Nehru Gives No Indication Of Action

Prime Minister Nehru said today that Chinese Communist troops have crossed from Tibet into Indian territory on two widely sep-arated frontiers and apparently are staying.

In India's northeast frontier area, Nehru told Parliament, several hundred Chinese apparently seized an Indian border post this week after driving off a 12-man picket detachment with gunfire. Nehru said four border guards

are missing. Nehru said the Chinese also had established a camp in a re-mote, uninhabited border sector of the Ladakh area of Kashmir, more than 1,000 miles west of the crossings on the northeast fron-tier. The Chinese also are reported building a road across the area, cutting off several hundred square miles of Indian territory. Nehru said the Chinese moved into the Ladakh region in October 1957. The Indian reconnaissance party was sent into the region at the end of last month, There was no indication in

On the mountainous northeast frontier, Nehru said, the Chinese crossed into India from Tibet of Aug. 25 and fired on a picket post in the Kameng section. He said the Reds returned on Aug. 26, opened fire again, and practically

encircled the border post. The Indian border patrol withdrew, Nehru continued, and the Chinese are presumed to be still

holding the position. India protested to Peiping, and the Chinese reply, received as Nehru sat in Parliament, claimed the Indians on Aug. 25 fired first and the Chinese shot back in selfdefense. Peiping said it knew nothing about the border crossing the

OWN REPORTS "I give credence to our own reports," Nehru said as the deputies cheered in approval. "All circumstantial evidence supports our

view. I believe it is true. Earlier in the session Nehru said the Chinese were forcibly holding Indian territory in the Ladakh sector of Kashmir, on the northwest border between India and Tibet. He said the Chinese had established a camp at Spanggur, well within Indian territory, and had arrested a reconnaissance party which had been sent to in-

vestigate. The Chinese released the recomnaissance group, consisting of one officer and five enlisted men, but Peiping asserted the territory was Chinese, the prime minister said. India he continued, sent a note to Peiping expressing surprise at this claim and outlining the exact frontier. So far no reply has been

Several newspapers in recent weeks have reported various crossings by Chinese troops into India along the mountainous border of Kashmir and also in the northeast frontier area, in the Indian state of Assam. There also have been reports of Chinese claims to these northern areas bordering on Tibet, as well as to Nepal and the protectorates of Bhutan and Sikkim, which lie between Kashmir and Assam

BORDER INCIDENTS The Times of India reported today that Red forces had pushed back several border patrols along the northeast frontier and said in at least one instance there was believed to have been an exchange of gunfire.

Earlier this week the Times reported the Chinese had built a road in the Ladakh area, cutting off several hundred square miles

of Indian territory. Representatives of all non-Com munist parties in Parliament submitted a question to Nehru, asking if part of Ladakh had been oc-

cupied by the Chinese.

Nehru referred to only one berder crossing, which he said took place between October 1957 and February 1958, at Khurnak Fort within Indian territory. It was there, he said, that the Indian reconnaissance party was arrested by a stronger Chinese detachment on July 28, 1959.

The Art Of Followship

Dr. John F. McNaughton, director of the Personnel Psychology Services Center at the University of Houston comes forward with the observation that corporate managers who have long hailed the benefits of "leadership" training now are teaching the merits of "fellowship"

"An executive may be a good leader," he explained, "but a lousy subordinate." Effective fellowship does not imply following blindly, he goes on, "It simply means understanding the boss' behavior. learning to take direction from above and, as a result, doing one's share of carrying out one's responsibilities within the

There is, it seems to us, a need to learn how to take orders before trying to give them. And leadership means just

that-to lead, not to drive. Some executives mistake drivership for leadership, and there is a world of difference between the two approaches.

The highest form of the art of leadership is not to seem to lead at all. He who can achieve that pinnacle of perfection has got it made Many an executive wears himself out

and reaches an untimely end by fretting over niggling details. He should learn to trust subordinates. It is better to fire untrustworthy subordinates than to worry oneself to tatters over minor details that someone else should be sweating out. Give a man a job he can do, see that he does it, encourage him to do it well, and that's the long and short of getting ahead in the ratrace of executive compe-

Part Of An Old Pattern

The Communist world conspirators have reduced coordination to a fine science. By this means they keep the free world off balance, disturbed and uncertain what

So, as Khrushchev approaches realization of his long dream of unilateral talks with Eisenhower - first in this country and next in the Soviet Union - the trouble in Laos begins to reach the crisis stage. In Laos Communist rebels are closing in from north and east - either Lactian native Reds supplied and trained by North Vietnam, which in turn is supplied by the Soviet Union - or by a mixture of Laotians and North Vietnamese and perhaps some Red Chinese.

