U. S. Assures **Allies Data** Is Available

GENEVA (AP) - The United States has assured its chief Western Allies it will inform them fully of developments in the talks between President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and will consult them on any specific agreements which

Eisenhower, officials say, is determined not to give Khrushchev any opening for a wedge between United States and other countries in the Western Alliance.

President, in his European swing Oliver P. Morgan. before he meets Khrushchev, wiff assure British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, French President Charles de Gaulee, and West Safety Speakers German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer that no deals will be made behind their backs.

He also wants to get their ideas about problems he and Khrushgestions for improving East-West relations

Secretary of State Christian A Herter, British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd, and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville are reported to have agreed that, in view of their deadlock Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko over Berlin, the Eisenhower-Khrushchev talks are highly desirable.

CAN END TALK

The ministers reason that they now can end their conference with Gromyko in failure and leave the Berlin crisis in a state of suspension, without the prospect of an imminent Soviet move against ported. West Berlin which would create a new danger of war. The Allies figure Khrushchev will want a good atmosphere for his American trip and will avoid unfriendly acts and belligerent talk.

The French government reacted slowly and with apparent coolness to the announcement of the impending visit exchange. But informants said the French government welcomed it as a means of buying time and stalling off the Soviet threat to Berlin.

The last session of the foreign minister's conference is set for Wednesday. It is expected that the conference will end with a brief communique announcing agreement to disagree and declaring the meeting in recess. The next round of talks may come at New York in mid-September when the ministers are expected to be on hand for the opening days of the annual U.N. General As-

The possibility that Gromyko might make some dramatic, lastminute proposal for a limited Berlin deal was not ruled out entirely. But in a luncheon talk with Lloyd Monday, he reportedly gave no sign of any such intention.

He did, however, indicate that recess of the present talks would be agreeable to him. There had been some fear he might try to keep the conference in session or veto a recess in an effort to force Herter to take full responsibility for a breakoff.

Trial Of Peter Zenger 225 Years Ago Today Recalled

date was Aug. 4. The event was a trial. The charge was criminal libel.

The defendant was a newspaper publisher and editor. He published a weekly paper called the New York Weekly Journal. His opposition to the policies of the governor in the administration of public affairs had led to the indictment against him for criminal libel.

He had been held in jail since the fall of the preceding year. The courts refused to allow him reasonable bail, Now, on Aug. 4, he was brought from jail, arraigned in a court before a judge appointed and controlled by the governor he was accused of libel-

His attorney was a diligent man name was Andrew Hamilton.

PAPER CONTINUED Despite the indictment against him, the Weekly Journal, in which had appeared the editorials criticizing the governor and for which editorials the editor was now being

held in jail, had continued to publish each S irrday. The editor's wife, a courageous little woman, who was as deeply concerned in the issue at stake as her husband, saw to it that the little newspaper was in the hands of its subscribers each week. She made little trips to the prison where the editor was confined and through what became known later as "the hole in the jail door," she

regard to justice or honesty. Zenger, a printer by trade, formed the Weekly Journal to oppose the tyranny of the royal governor. Zenger was not a welleducated man. He wrote vigorously but not brilliantly, but he wrote what he believed and he had the courage to point the accusing finger at the greedy governor and at the sycophants who were waxing rich at the expense of the

honest, hard-working colonists. Cosby did not take this criticism with patience. Early in the autumn of 1734, he ordered four editions of the Journal seized and burned. The courts refused to honor the order. The board of city aldermen declined to permit the -an earnest, sincere man. His public whipper to carry out the

governor's request. Finally Cosby was able to compel the sheriff-who owed his job to the executive's favor-to seize the editions. The sheriff, unable to find helpers, forced a Negro of them burned the offending newspapers in the public square.

EDITOR IN JAIL On the heels of this, Cosby ordered the arrest of Zenger on a charge of criminal libel. The courts, now back in line behind the tyrant, set the luckless editor's bond at 400 pounds - an enormous sum for those days. The court also required that his sureties, should he find any, post 200 pounds bail. Zenger's friends, although loyal, could not raise that kind of money. The editor was thrown in the common jail. For a number of weeks he was held in-

communicado. He saw no one but the jailer; he talked to no one When this stern edict was slightly relaxed, his wife was permitted to visit him. And it was in these visits that she was given the material and instructions by which she was able to continue publish-

ing the Journal without missing an issue for the 40 weeks that Zenger remained in his cell. Andrew Hamilton, the lawyer, doesn't seem to rank very highly in the estimation of historians. have, he displayed amazing courage and legal skill in appearing for the shackled editor. Hamilton's defense of his client was based on the argument that the jurors should look into the issue of whether the alleged libel of which his client was accused was false or true. This, although it was not so recognized at the time, was a tremendous innovation in law. The unfriendly judge on the bench sternly refused to permit

JURY ACTS PART So convincing was Hamilton's appeal, the jurors, in their own turn, ignored the instructions of the court. Hamilton had warned them the court had instructed them they could not consider this issue of truth or falsity.

