Ike Takes Time Out To Visit With Queen

BALMORAL, Scotland (AP) — President Eisenhower broke into his diplomatic mission to Western Europe today with a social visit to Britain's royal family at Balmoral Castle. Queen Elizabeth II made a completely unexpected appearance to the gates to welcome him.

The Queen — whose baby is expected in late January or February — certainly showed no physical signs of it. With Eisenhower, she inspected the royal bodyguard, Royal Highland Fusiliers. Then together with Prince Philip, they took the palace car from the gateway for the half-mile drive to the gloomy old castle built amid these melancholy moors by Queen Victoria.

The President then entered a royal car with the Queen, her husband and Margaret, and the party was driven into the castle. Eisenhower has known Elizabeth since she was a teen-age princess, and the visit is a private one, with the arrival ceremony the only public event.

Nehru Gives No Indication Of Action

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru said today that Chinese Communist troops have crossed from Tibet into Indian territory on two widely separated frontiers and apparently are staying.

In India's northeast frontier area, Nehru told Parliament, several hundred Chinese apparently seized an Indian border post this week after driving off a 12-man picket detachment with gunfire. Nehru said four border guards are missing.

Nehru said the Chinese also had established a camp in a remote, uninhabited border sector of the Ladakh area of Kashmir, more than 1,000 miles west of the crossings on the northeast frontier. The Chinese also are reported building a road across the area, cutting off several hundred square miles of Indian territory.

Nehru said the Chinese moved into the Ladakh region in October 1957. The Indian reconnaissance party was sent into the region at the end of last month.

There was no indication in Nehru's statement why he waited so long before acting.

NO SATISFACTION He said India had protested to Peiping but so far had no satisfaction.

"There is no alternative but to guard our borders and integrity," he declared. "We will have to be vigilant."

Nehru made no announcement, however, of military counteraction.

On the mountainous northeast frontier, Nehru said, the Chinese crossed into India from Tibet on Aug. 25 and fired on a picket post in the Kameng section. He said the Reds returned on Aug. 26, opened fire again, and practically encircled the border post.

The Indian border patrol withdrew, Nehru continued, and the Chinese are presumed to be still holding the position.

India protested to Peiping, and the Chinese reply, received as Nehru sat in Parliament, claimed the Indians on Aug. 25 fired first and the Chinese shot back in self-defense. Peiping said it knew nothing about the border crossing the next day.

OWN REPORTS "I give credence to our own reports," Nehru said as the deputies cheered in approval. "All circumstantial evidence supports our view. I believe it is true."

Earlier in the session Nehru said the Chinese were forcibly holding Indian territory in the Ladakh sector of Kashmir, on the northwest border between India and Tibet. He said the Chinese had established a camp at Spangur, well within Indian territory, and had arrested a reconnaissance party which had been sent to investigate.

The Chinese released the reconnaissance group, consisting of one officer and five enlisted men, but Peiping asserted the territory was Chinese, the prime minister said. India, he continued, sent a note to Peiping expressing surprise at this claim and outlining the exact frontier. So far no reply has been received.

Several newspapers in recent weeks have reported various crossings by Chinese troops into India along the mountainous border of Kashmir and also in the northeast frontier area, in the Indian state of Assam. There also have been reports of Chinese claims to these northern areas bordering on Tibet, as well as to Nepal and the protectorates of Bhutan and Sikkim, which lie between Kashmir and Assam.

BORDER INCIDENTS The Times of India reported today that Red forces had pushed back several border patrols along the northeast frontier and said in at least one instance there was believed to have been an exchange of gunfire.

Earlier this week the Times reported the Chinese had built a road in the Ladakh area, cutting off several hundred square miles of Indian territory.

Representatives of all non-Communist parties in Parliament submitted a question to Nehru, asking if part of Ladakh had been occupied by the Chinese.

Nehru referred to only one border crossing, which he said took place between October 1957 and February 1958, at Kharak Fort within Indian territory. It was there, he said, that the Indian reconnaissance party was arrested by a stronger Chinese detachment on July 28, 1959.

