## Ike Heads For Home After Historic Tour

- President Eisenhower headed for home tonight, winding up the crusade for friendship and peace in freedom which he carried to 11

A thunderous acclaim by about 500,000 jubilant Moroccans and a whirlwind visit to Madrid where generous send off capped the President's history making tour, the most extended foreign trip ever undertaken by an American

The 19 day journey, on which the President was cheered by per- ing haps nine million welcomers, en-compassed visits to Italy, Turkey, ful robes characteristic of the Pakistan, Afghanistan, India, Iran, Greece, Tunisia, Spain and Morocco, as well as a Western summit meeting in Paris,

The conclusion of the President's far-ranging venture in personal diplomacy still found him grinning and radiating confidence that he had managed to spread to millions a feeling of trust in the sincerity of American motives and policies. Only time will disclose the long-term effects. But there were many signs of at least a temporary boost to American prestige as a result of the tour. DUE AT 11

The President's orange - nosed jetliner headed westward and was due at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington at 11 p.m. EST, his point of departure Dec. 3. A refueling stop was planned

at Gander, Nfld. The President was received with wild enthusiasm and one of the most colorful welcomes of his three-continent tour when he arrived in this white-walled North

The United States has agreed to surrender the five American bases it built in Morocco at a cost of more than 400 million dollars while Morocco was a protectorate of France and Spain. They are staffed by 12,000 Americans, employ 8,000 Moroccan civilians and pour about 64 million dollars annually into the Moroccan econ-

While this will satisfy a Moroccan yearning for political and military independence, the departure of the U.S. forces will worsen an economic situation that has become grave in the first three un-

## **Court Upholds** 2 State, Birth **Control Laws**

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)-The State Supreme Court of Errors to-day upheld the constitutionality of two state laws dealing with birth

The laws prohibit the use of contraceptive devices, and forbid physicians from advising their use under any circumstances. The court, in a unanimous de

cision, said the laws "are a con-stitutional exercise of legislative It said "the judiciary has a duty to test legislative action by con-stitutional principles, but it can-

not, in that process, usurp the power of the Legislature." Connecticut's highest court was ruling on four suits brought against the laws, which often have been involved in court tests since they were passed in 1879.

Backers of the suits had indi-cated in advance of the ruling that they would appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court Principals in the suits were Dr. C. Lee Buxton, a physician and chairman of Yale Medical School's obstetrics department; three of

his women patients; and two hus-Buxton claimed that the ban on giving birth control advice pre-vented him from prescribing contraceptives for three patients for whom pregnancy could mean a loss of life or abnormal children. The patients also filed suits, using fictitious names to maintain their anonymity.

Consumer prices advanced less than one-tenth of one per cent to a level 25.6 per cent above the 1947-49 average. A month earlier, prices were 25.5 per cent above the base period.

It was the sixth time in seven months that prices, as measured by the Labor Department's consumer price index, advanced to a new peak.

The November rise was less marked than in September and October, and Ewan Clague, commissioner of hor statistics, said he looks for relative price stability until next spring.

## Housewife Is Target For Work' Ads

WASHINGTON. (AP)-A housewife who would like to earn a few dollars at home is a favorite target of deceptive employment advertising, a spokesman for the Association of Better Business Bueaus said today.

Edwin M. Lockard, who is also general manager of the Baltinore Better Business Bureau, spoke today from a statement pre-pared for a Federal Trade Com-mission Conference of Deceptive Advertising.

He cited promotional matter put out by a Baltimore firm speaking of "numerous affiliations" with businesses needing envelopes ad-dressed and chances to earn "\$35 or more per week for a few hours a night." Women were asked for two dollars "to cover cost of mailing, listing and registration."

Bureau investigation, Lockard said, disclosed that the advertiser was a newly formed company which could not prove it had work to offer. After a postal investiga-tion, the firm went out of business and the Post Office returned to senders the letters with the fee, Lockard said.

1. A hefty boost in American prestige in Asia, particularly in neutral-minded India, which may be the main arena in the East West struggle for the allegiance of uncommitted millions during the next decades.

