Wheat Decline Causes of Today

Editor's Note—This article was written by Owen L. Scott, and appeared recently in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, it being copyrighted by them, and is reproduced herewith by special permission.

THERE IS more reason why wheat today—on a statistical basis of world supply and demand—should be selling at \$1.50 a bushel, than there is for it to be selling at \$1 a bushel.

Present abnormally low prices are due in a measure to a concerted effort on the part of European buyers to boycott United States and Canadian wheat. These buyers have been able to establish a market to their liking because of unusually large grain crops in the principal importing countries and because of the unsettlement that struck all commodity markets after the October crash in the stock market.

Local Bank Reflects Good Conditions

The official statement of the First State Bank of Dimmitt, showing condition at the close of business on March 27, is published in the News this week, and shows a splendid condition. Compared with other banks of the Plains, many of them in towns larger than Dimmitt, and taking them as barometers of general business conditions, the statement makes a most excellent showing.

Another indication of this community's financial condition is the following comparison of the statement with that of the same bank as made on December 31, the last one published:

Total resources in December were \$470,617.15, and on March 27 it was \$520,424.15. Loans and discounts in December were 339,916.36, and last month were totaled at \$377,149.43. Total deposits in March were \$444,514.71, compared with \$399,277.15 in December.

STATE INSPECTOR VISITED SCHOOLS LAST WEEK

State School Inspector Brown, of Austin, visited the Dimmitt schools last Thursday on an official inspection trip, and before leaving, praised the student body of our high school, remarking that it was above the average for a school in a town the size of Dimmitt.

His inspection included buildings, equipment and teaching, with the exception of the vocational agriculture department, which comes under another department.

A written report on the local schools is expected from Austin at an early date, as a result of this inspection.

BIG INCREASE IN SCHOLASTICS OF COUNTY SHOWN

Past Year Shows Substantial Increase in Practically Every District in County.

According to figures furnished the News by County Judge-Superintendent M. R. Avery, Castro County Scholastics showed a big gain over last year, the present count, just completed, giving a total of 1,349, as compared with 1,026 last year.

Practically every district in the county showed a gain, the increase being heaviest in Dimmitt, increasing 99.

George, secretary of the Canyon civic body and of the ex-students association, both of whom made short talks to the students, and were responded to by Supt. C. A. Cryer of Dimmitt.

Over One Hundred Will Have Water By Next Week

With the completion Tuesday of the concrete reservoir, and on Wednesday of the tank of the city waterworks system, the pump was started Thursday and the mains and pressure thoroughly tested, after which the tower was drained and cleaned thoroughly, preparatory to filling.

With tests all made, approximately one hundred patrons will begin receiving service from the municipal system early next week, according to city secretary Bert Huckabee, who is in charge of the plant.

It is expected that work on the pump house and fire station will begin at an early date.

Dimmitt's new \$100,000 high school building, completed last winter, and used since Thanksgiving, will be officially dedicated with appropriate exercises and program on next Thursday, April 17, at 8 p. m.

Open house will be held beginning at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, until seven, at which time all patrons are invited to visit the institution.

Beginning at eight o'clock in the evening, introduction of visitors will be held, and short talks made by school authorities and local civic leaders, after which the address of the evening will be delivered by P. W. Horn, president of the Texas Technological College, of Lubbock.

The Dimmitt band, under the direction of Charles H. Dean, will furnish music for the occasion.

New Brick Service Station Started By T.-P. Oil Co.

Work was started Wednesday on a modern brick service station, on the corner of Bedford Avenue and Fourth Street.

The station is being built by the Texas-Pacific Coal & Oil Co., of which J. H. Workman is local wholesale agent. According to Mr. Workman, the approximate cost of this structure will be \$4,000, and it will be equipped with a large drive-in space, rest rooms, and the building proper will be 24x14 feet, built of brick, with two 1,000 gallon service tanks.

The contractor is E. A. Sutton, and material is being furnished by the J. C. Wooldridge Lumber Co., of this city.

