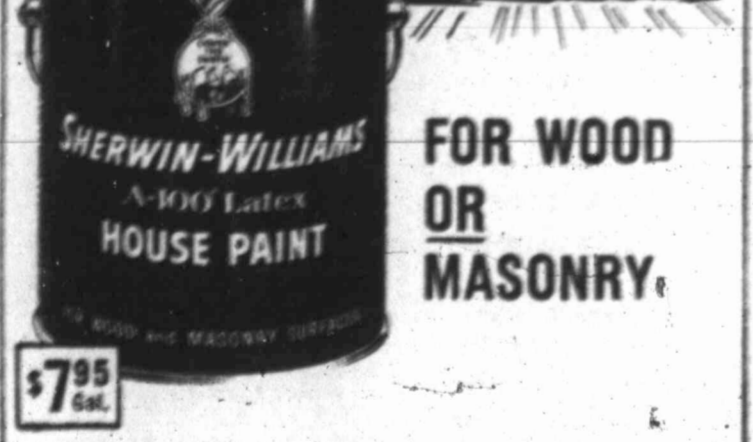

State Candidates Drub Each Other

If there isn't a big turnout at the Texas Democratic primary Saturday don't blame the candidates because they are doing everything possible to stir up voter interest—from beating the drums and shaking the bushes to drubbing each other.

Drubbing each other was the principal occupation Monday. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson charged that his opponent, Waggoner Carr, was backed by loan sharks and medical quacks and that open gambling will return to Galveston if Carr should be elected.

Carr blasted back by saying that hundreds of veterans land fraud cases had been dropped because the attorney general wouldn't cooperate with local officers. The House speaker said if he is elected he will call a state-wide meeting of district attorneys to get the land fraud cases reinstated.

Gov. Price Daniel said that gas pipeline company lobbyists are conducting "a campaign of vengeance" in which they are spending half a million dollars this week in an effort to defeat him.

"They are trying to punish me

to make gas pipeline companies pay a fair share of the tax burden in this state," Daniel said.

Jack Cox, who is trying to unseat Daniel, renewed his demand Monday that the governor reveal "his five secret tax plans," say when he will call a special session for teachers' pay raises and say whether he still favors a penny a gallon boost in the gasoline tax.

"Texans must decide to get rid of Price Daniel in Saturday's election or be prepared to put up with him indefinitely," Cox said, adding that if Daniel wins a third term, he will probably seek a fourth.

Jerry Sadler, candidate for land commissioner, told newsmen Monday his life had been threatened by persons who told him to "lay off" his investigation of the administration of the land office. He said he had not told police of the threats.

Land Commissioner Bill Allicen, who was at his desk in Austin, was scheduled to campaign in San Antonio Tuesday. Sadler earlier said he would concentrate on Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and the coastal cities.

Daniel was due to address the Knights of Columbus in Austin Tuesday while Cox was campaigning in San Antonio, Seguin and New Braunfels with a TV talk and rally in San Antonio at night.

Wilson was to speak at noon to the Houston Junior Chamber of Commerce, then campaign in Tyler and Texarkana, while Carr had scheduled a breakfast in Yorkum and a TV appearance in Corpus Christi.

AF Transport Crash Kills 3

YORK, Pa. (AP) — A C123B Air Force twin-engine transport lost its stabilizer in flight Monday and crashed in a farm field near this south-central Pennsylvania community, killing two officers and a civilian.

Killed were Capt. John H. Wrisberg, Elizabethtown, Pa., aircraft commander; Capt. Kenneth L. Church, Middletown, Pa.; and Walter Young, Lancaster, Pa., a civilian flight engineer.

An Air Force spokesman said

the plane was on a routine test flight after undergoing repairs at Olmstead Air Force Base in Middletown. Spokesmen added there had been no radio contact with the craft and no indication it was in trouble.

Cause of the crash is under investigation.

GARDEN TALK

Strange Wilt Disease Visits Weeping Willows

I have had a distressing number of sick willow trees brought to my attention. One damaged branch was brought to me, but it was early in the season and ap-

peared to be late frost damage. Since then Lorraine H. Symms, 3301 Eleventh Place, reported one that wilted and finally turned dark under the bark and died. Later Walter Parks reported branches dying back to the trunk on his weeping willow in his front yard at 1226 Purdue. This willow also appeared to be suffering from some sort of wilt and showed dark stains under the bark.

In looking through my library of plant diseases, there is little or no treatment recommended for this type of wilt. There seems to be a connection between this disease and a similar one that is carried by poplar trees. If there are other people who have noticed similar troubles in their weeping willows, I would appreciate hearing from them.

At the moment I am interested in finding out where they bought their trees that are dying, and if any poplars are planted nearby. I would also like to know how the tree looks. Does it have places where the bark is turning dark, followed by wilting and withering of the leaves? I am also interested in knowing how many weeping willows have suffered damage or death from this disease.

With a wilt such as this there is little treatment once the plant is affected, but on the other hand, knowing about it in advance may save some gardeners the loss of other weeping willows. It would be a shame to get attached to one of these beautifully shaped trees only to lose it as it matures.

