

### Auto Fire Truck Arrives And Is Ready for Use

Modern Fire-Fighting Apparatus Arrived and Is Ready for Chemical Usage.

The city's new fire truck arrived from Dallas Sunday, and is now ready for use in fighting fires within the city limits of Dimmitt.

The truck is equipped with 1,000 feet of hose, and a complete chemical plant, which feature can now be used to advantage in most emergencies. This equipment does not use the old-fashioned chemicals, which damaged practically every thing with which it came in contact. Common soda is used, and according to Mayor Brownlee, this storage department will be kept filled at all times, and until our water system is completed, it will be used in fighting all conflagrations.

C. B. Nabors, of the Kemp-Cone Chevrolet Company, has been instructed in the handling of the apparatus, and has been selected as driver temporarily. The car will be kept at this company's place until the city builds a garage for it.

**To Organize Volunteers**  
 Immediately upon the completion of the water system, now under construction, the company from whom the truck was purchased, will send a representative here to organize and drill a volunteer fire department.

**Siren to be Installed**  
 An electrically driven siren has been received, and will be installed at some high and prominent point in the business section. It will probably be operated from the central exchange of the West Texas Telephone Co., arrangements, however, have not been made for this, according to the mayor.

**Truck Tested**  
 The truck was taken out on the Charlie Mapes farm just west of town Tuesday, and with several city officials and citizens, a test was made, which proved entirely satisfactory to them.

Until the local water system is procured, the city is assured, according to a representative of the company making the truck, of ample protection with the chemical attachment.

**Strictly Modern**  
 The machine is modern in every respect, and is operated by its own power by the simple lifting of a lever connecting the pump to the engine.

### Plan System of Sidewalks for All Sections

Representative Here This Week For Purpose of Constructing In Dimmitt.

A contractor was here this week, and after meeting with several of the city officials on Tuesday night, left, but will return in a few days for the purpose of contracting with the city and property owners for a system of sidewalks in Dimmitt.

It is the intention of the city to have walks constructed to connect up all churches, both schools, the depot, and all main residential sections.

The company will, it is understood by the News, employ local contractors for the work, and they have a financing system whereby property owners, as well as the city, may pay the cost in monthly installments.

Walks in the residential sections will be four feet wide, with parking spaces of two feet on the inside, to the property line, and four feet between the outside of the walk to the curb line. In the business section the walks will be six or eight feet wide, extending to the property line.

The city will spend in the neighborhood of \$2,000 on street crossings, if the plan is carried out as now anticipated.

### Fifty Miles Rural Phone Lines Is Now Assured

Bethel and Flagg Communities Will Soon Have First Class Service From Dimmitt.

Thru the efforts of a committee appointed by the chamber of commerce several weeks ago, several communities of the County have been given the opportunity of procuring first-class telephone service. Bethel and Flagg having already accepted the offer of assistance from the County civic body.

At a meeting held Tuesday night of this week, in the Flagg school house, and attended by T. A. Singer, chairman of the committee, W. G. Baxter and Clarence O. Byrnes, members, and George C. Smith, and at which much interest was manifested by the twenty or more citizens of Flagg, Bethel and Big Square communities.

The Dimmitt committee has been authorized to assist in the purchase of wire for the main, or trunk lines, of which there is to be four, running directly from this exchange into Bethel, Flagg Big Square and a section south of Bethel. The main lines will be constructed with No. 12, first class wire, on 16-foot cedar poles and the farmers of all sections traversed will "tap" on at their own expense. They have been assured of first-class service by Mr. Singer, of the West Texas Telephone Co., at a very nominal monthly rate.

The Big Square patrons will probably render its decision to enter this arrangement on next Tuesday night, when the committee from Dimmitt will meet with them at the old school house for the purpose of going into the matter thoroly.

