking damages resulting from an oil line leak.

In the suit, Thompson asks that Coaden pay him \$1,200 for the damages he sustained.

His suit alleges that a Coaden oil line which crosses his property developed a leak about May 1 and the oil spilled over onto a stretch of land about 300-400 by 30-40 feet. This caused permanent damage to the land, he claims.

In addition, he alleges that the firm damaged his land in getting to the break with its equipment and also used his topsoil in filling in the hole after repairing the break.

## Nixon Defends Russ Parleys As Necessary

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — "Is anything to be gained by conferences with the Russians?" That question was put to Vice President Richard M. Nixon at a Commonwealth Club banquet Thursday night and he replied: "There is a great deal of justification for the question. Developments in Geneva don't offer too much encouragement, but the conferences are most useful. "And the main point is, the alternative to talking is unacceptable. The United States and the Soviet Union would draw apart and quite conceivably could end up by fighting. Neither the United States or any other nation can afford to risk settlements by force. "But the frightening thing is, war can come when all parties concerned do not want it."

Nixon said, however, there has been absolutely no change in the U.S. policy that any summit conference would have to be preceded by signs of progress at the current conference of foreign ministers. The vice president, his wife, Pat, and daughters, Patricia, 13, and Julie, 10, flew here from New York where he participated in ceremonies marking the 350th anniversary of the discovery of the Hudson River.

They go to Virginia City today where Nixon will speak informally at Nevada's silver centennial celebration. Nixon spoke on a wide range of subjects at the dinner sponsored by the civic club.

He predicted that labor reform will be a "major issue in the 1960 presidential campaign and should be."

## Rail Commuters Protest Chirping Conductor Gag

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—As a rule, commuters who ride the New Haven Railroad into New York don't get worked up over anything but late trains. When they feel a friend is being abused, though, they sound off. Lately, they've been pelting the railroad with letters because they think it's giving a hard time to one of its veteran employees, ticket collector Ed McCarthy. McCarthy used to whistle as he took the tickets, trestling and chirping as he worked from car to car.

McCarthy began his chirping routine about 15 years ago. Now it's as much a part of his makeup as his punch and his flat-topped cap.

"Some of the passengers make believe they're sleeping just to make me chirp," he said. "And then sometimes they really are asleep. Instead of shaking them and scaring the wits out of them, I chirp—and they usually wake up with a smile."

But not always, it seems. Early this month, a company supervisor said that while many regulars enjoyed the cheerful antics, there were others who didn't. As a result, an order went down to cut out the whistling.

This is what set off the letter-writing campaign. Some have come to McCarthy, some to the railroad offices, and some to the head man himself, President George Albert.

Although he hasn't yet issued an order removing the ban, Albert seems to side with the pro-chirp faction. "In this very crab world," he said, "and in the atmosphere in which we railroad people are living these days, a little whistling does no harm."

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## Cat Earns Keep As Snake Killer

CUPERTINO, Calif. (AP) — Mom, an alley cat who turned up at the Pattison home a couple of years ago and stayed on, has become a feline heroine. She's been bringing an occasional rabbit or gopher—dead, of course—and placing it at the feet of Shawn Pattison. Wednesday, Shawn heard a rattle while playing in his driveway. He ran to his mother, Clair Pattison. Mrs. Pattison looked where Shawn pointed. There was Mom, staring at a snake. For five minutes, or so it seemed, Mom toyed with the snake. Then Mom lunged, grabbed the snake behind the head, shook it violently, and chomped until it ceased to wriggle. Mrs. Pattison measured the reptile at 16 inches and said it had three rattles.

## Loans Said Better Than Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee wants a start made next year on a cutting down and eventually wiping out all gifts of foreign economic assistance. It contends loans are better.

The committee wrote its demand Thursday into President Eisenhower's \$3,930,000,000 foreign aid bill. Both the Senate and the House must agree if it is to become effective. No deadline was fixed.

Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.), pushing for more emphasis on loans, had been urging that all gifts of aid be ended by June 30, 1963.

Mansfield's proposal would have applied to grants and gifts of special economic assistance, for which Eisenhower is asking 250 million dollars next year, and defense economic supports, for which he seeks \$35 million.

Fixing a time limit, the committee adopted an amendment asking Eisenhower to submit a specific plan next year under which such grant assistance "shall be progressively reduced and eliminated."