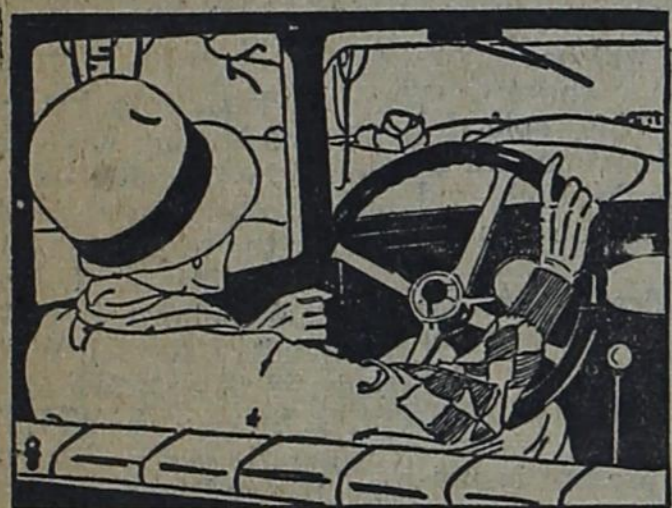

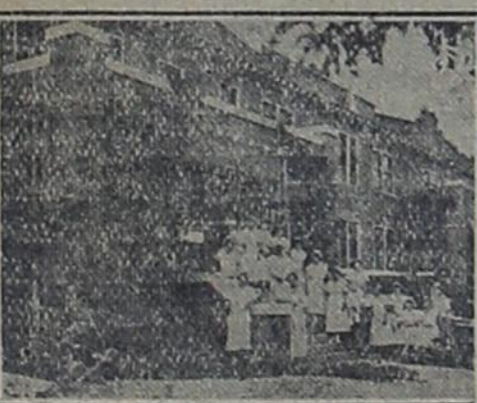

Home Economics Notes

NUTRITION AND CHILD HEALTH

THE HEALTHY child is vigorous, joyous, and lovable. The frame of the healthy child is well built, and his chest is broad and deep; his chest expansion is from 1 inch to 3 inches, according to his age. The healthy child stands upright, and is perfectly at ease. His eyes are bright, and there are no nasal obstructions; his hair is luxuriant. The healthy child has an over supply of energy, and he is overflowing with life. He has a vivid imagination, and a splendid curiosity, but his mental capacity varies and so does his appreciative value.

The unhealthy child is cross, hateful, and unlovable. His eyes are dark circled, and his hair is lustreless; he is easily fretted and aggravated.

Malnutrition is not a disease even tho it is regarded as such by a great many people. It is the result of a run down physical condition, or of an unbalanced diet.

It is estimated that one-third of the school children under 12 years of age have malnutrition. About thirty per cent of all school children have malnutrition. A pitiable fact, it is that malnourished children do not always come from poverty stricken homes, but they are often from the very richest families.

There are numerous causes of malnutrition among children, namely: (1). Insufficient food. (2). Improper cooking. (3). Unsuitable food. (4). Bad pasture and (5). Bad health and food habits. Some of the symptoms of malnutrition are: (1). Underweight (the child may be fleshy, but his flesh will not be natural, instead, it will be flabby). (2). Pale or sallow. (3). Dark circles around the eyes. (4). Dull, lifeless eyes. (5). Lustreless hair. (6). Disinclination toward work or play. (7). Tiring easily. (8). Lack of mental vigor, and (9). Nervousness. The two chief results, if malnutrition is not cured, will be an undeveloped mentality and an undeveloped physical body.

Malnutrition can be overcome and the best way to overcome the cause. Many times malnutrition can be traced back to bad conditions in the home. Such things as, practicing good health and food habits, and getting plenty of fresh air and exercise have not been followed.

There is absolutely no substitute for milk every day in the diet. If children do not like to drink milk as a beverage, there are many ways to prepare milk without the child's knowing that he is getting the valuable materials in it. There are other things to be remembered in thinking of milk. One of the most important of these is to be careful about the way milk is cared for—cleanliness should be one's guide.

Eggs and cereals should also play an important part in the diet of each child. "At least one egg a day" should be the rule in regard to eggs. Cereals should constitute about one-third of the diet. Cereals are an important factor in preventing constipation when they are cooked; they should be well done. There are several ways to prepare cereals, and if a child does not like them fixed one way, one should try another way.