Nehru said the government notes occasional press reports of the Chinese making some kind of claims to Sikkim and Bhutan.

AT COUNTY AIRPORT

Contract To Jimmie Jones For Hangar-Office Building

Jimmie Jones, Big Spring, was the successful bidder for the hangar-administration building at the Howard County Airport.

He was awarded contract to build the structure for \$58,411. His was the lowest of nine bids considered Thursday afternoon by the Howard County Commissioners Court. He has 135 days in which to complete the job and will start construction as soon as bond is approved and a work order is issued.

The hangar with a lean-to for administrative operations, will be just south of the Coeden hangar at the airport. It will have 100 by 80 feet hangar area and the annex will be 32 by 30 feet. The building is to be prefabricated steel with galvanized panels on the walls and roof.

Hospital Counseling Clinic Need Outlined At Meeting

Need for a counseling clinic as a means of relieving a mounting load on members of the professional staff of the Big Spring State Hospital was a cited Thursday evening by Dr. Preston Harrison, superintendent.

Dr. Harrison addressed the quarterly meeting of the Big Spring State Hospital Volunteers Advisory Council at the Chamber of Commerce offices. Not only are members of the staff being overwhelmed with appeals for child and marital counseling, but most ministers are experiencing a similar demand upon their time and resources, he said.

For a time during the past session it appeared the hospital appropriations would be cut rather than held steady or raised, he said, due to a heavy state deficit and limited tax resources.

Tiny Hamlet Gets Nation's Next Nuclear Power Plant

PEACH BOTTOM, Pa. (AP) — This tiny farming hamlet in south-central Pennsylvania, filled with serenity, suddenly has been plunged into the hectic race for nuclear development.

One of the members of Peach Bottom's board of township supervisors appeared very unexcited about the reactor. William T. Montgomery said he couldn't see how the plant "can benefit our area terribly much. I guess there's no harm in having it here."

Another board member, Samuel E. Gemmill, said he was for anything that's good for the community. "But if it isn't for me, it's not for me."

The Atomic Energy Commission said in Washington that it contracted with the Philadelphia Electric Co. and the General Dynamics Corp. for development of the 24½-million-dollar plant.

The construction was viewed as a step forward by the burgess of Delta, a community three miles from Peach Bottom.

"I think the plant may do our community some good financially," said Burgess Kelley Ashbury. The new reactor will give Pennsylvania two nuclear power plants. The world's first atomic plant for peacetime uses is located in Shippingport in western Pennsylvania.

Heavy Rains In Central Texas

Heavy rains fell Thursday night in Central Texas and cloudy skies over most of the state threatened more moisture Friday.

Forecasts call for scattered thundershowers through Saturday in all sections of the state. The Weather Bureau's long-range forecasts said light to locally moderate rain can be expected in East and Central Texas through Tuesday.

Three-inch rains were measured Thursday night in Taylor and Bastrop, while Granger caught 2.50 inches. The Central Texas thundershowers moved in after steady rains sent creeks out of their banks in this Big Bend country earlier in the day.

The Texas Highway Department reported State Highway 118 closed by high water at Moss Creek, two miles south of Alpine, after an unofficial two inches of rain.

Rains of an inch or more were general in the ranch country in far West Texas.

Thursday's maximum temperatures ranged from 82 at Sherman to 99 at Cotulla.

Gang Victim Rites Hear Peace Call

NEW YORK (AP)—The 15-year-old Negro girl lay in her white casket in historic Trinity church, whose stately spire rises between the skyscrapers of Wall Street.

A hushed throng heard the minister say: "Let there be no more sudden death on the streets of the Lower East Side. Let there be peace on the streets."

The Rev. Dr. C. Kilmer Myers spoke softly Thursday night to 500 mourners who came from the mid-tenements to the city's oldest church.

He pointed to the coffin holding the body of Theresa Gee, slain by a rifle bullet through the head in a teen-age gang fight—last Sunday.