The plan it asked for would apply different standards to different countries receiving aid. Critics of Mansfield's proposal had contended that some countries would need grants rather than loans for a long time.

In other actions, the committee

voted to curb secrecy on foreign aid spending and to restrict government guarantees on private investment abroad.

Secrecy on the amount of aid to any country would be limited to that necessary to U.S. security. The administration would be required to make public all other information on both military and economic aid.

Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho), who sponsored the secrecy ban, cited an example involving Brazil. He said it has long been known that this country has a missile tracking station on a Brazilian island, but secrecy hides "how much rent," as he put it, this country is paying Brazil.

Under an amendment by Sen. George D. Aiken (R-Vt.), investment guarantees would be limited to those made in underdeveloped countries.

They are now available generally to guarantee American investors abroad against losses from war, confiscation or inability to convert foreign currencies into dollars.

Aiken said the change would prevent further guarantees against such losses in countries like England, France, West Germany and Italy. It would tend to steer private investment into underdeveloped areas of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

He said it would permit continued guarantees on investments in underdeveloped areas of Spain, Greece and other countries generally eligible for technical assistance.

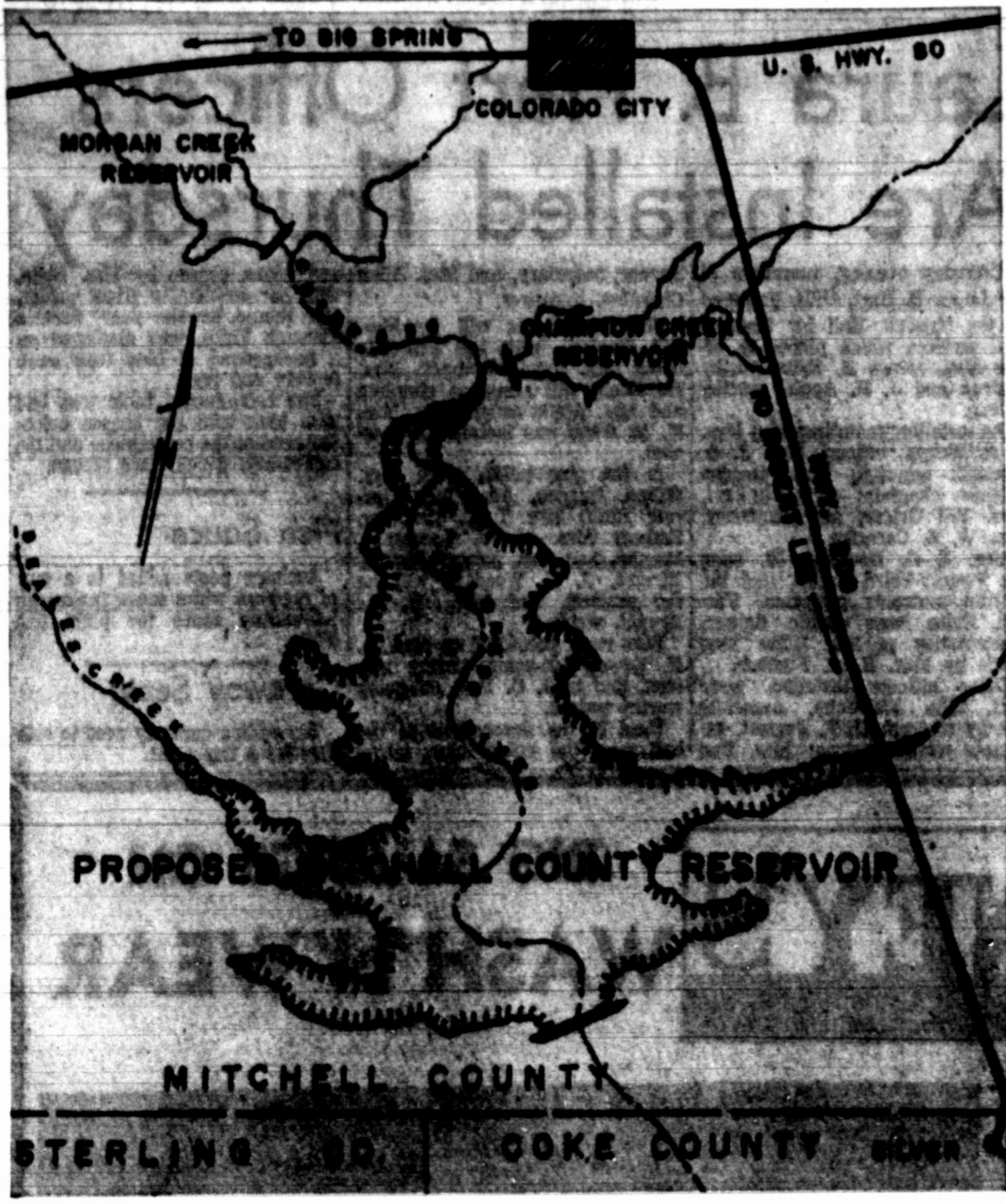

### Legislature Is Thrown Open To Other Bills

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Price Daniel's special legislative session, deadlocked on taxing and spending, was thrown open to other proposed legislation today. The governor, who by constitutional authority controls the subject matter of special sessions, added five specific proposals for consideration. He added a sixth blanket proclamation covering a wide range of local and general bills including regulation of small loans and corporate surpluses. The governor's open-door policy came as joint committees of senators and representatives tried to write acceptable compromises of the general tax bill and the general appropriations bill. Consistent reports were that the joint conferees had made no appreciable progress on either the taxing or spending problems. Speculation grew that a second called session would be necessary.

### Suit Filed By State Of Texas

State of Texas, through John C. Phillips, assistant attorney general, Thursday filed a suit against T&T Supply Co. and Doyle Thomas asking that the defendants be forced to pay penalties and that an injunction be issued against them. The petition alleges violations of state laws by the defendant in connection with overweight on trucks used in interstate transportation. The state sets forth that Article 911-B of Vernon's Penal Code and Article 1690-B also of the penal code, provide a penalty of \$100 a day for each day of the alleged violation. It also asks an injunction be issued to prevent the defendant from transporting any commodities on the roads and highways of the state at any time without first obtaining a certificate of public necessity. The case was filed in 118th District Court.