We have heard some commentators speculate if this uprising in Laos isn't Mao Tse-tung's way of reminding Khrushchev that he forgot to invite Pelping into the new East-West parleys. In short, that Mao is jealous of all the attention Khrushchev is getting, and this is his way of reminding his Kremlin partner that he, Mao, must be taken into consideration.

This in our opinion is an entirely naive view — a kind of wishful thinking that ignores one of the biggest facts in the modern world; namely, the worldwide Communist coordination, in which everything is timed and cooly calculated for the greatest effect.

While K. talks peace in the West, Mao raises his hackles in the Far East. What was to keep Mao from saying to K .: "You divert the West with peace talk for awhile, and let me shove our program ahead in Southeast Asia. You grab the headlines in your part of the world, and while the West is concentrating attention on you, I'll be going quietly about carrying forward our joint program in South-

There is, of course, absolutely nothing new about this cosy little swap-out between the Kremlin and Peiping. It is all timed and primed. It has happened time after time, and the world has taken note of it time after time.

The trouble is the free world forgets quickly. Peace to the West is something tangible, something to be hoped for and worked for, something to dream about.

To the Communist world conspirators, talk of peace is a gimmick, a useful tool, something they have only an academic interest in; for communism thrives and flourishes on chaos, and chaos anywhere in the world of today has a universal effect. K. could call off the running dogs of communism in Laos tomorrow if he gave the word.

Some Pluses In The Khrushchev Visit WASHINGTON - President Eisenhow-- rather, they would die

er has put into perspective the purpose of his conferences with the heads of the allied governments in Europe and also his reasons for the exchange of visits with Soviet Premier Khrushchev The president has no illusions about the

difficulties that lie ahead, but he feels it his duty to try hard to accomplish something for world peace. He recognizes the right of everyone who disagrees to voice his protest. He insists that there can be no assurance of world peace until the "captive nations" have their freedom and the right to choose their own rulers.

Though well aware of the discouraging record of the past, Mr. Eisenhower is dedicated to the principle of trying by every means at his command to influence the Soviet government toward peace and

general disarmament, The president disclosed his ideas at the press conference he held just before getting ready to fly to Europe. It was a memorable occasion. For in the space of a new minutes Mr. Eisenhower epitomized American purposes and reiterated American ideals.

The nation's chief executive said explicitly that his purpose in visiting the heads of the British, French, Italian and West German governments was "to support Western unity in opposing, by force if necessary, any aggression, and to preserve the defensive strength required for our common security."

To those who might have any idea that the people of the United States are so ettached to their comforts and luxuries that they might yield to peace-at-anyprice sentiment, the president had a significant answer that might well be pondered in Moscow. He said:

"I think that the strength of America is in its people, and I believe that we can put it this way: I do not believe it's necessarily true for each of us that we could get up and, with Patrick Henry, say, 'As for me, give me liberty or give me death.' But I believe that basically this is what you might call our national spirit. I believe that the American nation will never surrender its liberties to

As a corollary to this expression of steadfastness, the president said he was going to Western Europe to meet with the British, French, Italian and West German leaders in order to have an opportunity "to reiterate jointly that regardless of pressure or inducement we shall never retreat from our ideals or principles or weaken in our resolution to remain secure as we continue our search for

Most important among the president's comments, however, was his emphasis on the spirit of peoples and their power to determine their own fate. He said in answer to a question asked him about the 'captive nations":

"American will never concede that there has been a sound, durable or working peace that could be called global until these nations have had the right to express their own convictions, their own opinions and desires about their own fates, and then, as far as the United States was concerned, it would never cease to use every peaceable means and I have always emphasized that word 'peaceable' - to give them such an opportunity.

The president stated the case even more comprehensively when he referred to the self-assertion by peoples of underdeveloped countries. He said:


"Two billion people are going to find some way of expressing their convictions that they do not have to live in conditions that are completely unsatisfactory by any minimum standard that we set up for humans, and unless the civilized world - not just ourselves, but the civilized world - is willing and ready to share in the burdens of making it possible for these people to achieve progress in this area, this world is going to have tough

Last but not least, the president showed that he has no objection to the expression of orderly protests at the time of the Khrushchev visit. He said:

"The mere fact that a number of people have opposed this idea publicly and through advertisements - that, to my mind is one of the lessons he (Khrushchev) can learn. We don't resent it. Everybody in this country is able to make his own convictions and his own opinions and he is certainly at liberty to express them. And I think it is one of the fine lessons that he (Khrushchev) can learn,

and it may have some effect." This is but another way of saying that maybe, after all, there will be some pluses to the Khrushchev visit - if the Soviet premier learns that Americans stand unflinchingly for the right of free expression and the right of self - determination of all peoples. Without the Khrushchev visit, there would never have been such a dramatic opportunity for the kind of debate on freedom and human liberty that the world is to witness in the next few weeks, (Copyright 1959, New York Herald Tribune Inc.)

