President Sees Program Action

WASHINGTON (AP)-President Eisenhower said today nobody is going to be satisfied until the television quiz rigging scandals are cleaned up.

Eisenhower told his news conference the attorney general will be ready before Jan, 1 with recommendations for changes in the law to prevent what he called the astonishing deceptions carried out

The Federal Trade Commission also is looking into the possibility of deceptive advertising, the President said. He added that there may be some things that will need correcting in that field,

In response to questions, Eisen-hower said he does not believe the TV rigging indicates Americans have forgotten thier moral

standards. The President said, on the other

hand, that the reaction to TV quiz disclosures indicates that most Americans are not so much angry as bewildered. The reaction, the President

said, has been like that of the story relating to Shoeless Joe Jackson, the famed baseball player in the World Series Black Sox he believes those efforts have Scandal of 1919. A youthful fan said to Jackson: "Say it ain't so."

Democrats Thrash Republicans In Scattered U. S. Elections

Democrats generally consolidated gains on state and local levels in Tuesday's scattered off-year elections. In the main contests they easily retained the Kentucky governorship and the Philadelphia mayor's office.

Democratic politicians, looking for a 1960 presidential year trend, could point to a strong showing in Indiana and Connecticut municipal elections. Indiana Democrats retained control of every major city and ousted Republicans in Fort Wayne and Lafayette. But the Republicans gained in upstate New York, where they ousted nine Democratic mayors while losing four municipalities. And in New Jersey Republicans not only staved off a Democratic bid to win control of the state Senate, but apparently cut the Democratic majority in the As-

The ultra-conservative Lee no longer counts himself a Republican. He ran as an independent against a Democrat in what was supposed

In Philadelphia ever-hopeful Republican Harold E. Stassen went down to a predicted defeat by incumbent Mayor Richardson Dilworth, a Democrat. The margin was overwhelming.







The mobs finally were routed by Panamanian National Guardsmen, Canal Zone police and fireman and U.S. Army troops armed with rifles, bayonets and machineguns. The Canal Zone police arrested six demonstrators.

Right To Education

By proclamation of President Eisenhower the week of November 8 - 14 has been dedicated to public education throughout the country. Thousands of public schools will have their own programs of observance of American Education Week, and if the hopes of the sponsors are realized, some 26 million schoolage boys and girls and their parents will take part.

The list of sponsors is impressive the National Education Association, with a membership of nearly 700,000 teachers: the American Legion, the United States Office of Education, and the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

"Let us display to the world and ourselves," the President's proclamation says, "our pride in this primary instrument of democracy - public educationcomplemented by private education, which is supported by the willing sacrifice of each citizen and which benefits all. This we can do by giving our loyal and intelligent support to our schools and to the teachers who have dedicated their lives to the advancement of their students, the children of America.'

In the belief of Mr. Eisenhower, himself a product of the public schools of Abilene. Kansas, "the lessons of today emphasize the fact that individual freedom, responsible democracy and a rising level of living demand the full strength of a highly trained and dedicated citizen-

The theme of American Education Week is "Praise and Appraise Your Schools." It is hoped that the average citizen, not just parents alone, will become more aware of just what the schools he is paying for are achieving, and what they have to work with. If you are a tax-paying citizen, the public schools belong to you as much as to anyone, and what's wrong with paying a visit at least once a year to see how your property is being used and taken care of?

The origin of American Education Week had a shocking foundation. After World War I it became known that a pride-jolting percentage of the American people were physically or mentally unfit for service in defense of their country. It was then the NEA and the newlyformed American Legion decided to do something about it, and the first observance of American Education Week was in 1921. Biggest War Is Unreported

The biggest, most deadly war in the world today goes unreported and unsung. It is the savage, unrelenting war of landlords vs. tenants. Its massive assaults, skirmishes, punitive expeditions and rearguard actions are continuous and unrelenting. And as a war of nerves it makes the cold war resemble a fist fight between four-year-olds.

Only occasionally, in this or that part of the nation, does word of the guerrilla tactics creep into the news when some slum landlord is hailed into court for breaching not only the laws of the land but those of humanity and decency.

But no correspondents cover the continuous struggle of non-slum tenants vs. landlords. In many parts of the United States, landlords cry out piteously against rent-control laws as discriminatory and unjust, while tenants cling to them as their only defense against the rapacity

ONCE WERE POLITE

As a New York apartment dweller for 32 years, it has been my lot to see the before and after relationships between landlord and tenant. Before World War II, I nostalgically recall the landlords and their agents were polite, courteous and even friendly.

I know this sounds incredible and many younger tenants will think I am making it up. But it is the truth. Pleasant relationships existed between tenant and landlord. Even when the latter said "no" to some request, he managed to say it with

Well, sir, the best the tenant can expect today is a snarl, even when he signs for a 15 per cent raise, because the landlord is convinced that only the law prevents him from doubling the tariff. And as for service . . . waddaya mean serv-

The ideal landlord's agent today is a man who could, without rehearsal, step into Mike Hammer's shoes. His motto:

Strike the first blow, treat 'em tough and take no lip, particularly if the tenant is in the right. And don't do nobody no favors, even if deserved, or the tenant may get out of line!

And, above all, don't never do nothing to make the tenant comfortable, happy or secure. Always keep him off balance. That'll keep the little so-and-so in his place! Once, in the sweet, old days, landlords tried to give satisfaction. Now, the shoe, as in the case also of domestic help, is on the other foot. It is the tenant who is expected to give satisfaction and pull the forelock whenever Mike appears.

THOSE WILD PAINTERS These long, long thoughts have been borne in upon me recently as Chez Robb has gone through the awful ordeal that makes strong men weep and girls leave home. We have - in the New York phrase - been "redecorating." This does not mean new furniture, carpets, etc., etc. It merely means that the landlord, as provided by law, must paint the walls and ceiling once every three years.

As I saw paint tossed at the walls the "painters" under contract to the landlord. I thought wistfully of those talented gorillas in the London and the Baltimore zoos who became world-famous painters overnight. Next time I'm going to ask the loan of the gorillas. They couldn't possibly dispense as much extraneous paint as the lads after whom we are now cleaning up.