The construction of these lines which will begin just as soon as material can be placed on the ground, and will give the section approximately fifty miles of first-class telephone lines, with a service to about forty farmers, at present, with the prospect of adding fifteen or twenty more, within a few months.

Much credit is due the Dimmitt committee, and Messrs. J. G. Davis, J. C. Williams, and Arch Johnson for the progress made thus far on this proposition.

Other sections of the County, in need of this service, will be given the same opportunity, according to Mr. Singer, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee.

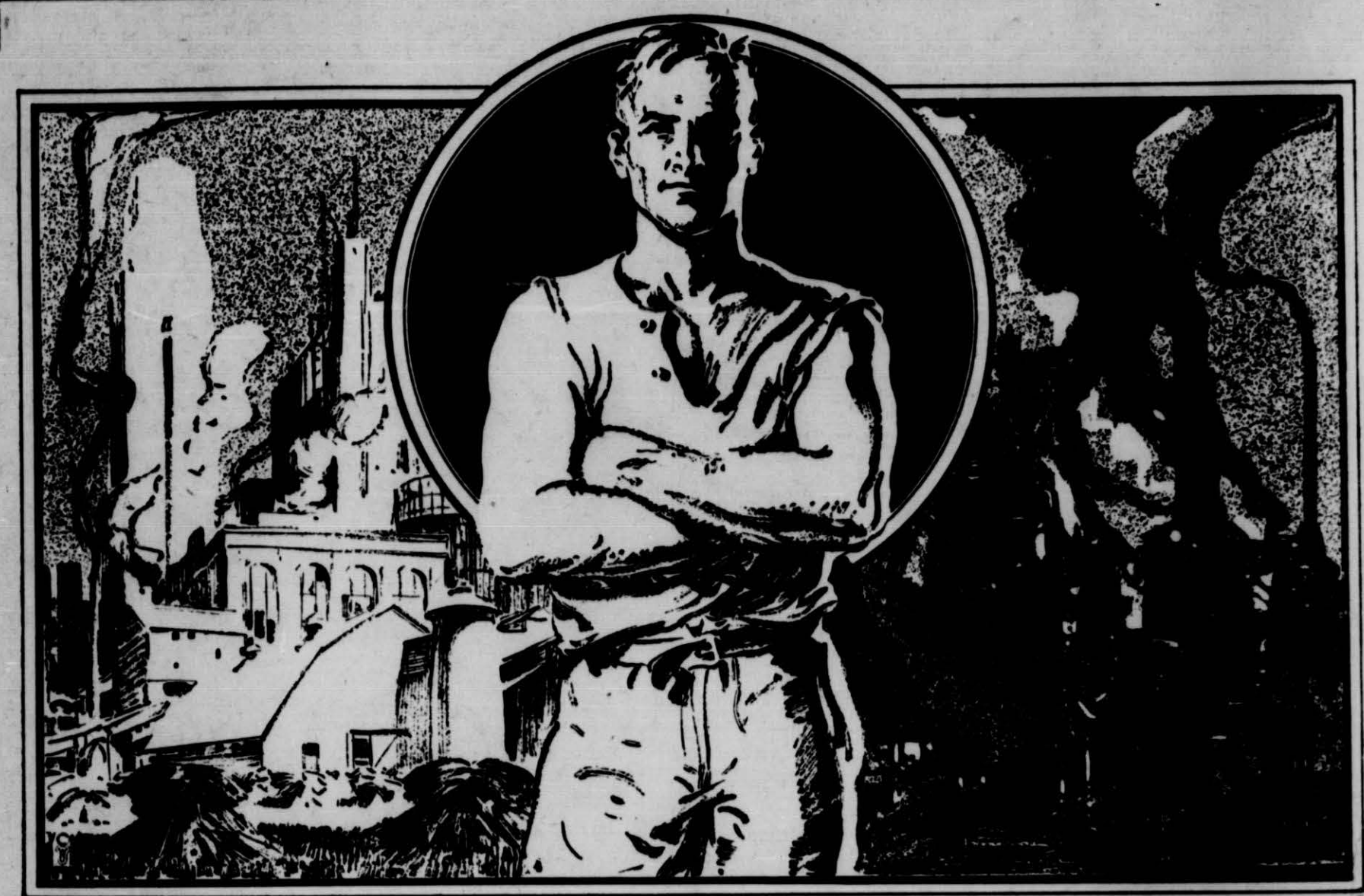

They were glad to see us, and from their conversation, we learned that they held a very friendly feeling toward Dimmitt and the county of which we are the seat.