Vegetables are another important factor in the prevention of constipation. There should be potatoes in some form each day. Fresh vegetables, such as string beans, peas, spinach, turnip greens, squash, and okra, are valuable vegetables.

Fruits of some kind should be eaten once daily. If children do not care for fresh fruit, dried fruits that are cooked well, prove to be very well. Now to be economical, fruits should be chosen in season.

Sweets are also an important factor for the diet, but much care must be taken along this

A thoro knowledge of the principles of diet for all ages and for all types of people is essential to every person who selects or prepares meals.

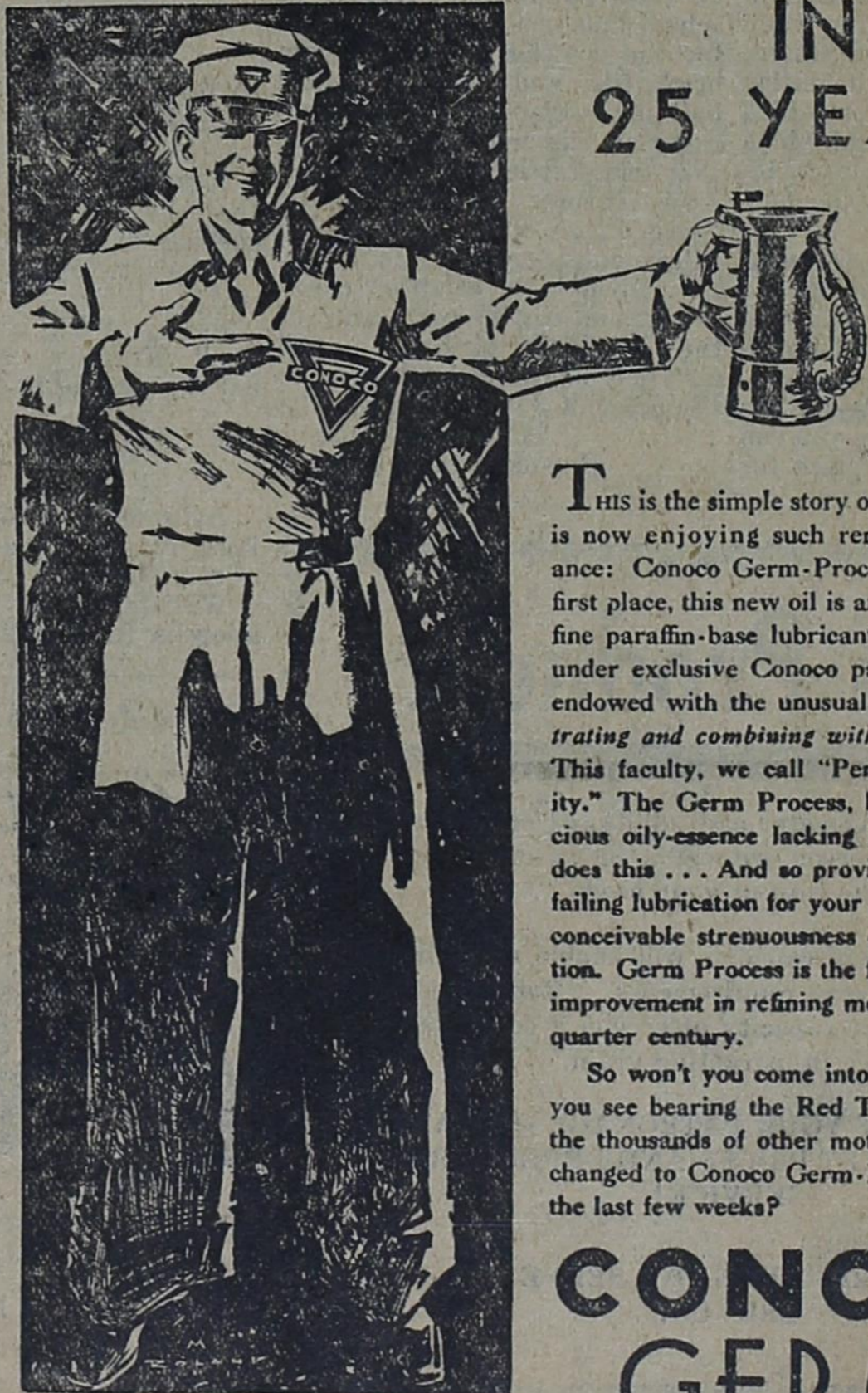

Wheat Decline Causes of Today

(Continued from first page)