"Do not heed the court." pleaded. "Look into the truth in this matter. Find out for yourselves whether Zenger has lied about Governor Cosby or whether he has but told the honest truth." So on Aug. 4, 1735-30 years be-

Canadian Party Has Reduced Death Penalty

OTTAWA (AP) — Capital pun-ishment has been reduced in Canada since the Conservatives came

to power two years age. Prime Minister John Diefenbaker's Cabinet has commuted 25 of 32 death sentences since June, 1957. The previous Liberal Cabinet allowed 21 hangings and commuted 18 death sentences be-

ween 1954 and 1956. Under Canadian criminal law, the courts must sentence anyone convicted of murder to death. But the federal Cabinet decides whether a murderer hangs or receives

a life sentence instead. The Conservatives' reduction of death sentences has led to criticism in some quarters that the Cabinet is making a mockery of court decisions. Justice A. M. Manson of Kamloops, B.C., charges that the Cabinet's action con stitutes an infringement of Par-

liament's rights.

Lester B. Pearson, Liberal leader in the House of Commons, said that if the government wants to abolish death sentences, it should propose such a change in Canadian law and let Parliament de-

Fulton said in an interview the Cabinet's policy is no indication that the government wants to abolish capital punishment. Such Zenger, freed from his cell, re- an action, he said, is a right only the Parliament can exercise.

"There should certainly be no feeling on the part of a judge that in commuting a death sentence we are reversing him," he added, contending that there is a difference between the court's responsibility to administer the law and the Cabinet's duty to exercise its law-given prerogative of mercy. 

Making Highways Dumpheaps

A gentleman who has just completed a 1,200-mile trek over Texas comes back with the report that beer cans and liquor bottles by the tens of thousands litter the

One does not have to be a tectotaler or prohibitionist to deplore this illegal misuse of our highway rights of way. And it is against the law to litter them. One might as well dump tomato cans, fruit juice cans, kitchen garbage or catsup bottles on the right of way as beer cans and whisky bottles. One is as inexcusable and unlawful as the other.

Florida eases this problem by providing litter containers at intervals along the highways where one may pull out and dispose of litter. Texas might emulate that good example.

Highway patrolmen, deputy sheriffs or constables might concert a campaign against motorists who show no respect for anti-litter laws, and no regard whatever for tourists and citizens who are disgusted with the unsightly appearance of our roads

The beer and liquor dealers might, in their own selfish interests, join wholeheartedly in an anti-litter campaign by warning their customers not to make a dumping ground of public thoroughfares - including, alas, city streets and private lawns and gardens.

This wretched habit costs the taxpayers money, not to mention the offense to good taste.

Frequently State Highway Department trucks, attended by several men, ply the highways picking up after the litterbugs. Thus, cost is added to ugliness.

There are other places to dispose of refuse beside tossing it out of a car window. A campaign to impress this fact on the driving public is long overdue.

Pinch On The Highway Program

Last year Congress voted a speed-up in the federal highway building program as a means of countering the recession.

This week the powerful House Ways and Means Committee voted to slow down the program by spreading it over four additional years - from 1972 to 1976. The program was having financial troubles, and President Eisenhower asked that the federal tax on gasoline be in-

creased from 3 cents a gallon to 4.5 cents. This was the sticking point, apparently, with the committee. The gasoline tax is held by many to be the special province of the states, some of which levy as high as 8 cents a gallon, and other states have recently raised or are currently considering hiking the levy.

If the committee decision is adopted by Congress, the states will be forced to cut back their current highway programs, based largely on federal aid, at a time a speed-up rather than a slow-down is in widespread demand.

As a substitute for the gasoline tax hike asked by the President, the committee suggests issuance of a billion dollars in revenue bonds against future highway user tax receipts coming into the highway trust fund. That would have the automatic effect of spreading out the national program four additional years. It also is another form of federal borrowing and therefore inflationary,

Big Salaries To The Retired Brass

WASHINGTON - Why do firms with huge defense contracts from the government hire retired admirals and generals at five-figure salaries? Is it because they know the right people in the Pentagon and can lobby through big contracts? Are they merely front men? Or do they have real ability worth \$50,000 or \$75,000 a year?

These are questions which a House committee, headed by Representative F. Edward Hebert, is trying seriously to answer. Behind the inquiry is a supercharge of resentment and frustration not only in Congress but, judging from Congressional mail, in the country as well. To the eye of the ordinary viewer, the big brass seem to be in league with giant industry to spend more than \$40 billion a year of the taxpayers' money. And Congress, charged with responsibility for taxes and appropriations, can only chip away at the great monolith that is

labeled national security. One source of resentment is the fact that if the ordinary citizen, trying to live on his social security retirement pension, to which he has contributed throughout his working life, makes more than \$100 a month, he loses the pension. Yet an admiral or a general, retiring with a pension of \$12,000 a year, to which he has not contributed, can take a salary with private industry up to any amount, including the bonanza of stock options in the company, and still keep his government pension.

Reflecting this resentment, the House came within a few votes of adopting an amendment which would have forbidden officers to take defense jobs for five years after their retirement.