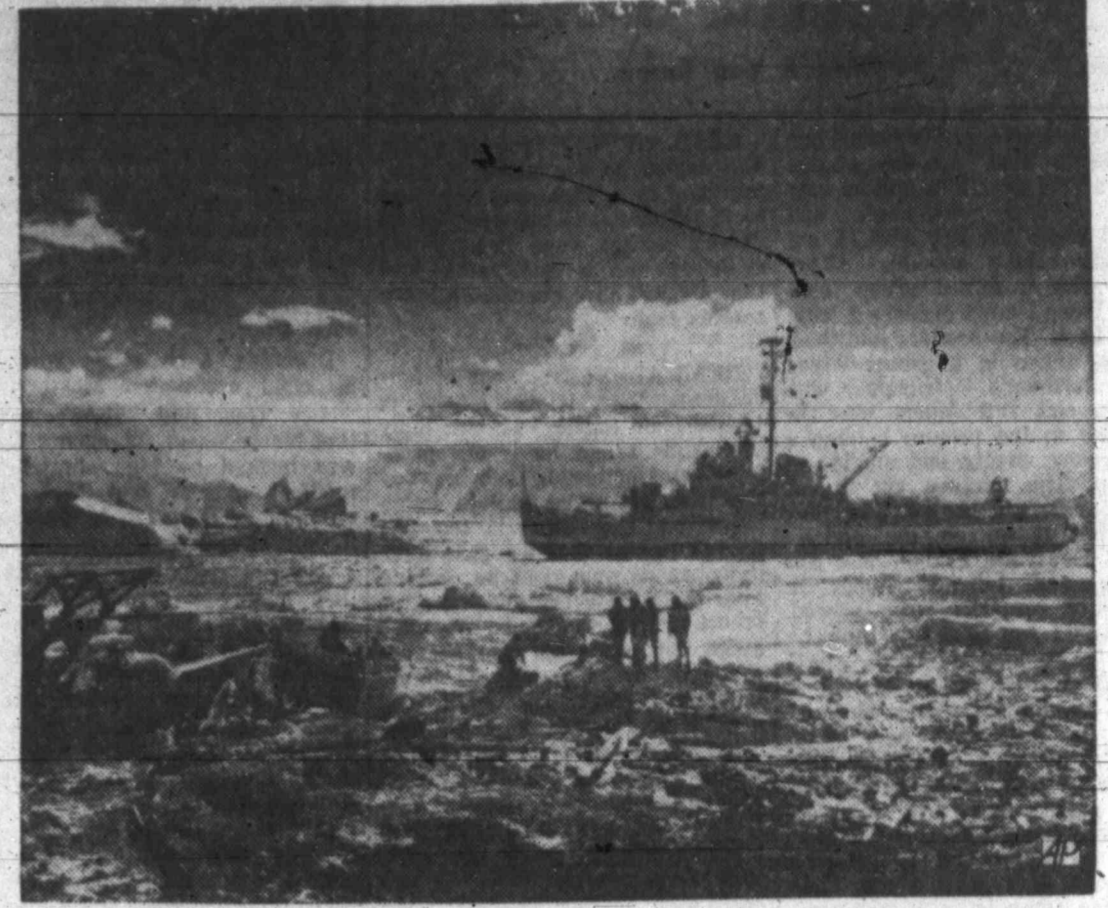

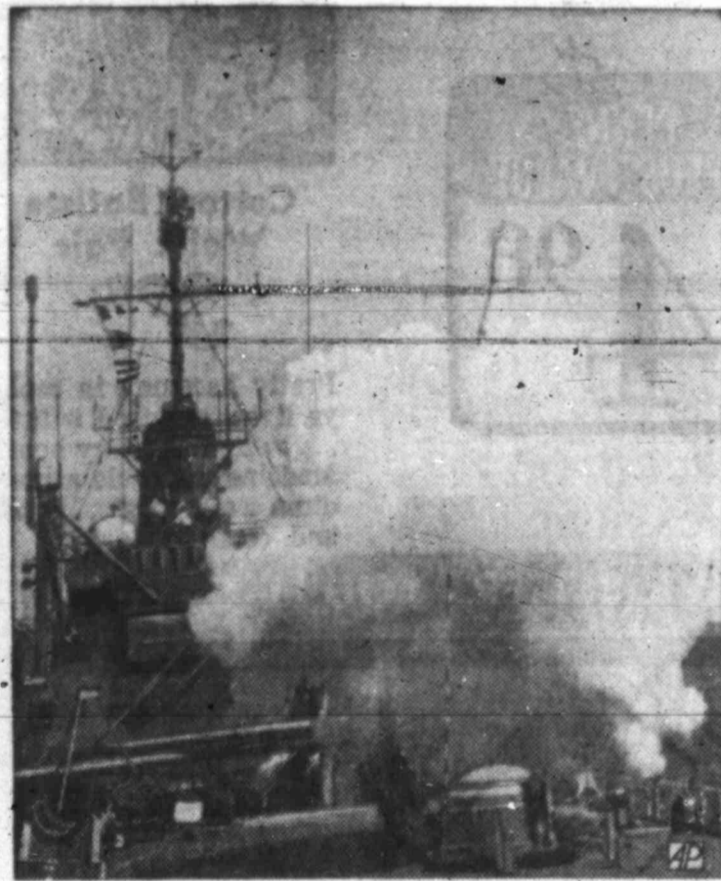

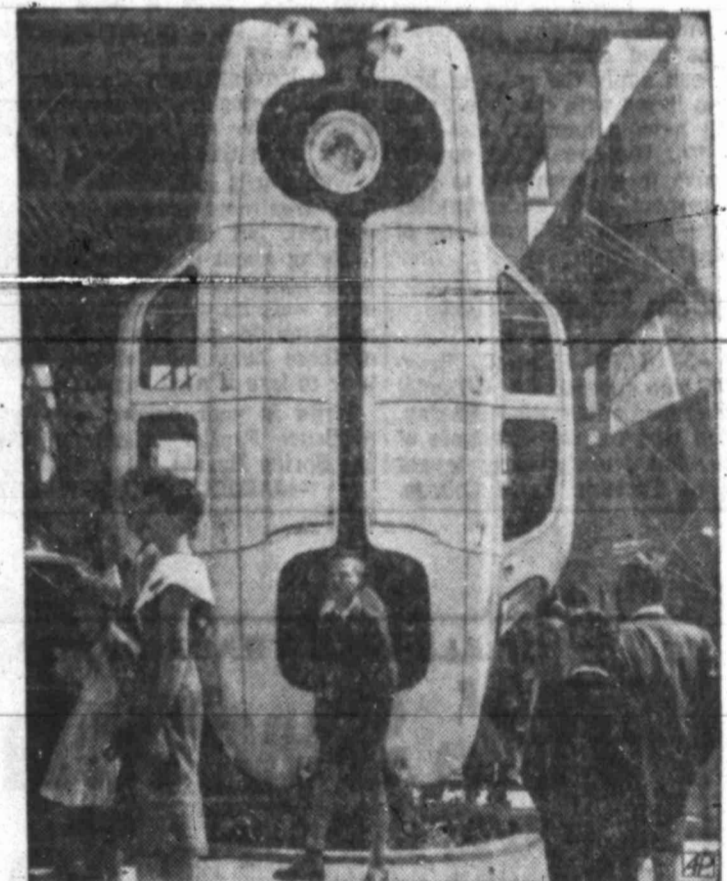

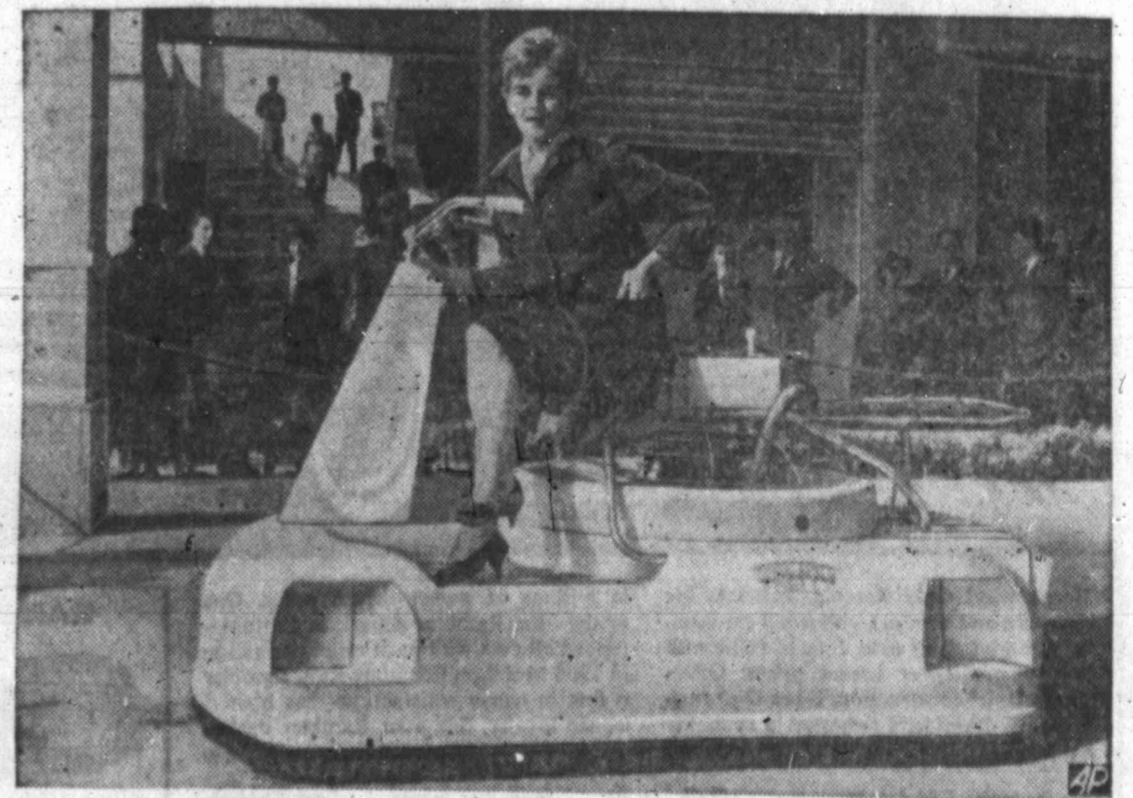

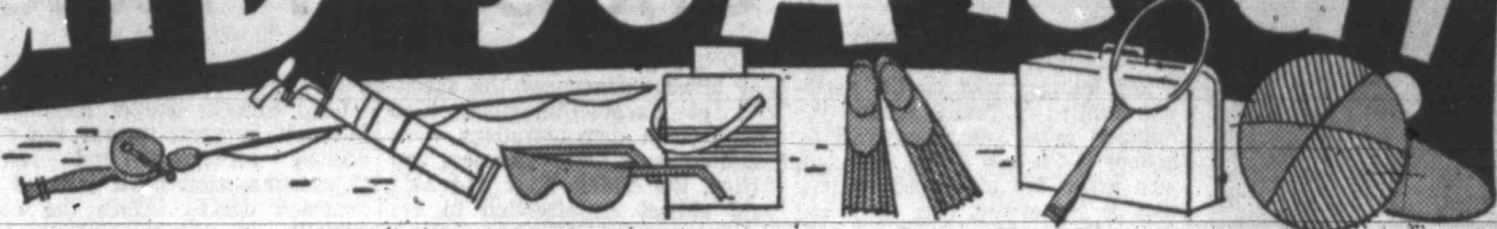

Candidates File Reports Of Campaign Expenses

Miller Harris, candidate to succeed himself as sheriff, has spent more money in the primary campaign than any local candidate. Grover C. Coates, candidate for constable of Precinct 2, has spent the least.

Mrs. Pauline Petty, county clerk, said that nearly all of the candidates in the several county and precinct races have filed their expense accounts with her office, as required by law.

These were due on April 29: Check of the reports showed that Harris has spent \$685.90. A. E. (Shorty) Long, who is one of Harris' two opponents, has spent \$467.68 in the first primary campaign. M. L. Kirby, the third candidate in this race, had not filed his expense report Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Viola Robinson, who is seeking re-election as county tax

assessor, has spent \$543.15. Zilah L. Lefevre, her one opponent, reported expenditures of \$529.17.

COMMISSIONER RACE
In the two county commissioner races in which there are contests, the reports show the incumbents spent less than their opposition.