"Because she died in a burst of violence on a street of this city, she has become more than Theresa Gee, which was all she ever wanted," he said.

"She has become a symbol of the utter failure of our urban society to make it possible for young people to grow to adulthood without the nagging presence of tragic experiences."

"She is a symbol of our failure to provide wholesome and reliable goals. She is the victim of the strange rift between youth and adults in our day."

"We are the guilty ones, the police, the social workers, the clergy and the citizenry, all of us caught up, as was Theresa, in the tragic and demonic forces of the history of our age."

Dr. Myers, head of an East Side chapel of Trinity Protestant-Episcopal parish, aided in arranging a truce two years ago between teenage gangs of the area—one predominantly Jewish and Italian and now inhabited by many Negroes and Puerto Ricans.

Theresa was not the only victim of Sunday's gang war. Julio Rosario, 14, died on Tuesday of stab wounds. Six other youths were stabbed or shot, none fatally.

In a swift reaction to the violence, a grand jury Thursday returned two first-degree murder indictments. One was against John Cruz, 18-year-old Puerto Rican, for the shooting of Theresa. The other against Miguel (Gypsy) Castro, 17, in Rosario's slaying.

Police said Cruz, leader of the Forsyth gang, admitted shooting Theresa but said it was accidental.

Police said the Forsyth gang was a predominantly Puerto Rican group while the rival gang, the Sportsmen, was composed chiefly of Negro youths.

The Sunday battles stemmed from a fist fight a week ago Thursday between Cruz and Castro, a member of the Sportsmen.

Castro lost the fight but returned Sunday with a dozen followers.

The mourners at Trinity church received leaflets asking them to march in a procession tonight as a demonstration for "an end to fear and hatred."

Oil Fete Continues

TITUSVILLE, Pa. (AP)—The age of oil is one century and one day old today.

The Oil Centennial celebration continues at Titusville, hometown of oil, after the actual 100th birthday party Thursday. Celebrations today called for carnivals and dancing in this small northwestern Pennsylvania community.

Tomorrow the centennial week ends with parades, a ball, fireworks and other parties.

Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, said in one of the key speeches of the Centennial the United States is not running out of oil.

The United States can produce three million barrels more of oil per day, he said, "than we are now producing from the wells presently drilled at their most efficient rate."

"It is a remarkable achievement that in this 100th year of oil, and after the production of 62 billion barrels of oil, we find ourselves with a reserve of 37 billion barrels of oil and a gas reserve of 260 trillion cubic feet, both the largest in the history of 100 years of oil."

Edwin L. Drake of New Haven, Conn., dug the world's first commercial oil well near Titusville, Aug. 27, 1859. Many wells are still producing in the area.

Housing Bill Ultimatum Laid Before President

WASHINGTON (AP)—A defiant Congress, turning a deaf ear to Republican veto warnings, today handed President Eisenhower a "last chance" billion-dollar housing bill.

Party lines fell apart Thursday as the House, by a topheavy 283-105 vote, completed congressional action on a \$1,650,000,000 bill that contained the same features that prompted a housing veto last month.

At stake was the President's perfect record of never having a veto overridden. This time the House virtually dared him to challenge its action.

The overwhelming vote far exceeded the two-thirds necessary to override. The Senate vote, on Aug. 19, likewise was by a overriding majority of 72-14.

With adjournment fever mounting, and House leaders looking forward to quitting by next week-end, the President was confronted with a take-it-or-leave-it proposition.

"If President Eisenhower wants a housing bill, this is his last chance," proclaimed Rep. Albert Rains (D-Ala.), sponsor of the bill and Democratic housing spokesman.

When the President vetoed the first \$1,375,000,000 housing bill as excessive, he hit at new public housing authority, loans to extend the government into college classroom construction, and other features.

And in a message last Tuesday, Eisenhower told Congress to limit itself to extending the authority of the Federal Housing Administration to insure home mortgages. This insurance authority, which does not involve additional funds, is already about five billion dollars in excess of congressional limitations.