Driving back, we stopped at the home of Charlie Jones, who during the last harvest made and marketed over 15,000 bushels of wheat from his section of land, purchased six years ago. Entering the front yard, the absence of old, worn-out farm machinery and junk was conspicuous. To our left we noted a new large sedan, of an expensive make. On either side leading to the house was one of the prettiest small plots of grass we have ever seen, city or country—well cared for and beautiful to look upon. Meeting Mr. Jones, who is a young man, we were pleased with his personality. Before leaving we were taken thru a beautiful flower garden, presented with a bouquet of flowers of every imaginable color, and on into a garden of which any person would be proud. Large, red strawberries, watermelons, tomatoes, peanuts, and many other varieties of vegetables, meant that this home knew the intricacies of the modern can opener. Bordering the garden were numbers of matured fruit trees, well cared for and beautiful to look upon. The writer cannot vouch for the sweetness of the watermelon we were presented with, for our adventurous companion of the Castro Grain Elevator took it home with him. Mr. Jones is a native of Hale County, and says he will be a visitor to our fair this week, for he is deeply interested in the products of Castro County. And well he should be, for he is one of the leaders in the agricultural work of the county.

Our next stop was the large, two-story home of D. C. Axtell, a native of Kansas, and another successful farmer, as attested by the beautiful Bermuda lawn, well-kept yards and home. Mr. Axtell, like Mr. Jones, is a farmer of the soil, and is known in his community as well as surrounding communities as a leader in all progressive movement and things for the good of the people of his neighborhood. Mr. Axtell ventured the message to telephone service from Dimmitt, and he was assured by his carrier that not only would all other sections of the county be served, but he would be serviced with this essential service at a late date.

Driving back thru Flores, we noticed the beautiful home, in the building of Ernest Jones, brother of Charlie, and a leader in all community life of Flores, a community really coming to the front, and which voted just a week ago for the construction of a modern brick school building. This new home, when completed, would be a credit to any large town, and will be worth viewing by every citizen of Castro County. We hope to have the pleasure of meeting the builder of this home, and of becoming acquainted with him, as well as every other builder and worker in Castro County.

**Our Community Festival Week**

Dimmitt's first Community Festival Week is history. But it is, in the opinion of The News, history not to be forgotten by those who were interested and who attended the series of excellent lectures given by Capt. C. S. Nubbaum, Community Specialist, under whose supervision the program was conducted.

Capt. Nubbaum has a way of getting the interest of his listeners, of holding same, and of convincing them of the wonderful opportunities presented in community work. Contrary to the belief of many, he did not use the platform for a place to tell us how to build a community. He did not act as mentor to a group who were striving to build a town for posterity and one of which they could feel proud. These were many right here in Dimmitt who were too busy to attend these lectures. There were many who were not interested, too. And then there were some who didn't care. These three, we believe, can all be placed in the same class, and to this group The News merely wishes to state that they missed, in our opinion and that of many others who attended regularly last week, a treat which, if they could be made to realize, was costly to them.

Had even fifty per cent of the people of Dimmitt and Castro County attended these lectures, the benefits would have been incalculable. But it is not the county, this city, nor any community, who is the loser. It is the people who failed to attend! Those who took advantage of the opportunity of bettering their knowledge of community work are ready now to start anew the work of building around us a closer relationship between the citizens of all communities of Castro County, and it will be the goal of the few to set up a standard in Castro County which every man, woman and child will be proud.