world supply for the current year including the crop and carryover should have been just about sufficient for normal consumptive requirements with a reduced but moderate carryover into the 1930 crop year.

"But foreign demand, which the four exporting countries depend upon to absorb their surplus, has been abnormally light for United States and Canadian wheat. There are four reasons:

Causes of Slack Demand

"1. There has been some contention between European buyers and the Canadian pool—with the buyers evidently wishing to break the pool.

"2. There has been a tendency to boycott United States wheat as a retaliation against the attempt to raise the American tariff.

"3. Germany and other countries have raised tariffs against imported wheat.

"4. The French crop was underestimated.

"As a consequence of these developments, Europe has been buying from hand-to-mouth. It is now a question of how long she can continue to do so. The normal carryover of world supply of wheat is less than one month's consumption. This means that a relatively close relationship exists between consumption and production thruout the world. The crops of Argentina and Australia have been small. This country and Canada have wheat which the importing countries should be needing in larger quantities.

Pool Forced to Sell

"But other factors have entered the price situation. The Canadian wheat pool is the largest single seller of wheat in the world, and its position has a great effect. In its operation the pool receives wheat of its members, advances them so much a bushel—about \$1 this last year—and then borrows from the banks to carry this grain until it is sold. When the stock market crashed last October, the banks became uneasy and pressed the pool. This put the selling agency

at a disadvantage and forced some dumping, with resultant price depression.

"Then with prices down, the Federal Farm Board agencies finally entered the market in this country. The appearance of the Government would have been a natural tendency to frighten private trade. Experience shows that the period of highest prices in grain is the period of greatest speculative activity. Government participation brought a decrease in normal speculation and a market somewhat artificial.

Crop Conditions Just Average

"At the same time there has gone forth an exaggerated impression of the crop prospects for the coming year. Persons of influence, in order to prevail upon Spring wheat farmers to reduce their acreage have broadcast the impression that the Winter wheat crop is almost sure to be a bumper one. This adds to the price depression.

"As a matter of fact, the Winter wheat crop, which usually to-

tals two-thirds of the United States wheat production, has come thru the Winter in average condition. Its acreage is 2 per cent larger than last year, but 7 per cent under the acreage of the year before. Besides, the growing season has only begun and many a factor can enter before harvest.

Canada Crop Prospects

"The probabilities are that Canada, owing to a deficiency of subsoil moisture, will have no better than an average Spring wheat crop, even if weather is better than average.

"This country is likely to enter the new crop year with a carryover about as large as last year, or around 240,000,000 bushels. This is almost twice normal, but new world supplies are smaller and if consumption is normal the statistical outlook is not dark.

"On a normal basis, with world supplies, and the world outlook as they are, one would expect the price of May wheat at this time to be near \$1.50 a bushel."

Beginning at the northeast corner of Block 74, and extending south along west side of 5th street, to southeast corner of block 74, thence west along north side of Bedford avenue to the southwest corner of block 74; and beginning at the southeast corner of block 83 and extending north along west side of 6th street to the northeast corner of said block 83; and beginning at the southwest corner of block 83 and north along east side of 7th street to the northwest corner of said block 83; and beginning at the southeast corner of block 100 and west along north side of Bedford avenue to southeast corner of block 109, thence north along west side of 8th street to the northeast corner of said block 109; and along south side of Bedford avenue, beginning at the northeast corner of block 99, and extending west to the northwest corner of block 162; and beginning on Front street at northeast corner of block 1, in Clifton Heights Addition; and extending south along west side of Front street to northeast corner of block 2, thence west to northwest corner of said block 2 in Clifton Heights Addition; and beginning at northeast corner of block 125, extending south along west side of 9 st. to the southeast corner of block 124, the Sidewalk in front of or alongside of all property above described to be four feet wide and the estimated amount to be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof, per front or running foot on each such portion of street, is \$0.92. Total per front foot, \$0.92.