But the House Thursday, with machine-gun monotony, knocked down successive Republican-backed efforts to revise the bill and kill features already denounced as objectionable by the President.

On final passage, 54 Republicans and 229 Democrats voted for the bill. Only 76 Republicans and 29 Democrats voted against it.

Republicans deserted their party leadership in droves. The coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats, so effective in past floor maneuverings, was never in evidence.

Crime Spree Ends In Death Of Youth

AUSTIN (AP)—Two teen-age escapees from a Wisconsin correctional camp stole cars in several states and abducted an Austin planning commission member before they were stopped Thursday.

One tried to shoot it out with police. He died when his gun failed to fire.

The other, Larry Lee Radant, 19, of Wisconsin, was jailed.

Police Chief R. B. Laws identified the dead youth as David Krushek, also 19.

Planning commissioner Marvis Braswell escaped from the two about 1 p.m. 13 hours after he was abducted.

In a signed statement, Radant and Krushek said they escaped from the McVaughton Correctional Camp at Lake Tomahawk, Wis., Aug. 20.

Newsman-Officer Relations Told By Marshall Formby

PORT ARTHUR (AP)—"If you peace officers will be fair with the press, the press will be fair with you," Marshall Formby told the East Texas Peace Officers Assn. Formby is a former chairman of the Highway Commission. He is also a former police reporter on daily newspapers and has published weekly newspapers.

"Most of the trouble or friction between the press and police is caused by misunderstanding," said Formby. He recommended that officers and reporters learn about each other's problems.

"Many times a peace officer fails to take into consideration problems such as deadlines and working hours of the press and radio. On the other hand, inexperienced reporters many times do not know the problems a sheriff and his deputies have to face."

Formby, a Plainview lawyer, is candidate for governor next year.

See? College Life Can Be 'Tiring'

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Tests by Dr. Marian Williams indicate high school girls have stronger muscles than college girls.

Dr. Williams, a Stanford Medical School physical therapist, tested 25 high school seniors and 25 college girls, using an apparatus which measures arm and leg pull in pounds.

Dr. Williams calculated the college group was 3.6 per cent weaker than the high school group. She offered no explanation.

"Radant says he and Krushek traveled from state to state, stealing cars, even kidnaping a man in Colorado who later got away after saying he was a policeman," Laws said.

The youths held up Braswell Wednesday at an El Paso motel as the real estate man entered his room. They took \$25, and headed for Austin.

Arriving at Austin, Braswell cashed a check for \$100 and the teen-agers bought clothes.

Braswell drove to a motel, went inside and signed for the trio. Then he said goodbye and walked out.

"I've fulfilled my part of the bargain," Braswell said. "I'm going home."

He said about two hours later, after talking with his brother, they notified police who went to the motel about 1 p.m.

Detective Capt. K. R. Herbert and Sgt. Charles L. Jones walked into the dimly lit room. Radant gave up. Herbert walked toward Krushek, who held a .22 revolver.

"Don't come any closer or I'll kill you," Krushek said.

Herbert kept walking. Krushek pulled the trigger. The revolver clicked. Then Jones fired. The bullet hit Krushek above the heart.

Laws said the gun failed to fire because the firing pin did not hit the cartridge's center.

Confederate Navy Yard Shop To Go

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP)—The Confederate Navy Yard naval ordnance shop in Charlotte—200 miles

from the coast—is being demolished to make room for an automobile parking lot.

The building's exact age is not known, but a woman whose father worked in it said the ordnance shop was moved here in 1962 from

Portsmouth, Va., when Yankee forces threatened it there. Later the shop was moved to Lincoln, 33 miles northwest of Charlotte, when Union troops entered North Carolina.