County Commissioner P. O. Hughes, District No. 1, reported he had spent \$317.90. Rufus L. Stallings, who is running against Hughes, has spent \$349.

Joseph T. Hayden, who is seeking the post now held by Hudson Landers, commissioner, Precinct 3, reported expenses of \$308.08 as compared with Landers' \$199.20. Wayne Burns, county attorney, who is running without opposition, has spent \$304.

Walter Grice, also unopposed for re-election to justice of the peace, Precinct 1, Precinct 1, reported he had spent \$190.

J. W. Patton, who has one opponent for his job as constable, Precinct 1, Place 1, has expended \$170.16. W. R. (Dub) Weatherford, in the same race, had not filed a report Monday.

NO REPORTS
No reports were on file for Otis West and Tom Birkhead, who are contesting Coates for his Coahoma constable post.

One major item on each of the expense reports filed by the candidates is the assessment levied by the Howard County Democratic Executive Committee for the expense of the primary. This explains, for example, why Burns, unopposed has expended \$304. Under the formula employed Burns was assessed \$264 for primary election expenses. If more than one candidate is in the field, the pro rata cost diminishes.

Sgt. Debehnke Signs At Webb

T.Sgt. Donald A. Debehnke of Oshkosh, Wis., has re-enlisted at Webb for four years of Air Force duty. The 30-year-old sergeant will have had 16 years' military service at the end of his current tour.

Sgt. Debehnke entered the service in February, 1948, and nine months later he was sent to Rhein Main, Germany, to join the 60th Maintenance Squadron. As a member of that unit he took part in the Berlin Airlift and was awarded the Medal for Humane Action.

He returned to the United States in 1951 and, prior to coming to Webb, he served at Bryan AFB. He is assigned to the Wing personnel office at NCOIC of the airman's branch.

His wife, Mary, is from Oshkosh. They live in Webb Village with their 3-year-old daughter, Dianne.

Williams Says Lyndon No Soap

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Michigan's Gov. Mennen (Soapy) Williams says he isn't going to support Sen. Lyndon Johnson of Texas as for the Democratic presidential nomination.

"We have a fair chance of carrying Michigan with anyone but Johnson," Williams said Monday. He said Johnson is "not a liberal in civil rights or anything else," and asserted that Michigan is a liberal state.

