DIMMITT SCHOOLS TO OPEN TERM MONDAY

NEW BUSINESS BUILDING DAMAGED BY FIRE WEDNESDAY

A fire, of undetermined origin, gutted the attic of the locker room of the Dimmitt Food Bank building Wednesday at about 12 o'clock, resulting in an estimated \$3,500.00 damage, which was only partially covered by builders insurance. The building, which has been under construction for the past several months, had just recently been completed and was ready for installation of equipment. Work of installing insulating material in the attic, where the fire originated, was completed Tuesday. The fire was discovered by Mr. Glenn Youta who immediately turned in the alarm, and quick response by the fire department prevented the flames from spreading to other parts of the building. Although cause of the fire was not established it is certain that it was not due to defective wiring as the current had not been turned on in the part of the building where the fire originated.

When necessary repairs are made to the building and equipment is received, the building will house a modern Locker and wholesale meat packing plant.

DROUGHT ROUTED BY GOOD RAINS

One of the worst droughts in recent years was broken this week when general rains fell over a large area of the panhandle and South Plains. Many sections that had not had a trace of moisture in many months received good rains. Castro County received its share of moisture with precipitations amounting from one to four inches falling over the county. Intermittent showers beginning Sunday morning and continuing through Wednesday night have practically assured a planting season for wheat, and should insure good early grazing for cattle. Row crops will also be greatly benefitted by the recent rains.

DIMMITT TO HAVE VETERANS FLIGHT TRAINING SCHOOL

Preliminary work is under way to secure a Veterans Flight Training School for Dimmitt and Castro County. Announcement of the movement was made Tuesday by Mr. J. B. Alley when he was a guest of the Dimmitt Lions Club. Mr. Alley, who recently graduated from the Spartan School of Aeronautics at Tulsa, Okla., declared that necessary steps are being taken to get Bobcat Field designated and qualified as a government approved C. A. A. Field meeting requirements for a veterans approved Flight School.

All veterans are eligible for the free flight-training being offered under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Mr. Alley, who graduated with Instrument rating and Instructor rating, also said that the training would be available to others at a moderate charge. He also declared that all ex-service men who are interested in flight training are requested to see him at the Dimmitt Laundry.

Ground School classes will be conducted in connection with the actual flight training.

GOOD INTEREST SHOWN IN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING THURSDAY NIGHT

A large crowd was present Thursday night at the high school auditorium for the Chamber of Commerce meeting, and an exceptionally interesting program was rendered by a number of farmers from over the county.

Interesting talks were made by Messrs. Leo Witkowski, Willis Hawkins, Morgan Dennis, E. L. Adams, and County Agent Raymond King. Each of the speakers pointed out the need of a County Chamber of Commerce and the benefits to be derived from cooperative effort in promoting the agricultural and stock farming interests of the county. In discussing the different types of farming possibilities being brought about by the expanding irrigation program, each speaker pointed out the necessity for a more diversified and intensive farming program, which in turn would result in increased value of rural and city property. The belief that only a cooperative effort could bring about maximum agricultural development and proper and adequate marketing facilities for the various crops which produce well in this community, was expressed by the speakers.

A number of farmers applied for membership in the organization following the program.

According to an announcement by Chas. Hays, president, a meeting of the Board of Directors will be held next week to make final plans to set the Chamber of Commerce in operation.