## 9,000-Foot Wildcat Site Is Scheduled By Stanotex

Standard Oil of Texas announced site today of a 9,000-foot wildcat in Dawson County, and an old wildcat will be re-entered for tests in Sterling County. The new site is Stanotex No. 1 Richards, about five miles southeast of Lamesa. In Sterling, J. S. Goodrich will plug back the No. 1 W. L. Foster to 9,350 feet and test the Mississippian. The well, drilled originally by Humble, was plugged in 1952 at 9,540 feet. Location of the wildcat is 2 1/2 miles west of the Patricia field, 660 from south and west lines, Labor 20, League 268, Kent CSL Survey. A new Patricia field site is Forest No. 3 Harris, about 12 miles southwest of Lamesa. It is 6,250 feet from south and 330 from west lines, League 268, Moore CSL Survey. Drilling depth is 12,500 feet. The Stanotex No. 1 Richards wildcat is 660 from north and east lines, 35-55-in. T&P Survey, and five miles southeast of Lamesa. Drilling depth is 9,000. Rodman No. 1 Turnbow made hole at 4,280 feet in anhydrite and 837. The wildcat is 660 from north and west lines, Labor 14, League 262, Kent CSL Survey. Southern Minerals No. 1 Slaughter drilled at 7,468 feet in shale. It is a wildcat 660 from south and 550 from east lines, 6-2, T&NO Survey. Operator installed pump at US Smelting No. 1 Sims today, before taking potential. The wildcat is nine miles southwest of Justiceburg, C NE SE, 7-2, T&P Survey. Stanotex No. 1 Scherz, C NE NE, 35-34-5s, T&P Survey, progressed at 7,136 feet in lime. The 10,700-foot explorer is 16 miles south of Garden City.

### Deputy Testifies He Obtained Confessions To Coed Assault

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A sheriff's deputy testified today that within hours after the rape of a Negro coed he had a confession implicating four white youths. The officer, W. W. Slappey, told a male white jury trying the youths for rape that he talked with the youngest, Ollie Stoutmire, 16, shortly after his arrest. Slappey testified: "I asked him did he have intercourse with the girl. At first he said no, the other three did and he didn't. I asked him again if he were sure and he said: 'Yes sir, we all did.'" The defense fought bitterly but vainly to prevent introduction of statements taken from the quartet after their arrests. Circuit Judge W. May Walker allowed the state to proceed in offering the statements. Of a second defendant, Patrick G. Scarborough, 20, Slappey testified: "He said he didn't know exactly what happened, that he was asleep on the back seat." Slappey then quoted the eldest of the defendants, Willton T. Collinsworth, 23, as saying: "He said two of the boys had intercourse with the girl but he didn't know which two it was, but he wasn't one of them." The defense already has admitted to the jury that Collinsworth did have relations with the coed.