Section Of State's Urban Renewal Law Knocked Out

SAN ANTONIO (AP)—A section of the state urban renewal law was ruled unconstitutional Monday by the 4th Court of Civil Appeals. The ruling is expected to have sweeping effect.

The opinion was written by Justice Jack Pope on a suit contesting an urban renewal election June 27, 1959, in Laredo. The urban renewal proposal was defeated 2,072 to 1,885.

The state law allows cities to participate in federal urban renewal programs under which property designated for redevelopment

ment may be condemned and resold, with the federal and local governments absorbing any loss if the sale price is less than that paid the former owner.

Pope's opinion said the section of the law under which the city allowed only property owners to vote is unconstitutional. The rest of the law will stand, however, he said.

The ruling came on an appeal filed by a group headed by J. J. Richter after a district court turned down their suit seeking to have the election voided.

"An election to determine a matter of policy is open to all qualified voters within the voting district," Pope wrote.

"The fact that a policy, once adopted, will cost money is not the controlling test," the opinion said.

"The Laredo resolution on which voters were expressing their wishes does not contain anything which could be called a vote for a direct expenditure of money."

"An election which does not concern the expenditures of money is open to all qualified voters," it added.

Reds Replace German Commander
MOSCOW (AP)—Marshall M.V. Zakharenko, former commander of Soviet troops in East Germany, has replaced Marshal V. D. Sokolovsky as chief of the general staff for the Soviet army and navy.

Sokolovsky, 63, has been reported in ill health.

Psychoses Are Forms Of Serious Mental Illness

(Third in a Mental Health series—Ed.)

The psychoses are the forms of more serious mental illness. There are several of the psychoses, the most common being schizophrenia; involuntional; manic-depressive (not manic); old age; brain injuries (due to mishaps, chronic alcoholism, advanced syphilis, etc.) and paranoia.

Don't let these words mystify or awe you. Let's have a look at some of them.

Schizophrenia is a Greek word which means split or shattered mind. It claims more victims than any other psychosis and is often called the psychosis of youth because its victims are generally between 16 and 30 years of age when the breakdown comes. Some schizophrenia develops as early as six, some as late as 65, but most are in that 16 to 30 range. Of 300,000 mental cases admitted to hospitals annually, 25 per cent suffer schizophrenia.

There are four distinct types of it. The first is the "catatonic" type, which has to do with bodily movement. In some cases a patient may be completely motionless, sometimes remaining as rigid as a board for hours; he may be still for a long time, then race or thrash around aimlessly and violently. In the simple type the patient has limited contact with his surroundings. While he may sit quietly for hours, paying no attention to anyone or anything, he may be able to dress or feed himself (but his condition will worsen).

The hebephrenic type does silly, childish things and his talk is mostly nonsense; often he goes into fits of giggling or weeping.

The paranoid type may hear "voices" which tell him to do things, or he may receive messages through secret waves and rays; he may have ideas that there is a plot by secret powers to kill him and sometimes may be hostile or violent toward those who want to help him.

Involuntional psychosis usually occurs in the 50-to-55-year bracket. This is the "involuntional" or "turning back" period, or "change," as some put it. The outstanding symptom is deep and tense depression. The victim sinks into a deep mood of misery and unhappiness; he worries constantly, and may weep frequently and uncontrollably. He may feel that he has utterly failed and has caused nothing but trouble. Illness may be imagined, to the point of painful bodily sensations. Sometimes the victim may have delusions or think those

about him are seeking to shame or ridicule him.

Manic-depressive psychosis is often misunderstood. As mentioned, the word is manic (not maniac, which so many seem to call it). All of us understand extreme depression; well, manic is just the opposite: A patient with manic-depressive psychosis may be highly excited and elated, feeling high and super-charged one minute, and in the depths of despair the next. On the other hand, the manic condition may last for weeks or even months, but it will usually swing in the opposite direction. Most of these cases are in the 40-50 year bracket.

Every age seems to have its special psychoses - schizophrenia for youth, involuntional and manic-depressive for the middle-aged, and cerebral arteriosclerosis and senile psychosis.

The arteriosclerosis is a hardening of the arteries which feed the brain, and is thought to cause tissue deterioration. Inevitably, memory and responsibility fall progressively until the victim is helpless and may talk only gibberish. Symptoms of old age psychosis are the so-called "second childhood" in which a person's behavior becomes like that of a child in many ways, coyness and cunning, childish tantrums, petulance and a demand for a lot of attention.

Among the other psychoses, there may be hallucination, delusions, depression and lack of emotional control. Paranoia is characterized by delusions, usually those of grandeur. The patient may imagine himself to be endowed with supernatural powers, or to possess great wealth and power. Most of us think of "the man who thinks he is Napoleon."