Negro Charged In Hammer Death

GALVESTON (AP)—A 20-year-old Negro, A. D. Randle, was charged with murder early today in the hammer slaying of Julius

D. Papi, 68, Thursday night. Papi died after he was struck during the robbery of his grocery store.

Police Chief O. E. Henson said Randle was under a second murder charge, filed by Randle's brother-in-law in the death of Ran-

die's 17-year-old wife, Dorothy May, earlier this year.

Mrs. Randle's death was listed as due to natural causes following an autopsy. Randle was bound over to the grand jury and released on \$100 bond after his brother-in-law filed the charge.

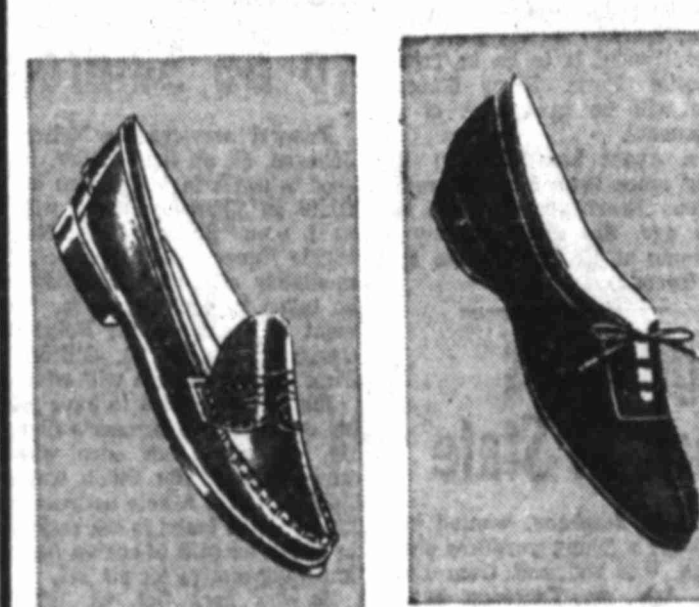

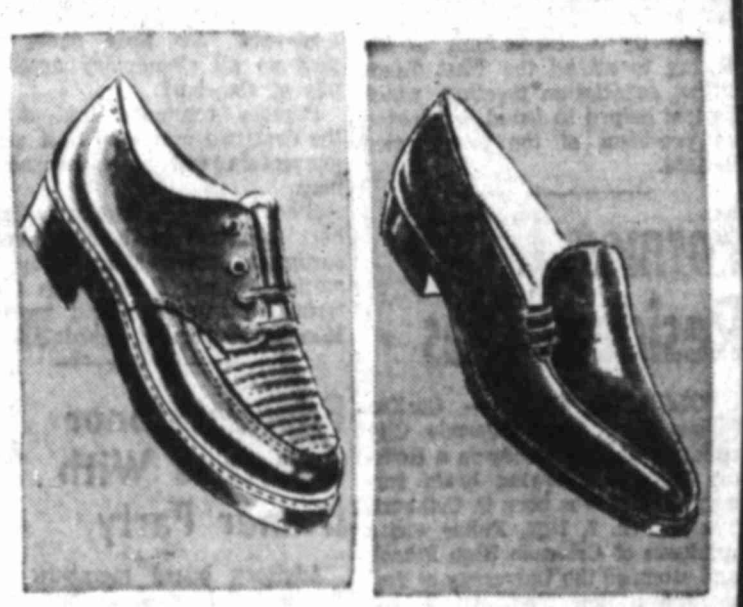

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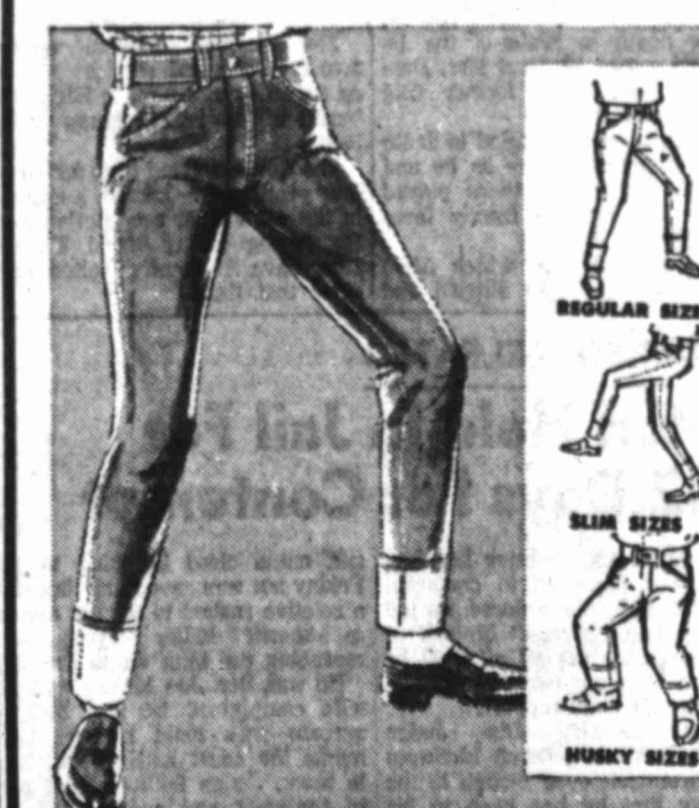

El Paso Bridge Knocks Down International Wall

EL PASO (AP) — Citizens of two nations have destroyed a wall which a United States Senate leader says "must be knocked down if mankind is to survive."

Sen. Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson presided Thursday at the formal opening of a bridge between El Paso and Juarez, Mexico — the two largest cities on the Mexican - U. S. Border. It is toll-free—the first new bridge in the area in 70 years.

A threatening rainstorm prevented Johnson from delivering his speech, but he told newsmen "you can consider that I have said in public everything I said in the prepared text."

The concrete structure was completed in 1950. Johnson said efforts of civic and governmental leaders on both sides of the border in getting the bridge opened to public traffic is an example of "understanding and unity." He said "there are many more gateways that must be built and dedicated. In a world which is so fiercely divided, we must build centers of strength in which free men can preserve the institutions of individual liberty."

Officials of the United States and Mexican cities, states and federal governments participated. Generals, mayors, governors, ambassadors, Consuls, politicians and newspaper editors from both sides were among an estimated 15,000 persons at the ceremony.

