

THE SUN BREAKS THROUGH the dark heav clouds over Dimmitt Monday morning, ending a night of treacherous weather. As the clouds broke, neighboring Hereford started digging out from a tornado that struck the Deaf Smith County city during the night, causing \$21/2 million in damage and injuring 20 persons. The tornado passed 10 miles west of Dimmitt shortly after midnight Sunday, accompanied by a turbulent storm system that dropped .25 of an inch of rain on the city.


## **Burnett earns** master's degree