2. New luster for Eisenhower's eputation as a world leader dedicated to peace. This bolsters him in advance of face-to-face talks with the Soviet Union's Nikita Khrushchev



By HUGH A, MULLIGAN Isaac Watts, often called the "Father of Hymnody," came into the world when Christmas carol singing was regarded as "ye work

of ye devil. It was the latter half of the 17th Century, a time of great religious upheaval in Europe. Calvin's insistence that "the Bible" alone" be used in public worship had driven popular hymns out of many churches, particularly in England among the strict Puritan

Instead of hymns, the congregation chanted selected passages from the Scriptures, usually the Psalms. The clerk intoned the first line in a monotone and the people, as Watts once complained responded with "dull indifference."

Watts, one of nine children, was the son of a boarding house keeper and deacon of the Independent church who had twice gone to prison for his religious beliefs. As a boy, Isaac had stood with his outside the prison gates to sing hymns to his father and the other inmates. His parents managed somehow to scrape together enough money to encourage his love of music with piano lessons.

"Watts Psalms and Hymns. In all, Watts filled 52 volumes with his hymns. Most of them, like "Let Dogs Delight to Bark and Bite," are long forgotten, but his "How Doth the Little Busy Bee" remains a children's favorite and his "Joy to the World" has become a cherished Christmas

Watts wrote "Joy to the World" in 1719 while staying as a house guest at the estate of Sir Thomas and Lady Abney outside London. In that visit he undoubtedly set the all time guest record. He came for two weeks and stayed for 36 years. His gracious hosts complained that it didn't seem long enough.

MUSIC ADDED LATER

"The music we hear today to "Joy to the World" was added more than 150 years after Watts wrote the words. It was composed in about 1870 by Lowell Mason of Medfield, Mass., and based some what loosely on themes found in Handel's "Messiah."

When Watts died in 1748, his place in the world of religious music had already been preempted by Charles Wesley, brother of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism The brothers went to America in 1735 as missionaries to the new colony at Georgia, where Charles was to be secretary to Gen. James Oglethorpe. Ill health forced him to return less than a year later, but he never forgot the marvelous singing of the German Moravian colonists. The Moravians, a devout sect who later moved to Pennsyl vania, gave Charles Wesley the in spiration for his life work. He published his first hymns at Charleston, S. C., and was brought before the grand jury in Savannah for introducing "Unauthorized for introducing "Unat Hymns into the Worship."

FULLS WARANA WA WA

As the "Poet Laureate of Methodism," he wrote more than 6,000 hymns, finding inspiration almost anywhere and writing with ease under the most difficult condi-. tions. Once he fell off his horse while accompanying brother John on an evangelical mission and complained that the resulting injury "spoiled all my hymn writ-ing for that day."

### Something Of A Switch

A switch on constant complaints that the Air Force (and by implication other branches of service) spends entirely too much of the taxpayers' hard-earned money was disclosed at week's end when the General Accounting Office chewed the AF out for not spending enough.

The Air Force, said GAO, runs up an unnecessary \$5 million excess in costs each year by driving its automobiles too long. thus creating excessive repair bills. It operates a fleet of 150,000 cars, and there are more 1951 models among them than any other year model, GAO charges, This clinging to battered, worn-out cars— "through a false sense of economy and a lack of understanding of proper budgetry procedures" will add an additional cost of \$2 million a year in repair and replacement bills for several years, before the slack is taken up, the agency avers.

This beef from GAO was pinpointed by

the charge that the Air Force had pursued this mistaken policy without notifying Congress about these excessive costs in its annual budget requests.

GAO is a potent instrument of govern-

ment, and it appears to be a policy-making outfit as well, with apparent authority to tell each and every other branch just how it should manage its housekeeping chores-and no back talk.

However, in this case it may have a point. Many private corporations and industries follow a definite program of trade-ins for their motor fleets, and such outfits usually know pretty well how to cut corners and reduce costs.

So if GAO says, "Buy more cars and turn them over (figuratively) faster," we wouldn't be surprised if the AF and other service branches didn't take the hint with glee and start reaching for the requisition blanks.

Detroit will be pleased.