Death Of House Painter Probed

AUSTIN (AP) — Police probed today the death of house painter Leonard L. Burt, 58, found dead Sunday after a passenger train demolished his car north of Austin.

Travis County physician Harold M. Williams said Burt was killed by a tremendous blow on the head before the train hit his car.

He said he didn't see how it could be anything but murder. Sheriff T. O. Lang said there are no suspects.

The medical examiner said he had proof positive Burt was dead before the Missouri - Pacific train made junk of his car and hurled his body some 20 feet off the right of way.

"All the other tearing and breaking showed no bleeding in the tissues which is proof positive the person was already dead," Williams said.

The dead man's skull had been shattered by a blow with an iron bar which cut a six-inch gash in the back of his head, the examiner said.

Members of the train crew said the body was cold when they reached it.

New Oil Stamp Is Placed On Sale

One hundred years ago Thursday, the world's first oil well was completed.

To observe this important event, the U. S. Post Office has issued a special 4-cent commemorative stamp. The stamps were first placed on sale Thursday in Titusville, Pa., where Oil Well No. 1 was drilled.

Here in Big Spring, E. C. Boatler, postmaster, ordered 25,000 of the stamps. Today he has only 15,000 on hand.

Raymond L. Tollett, president of Cosden Petroleum Corp., bought 10,000 of the local office's stock of the stamps and had his order on hand before the office was allowed to begin selling them.

The remaining 15,000 stamps are now on sale at the Big Spring post office and other offices throughout the land. The one day restricted sale at Titusville expired Thursday afternoon.

Mr. Tollett proposes to use the stamps on company mail in order to further emphasize the importance of petroleum in the American industrial picture.

Boatler delivered the Cosden or-



der in person. It comprised two sizeable "books"—each containing 5,000 stamps.

