How Things Have Developed in '61...

This is the last of a series of two articles summarizing outstanding events that have occurred in Dimmitt and Castro County in the first six months of 1961. The period covered here begins with April 1 and ends June 30.

April 6 saw an increasing infestation of greenbugs in wheat fields and farmers had to delay spraying because of inclement weather. Also that week it was announced that the Birch Society co-ordinator, General William Lee, was to appear in Dimmitt under the auspices of the American Legion to make a speech, and the Castro County Chamber of Commerce announced the appointment of Eddie Coltharp as manager of the Chamber. Jack Miller was named new Lions Club boss and George Bradford became mayor.

On April 12, the top news story was concerned with the new grain program; a rather involved process by which the farmer could limit production and at the same time increase income. The John Birch Society co-ordinator made his scheduled speech stating that his organization had been falsely accused and that it has only one purpose, that of educating the American people about the evils of communism. Dimmitt Wheat Growers announced that week that they had purchased he grain elevator portion of Dimmitt Gin and Elevator. Pete Wright was elected president of the

Dimmitt JayCees. A first Little League meeting was called during the week of April 20. During this same week school children celebrated an American Heritage Day by dressing to represent some segment of our society at some given period in our nation's history. Awards were made that same week to winners in an American Heritage Essay Contest, from both Hart and Dimmitt schools, Mrs. Few Brewster was named the judge of the local National Piano Guild Tournament, judging the students of Mrs. Howard Horshey, Mrs. Faun Welker, and Mrs.

Roy Lowe. A large crowd attended a grain producers meeting where it was explained how 20 per cent of base crops are to be diverted to approved conservation crops before qualifying for full price supports.

A School Appreciation Day was scheduled by members of the school faculty during the week of April 27. Dr. Morris S. Wallace from Texas Tech was announced as the speaker. Bill Baker's Grocery burned that week and the Northside Baptists moved into their new church. Buddy Byrnes was named outstanding JayCee for 1960 at the annual JayCee banquet. Funeral services were held for the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Anthony and David T. Davis Local 4-H Club boys participated in a Tractor Contest where they had to determine eauses for mechanical failures and make necessary repairs.

The week of May 4 brought a rebuttal to the Birch Society co-ordinator from J. L. Munro, a Texas Tech government instructor, who stated the goals of the organization would not be good for this country. A pie and slave auction was slated by the Lions Club to raise money to bring two foreign students to Dimmitt next year. Mac Strother was selected to attend he Texas Nuclear Science Symposium, J. W. Carmichael accepted graduate fellowship in Chemistry at the University of Illinois and West Texas announced three graduates from Dimmitt, Judith Cleavinger, Thomas Roberson, and Don Sheffy. Charlie Armstrong

was elected State JayCee vice-president. Keitha Davis and Beth Cleaver were announced as valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, during the week of May 11. The Lions raised \$1,310, a sufficient amount to finance two foreign exchange students in Dimmitt next year. Mrs. Grace Loyd announced retirement plans after 26 years of teaching. A Texas Tech educator cited needs for higher quality schools in Texas at the "School Appreciation Day" tea. Last rites were held for John W. Hawkins and W. T.

In the week of May 18 school superintendents announced the graduation of 80 senior students in the county. C. L. Kay from Lubbock Chrisian College was announced as speaker at the Dimmitt baccalaureate service. Beth Beecher and Donny Nelson were selected as representatives to the American Legion Auxiliary Girls' State and the American Legion Boys' state. May 31 was announced as deadline to file a petition to participate in the 1961 feed grains program. Superintendent Paul Hilburn announced that Dimmitt would host a bus load of foreign students the latter part of June.

The week of May 25 included the Nazareth Baseball Club's Golden Anniversary. Thieves broke into Bob's Super Market that same week and took \$1,153. Elton Singer was elected president of Texas Division of International Parks Highway Association at Littlefield. Mrs. Mary Flynt became the American Legion Auxiliary State vice-president of the Fourth Division. Mrs. Sam Gilbreath was announced the top winner in the Garden Club Flower show. The JayCee-Ettes held their installation banquet that week and Mrs. Beverly Wadsworth, JayCee-Ette state president, installed new officers. Sam Gilbreath and B. M. Nelson returned from Washington, D. C. and the contents of their testimony for sugar beet allotment was reproduced in the News in that week of

June 1 found Dimmitt getting ready for a season of summer activity with 100 boys signed up to participate in Little League competition. 