## Doesn't Come On A Silver Platter

Tips on achieving a balance between industry and agriculture have come from widely separated points, but they illustrate the fact that you have to work for what

Gov. LeRoy Collins of Florida, speaking in Louisville before the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, had this to say:

Our great development did not just fall in our laps, either. In my own state we are currently spending nearly twice as much for industrial promotion and advertising as all of the New England states combined. And the results have proved these wise investments. During the last three years, we have had more than 2,000 new industrial plants and expansions of existing plants, move in to bolster our economy.

To which an Orlando Sentinel columnist adds this comment: "In New England industry continues to move elsewhere. It takes money to make money."

The other pertinent remarks came from the other corner of the country. In Laramie, Wyo., a University of Wy-

oming professor of business administration declared that state must try to attract more manufacturing industry to bolster its off-balance agricultural economy.

But O. D. Turner recognizes there are obstacles in the way, including lack of water, lack of markets, and the "exporting" of its talented young people to other

"Wyoming is a large and undeveloped state," said Professor Turner. "It particularly lacks in manufacturing, and its economy is unbalanced and unstable-too dependent upon the whims of nature." He urged the development of what re-sources Wyoming has-food, fiber and minerals "to the greatest possible extent."

Texas' ties to Wyoming, historically, are greater than most Texans realize. Few of them remember that part of Wyoming was once a part of Texas, and that even later Texas cattlemen and their herds gave that state the foundation for its first economic foothold.

But Governor Collins and Professor Turner were giving sound advice that applies to Texas, and especially to West Texas. What we need and what we want must be gone after-it won't come to us on a silver platter. West Texas has made great strides in recent years, but we have a far piece to go and we should set our feet firmly on the trail and try to get there at a much faster pace than we have set for ourselves up to now.

## Marquis Childs NATO-Defense Cat With Nine Lives

PARIS - That old song, "Did You Ever See a Dream Walking?" could serve as the theme song of the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance. Never at any time during the decade of NATO's existence have the plans and the proposals of the military schemers and dreamers been translated into force in being. And now, in the midst of a conflict over whether to negotiate with the Russians or not to negotiate and when and how and where, the cracks in the structure are widening.

The failures of NATO have often been toted up in the past. Its demise has frequently been predicted. Yet, it has sur-vived, in however diminished a form, if only because at an appropriate moment the rattling of missiles from the other side of the Iron Curtain seemed to give it a new reason for being.

OUTWARDLY THE situation today is quite different, During the current NATO meeting, with the customary demand for more strength and a bolder posture, scarcely a peep has come out of Moscow. The Eisenhower-Khrushchev talks and the negotiations they opened up are taken as a portent of peace in a Europe that is flushed with prosperity.

With the backdrop on the world stage thus altered the North Atlantic allies are engaging in what has very much the look of the old game of power politics. Rivalries and hostilities are more and more nakedly exhibited-the Franco-German alliance on the continent versus the British-led group on the periphery.

Access to markets, economic supremacy, even military domination, these are the prizes being fiercely contended for within the alliance. Add to this the persenalities of Konrad Adenauer with his almost-total power in Germany and Charles De Gaulle, who towers in cloudy grandeur over the French horizon, and you have a prescription for something rather less than a close-knit defensive alliance.

A SENSE OF THE urgent realization of this went into Secretary of State Christian Herter's opening address to the NATO Council, Unlike the late John Foster Dulles on a similar occasion, he did not threaten the allies with "an agonizing reappraisal" of American policy. But with unmistaka-ble firmness he made it plain that unless

Europe is ready to do more to meet NATO commitments and help shoulder the burden of the under-developed nations of the world the United States will no longer continue to carry a disproportionate

share of the load. What he stressed was that actually the situation had not changed, since the Soviet threat to overwhelm the free world still stands. Yet there are signs that negotiation with the Russians may open the way to an eventual settlement achieved over a long period of time. He declared that the United States intends to maintain the effectiveness of its five divisions in

FIGURES CIRCULATED privately by the American delegation show how marked is the discrepancy between what the United States is doing and what the European allies are doing. For defense and foreign aid the United States is devoting 11.6 per cent of the gross national product. This compares with 5.5 for Germany 4.7 for

Italy and 5.1 for the Netherlands, The percentage for France is 12.1, but this includes the cost of the war against the rebels in Algeria. The French insist that war is in defense of the North Atlantic Alliance and part of General De Gaulle's present anger resulted from America's failure to vote with France in the United Nations against the Algerian resolution.

