While the President actually requested \$4,175,000,000 in new money, Congress limited appropriations to \$4,086,300,000 in a separate bill authorizing continuance of the aid program. The actual money figure is \$701,800,000 below the authorized amount.

Presumably the Senate, which regularly has been more generous than the House in foreign aid funds, will be asked to restore some of the cuts,

The committee's action was taken on recommendation of a committee headed by Rep. Otto E. Passman (D-La).

The military phase of the program, which finances fighting equipment, training, supplies and services for friendly nations, was limited by the committee to \$1, 600,000,000 of the two billion requested.

WASHINGTON (AP)-Senate investigators said today bold measures must be taken to shut off heavy flow of drugs going to pped up juvenile gangsters in

As a start, said Sen. Thomas-Bennings Jr. (D-Mo) the nation hould concentrate on an impor-ant source of supply of heroin and narijuana—the border towns of

Negotiations between the United States and Mexico should be start ed, he said, to develop new measures of control over narcotics peddling and smuggling.

These conclusions were contained in a statement by the Sen-ate Juvenile Delinquency Commit-

tee, headed by Hennings.

"This tie-in between drugs. gangs and the rate of juvenile crime is nationwide," the committee said. "In Philadelphia, Chicágo, Los Angeles and Detroit, our investigators found the pattern was the same.

"In New York, Mayor Wagner testified that drug addiction in that city is the biggest single factor behind juvenile crime.

The committee said wide oper vice, prostitution and drug sales are common in Mexico towns along the 1.200-mile open borderespecially Tijuana, south of San Diego, Juarez across from El Paso; and Nogales, south of No-

Hennings said "The committee found that the Mexican border is the primary port of entry for narcotics into California and Southwestern United States and that much of the drugs find their way right into the heart of major Eastern popu-


"We also learned that virtually 100 per cent of the narcotics confiscated in the Southwest are of Mexican origin: narcotics are the collector of customs' biggest problem, occupying 75 per cent of his efforts, and that marijuana is

used extensively by adolescents.

It was Mr. Justice Oliver Wendell Willy - nilly, it might get into Soviet hands, Homes who said that the exercise of free press and Khrushchev's propaganda statespeech does not entitle a man falsely to yell. "Fire" in a crowded theatre." It occurs to me that the word "trea-

son" and its implications are not to be tossed around any more lightly by irresponsible partisans in search of political advantage. Yet the repugnant era of Sen, Joe McCarthy was revived in all its vulgar innuendo the other day by David Lawrence, editor and columnist.

MR. LAWRENCE; simultaneously beating his breast and his typewriter (no small feat!) cried aloud in newspapers (including The Herald) that any criticism whatsoever of President Eisenhower opens the miscreant's patriotism to most serious question!

During the administrations of F. D. Roosevelt and Harry Truman, if if memory hasn't completely crumbled, Mr. Lawrence didn't feel that "constructive criticism" of the opposition was anything but his patriotic duty as he wrasled with might and main to point out the path of rectitude to the Democratic party and its

BUT CRITICISM of a Republican President in these trying times so pains Mr. Lawrence that he is ready to accuse the critics of giving "aid and comfort to the

Politicians, editors, writers, "intellectuals" (the quotation marks are Mr. Lawrence's not mine. I have no objection to brains) and public figures who dare to criticize Mr. Eisenhower or his administration knowingly run the great risk of being quoted in Soviet newspapers and publications.

In this manner the above give "aid and comfort" to the enemy, in Mr. Lawrence's solemn excommunication statement, and are, ipso facto, unpatriotic.

THUS, BY LAWRENCE logic, no criti-cism of Mr. Eisenhower is allowable.

ments. The "cold war" and the "hot war" are inseparable in the Lawrence mind, and what this nation needs is a stern censorship, especially in a campaign year, lest there be any hint that the Eisenhower record and the Eisenhower administration have been less than perfect. As an American who still believes what

it says about responsible free speech in the Constitution, I find Mr. Lawrence's strictures, even allowing for intense partisanship, just so much sheep dip.

No American could have been more infuriated than I at the outrage and humiliation heaped upon the Presidency and Mr. Eisenhower by Khrushchev's swinish behavior at the only meeting of the Big Four in Paris.

BUT ANGER AT the Russian's brutish behavior and admiration of Mr. Eisenhower's dignity and superb self-control in the face of it should not be used as a gag for press or public. Both have not only the right but the duty to question the whole bungled U-2 affair, and how and why it happened

To question the patriotism of men who make such inquiries is despicable. To argue that American free speech and press should be edited for the benefit of Russian press and public is one of the most astounding doctrines I have ever

I DO NOT question the patriotism, although I may question the wisdom, of those who have decided that President Eisenhower is to go through with his journey to Japan. If our President is met in Japan with insult and violence, I shall

be as deeply outraged as I was in Paris. But I shall still believe it the privilege of any patriotic citizen to make responsible criticism of Mr. Eisenhower and his administration if he wishes to do so

al paper" of the National Bureau of Economic Research, the annual report of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, or a monthly review of a Federal Reserve Bank, you get a sense of life, excitement, and anxiety to get a message across. These are not organizations which go

in for popularization for popularity's sake. They don't scant scholarship for reader interest. Yet, they are trying to interest readers.

FORMATS ARE pleasant, the writing frequently is literary as well as literate. Charts often have headlines to tell a story —a happy replacement of the mute

This revolution was a product of the Great Depression. Lives were topsy-turvy by cause - and - effect forces people couldn't understand: The collapse in the stock market slowdowns in retail sales. layoffs in Pittsburgh or Detroit, the fall in the exchange value of the French franc and the Japanese yen, increasing unemployment in the U.S., and a run, ultimately, on American banks.

AS PEOPLE AWOKE to the dismal and frequently involved consequences of economic events, they wanted to understand them. Business news had to be "languaged up" -- expressed clearly --without being inaccurate. Business Week magazine and Fortune specifically strove to meet this demand.

In World War II, the War Production Board found it necessary to keep toplevel government and business men in the Army, Navy, White House, numerous special agencies, and WPB, itself, informed on production. What are the bottlenecks? What materials are short? How much lend-lease is going to Russia, England, elsewhere?




