

"Uncle" Frank came to the county from Hill County in 1903, and says he and a neighbor who is almost as hardy dug Frio Draw. But Mr. Aze hasn't been growing potatoes very long. He says the biggest hazard is in not knowwhen or how to water the crop. There are plenty of other risks.

Mr. Axe is one of the smaller potato gowers. He has 17 acres in white cobblers, and will make a nice profit. He also has some fine cotton, and a good food -----