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## Deputy Testifies He Obtained Confessions To Coed Assault

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A sheriff's deputy testified today that within hours after the rape of a Negro coed he had a confession implicating four white youths. The officer, W. W. Slappey, told a male white jury trying the youths for rape that he talked with the youngest, Ollie Stoutmire, 16, shortly after his arrest. Collinsworth, 23, as saying: "He said two of the boys had intercourse with the girl but he didn't know which two it was, but he wasn't one of them." The defense already has admitted to the jury that Collinsworth did have relations with the coed.

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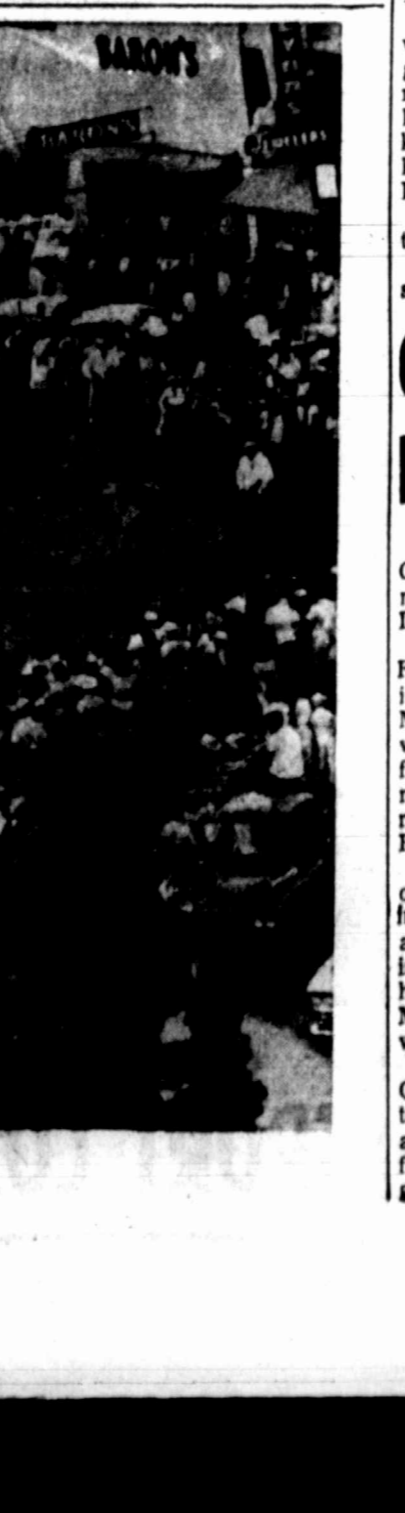

The Dodgers made it a breeze for Podres by rapping five Phil pitchers for 19 hits. Robin Roberts (4-5) was the loser.

Podres, who has pitched seven three-hitters in his career, struck out six and gave up three walks. Buhl (6-3), coming back after last year's arm trouble, won his fourth in a row with his second shutout. He walked four, struck out eight. The Braves, who had lost two straight, collected five

Hillman Robbins, a 27-year-old, 5-10, 137-pound freshman pro who was a National Amateur champion two years ago, was only a stroke behind.

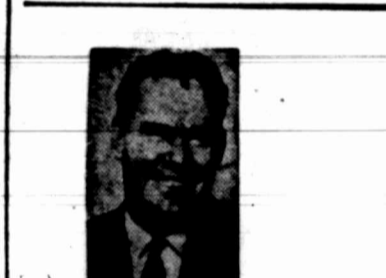
But so many good players were grouped within a few strokes of these pace-setters that it still could be anybody's tournament.

# Sox Ride Ace's Arm To 1 1/2 Game Lead

Billy Pierce missed that elusive no-hitter he's come so close to nailing again Thursday night, coming off with the fourth one-hitter of his career — tops among active pitchers in the majors.

This one hoisted the Chicago White Sox into a 1 1/2-game lead in the American League with a 3-1 victory over the Washington Senators.