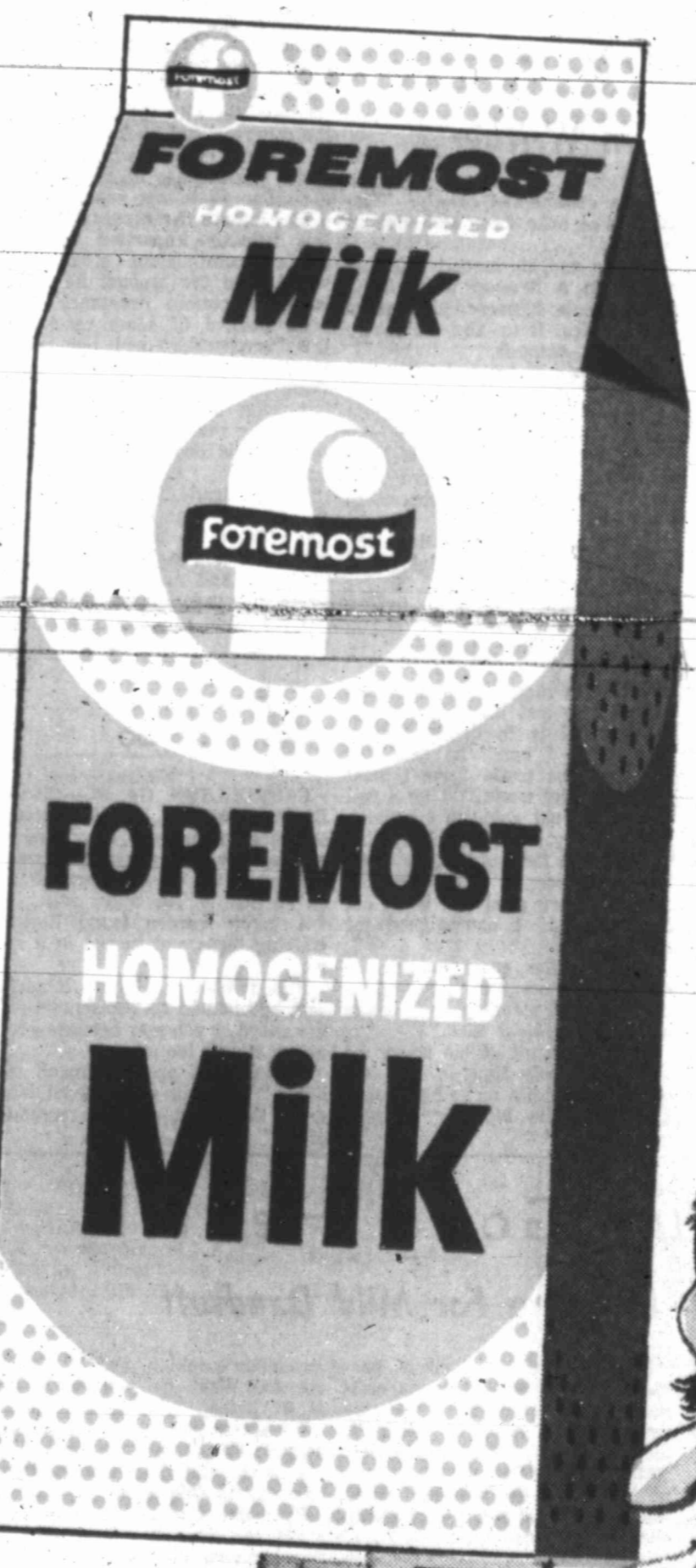
In addition to psychoses and neuroses, the psychotic personality is a form of mental illness. The person with a psychopathic personality gives the appearance of being normal in many ways. He doesn't do or say strange things. He doesn't have extreme fits of depression or excitement. He doesn't imagine he is president or that he is receiving secret messages. His sickness is in his character. He is lacking in conscience, feelings of humanity, decency, justice, honesty, or responsibility. The results in anti-social, immoral, irresponsible and often criminal behavior.

The person with a severely psychopathic personality knows that there is a difference between right and wrong, but he does not care. He is concerned only with getting pleasure and enjoyment whenever he wants it, no matter what he has to do to get it. He

is unstable and easily provoked to violence. Many people with psychopathic personalities are intelligent and pleasant and find it easy to deceive others, such as the confidence man or the professional Romeo. Some others are just plain hoodlums.

But whatever the kind or degree of psychosis, all its victims have one thing in common—they are seriously sick in their minds and the need treatment.

