2 Navy Ships Collide, Killing 11, Injuring 21

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Patrick Medeiros' bow lookout aboard the freshly refitted destroyer Collett, peered anxiously into fog as thick as cotton candy. His ship seemed to be gliding blindly through a cloud. Suddenly Medeiros screamed into his microphone: "Ship dead ahead!" An instant later the newly painted bow of the Collett smashed into the destroyer Ammen, a kamikaze-scarred veteran on its way to the boneyard. Then Medeiros, 19, of Honolulu, heard the awesome sounds of disaster at sea—frantic shouts, the clanging of bells, death screams, the hiss of steam, and the rip and tear of steel. Medeiros escaped with a bruised thigh but 11 other Navy men died in the collision Tuesday. At least 20 others were hurt, but only six were hospitalized. The Ammen, heading for San

Diego and deactivation, had just unloaded her explosives at nearby Seal Beach. Otherwise both ships could have been blown out of the water. The 376-foot Collett left her bow anchor embedded in the Ammen's twisted superstructure and carried off a crushed Ammen seaman in the fang-like wreckage of her own bow. When the bow lookout first yelled, the Collett's skipper, Cmdr. A.T. Ford of St. Petersburg, Fla., shouted from the bridge: "All engines back full. Right full rudder." The Collett, apparently in a turn, struck the Ammen's port side below the waterline just astern of amidships, then slid up and smashed into the superstructure. Those killed were all aboard the Ammen and had been working in two offices above deck. "Stop engines," ordered Cmdr. Zaven Mukhalian, captain of the Ammen. The damage control party quickly went below and secured watertight doors. The Ammen looked sadder than when a Japanese suicide plane crashed into her during the Battle of Okinawa in 1945. She listed 11 degrees to port but did not sink. "Thank God we unloaded the ammunition," said Mukhalian, sailing the Ammen on her last voyage to a moth-ball berth. "Stop engines," ordered Cmdr. Zaven Mukhalian, captain of the Ammen. Help was already on the way. Fog made rescue operations difficult. But small boats from the harbor department of the resort

town of Newport Beach arrived and began to shuttle the dead and injured to shore, five miles away. A Marine helicopter flew others to a hospital ship 20 miles away at the Long Beach Naval Station. The crash produced quiet heroism but no panic. Coxswain Alex Amavica, 28, of Yuma, Ariz., was in the Collett's bow boson's locker when the ships slammed together. Stunned and shaken, he was in a section twisted completely back. But he walked out unharmed and later ferried two doctors in a motor whaleboat to the drifting Ammen. When he returned to his ship, Amavica sat quietly on a pile of rope and said, "I've got a headache." Why did the ships collide? Both captains said they had their radar turned on. The Ammen's skipper said he had been tracking the Collett for 20 minutes before the crash. They refused to go into details of the speed of their ships or their maneuvers, pending an official Navy inquiry.

## ON THE SHELF

**HAITI: Black Peasants and Voodoo.** By Alfred Metraux. Universe Books. \$8.50.

The three million peasants who exist in the valleys and on the mountain slopes of Haiti are not types for tourist posters. They're picturesque, but their poverty and misery are too appalling.

Alfred Metraux wasn't a tourist. He was sent to the island republic to study rural life, and while doing so he was won over by the charm and friendliness of these destitute people. His book reflects his genuine affection, but its scholarly yet highly readable prose is never marred by condescending paternalism nor maudlin apologies.

The Haitian peasants Metraux writes about stand on their own feet as they try to wrest a living from rocky slopes and impoverished soil. Their day to day struggle for survival, their lighter moments, their common law marriages and polygamy practice, their superstitions and religion come alive for the most casual reader.

The illustrations, mostly photographs by Pierre Verger, are remarkable for capturing the spirit of the people with superb technical artistry. Numerous (and probably rare) snapshots of pagan rituals point up the author's concern with voodoo. His intelligent understanding of the peasants' religion, which mixes Catholic practices with long-standing pagan rites, doesn't use the customary sensational treatment to make it dramatic. It does not need it. It's pretty heady in its own right.

According to the author, voodoo worshippers see no problem in their dual allegiance. They identify their gods' called loa, with Catholic saints (cheap prints are easy to get and are decorative in themselves).

**SET THIS HOUSE ON FIRE.** By William Styron. Random House. \$3.95.

An hour out of Naples by car up a steep grade, the little town of Sambuco plays host to an American film company, and to Mason, a wealthy American, and his mistress Rosemarie; Peter Leverett, Mason's visitor and Styron's absorbing spokesman; Cass Kinsolving, a beginning artist, and his wife Polly; and a servant girl, Francesca, from a hilltop peasant hotel. These are setting and cast for the long and eagerly awaited second novel from the author of "Lie Down in Darkness."

Every bit of the wait was worth it. After several years in Europe, Peter on his way back to the States is invited by Mason, a long acquaintance, to stop off in Sambuco, and as the reunion with Mason sets this story off on its stormy route of rape and murder, a reunion some years later with Cass occasions the telling. Since Peter is to sail from Naples, he drives down early from Rome, and on the way runs into, or is run into by, an Italian on a scooter. The accident ruins the two-wheeler, nearly ruins Peter's car, knocks the Italian unconscious, and gives Peter his first glimpse of Cass's two small children and their mother, Polly, who is one of the few unstrained, normal humans in this novel overflowing with the eccentricities and wild fancies of romantic character.