Commercial Walk

Beginning at the southeast corner of block 99, and running north on west side of 7th street, to the northeast corner of said block 99, and beginning at southwest corner of block 83, and extending east along north side of Bedford avenue to the southeast corner of said block 83, the Sidewalk to be sixteen (16) feet wide and to have a uniform curb line, the total estimated amount to be assessed against the property and the owners thereof per front foot or running foot on each such portion of street is:

A hearing will be given and held by and before the Governing Body of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, on the 9th day of April, A. D. 1930, at 2 o'clock p. m., in the Courthouse in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to all owning or claiming any property abutting upon such portions of streets, and to all owning or claiming any interest in any such property. At said time and place all owning or claiming any such abutting property, or any interest therein, shall be and appear and will be fully heard concerning said improvements, the cost thereof, the amounts to be assessed therefor, the benefits to the respective parcels of abutting property by means of the improvements on the portion of street, upon which the property

abuts, and concerning the regularity, validity and sufficiency of the contract for, and all proceedings relating to such improvements and proposed assessments therefor, and concerning any matter as to which they are entitled to hearing under the law in force in the City and under the proceedings of the City with reference to said matters. Following such hearing, assessments will be levied against abutting property and the owners thereof, and such assessments, when levied, shall be a personal liability of the owners of such property, and a first and prior lien upon the property as provided by the law in force in the City, and under which the proceedings are taken, being the Act passed at the First Called Session of the 40th Legislature of the State of Texas, known as Chapter 106 of the Acts of said Session.

The improvements on each such portion of street, or streets, constitute an entirely separate and distinct unit of improvement, all to the same extent as if entirely separate and distinct proceedings had been taken with reference to the improvements and assessments therefor in connection with improvements on each such portion of street, or streets, and the assessments against the property abutting upon any unit shall be and are in no wise effected by any fact or circumstance relating to or connected with the improvements in other units.

Of all said matters and things, all owning or claiming any such property or any interest therein, as well as all others in any wise interested of affected, will take notice.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 15

CAPTION: SIDEWALKS AND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE BUILDING OF Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, the repairing of Sidewalks, providing the levying of a tax for the building of Sidewalks and creating a penalty for the neglect or refusal to repair Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, by virtue of the terms and provisions of the Act passed at the First Called Session of the Fortieth Legislature of the State of Texas, and known as Chapter 106 of the Acts of said Session.
BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Dimmitt, Texas:

Section 1. That all Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt that may be built by any resolution of the City Commissioners shall be constructed under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of the Street Committee, or Street Commissioner; and all Sidewalks hereafter constructed shall be built in strict conformity to grade for Sidewalks established by the City.
Section 2. That all sidewalks shall be made by or at the expense of the owners or occupants of the premises fronting thereon, and shall be built within fifteen days after publication of notice in the official newspaper of the City as hereinafter provided.
Section 3. That unless a different width be specified in the resolution ordering the construction, all Sidewalks shall be sixteen feet wide in the business district, and four feet wide in the residential district.

Section 4. That all Sidewalks hereafter constructed shall have a uniform slope of one-fourth (1/4) inch per foot from the building or front line of the lots, in front of which same are built to the outer edge thereof.
Section 5. That Sidewalks must be built of concrete, to be made in the proportion of one part cement to two parts sand and four parts gravel for base course, top dressing to be made of one part cement to two parts sand, and one course work shall be made of one part cement to five parts sand and gravel.
Section 6. That the City Commission by Resolution may at any time, order the building of Sidewalks on any square, street or alley of the City. Such Resolution shall prescribe the street or place along which same shall be built, and may be in the following form:

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, that the owners or occupants of all the property fronting the North,