Pierce, whose last one-hitter was a 3-0 decision over the Senators June 27 last year, gave up a third inning double by Ron Samford Thursday night, then pushed the run across with three consecutive walks.

Colavito's double, following a walk to Woody Field, broke up a 1-1 duel between southpaw Don Ferrarese of the Indians and Milt Pappas of the Orioles. Both finished with seven-hitters and 5-3 records.

Al Kaline drove in three runs with three hits for the Tigers. He singled home the clincher in a three-run seventh inning against rookie Ted Wills (2-1) and hit his 12th homer in the ninth. Reliever Ray Narleski made his second start and went all the way for a 3-6 record with a five-hitter, giving up Ted Williams' 484th career homer, second this year, in the sixth.

**THE LONG LONG TRAIL**

**No Heir Apparent In Sight As Governor's Race Nears**

Editors Note — While Louisiana Gov. Earl K. Long swears a sanity hearing in Galveston, Tex., his powerful political machine is without an heir with a governor's race on tap in December. The Long influence has been dominant factor in Louisiana politics since the late Huey P. Long became governor in 1928, and Earl K. Long is — undisputed master of the political legacy Huey left in his last of a three-part series. AP writer Hugh Mulligan deals with Earl Long and the political repercussions in Louisiana while Long is confined in a Galveston psychiatric clinic.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—With fiery Gov. Earl K. Long in a Texas mental clinic awaiting a sanity hearing, the powerful Long faction that his brother Huey founded faces a governor's race in December with no heir apparent in sight.

"There is no heir apparent," says State Sen. Charles Deichmann, a Long leader from New Orleans. "Earl doesn't believe in grooming successors. He always busts up his organization and rebuilds after losing an election. When he's out, he wants the whole bunch out with him. That way everyone stays dependent on him and nobody gets big ideas."

For nearly 30 years the sulphur-tongued "last of the red hot poppas," as Earl once called himself, has been in and out of office, running for governor or lieutenant governor in every election since the hey-day of Huey, with the exception of 1952 when he tried to handpick a successor and lost overwhelmingly.

Huey Long, with his dynamic personality, his emotional appeal to the common man, his ruthless, power-grabbing tactics, founded the dynasty and bequeathed it a spiritual figurehead, the image of the "martyred Kingfish."

But to younger brother Earl, now 63 and in his third term as governor, must go the credit for rescuing the dynasty from the wreckage of the Louisiana scandals and building it into a lasting political machine by sheer force of politicking.

There are and have been other Longs on the Louisiana political scene. Huey's son is the state's junior U.S. senator. Another brother, George, died in office as a congressman. Huey's widow, Rose, filled out the remainder of the Kingfish's Senate term when an assassin's bullet cut him down. A third cousin, Speedy Long, 30, is now in the State Senate and regarded as a corner, even though elected as an anti-Long from Earl's home district.

But only Earl, of all the Long kin, has been able to don Huey's mantle and lay claim to his devoted personal following. This he has had to do for himself. Huey didn't believe in grooming successors either, even from inside the family.

Earl, who got his first political job from Huey and stumped faithfully in his behalf, found that out when he sought the lieutenant governor slot on the ticket that

was to carry on the work while the Kingfish went on to the U.S. Senate and, so the dream went, to the presidency. Thinking the kid brother might be getting too big for his britches, Huey gave the nomination to a lesser member of the hierarchy. Earl in retaliation broke with his brother to run and lose on a rival ticket.

Claiming deathbed forgiveness, Earl managed to get back in the fold in time for the Louisiana scandals, the half-billion dollar plundering of the state treasury that followed in the wake of Huey's assassination. He moved up to the governorship when Dick Leche resigned to go to the pen-

**Mexican Divorce Ends Marriage Of 'Involved' Minister**

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—A Mexican divorce has ended the marriage of Dr. W. S. McBirnie, Baptist minister who resigned his pastorate after admitting "improper involvement" with a woman member of his congregation.

Judge Eduardo Garza Villanor of the Court of First Instance granted the divorce June 1 in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, it was learned Thursday.

The divorce was by mutual consent, which is sufficient grounds under Mexican law. Mrs. McBirnie's maiden name, Jane Harvey, was restored. The couple was married in 1940.

The congregation of Trinity Baptist Church accepted the resignation of the 39-year-old minister Wednesday at a meeting attended by 1,200 persons.