The villain is Mason—unless villain and hero too appear in one and the same troubled artist. As a teen-ager, when Peter first knew him in school, Mason had been an unregenerate youngster with a father who'd made a fortune in films, a beautiful hard-drinking mother, and a rampaging yen for girls married or single, his or somebody else's, but girls. He found plenty of them in the South, where Peter met him, but Europe was an even happier hunting ground, and Sambuco was next to Paradise. If she's an Italian, she will not be able to resist him or his money, he's convinced.

This insufferable superiority alienates Peter and Cass, and the particular incident which brings the whole story to a gripping climax is his insane manhandling of Francesca, and the still insaner behavior pinned on him afterward. This is a story of cause and effect, of ill doing and compensation, guilt and retribution; and Cass and his conscience are Styron's theme embodied in a dramatic set-to. Some random but relevant reactions will stir you: We are no further along than the ancient Greeks, for instance, or again, our trouble is that as a nation we have not suffered enough. But the core of the story is the examination of evil.

Cass alone is a fascinating character, but he has stiff competition. He lacks the raw soul of the Italians, and unlike his friends does not shoot off sparks; the final sessions with him last perhaps longer than necessary, and don't quite sustain the phenomenal qualities in the first half, or two-thirds, of this novel. There, explosions of hatred, passion and grief mount dizzily to climaxes hard to match anywhere in contemporary American fiction. The squabbles and clashes ring starkly true, there is a turbulence in some scenes as sweeping as if they had written themselves—though Styron sweat out every word. Over it all presides a fine discernment, with a wit that is tart, bawdy or sardonic.

**THIS DAY IN TEXAS**

The U. S. Army candidates inducted at Fort Des Moines on this day in 1942 were ushering in a new era in American military history.

They would qualify as "officers," but never as "gentlemen" by Act of Congress. They were the first contingent of WAAC officer candidates, 440 of them, and they received their commissions in August of that year. In Sept., 1943 the women's corps was accepted as a permanent division of the Army.

Commanding the first units of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps was Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston, who was commissioned a colonel in 1942. After her WAAC tour of duty Mrs. Hobby returned to Houston and her peacetime role as a newspaper publisher (except for a term as a Cabinet member).

Other branches of the service followed the Army's example and began recruiting volunteers. During World War II more than 8,000 Texans joined the WAC (as it was shortly called), and some 4,000 young Texas women enlisted in the Women Accepted for Voluntary Emergency Service, the WAVES.

Texans also rendered fine service to the SPARS and the Marine Corps auxiliary.

## Texas Flood Victims Face Cleanup Job

Families forced from their homes by a cloudburst in the South Central Texas town of Calvert returned to their damp and muddy homes Wednesday to begin cleaning operations.

More than six inches of rain fell on the town of 2,500 within an hour Tuesday forcing 20 families to flee. The water from two overflowing creeks also closed State Highway 6 and two farm roads for several hours.

Calvert police Wednesday reported the water had receded and all highways were open.

A 4.50 inch downpour hit Ringgold in Northwest Texas Tuesday knocking out telephone service in some homes. But the rains were a boon to firemen battling a blaze in a big storage tank 3 1/2 miles north of the city near the Red River.

Heavy rains also fell 11 miles southwest of Breckenridge in West Central Texas. A farm in the area got 2.60 inches of rain within an hour. In the same general area Ballinger measured 1.32 inches, Putnam got 1.10 and Eastland .90 inches.

Early Wednesday widely scattered thundershower activity was reported in portions of South Central Texas.

Official rainfall totals reported to the Weather Bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 p.m. Tuesday included Beaumont .94 inches, Victoria .82, Longview and Waco .54; Lufkin .41, Harlingen .28, Abilene .23, Sherman .21, Laredo .20, Cotulla .16, Corpus Christi and Galveston .15, Boeville and Junction .10, Brownsville .07, and Kingsville and San Angelo .05.

Torrential rains fell 7 1/2 miles northwest of Cory City in Karnes County after a tornado funnel was sighted by Otto Rudolph. The twister did not touch ground.

Falls City, south of San Antonio, reported a 4-inch rain.

Temperatures early Wednesday ranged from a high of 80 at Galveston to a low of 60 at Dalhart.

The five-day forecast issued Wednesday calls for generally heavy rains and scattered thundershowers in Eastern and Central Texas and moderate rainfall in scattered thundershowers in Western Texas. Temperatures are expected to be 2 to 4 degrees below normal in Western Texas, and about normal in extreme South Texas and near the coast and 2 to 4 degrees below normal in other portions of Eastern and Central Texas.

## Red Protests

LONDON (AP)—Twenty-five banner-waving British Communists picketed the U.S. Embassy last Tuesday night and handed in messages protesting American reconnaissance flights over and around the Soviet Union. A Communist party spokesman said seven more Red deputations will stage separate demonstrations at the embassy in the next week.

## Sinatra, Parking Worker In Row

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The city attorney's office says it will decide today if any charges will be filed against Frank Sinatra as the aftermath of a row with a parking lot attendant.

Sinatra denied at a hearing Tuesday that he had pushed Edward E. Moran, 21, at a Hollywood night club last May 14. Moran told a previous hearing

held by the city attorney that Sinatra shoved him then called on an acquaintance, John Hopkins, for help.

Hopkins, Moran said, hit him five or six times with his fists. Sinatra said he had stepped off a curbing when a car driven by another attendant "screached to a stop six inches from me."

"I was shaken," the singer related, "and I started to berate the driver when Moran came up. He came towards me and I put up my hands to keep him away, but I didn't shove him."