AS THE GERMAN delegation made clear here once again, Adenauer's policy— and Germany is Adenauer—is to block any meaningful negotiation with the Soviets. The venerable Chancellor contends that to change one single stone in the present structure of Germany and Berlin, short of reunification on his terms, is to bring it all down. And how, he is said to have demanded to his fellow heads of government, do you expect me to be reelected in 1961 if you propose making concessions that can only benefit the Social Democrats? In 1961 Adenauer will be 85 years old.

De Gaulle has taken a similar view, although at the same time he angered the Germans by declaring that the eastern provinces lost to the Soviet bloc at the end of the war must be regarded as permanently separated from the Reich. He appears to consider himself another Charlemagne, prepared to rule over a Europe under the hegemony of France.

THERE IS A LURKING suspicion that he might want to strike his own bargain with the Russians in the game of power politics. Khrushchev is coming to Paris for a 12-day visit in March and elaborate preparations are being made to receive and impress him. Presumably long before that happens France will have shot off her atomic device in the Sahara and thereby have become eligible for mem-

bership in the atomic club. Sitting across the channel the British are not unhappy to discover the old subsurface rivalries recurring, despite the outward Franco-German embrace, Prime Minister Macmillan is reported to believe that De Gaulle's real objective is to keep Germany permanently divided so that France will always be the dominant power. The six nations in the European free trade area look with suspicion on the seven assembled under the leadership of Britain, This has the making of the bitter-

NEW YORK (AP) - Fifteen years ago today a U.S. brigadier troops in and near Bastogne." became the first soldier in history to win military immortality with a four-letter word. The word was "Nuts!" and the man who said it-and later came to hate the word-now feels it changed his whole life.

This bit of American slang, delivered as a defiant reply to a German surrender demand, infuriated a Nazi army. It set the Allied world rocking with laughter and

Today it is still the best remembered symbol of the greatest engagement fought by American troops in World War II -the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium. The battle, personally planned by Adolf Hitler in a last-ditch gamble, began at 5 a.m. Dec. 16,

1944, with a bombardment by 1,900 German artillery pieces. The Nazis, attacking with 250,-000 troops and 1,000 tanks through the Allied "rest camp" area in the Ardennes, achieved complete

tactical surprise.
THE ACTING COMMANDER, Anthony (Old Crock) McAuliffe and the 101st Airborne Division were rushed by truck to Bastogne. There, strongly supported by ele-ments of the U.S. 9th and 10th Armored Divisions, McAuliffe held the vital Belgium road center against frantic German breakthrough efforts.

Discharged from the "Texian" army on this day in 1835 was George Washington Barnett, pioneer Texas doctor and hero of the Revolution and Indian wars. Barnett was born in South Car-

to Texas, where he divided his time between farming near Brenham and the practice of medi-cine. He had been educated at Waxhaw Academy Very shortly Barnett was in-volved in Indian wars, serving

as captain of a volunteer compa ny which attacked the Tawakoni Indians in 1835. Then the fever of revolution raged high among the colonists and Barnett became a second lieutenant in the force which besieged Bexar (San Antonio) and captured the city in the famous surge behind "old Ben

A delegate to the Convention of 1836, Barnett hurried away from its proceedings like many another man as his family was caught up in the Runaway Scrape. He spent a good part of 1836 transporting supplies for U. S. troops under Gen. E. P. Gaines, then served several terms in the Congress of the Republic.

In 1846 Barnett moved to Gon-zales County. In Oct., 1848, he was killed by marauding Lipan-Apache Indians, and was buried in the old cemetery at Gonzales. In 1936 the Texas Centennial in Barnett's honor.