The former Mrs. McBirnie declined comment on the divorce. McBirnie's whereabouts are unknown.

Public office has been a way of life—more than that—an obsession, with him. In Louisiana, the governor can't succeed himself. But "Ole Uncle Earl" has tried every trick in and out of the book to keep himself in power. Defeated for governor in 1940, he tried to have himself named secretary of state when the nominee died without taking office. At the end of his 1948 term, he attempted to call a constitutional convention to extend his term without a vote of the people.

And next week's sanity hearing will determine whether he can carry out his latest scheme to resign in favor of Lt. Gov. Frazier and then run to succeed him. The sound trucks are painted and waiting.

Without Earl doing the hoeing, the harvest this year could go to the anti-Long camp where several popular figures, like young Mayor deLesseps S. Morrison of New Orleans and former Gov. Jimmy Davis are eyeing the race. At the moment the big house on the hill that Huey built stands empty, and his followers seem reluctant to try the door. At least until they find out whether the big boss is coming back.

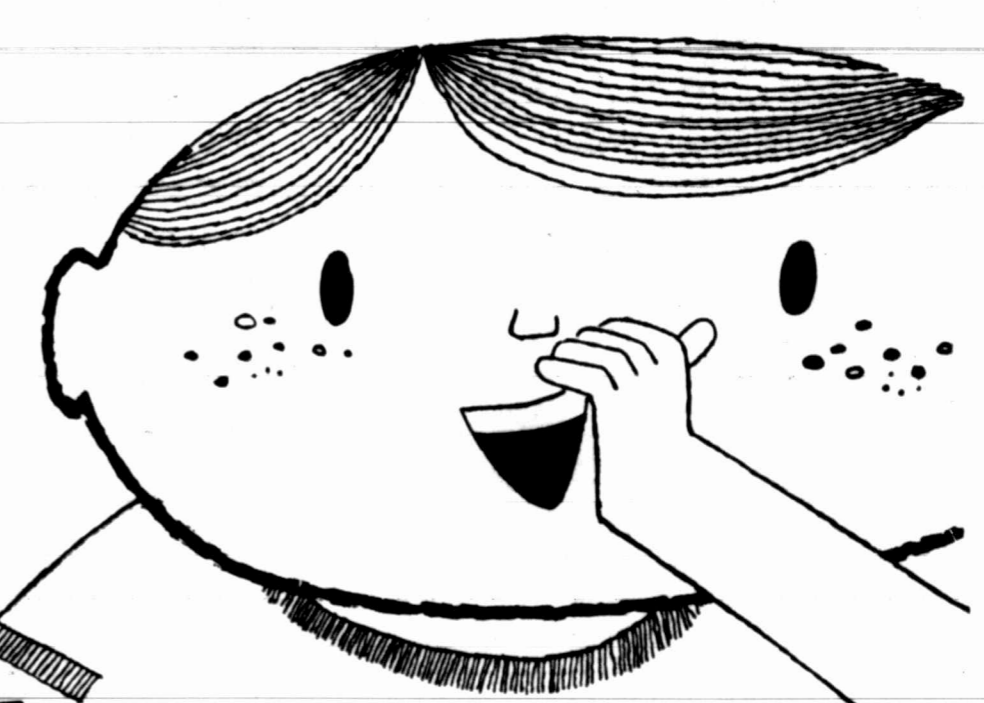

## Steam From Earth's Core Seen As Big Power Source

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Steam from the depths of the earth is seen as a cheap source of untapped energy, a reserve to which man might turn when all other sources are spent.

Prospects for such power sources were outlined by Earl F. English before the Southern Research Institute's "Undiscovered Earth" conference.

"The volume of the geothermal heat is millions of times greater than all the known resources of fossil fuels and will endure for millions of years," said English, vice president of the Thermal Power Co.

English sees the use of geothermal steam as a heat source for many industries, providing the location of the steam supply is suitable for installation of such an industry.

He says, however, that it is not practicable to transfer steam over long distance.

English says the natural market for geothermal steam is the production of electric energy. But he emphasized that the uncertainty of sources of continued steam power from the earth is a handicap.

Steam drilling operations have been conducted in Italy, New Zealand and in Sonoma County, Calif.

"There can be no guarantee as to the total amount which can be developed at a particular location nor as to its duration," English said.

English said the cost of operating a geothermal steam plant would be relatively cheap in relation to other power plants.