Those who failed to take part in the Festival last week are invited again to assist in the work which this program has inspired to a greater degree.

**A Community Sales Day**

Last Saturday Dimmitt had its First Community Sales Day, in connection with the Festival Week, sponsored and financed by the Chamber of Commerce of Castro County. To The News it seems that this day was, in a measure, a success. Reports from the merchants who participated, and every aggressive firm in town did, show that the majority of those who attended were really interested in the goods on display. At the suggestion of Capt. C. S. Nubbaum, who was with us last week, this plan was inaugurated, and it has been suggested that it be a regular monthly event. That is an excellent suggestion, and we are assured of the assistance of the Chamber of Commerce.

As we understood that our first day of this kind would not be as good as others to follow, we must take it before the people of the county continually to make them see the good, and the purpose, of the day. The News believes our first day was a success, and we would like to see one each month hereafter.

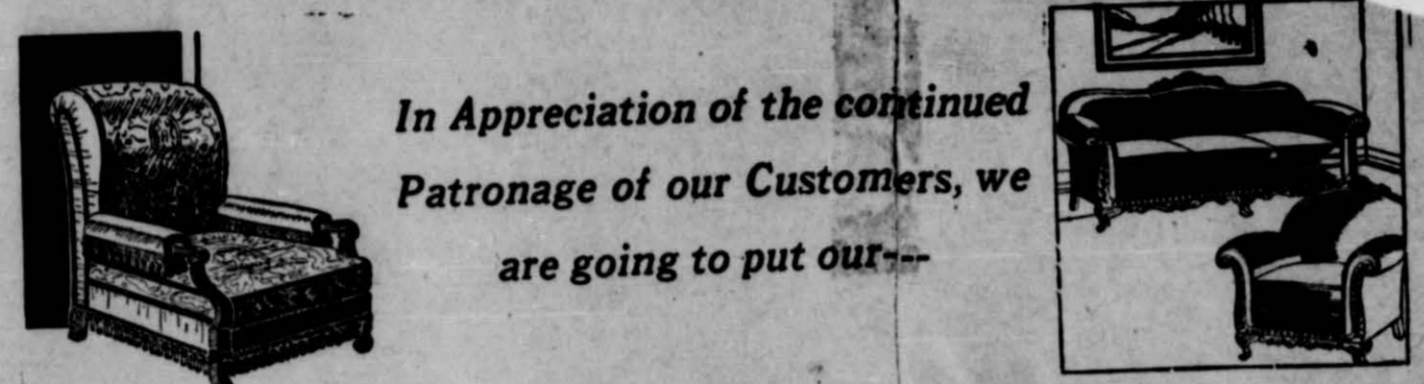

**Report of Grand Jury In Term Of District Court Just Closed**

Do the Honorable Chas. Clements, Judge of District Court, October Term, Castro County, Texas, -930: We the Grand Jury for the above term of Court hereby render our final report.

I. We find the condition of our county unusually good as regards law abiding and law enforcement. We have found that law violations are for the most part few and of a minor nature, and we call upon all good citizens to continue lending their aid to our officers, because as the country settles up, law violation will be much more frequent and of a more serious character, unless the good citizens remain steadfast in their determination to keep Castro County a law abiding County.

II. We wish to thank and commend the District Attorney for his unceasing labors with us, and wish to commend the County Attorney and Sheriff for their work in taking care of misdemeanor violations of the law by complaints, thus saving the county the expense of grand jury investigation in many misdemeanors.

III. We find that the court house is in as good condition structurally as its age, and foundation will warrant, and wish especially to commend the janitor for his painstaking care of the building.

IV. We wish to caution our citizens against a number of thoughtless violations of the law, such as firing a gun across a public road and hunting at night. These matters, though seeming minor, could and often do result in serious consequences, since travel along the highways is increasing rapidly in our section of the State.