## Wrong Kind Of Christmas Gift

It will not be a very Merry Christmas for the newspapermen of the nation (or for the public at large, for that matter) if the arbitrary ruling of three U.S. Dis-trict Courts in Detroit is upheld by the higher courts and becomes a law of the

In Detroit, three U. S. judges have decreed that their courts will suppress information about certain litigation brought before the court. Newspapers which print information about these suits will be in contempt of court. The judges have wide discretionary power in punishing for con-

The judges, according to the reports, have decided that publication of the facts about certain law suits is none of the public's business. Therefore, they will close the records in these cases. Newspaper reporters cannot investigate the petitions and filings and are forbidden to publish any reports on the suits. A long time ago, a document was written which has been staunchly defended,

and which set forth as one of its basic principles that no abridgment of the freedom of the press will ever be permitted in these United States. The authors of the Constitution set forth certain rights which were to be the protec-

tion and safeguard of Americans for time to come. These included among others freedom of speech, freedom of religious worship, and freedom of the press. As time has passed, restraint has been laid on freedom of speech and press but

able so far to keep a reasonably open route for the publication of information its readers want and need. Now the federal courts, as represented by these three judges, want to apply censorship to the news. They want to decide

what the public is to be told and what

the newspapers of the land have been

it is not to be told. One assumes that the judges will be the ones who will deter-mine the matter. One also knows from personal experience that there are many cases filed in the courts which the litigants would greatly prefer were never mentioned in the public press. It is to be concluded that the attorneys in such cases would appeal to the judges that their cause be

locked from the public eye. The assumption seems further to be that it is the belief of these judges the public has no interest in certain matters; further, that even if the public is interested, it is not to the public's benefit to grat-

ify that interest. It would take a great and far-seeing intellect to determine accurately the interest or importance of any matter to the public at large. I do not believe that any judge of any court in these United States is sufficiently gifted to make such evaluation.

I further believe that any censorship for any pretended cause is dangerous far beyond the alleged purpose for which it was imposed. A rule which bars a specific matter from publication can establish precedent by which other matters may be carried. It could become a snowball, which would gather in more and more as it rolled. Ultimately, freedom of press would be destroyed.

And when free press vanishes, free speech will go and likewise, freedom of

I hope devoutedly that this Detroit experiment will be promptly and effectively destroyed by the higher courts of the

If it is not set aside and is upheld as a law of the land then, indeed, it will be a sad Christmas for the American people.

Another decade, another dollar Everybody and his dog in the writing dodge are, at the moment, taking a look at the decade ahead, the Shimmering Sixties. And I see no reason to sit silent on the sidelines.

To tell the truth, I can't for the life of me figure out what's going to happen tomorrow, much less a year or five years from now. But I certainly love to read about the rich, full life in the 'sixties, as now predicted by the syndicated seers and economists.

Every man his own Croesus in the sixties! That's the golden litany that runs through most of the prophecies. Every man a king," cried Huey Long. He should have lived so long as the 'sixties, when it's going to come true in diamonds.

EVERYONE, INCLUDING government economists, predicts a gross national product of \$500,000,000,000 in 1960. A half-trillion dollars; man, that's cool! When I went to school, we learned, purely as an intellectual concept, that there was a nebulous something called "millions." But that figure was copyrighted by another nebulous figure, J. P. Morgan, and the Milky

Now, a million dollars is just small change left over from a billion. And if the rosy vision of the 'sixties is confirmed, a billion will just be chicken feed from a trillion. I don't even know what comes after a trillion. Probably a nice, cozy padded room

With a vision of sugar plums in the 'sixties dancing in my head, I pulled the World Almanac off the book shelf and discovered that the receipts and expenditures of the United States Government hit a billion for the first time in 1917, a year in which I was certainly around but more interested in boys than billions.

IT WAS FASCINATING to learn from

the Almanac that in 1916, Uncle Sam's receipts amounted to a mere \$782,534,548, and that he only spent \$734,056,202. Of course, those were the horse-and-buggy days, but it's nice to know that both were paid for, old-fashioned as it is.

Now, everyone - including Uncle Sam - lives on credit, and the economists' prediction that the gross national product will hit \$800,000,000,000 by 1970 doesn't surprise me at all. Frankly, I think they ought to aim for a nice, round figure like a trillion.

All I want for the final Christmas of the 'fifties is a shovel, steam preferably, to help me scoop up my share of the easy pickin's in the 'sixties. There is every reason to expect that Macy's basement will be stocked with diamond collars in another couple of years.