Ike's Popularity Continues High

PRINCETON, N. J. - President Eisenhower's personal popularity with American voters continues at a high level In a nationwide Gallup Poll check on the President's popularity, 61 voters in every 100 said they approved of the way Mr. Eisenhower was handling the Chief Executive's reins.

The current popularity reading for Mr. Eisenhower is slightly above his secondterm average of 60 per cent approval. By way of comparison, the popularity rating for former President Truman at this point in his second term was 29 per Throughout his last term in office, Mr. Truman's popularity averaged at 36 per cent.

Although there has been much talk in Washington circles recently about the 'new" Ike, the resurgence in the President's popularity with voters actually started some months ago.

In the aftermath of the November, 1958, elections - when his party's Congressional forces went down to a crushing defeat - Gallup Poll reporters found 52 per cent of voters giving Eisenhower a vote of confidence, near his all-time low. During the first half of 1959, Mr. Eisenhower's popularity rose steadily. Since June, as the following trend shows, it has

Analysis of the vote of different groups in the population reveals these highlights about the President's popularity gains since first of 1959:

1. In view of the determined stand Mr. Eisenhower has taken on labor reform, it is interesting that some of his most dramatic gains since January have been made among the nation's manual work-

In January, 50 per cent of manual workers approved the President's handling of his job. Today, 58 per cent give him a vote of confidence.

2. Although the President enjoys majority approval in all regions of the country today, he has scored most heavily since the first of the year in the Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast states. In the Far West today he is up eight points from 55 per cent approval in January to 63 per cent at the present time. In the other regions of the country,

his approval vote today is as follows: East - 62 per cent, Midwest - 63 per cent, South - 54 per cent.

3. In terms of party, the President's biggest gains since January have come from among the nation's Independent voters. He is up eight points with this group - from 57 per cent in January to 65 per cent approving today.

4. Eisenhower has lost ground slightly since the first of the year among two groups in the population. Among whitecollar workers and farmers, the President's popularity rating at present is slightly below what it was in January,

PORT ARTHUR (AP)—"If you peace officers will be fair with the press, the press will be fair with you," Marshall Formby told the East Texas Pace Officers Assn. Formby is a former chairman of the Highway Commission. He is also a former police reporter on daily newspapers and has pub-

lished weekly newspapers.
"Most of the trouble or friction between the press and police is caused by misunderstanding, said Formby. He recommended that officers and reporters learn about each other's problems.

"Many times a peace officer fails to take into consideration problems such as deadlines and working hours of the press and radio. On the other hand, inexperienced reporters many times do not know the problems a sheriff and his deputies have to face." Formby, a Plainview lawyer, is candidate for governor next year.



SAN FRANCISCO (AP)-Carmen Basilio tries to prove again tonight that a little middleweight boxing champion of the world. The craggy faced onion farmer from Chittenango, N.Y., weighing about 153, tackles Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, a bull shouldered 160-pounder, in a 15-round battle to decide the National Box-

Basilio stepped up from the 147-pound class when he outpointed Sugar Ray Robinson for the middle weight title on Sept. 23, 1957. Carmen then weighed only 151 as an overstuffed welterweight.

On March 25, 1958, Robinson won back the championship over the 15-round route, but the NBA stripped him of his title last May 4 because he hadn't defended it. New York, Basilio's home state, still recognizes Robinson as champion, as does Massachusetts.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviets claim they are close to developing new and more power-"artificial comets" that could be seen if they reach the planet Mars, at least 50 million miles

The idea, a Soviet report translated here says, would be to provide a space-probing rocket with kind of taillight consisting of cloud of chemical gas having high reflective powers for sun-

Such a device, the Soviets claim, could automatically and visually signal the arrival of the rocket in the vicinity of Mars even if radio communication at such a great distance failed.

also allow new tests of the density fills interplanetary space, Soviet scientists say.

The Soviet report, translated and distributed by the U.S. Department of Commerce, declared the new possibilities stem from initial success with a form of 'artificial comet" arrangement used in the Soviet rocket Mechta launched last January.