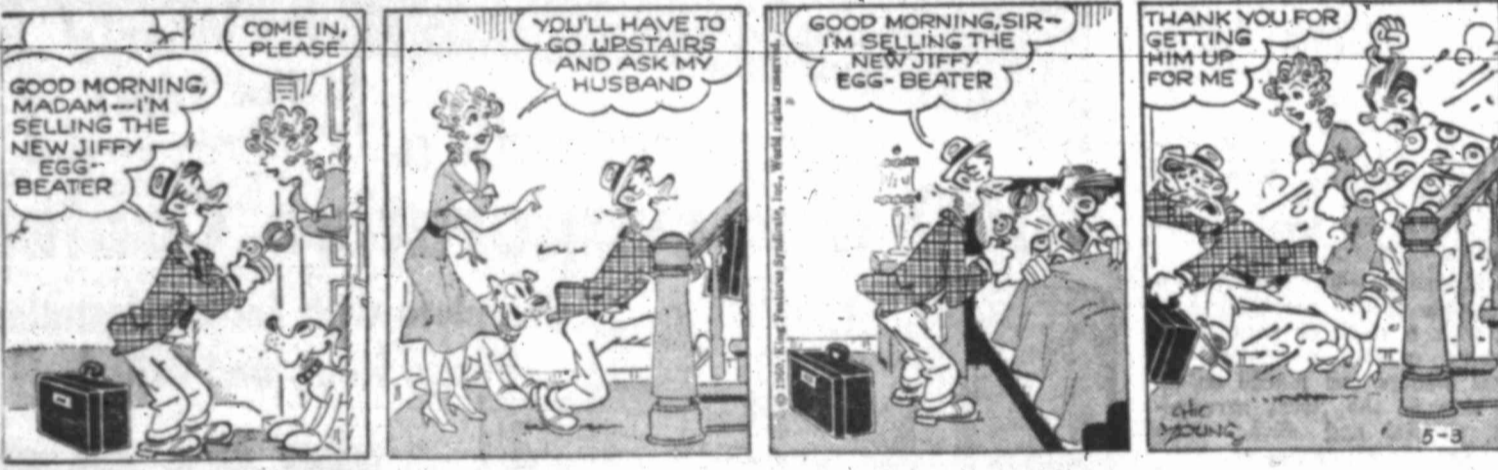

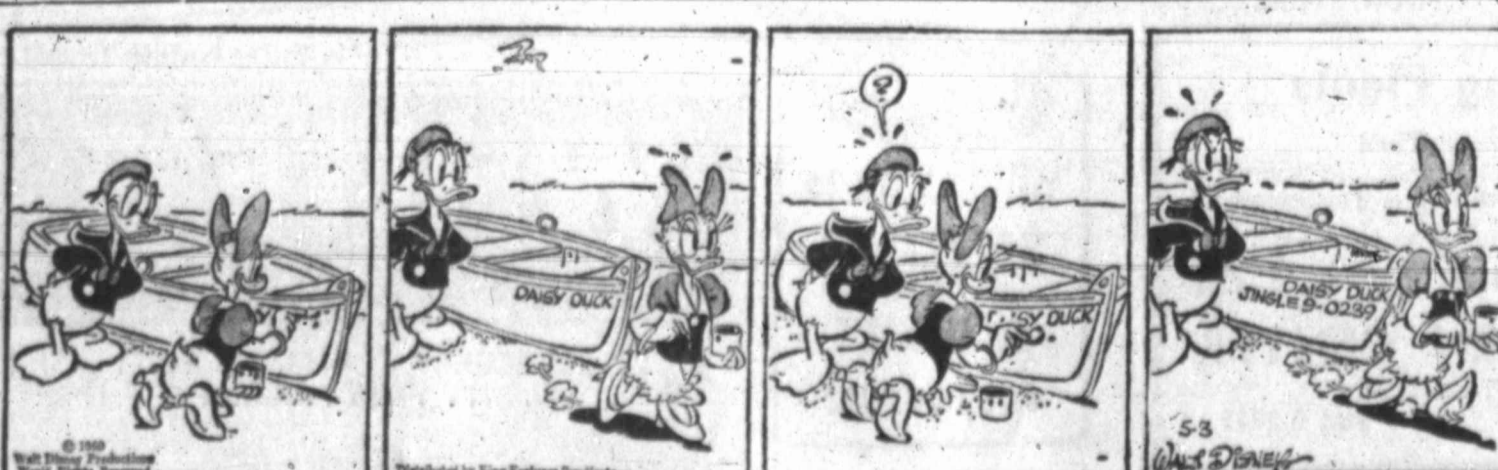

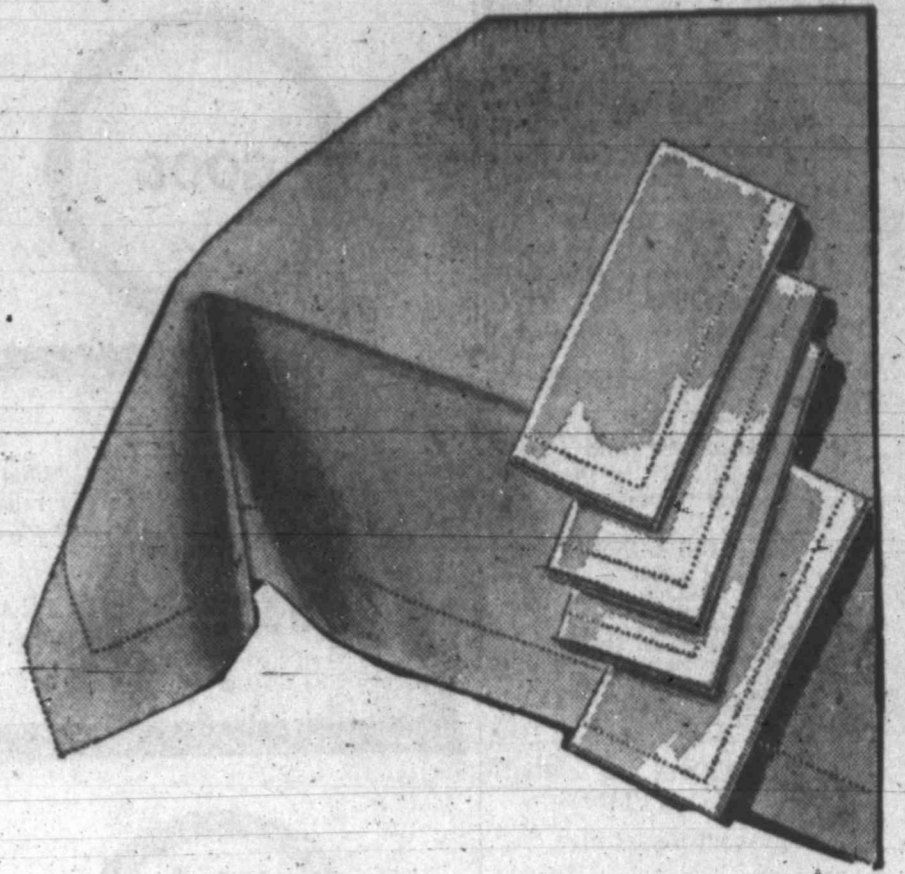

Kinsey Researchers Peering
Into Data On Sex Offenders

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) —
The Kinsey reports—first pen-
etrating look at U. S. sex habits—
are probing still deeper into mod-
ern sexual problems.
Their newest project: how and
where human sex activity runs
afoul of society and the law.
More than a decade has passed
since the first Kinsey report
shocked the nation with its
findings:
One of two American husbands
has sex relations outside of his
marriage.
One of four American wives
commits adultery.
One of 10 American women is
pregnant before she marries.
Eighty-five per cent of the women
and 98 per cent of the men
could be jailed one time or another
for some element of their sexual
behavior.
PURPOSES LISTED
When Dr. Alfred Kinsey died in
1956 of a heart attack, he left the
Institute for Sex Research to carry
on his work. One of its pur-
poses:
To provide an accurate picture
of how people behave sexually to
aid in the realistic formulation of
sexual values and restraints, and
in general to aid law-making
bodies, psychiatrists, sociologists,

clergymen and other scholars of
human behavior.
The institute's small staff is
now at work on the Indiana Uni-
versity campus, sifting through
2,800 prisoner interviews for the
fourth report: Sex Offenders.
"One of the problems is that the
law is so constituted that a great
deal of human sexual activity is
illegal," explains Dr. Paul H.
Gebhard, institute director.
"In consequence, many of the
people who have been fined or in-
carcerated on sex charges will
probably prove to be very much
like the average individual."
RIDICULOUS LAW
For instance, most states have
laws forbidding intercourse with
underage females, whether they
consent or not. This is statutory
rape, and every prison holds per-
sons convicted on this charge.
However, it is ridiculous to
condemn, as a criminal, a man
