



# Plan No. 7 for Ungraded Dairies

NOTE: This building is small single wall, cheaply constructed building which can be built by the producer without outside labor. It only a two-stall barn is needed only a little over 600 board feet of lumber will construct it. Consider ing the present cost of materials the lumber in this shed should cost less than \$60.00 provided all new naterials are used. If the producer has a well located shed on the premises that can be converted into such a building, the cost would be much less. Used lumber may be used if it is smoothe on the inside and painted. This plan is consider ed to be large enough for milking 8 or 10 cows, two at a time, and it is small enough that it can easily be moved by a tenant farmer if

MILK ROOM The milk room should have at least one glass window which ma be put on a slide inside the wall and which may be screened on the outside. A tight wood floor will be satisfactory provided waste water is piped away from the milk room The roof should join the walls tight enough to exclude flies and dust The floor should be about one foot

floor will prevent standing water under the milk room. A panel may be cut from the top portion of a solid door and the opening screened. The panel removed should be fastened together with cleats and during bad weather may be placed back in the opening and fastene! with wood buttons. This home-buil' door will serve the purpose of both a screen door and a solid door. The door should open to the outside and should be made self-closing with a spring. A storage rack built of wood 18 inches above the floor will serve as storage for cans, pails and strainer. Two vats or two tubs should be installed for cleaning and bacterial treatment of the utensils with a chlorine solution. Cooling facilities are required. This may be provided by piping told water from the well by means of a pump or mill into the milk room and directly into a cooling vat or tank in which cans of milk may be placed. An overflow pipe should be so located that the water level

the barn should face South and should be left open for ventilation and sunning. A poultry wire fen e around an area of about 12 ft. 15 ft. in front of the barn will keep out chickens, calves, etc. Feed must not be stored in the milk room or the milking barn. A separate feed room may be provided or feed may be stored in a nearby barn.

The job of producing milk on the farm throughout the year will be made easier, more convenient and more sanitary if it is done inside suitable buildings. The milker will be more comfortable and the cows will be more comfortable and will produce more milk on an average. Expensive buildings are not requir-ed. This small building is designed to comply with State Health Department regulations for ungraded



# SUGGESTIONS IN CARE OF YOUR BATTERY

A partially-charged battery that gives tractor operators many headaches can be eliminated by perodic testing and routine servicing.

Experience indicates that overcharging and lack of distilled water are chief causes of short battery life.. Battery boiling is caused by orcharging and should be remedied by decreasing the charging rate, he added oerore giving the following suggestions on battery care:

It pays to test a battery with an hydrometer. The reading indicates the condition of the battery.

Don't take a reading fro mthe cell which has had water added to it until after the tractor has been driven for at least 30 minutes. If readings of 1225 or less are obtained, the

battery is not sufficiently charged and should

either be recharged or replaced. If the battery has been discharged by leaving the light or ignition on, it may be recharged by

If readings above 1250 are obtained, the bat-tery is fully charged and it will merely be neces-sary to add distilled water.