OF COURSE, THERE IS always a pessimist or two in every crowd who can spot a worm in an apple at a thousand paces. If the steel strike isn't settled before the end of the 80-day cooling off period, if inflation isn't checked, if the national debt grows, if the outflow of gold continues and if some sourpuss shoots Santa Claus, we may all have to go back to work.

But wages are going up and hours of employment are going down in the 'sixties, the optimists say, and I can hardly wait. Work will just be one, long coffee break, with cream on the house. (In these cholesterol count days, who takes sugar?)

## J.~A. Livingston Gold Reserves And The Dollar Dilemma

### Not even a poet has a license to say that the United States has discovered the elixir of everlasting, depression-proof,

contra-cyclincal prosperity. Yet, there's no denying that the United States found a way during the post-

war period to shorten recessions and stimulate recovery. The method was to make money plentiful - reduce interest Now enters a disturbing thought, ut-tered by Dr. Marcus Nadler, consulting

economist of the Hanover Bank of New York, among others: During the postwar years, U. S. economic policy was comparatively simple. The Federal Reserve Board could concentrate on this domestic question: Is business good or bad? It didn't matter in the least if interest rates were low. If foreign investors took money out of the U.S., if gold were withdrawn from the U.S. Treasury and earmarked for the account of foreign central banks, that was all to the good.

The world was short of gold and dol-lars. A redistribution of gold stocks was desirable. Now, redistribution has been achieved.

No longer can the Reserve Board focus exclusively on business - good or bad? True, the U. S. still possesses the largest pile of gold in the world - more than \$19,500,000,000. But this is down from \$23,000,000,000 two years ago. Foreigners have a \$19,200,000,000 claim against this gold - "dollar balances." These are deposits in U.S. banks and-or investments in U.S. Treasury securities. Therefore, our gold supply isn't our own. Some of it - no one knows how much - is subject to call on a moment's notice.

In five years, foreign holdings of U. S. Treasury bills and certificates have increased by \$3,790,000,000 to \$8,745,000,000. These could be sold, if interest rates elsewhere were more attractive. At the same time, deposits in commercial banks could be "called."

Consequently, the Federal Reserve Board has lost its freedom to fight a recession, Dr. Nadler notes: "In the future, when business activity tends downward, the authorities will face a dilemma. If they take measures to lower interest rates excessively to assist business, a large-scale outflow of gold might be precipitated."

Yet, if the Reserve doesn't reduce interest rates, it would be violating the Congressional mandate in the Employment Act of 1946.

Therefore, it is frequently argued: We have to raise the price of gold. This would give us more "gold dollars" with which to resist flash outflows of money from

However, Dr. Nadler and other money experts would be quick to point out that foreign central bankers can't afford a run on U. S. gold stocks. Anyone who says, "See our entire gold stock is mortgaged," is mouthing an absurdity. For-eigners can't flee the dollar for several reasons:

1. The doliar today is the world's "reserve currency." It's handier than gold. You can transfer a dollar balance from one country to another by cable. And, it can always be converted into gold as long as the U. S. has a large stock. Along with gold, it's the world's store of value as well as the handiest medium of exchange.

2. Central banks, commercial banks, and foreign firms need dollar deposits for trade purposes. This country is a major exporter and importer. Dollar balances here enable foreign customers to pay for their purchases in this market.

3. The U. S. government's credit is incontestably the best in the world. So, foreign banks and firms are likely to hold their surplus international funds here. Lester V. Chandler, in his excellent study, "Benjamin Strong, Central Banktells how the Bank of England, the Bank of France, the Reichsbank, and the Federal Reserve System collaborated during the 'twenties to protect one another against international hot-money flashes. They had a mutual interest in stablilizing exchange rates. Foreign central banks today have a similar interest in protect-

If foreign commercial bankers or investors started a run against the dollar, foreign central banks would offset the outflow by increasing their own dollar balances. This would be self-interest,

An unpropserous America is the western world's supreme liability. Central bankers of the western world would want the Reserve System to ease money rates at the onset of a U. S. business decline.