whose offense was intercourse
with his underage fiancée, Dr.
Gebhard says.
The new report, due sometime
next year, covers minor and se-
rious offenses—ranging from rape
and offenses against children to
peeping.
Women have been eliminated
from the new report, largely be-
cause most female offenses have
a commercial nature, such as
prostitution, and the rest are re-
latively rare.
One reason is that the average
woman hasn't as strong a sex
drive as the average man, Dr.
Gebhard says, and, although there
are exceptions, the average woman
never reaches the peak of sex
interest attained by the average
male.

tion we've chosen to impose on
ourselves and in consequence
there is a considerable amount of
extramarital activity.
Monogamy is generally easier
for women than for men. But even
women have polygamous tenden-
cies cropping up in dreams or
fantasies.
DIFFERENT ROADS
Societies have taken different
roads to control the problems of
sex among their members. Thus
few prohibitions apply to all
mankind.
Premarital intercourse, taboo in
the United States, is socially ac-
ceptable in many European coun-
tries and elsewhere.
And sometimes societies make
trouble for themselves in the
already difficult area of human
drives and emotions.
"Take our own society, for ex-
ample," Dr. Gebhard says.
"There's this great stress on
physical beauty. Look at the in-
escapable advertising that's being
pounded in on our female popula-
tion day in and day out.
"Be beautiful. Dress stylishly.
Wear this perfume. Use this soap.
And the whole emphasis is to be
beautiful—that is, be sexually at-
tractive. Adopt the mannerisms of
the latest Hollywood stars."
"So on the one hand, society is
strongly encouraging sexual at-
tractiveness. But when it comes
to the logical conclusion of sexual
attractiveness—sexual behavior—
then society suddenly reverses
itself and says: No, no, no."
"So we have this peculiar situa-
tion of encouragement on one hand
and repression on the other. It's
almost schizophrenic."