The stamps are brown in color. Across the top is "U. S. Postage." The dates "1859-1959" are printed in the upper quarter of the stamp. The legend reads "Petroleum Industry." The denomination is 4 cents. In the center is the outline sketch of an oil derrick.

Confirmed Quake Toll Stands At 16

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The confirmed death toll stood at 16 today in Mexico's worst earthquake of the year, but many areas in the quake area in southern Mexico still had not been heard from.

All the dead so far were reported from Veracruz state, in an area of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec bordering and just south of the Gulf of Mexico.

Officials said there were at least 80 injured in the state.

Another light shock was felt Thursday at the port of Coahuaco, hard hit by Wednesday's severe quake. A few damaged houses collapsed.

Government rescue teams flew to many stricken areas in which deep cracks made many roads impassable. Many communications lines still were out.

Wool Growers To Vote On Promotional Funds

Wool growers will have the month of September in which to vote in the referendum on promotional funds.

Ballots are being sent out from the Howard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office to all known wool growers. Any others who may qualify but who have not received ballots are urged to secure them from the County ASC office at 403 Lancaster, said Gabe Hammack, office manager.

Those eligible are those who have had sheep (over six months of age) for 30 days or more since Jan. 1, 1959. Ballots will carry weight in proportion to the num-

ber of head of sheep the producer has.

The issue is whether to set aside, out of incentive payments, sums for advertising and promotion of wool. Some contend that the idea of the incentive payment is at stake.

The incentive payment has been the difference between the price (over-all average) which wool actually brought and 62 cents a pound. The base level next year has not been set but speculation places it at 60 cents.

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—Robert T. MacAllister of Cincinnati received more than a diploma today on completion of a four-week course in high level management at Northwestern University.

His employers, the Formica Corp., sent him a graduation present in the form of a promotion to vice president for sales and advertising. MacAllister, who had been manager of decorative products, was one of 39 businessmen from 15 states who attended Northwestern's Institute for Management.

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM CAPTAIN JOHN YORK

Gallant Pioneer and Defender of His People

Among the many "tall Texans" who lived too courageously ever to be forgotten, and too quietly to make the headlines of history, the name of Captain John York stands out. In 1829 John York came to Texas with his family, settling near San Felipe de Austin, at the future site of Industry, in what is now Austin County.

First, there was Indian fighting to be done. Then, there was Texas' independence to be won. John York led a company of his neighbors, volunteers, to San Antonio where he joined Ben Milam in the historic siege of Bexar. Home again, he was given a half-interest in a league of land in the new Republic of Texas which he had helped to create. Later he was to do more for the new State of Texas. In 1848, for a sale price of just \$1 cash, his land became the site of Yorktown, in the newly formed county of DeWitt.

But Captain John had only a few weeks

in which to watch the settlers and their families coming in to build his town, and his dream of the new Texas. Marauding Indians soon threatened the little Yorktown, and the Captain's leadership was needed again. He didn't return from the first retaliatory expedition. Captain York was killed on October 11, 1848—a champion of freedom to the last.

Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live. In this vigorous and freedom-minded homeland, "Beer Belongs" movement serves the best interest of Texans, the Foundation stresses close co-operation with the Armed Forces, law enforcement and governing officials in its continuing Self-Regulation program.

A New Spirit for a Renewed People

THE PROPHET, JOEL, PROPHECIES DISASTER FOR ISRAEL, BUT A FINAL BLESSING OF GOD FOR JUDAH

Scripture—Joel

By NEWMAN CAMPBELL

THE BOOK of Joel begins with the prophet's warning of disasters to come, but promises future blessings if the children of Israel will return to the Lord and worship only Him.

A plague of locusts is the first of these woes to descend upon the nation's crops, devouring every bit of the precious grain on which the people depended for food.

"The field is wasted, the land mourneth; for the corn is wasted: the new wine is dried up, the oil languisheth."—Joel 1:10.

