Deformities can be prevented and crippling lessened in many cases, by prompt, complete and sometimes prolonged medical

Even though these encouraging facts have been established, still with polio as with any other diseease prevention is better than cure Summer is the chief danger period and to avoid the risk of contractig this disease, it is well to observe the followig health suggestions especially with regard to children practice absolute cleanliness in personal, home and community life try not to mingle with irowd; don't get over-tired since extreme fatigue lowers resistance; avoid chill ing by swimming overlong in cold water; consult your doctor at once if a member of your family has fever, headache, nausea, a cold, upset stomach, muscle soreness or





TRIM YOUR TREES-

Some kinds of pruning may be done at any time", Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. M. College, said recently. "Remove dead limbs, diseased limbs and limbs that injure each other regardless of sea-

Some plants need pruning all during the growing season. Among these shrubs are abelia and Florida jasmine which have a tendency to send out long awkward shoots. If are cut off the plant will grow into a compact form which generally is liked better than a shrub with a few long sprouts. Hardy shrubs which grow fast such as amur river privet or Japanese ligustrum, may be pruned safely during the growing season.

Miss Hatfield says, prune shrubs which bloom in the spring or early summer just as soon as the blooming season is over for it is then they begin forming bloom buds for the next year. Among these are such plants as bridal wreath and flowering peach. If you wait until late summer or winter, pruning lessens the amount of blooms as it destroys bloom buds.

Among flowering shrubs to be pruned as soon as they have bloomed and before they form bloom buds for the next year's flowers

Azaleas, butterfly bush (buddleia), redbud, flowering quince, flowering dogwood, catoneaster, poinsettia, philadelphus (English dogwood, mock orange) photinia, flowering plums, spireas, viburnums (haws and snowballs), primrose, jasmine, winter blooming jasmine, and wisteria.