Hebert frankly admits that his committee finds it difficult to pin down just what it is that the generals and admirals do for their salaries. But he says, too, that in trying to get the facts he is also trying to be fair. Inevitably, the inquiry spills over into the "munitions lobby" and the part played by the admirals and gen-

Last week the committee looked into the Aerospace Industries Association. maintained by the companies producing aircraft, missiles and rockets. Eighty per cent of their business is with the government, and they contribute in proportion to their sales to a fund that last year totalled \$1,419,115. The biggest compa such as Douglas, Boeing, Convair and Lockheed, contributed \$75,000 each.

Orval R. Cook, a retired Air Force major general, is president of Aerospace at an annual salary of \$49,999.92. He testified that besides research and educational projects, Aerospace does some lobbying. What startled Hebert and the other com-

Bacteria And Their Use As Weapons Of War

I notice in the paper where botulism caused the death of a number of per-sons a few days ago. Death from this cause is so rare it rated considerable attention in the newspapers.

It is an ailment which develops when a person eats canned foods not properly prepared at the time they were processed. Generally it occurs in home-canned vegetables — particularly green beans. Commercially processed foods are usually free from the danger.

The little bug which causes the disease is possessed of a very peculiar characteristic—one we should be most happy he does possess. He is harmless as long as he is in the open air; once he is locked up without oxygen he becomes lethal. Suppose nature had reversed the pattern? Suppose he achieved
his fatal abilities when exposed to air?.

I understand he is abundant, but fortunately for humanity, he seldom gets a
chance to work his avil chance to work his evil.

Which leads me to recall a time not too many years ago when there was a lot of attention focused on the possibility of bacteria as a weapon in wars to come. Botulism, I do not suppose, would be a very effective germ to use in such warfare. Unfortunately, there are many others - anthrax, for examplewhich have even greater destructive powers and which could be easily employed to decimate a nation.

I remember reading, at the time some emphasis was being placed on this subject, that all a bacteriologist, assigned to produce a supply of deadly germs for warfare, would require would be a small cottage, a few simple pieces of equipment and a quantity of eggs. With this inexpensive and inconspicuous setup, it would be possible, I understand, to produce wholesale death.

The eggs would be used as cultures in which the germs could be produced by the multi-millions. Their preservation and ultimate distribution would be a matter of little difficulty. They could be dropped from air; dumped into water reservoirs; poured into rivers. They could be casually sprinkled on foodstuffs in stores. Indeed, the ease with which they could be distributed is shocking to consider. It is an inevitable circumstance, in all

wars, there are certain individuals inside each nation opposed to the war and so fanatic in their attitude they can be persuaded to do anything to bring a termina-

tion to the conflict. And in these days, when attacks on military irstallations and armies is not the first element of war, the opportunity for such individuals to levy disaster on the civilian population is abundant. Also, agents from the enemy country could be planted and assigned to just such opera-tions as producing lethal bacteria and

supervising their employment.

In World War I, (which seems a long, long time ago) the Germans developed poison gas. They used it with deadly effectiveness for a time. The Allies were able to devise a defense and, in their own turn, employed the same weapon against the Germans. The upshot was a stalemate-abandonment of the weapon by both sides.

In this case, the deadly fumes were projected only against armies. The idea of wholesale decimation of civilian populations as major war device had not progressed (not a suitable word,

I think) as far as it has now. In these days we have nuclear weapons and no sound defense has been created against them. The only protection so far is their own dreadful horror - nations which have them are most reluctant touse them both for humanitarian reasons and for fear of the retaliation that would follow. These things are so terrible and so destructive they create a sense of

terror by their very existence. Ultimately, nuclear weapons will be used in war. In the next war in all probability. We have to accept this brutal realiza-

And when we contemplate the potentialities offered by such conflict, it is an easy step forward to visualize a war in which bacteria would also be employed. Given warning, it is possible most of the deadly bacteria which could be used for weapons could be countered. We will have no warning, unfortunately. No more than we will be warned whengthe first atomic weapons will be put into use.

India Builds First Fresh Milk Factory

NEW DELHI, India (AP)-With foreign help, the Indian government is completing a project to provide New Delhi with its first dependably pure fresh milk.

Milk is a luxury in India. Those who can afford it usually get milk from emaciated, sickly cows, di-

But to a devout Hindu, milk is nectar. It is one of the prime offerings to a deity. Nothing is said to please a departing soul more than a few spoonfuls of milk. The government is building a

big milk processing plant in the heart of New Delhi's industrial suburb. A system of cattle colonies is being established within a 50-mile radius of the city. Sacred cows will continue to wander in Delhi's streets, but

small, unsanitary private farms will be banned from the city. Five countries are supplying money, experts, and equipment for the first milk plant of its kind in India. More than half of the funds for the four-million-dollar curb to outline curving walkways project came from New Zealand, through the Colombo Plan, Ten blocks. Eighty tons of topsoil was experts and machinery have come from Britain, West Germany, Sweden and Denmark.

The plant will turn out 100,000 gallons of milk a day. It will also produce ice cream, butter, and the first powdered milk made in In-