Joel called for a time of fasting and humility. "Sanctify ye a fast, call a solemn assembly, gather the elders and all the inhabitants of the land into the house of the Lord your God, and cry unto the Lord."—Joel 1:13-14.

The beasts of the field also suffered from this terrible drought. They "cry also unto Thee: for the rivers of waters are dried up, and the fire hath devoured the pas-

ture of the wilderness."—Joel 1:20.

"Therefore also now, saith the Lord, turn ye even unto Me with all your heart, and with fasting, and with weeping, and with mourning: And rend your heart, and not your garments, and turn unto the Lord your God: for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repenteth Him of the evil."—Joel 2:12-13.

"Let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep between the porch (of the temples) and the altar, and let them say, Spare the people, O Lord, and give not Thine heritage to reproach, that the heathen should rule over them: wherefore should they say among the people, Where is their God?"

"Then will the Lord be jealous for His land, and pity His people. Yes, the Lord will answer and say unto His people, Behold, I will send you corn, and wine, and oil, and ye shall be satisfied there with: and I will no more make

you a reproach among the heathen."—Joel 2:17-19.

"The former and latter rain were the rains which marked respectively the beginning and the close of the wet season, coming in October, November, March and

April, respectively. The "former rain" moistens the earth and fits it to receive the seeds which are sown shortly afterwards; the "latter rain" is important for giving fullness and strength to the ripening crops; if either fails, the ensuing harvest is seriously damaged.

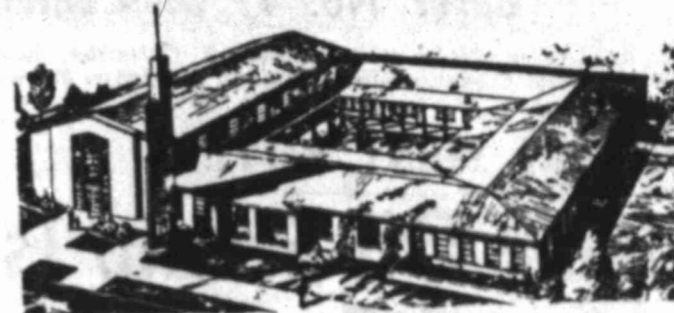

in Big Spring. He succeeds the Rev. Clyde Nichols, who went recently to Borger.

Sam Goldwyn Celebrates His 77th Birthday

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Seven is a lucky number. Now I've got two sevens so I must be doubly lucky."

With obvious delight, Samuel Goldwyn made this quip on the occasion of his 77th birthday Wednesday. He spent it as he has most of his life — working.

"I've been working since I was 11 years old," he said. "And I'm going to keep right on working. That's how I live."

The shiny-borne, high Polish-accented voice and the Goldwyn legend have been part of the movie world for almost a half century. The past year has seen the loss of most of the remaining pioneers of the film — Cecil B. DeMille, Jesse Lasky, Louis B. Mayer and Harry Cohn.

Goldwyn talked only briefly of their passing.

"I miss Cecil; he was a wonderful man. Jesse too. We started together in the movie business 48 years ago.

"But I never look back. The only certain thing is change. The world is going through a great many changes and you have to adjust yourself to them."

He added that many good producers have risen in the second generation of film makers. But he is disturbed by two elements of the Hollywood scene:

1. Production abroad. "It saddens me to see producers running away from Hollywood to make films elsewhere. You talk about the Moscow exhibit showing the American way of life. Our movies have done that for 50 years. Hollywood has been our greatest ambassador.

2. Sex in films. "I always made pictures for the whole family. I never had a picture turned down because I'm my own censor. I don't have to undress my actresses to sell pictures. You can be just as successful making clean films as some of the racy pictures that are being made today."

Goldwyn plans to spend the next year opening "Porgy and Bess" in Japan, India and the capitals of Europe. He will also tour the Middle East "to explore the possibilities of my next production."

There seemed no doubt in his mind that he would be out selling the new film as he neared his 80th birthday.