South, East or West side of (name the street from to in said City) be and they are hereby ordered to construct a concrete Sidewalk in front of said property in conformity to Sections Three, Four and Five of this Ordinance.
Section 7. That on the passage of an order for the building or repairing of any Sidewalks, the City Secretary shall cause a notice thereof to be published for fifteen (15) days in the official newspaper of the City, which notice shall be dated and signed by the Secretary and shall specify the day on or before which said sidewalks shall be constructed by the owner or occupant, and may be in form as follows:

NOTICE is hereby given that the City Commission has ordered Sidewalks to be constructed as follows: On etc. (giving the description contained in the Resolution offering the same) now unless the same shall be constructed in the manner required by Ordinance relative to Sidewalks on or before the day of next, the same will be built and paid for by the City and the expense assessed on the premises chargeable therewith.
Section 8. That the City Secretary will make out and cause to be served upon the owner or occupant of such real estate when known and can be found, a written or printed notice thereof, dated and signed by himself, and formed substantially as follows:

"Mr. (name the party) Sir: You are hereby notified that the City of Dimmitt has ordered a Sidewalk to be constructed in front of Lot No., Block No., on Street, in the original town (or any addition thereto, specify the addition). Noy unless you shall construct the same to the satisfaction of the street Committee or Street Commissioner in the manner required by Ordinance, on or before the day of (day and month mentioned in published notice) the same will be built by the City and the expenses assessed against the premises."
Section 9. The notice required by the preceding section shall be served by delivering a copy thereof to such owner or occupant in person, or by registered letter, or by leaving the same at the residence or place of business of such owner or occupant. Such notice may also be served upon any known agent of the parties aforesaid. The person serving such notice, shall endorse thereon his return, showing when and how and on whom the same has been served.
Section 10. That should the owner or occupant of any real estate in front of which any Sidewalk has been ordered to be built, fail or refuse to construct the same within the time mentioned in the notice aforesaid, to the satisfaction of the Street Committee or Street Commissioner, it shall be the duty of said Committee, or Street Commissioner to report the same to the City Commission; said report shall be in writing and shall give a description of the lot or other premises, also the name of the owner or occupant on whom notice has been served and the manner of service, or if any owner be unknown or cannot be found, such report shall state opposite the lot: "Owner unknown" or "Cannot be found"

as the case may be. The said Committee or Commissioner shall also procure and file with such report a copy of the Sidewalk Notice published in the newspaper doing the city publishing with an affidavit of the publisher, of its due publication.
Section 11. That on receiving such report, the City Commission may order the Street Committee or Street Commissioner to construct the Sidewalk mentioned therein which order may be in the following form:

Whereas, the owner of the following described real estate to-wit: Lot, Block, original Town of Dimmitt, Texas, (or any addition as the case may be) has failed after due notice to construct a Sidewalk thereon in pursuance to an order passed the day of (giving date of Resolution ordering the same). It is therefore, ordered that the Street Committee or Street Commission,

construct the same forthwith in conformity with the original order and report the expenses for assessment.

Section 12. That an accurate account shall be kept by the Street Committee or Street Commissioner of the cost of every Sidewalk constructed by order of the City Commission and they shall report the same in writing as soon as practicable in the following form:
"Your Street Committee, or Street Commissioner begs time to report that in compliance with an order of the City Commission passed on day of 19.... (giving date of order) they have constructed a Sidewalk on the premises herein after described at an expense set opposite thereto, to-wit: Lot Block of the original town (or addition as the case may be) of Dimmitt, \$.... to be signed by the Chairman or other member of said Committee or Commissioner and addressed to the City Commission."
Section 13. That the City Commission on receiving the report required by the preceding section by a Resolution passed by a vote of the majority number, assess the expenses on the real estate described therein, which Resolution may be substantially in the following form:

"BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, that the sum of money set opposite the following lot, to-wit: Lot, Block, original Town of Dimmitt, \$.... be and the same is hereby assessed thereon to defray the expenses of a Sidewalk constructed and paid for by the City, in pursuance of an order passed on the day of 19...."
Section 14. That it shall be the duty of the City Secretary as soon as practicable after the passage thereof to furnish the assessor and collector a certified copy of the Resolution provided for in the preceding section, signed by the Mayor and attached by himself with the seal of the corporation attached thereto, which certified copy, as aforesaid shall be full and sufficient authority for the assessor and collector to remise and collect the assessment therein specified.
Section 15. That upon receiving such certified copy of said assessor and collector to cause to be published for ten days in the official newspaper of the City, a notice of such assessment as made by the City Commission and demanding the same within thirty days after the date thereof. Said notice shall be dated and signed by the assessor and collector and may be in the following form:

"Notice is hereby given that the sum of money set opposite to the following lot to-wit: Lot, Block, original Town of Dimmitt, has been assessed thereon by the City Commission for the cost of a Sidewalk constructed and paid for by the City and payment of said amount is hereby demanded within thirty days from date hereof."

Section 16. That should the owner of any real estate so assessed fail or refuse to pay the amount of such assessment or any portion thereof, within thirty days after the date of the first publication of the notice prescribed in the preceding section, the assessor and the collector shall by virtue of his certified copy of the Resolution signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Secretary under the seal of the corporation as provided in Section 14 file suit in the Corporate name in any Court having jurisdiction, levy and sell such delinquent premises of real estate, whether belonging to resident or non-resident, for the payment of the assessment due thereon together with the costs of sale accruing thereon, according to the order of said Court.

Section 17. That the owner of real estate sold for the payment of any assessment for the construction of Sidewalks or his heirs, assigns or legal representatives shall have the power to re-deed the same at any time within two years from date of sale by paying to the purchaser double the amount paid by the purchaser.
Section 18. That should the assessor and collector fail to make the sale of any real estate for want of a purchaser he shall

bid the same off to the City for the amount of the assessments due and costs accruing thereon and execute and deliver to the City a deed to same in the same manner provided for to individuals for real estate sold. Said deed shall be recorded in the County Clerk's office and shall vest a good and absolute title in the City to said land, if not redeemed as herein provided. The owner of such real estate may redeem the same at any time within two years from date by paying the assessor and collector double the amount of money paid by the City and upon payment being made by the owner or his agent, the assessor and collector shall procure from the City Secretary and deliver to such party a quit claim deed to such property which deed shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary under seal of the City.
Section 19. That whenever the assessor and collector shall have made sale of any real estate under this Ordinance, it shall be his duty to make return of said sale to the City Commission stating in the return, the land sold, the name of the owner, if known, and if unknown state the fact, the time of sale, the amount for which said sale was made, together with the name of purchaser which return shall be entered of record on the minutes of the proceeding of the Commission.
Section 20. That the assessor and collector on final settlement of his assessments with the City Commission shall be entitled to a credit for the amount of all the assessments for the construction of Sidewalks due the City, for which the lands and lots were bid off to the City, and in all cases where the property if levied on and sold for assessments, for Sidewalks, he shall receive the same compensation that is allowed by Ordinance for making a levy and sale for the taxes.
Section 21. That nothing contained in this Ordinance shall be construed to deprive the City of any rights, power or authority which it may have, to collect said assessments for the construction of Sidewalks, or the value of work and labor done and material furnished in constructing Sidewalks by instituting suit in the Corporate name in an Court having jurisdiction thereof.
Section 22. That no assessment for Sidewalks as herein contemplated, shall be deemed to be invalid in any case where the name shall be made in conformity with law although the same not be in conformity with the preceding and forms herein prescribed.
Section 23. That any person being the owner of any premises in front of which any Sidewalk may be broken or otherwise out of repair who shall fail or refuse to repair such Sidewalk within the time required by the notice prescribed in Section 7 shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not exceeding one hundred dollars and each day that such person fails or refuses shall be deemed a separate offense. It shall also be unlawful, with penalties as prescribed above, in this Section, to damage any Sidewalks in the City of Dimmitt, by the driving of heavy vehicles over same, or damaging them in any other manner, to require repair.
Section 24. The fact that the City of Dimmitt is without adequate Sidewalks, that for the immediate preservation of the public health, and safety, said City creates hereby an emergency, which requires that the rule, requiring Ordinances to be read at more than one meeting, be suspended and that this Ordinance take effect immediately after its passage, and it is so ordered.
