## County Health Officer Urges Mosquito Control Measures Now

Peak months for mosquitoes to lay their eggs are in May, September and October. "This is the time that we must make every effort to interfere with the breeding grounds of mosquitoes so that we will not be plagued by swarms of mosquitoes and the possibility of a number of cases of encephalitis later this year," says Dr. Harold Bischoff, County Health Officer.

"Anyone who owns land upon which there is a lake should heed the instructions which are to follow," he says. This is especially important to those people who have lakes which are within two miles of a town. The ground around the lake should be broken with a disk plow and the lake and the surrounding area which might become part of the lake should be sprayed with a chemical known as Dieldrin. This chemical is apparently toxic to livestock and it is not suggested that lakes in pastures where livestock is kept, be sprayed with this chemical. Where lakes are present in pasture where livestock is harbored these lakes may be seeded with top-water-minnows. Information regarding the procurement of these top-water-minnows will be available shortly.

"Understand that the time to do these things is now, not next month or next year," Dr. Bischoff emphasized.

All containers of any sort which can contain water for any length of time should be emptied periodically, at intervals of two or three days, upon the ground and fresh water added. This will include any type of receptacle for the watering of pets like half of an automobile tire, cans, bowls, poultry watering troughs, stock troughs, etc. Where a person has an air conditioner where the water drains out on the ground, the hose should be moved every day or two to a new location permitting the water to evaporate or sink into the ground. Where air conditioners have recirculating pumps, the addition of one tablespoon of any household insecticide should be added every couple of days.

The townspeople might expect to have a mosquito count in the city when the mosquito count in the area is high. Plans are being made by the city commissioners to obtain apparatus to determine when the mosquito count is low so there will be no unnecessary dusting.

"Everyone should make a concerted effort to see that any weeds or refuse in which mosquitoes may breed is removed from their premises," the health officer said.

These measures outlined above are for your protection and the protection of your families. The virus of encephalitis is carried by mosquitoes and when you are bitten by a mosquito you never know whether or not that mosquito is infected with encephalitis virus," he said.

"In the interest of public health, your health, and the health of your loved ones, you must do everything you possibly can to stop the growth and development of mosquitoes in your area."

## Texas Tech Educator Cites Need for Higher Quality Schools in Texas

"Quality schools do not come cheap," said Dr. Morris S. Wallace, head of the Department of Education at Texas Tech Thursday evening. "The community that tries to economize it schools is defaulting on its obligation to itself and to its children."

Dr. Wallace was speaking before Dimmitt's first "School Appreciation Day" held in the High School auditorium and later on in the evening throughout the school system.

Dr. Wallace dealt at length on the school's role in the community and the community's obligation to the schools and its teachers. "The school provides the intellectual stimulus to elevate the community and to inspire its prosperity and growth," he maintained. "Our schools are our greatest source of development of human intellect and aspirations."

Dr. Wallace dealt at some length on the distance the public schools have come during his 29 years in education. "I cannot help but be amazed at the beautiful school buildings of progressive communities and at the depth of purpose that is everywhere from the gleaming cafeterias to book-lined libraries. Contrasted with my days in school we have come a long way."

"But," he emphasized, "regardless of what we have done, we must keep advancing. I greatly fear federal government intervention in state-supported schools and the only way to prevent this from happening is to set our own lofty ideals and strive for them. Federal aid to education will come only if many schools fall below levels considered normally safe."

"Two things are necessary for quality schools," Dr. Wallace declares. "One is the school's physical plant — its buildings, classrooms, shops and other real estate — and the other, naturally, is its teachers."

"Because of absurdly low salaries, we have a critical shortage of classroom teachers," he said. "My departments at Tech had requests for 4,670 teachers last year and had only 206 ready for jobs. One teacher is produced where 22 are needed. To make up this deficit schools have to go searching and they must hire teachers with less training. Texas issued 5,250 emergency certificates last year for teachers mostly in the primary (See EDUCATOR, Page 9)