V. We entreat a parents to cooperate with our excellent schools in teaching their children good government to the end that such children may grow up to be law abiding citizens.

**Twenty-Four Votes Cast Against and 150 For Issue**

By the very decisive vote of over two to one, and a heavy vote polled for the district, the Dimmitt Independent School District bond election carried last Saturday.

This means that \$35,000 in bonds will be issued, for the purpose of building a Physical education unit to the new high school building, and it is expected that it will be started next spring and completed in time for use during the 1931-32 session of school.

**Vote Was Heavy**

The vote Saturday was unusually heavy, and was much larger than anticipated by school officials and other proponents of the measure.

There was a total of 24 votes against and 150 for the issue, according to unofficial count.

**DIMMITT'S FIRST POULTRY SHOW DECEMBER 5-6**

Aggies of Dimmitt High Will Sponsor and Promote Poultry Show Here.

Under the sponsorship of the Dimmitt F. F. A.'s., of the Dimmitt High School Vocational Agricultural Class, plans are rapidly moving forward for the first poultry show ever held in Dimmitt, according to T. V. Weaver, head of the vocational agriculture department of the local high school.

To Be Held In December

December 5 and 6 have been set for the show, which will be held in the old auditorium building, just east of the grammar school building. Those in charge say that the show is expected to create much interest as well as be worth much from an educational standpoint.

To Stimulate Interest

The F. F. A.'s. say that the plan to have a poultry show grew out of a realization that too little interest is taken in the industry in Castro county. They express themselves as feeling that the show will teach persons visiting it, something that will be of value to poultry raisers; and will make those present better able to select a bird that will lay and that is in line with the requirements of the American standard of perfection. It is hoped that the show will be made an annual affair in the county after this first exhibition.

Public Interest Urged

Every person who can possibly do so is urged to bring his birds and enter them in the show. Mr. Weaver says along this line, "Of course some will claim their birds are not good enough to enter in a poultry show, but they are. We should not wait until everybody else gets a standard bred poultry to begin a show."

The class is especially anxious for the public to take an active interest in the show, which will determine largely its success and the future of an annual show along the same lines.

Mr. Weaver stresses that "Everyone is cordially invited to attend this show and see what the other fellow is doing."

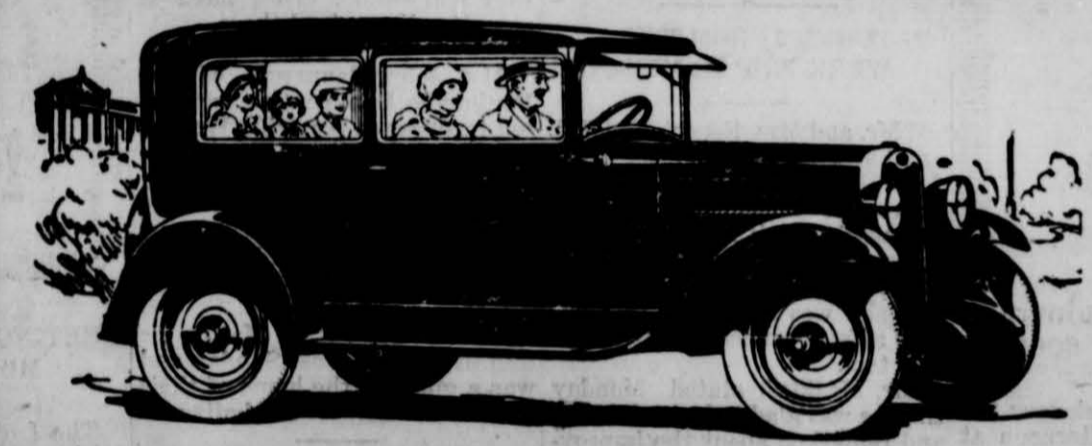
