Jury Wheel Yields First Panel For Term Of Court

The increase in Big Spring's population has made it necessary for the local courts to adopt a new system of selecting their juries. Under the law, a city containing a population of at least eighteen thousand must select juries by the use of a jury wheel.

A jury wheel was provided in late July, made to specifications by Manuel Puga, Article 2095 of Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes listed these specifications: "Said wheel shall be constructed of any durable material and shall be so constructed as to freely revolve on its axle; . . . and shall be kept locked at all times; . . . by the use of two separate locks, so arranged that the key to one will not open the other lock; and said wheel, and the clasps thereto attached into which the locks shall be fitted, shall be so arranged that the wheel cannot be opened unless both of said locks are unlocked at the time the wheel is opened."

SEPARATED KEYS
The keys to the locks, the Statute stated, are to be separated between the district clerk and the sheriff. And adhering to this law, the keys were given to District Clerk Wade Choate and Sheriff Miller Harris at the time the wheel was delivered.

Further in accordance with the

law, six typists were hired to type the names of some 14,000 citizens eligible for jury duty in the district and county courts as listed on the tax lists in the tax assessor's office for the current year. The names were chosen by the tax collector, the sheriff, the county clerk and the district clerk, or their deputies.

The cards were completed last week and Monday they were placed in the wheel by the district clerk, tax assessor, county clerk and sheriff. On Thursday the first jury panels were drawn from the wheel.

Four panels consisting of 90 people were drawn, one for each week of the September court session. Again local officials followed the wording of the law to the letter. The law states that:

FOLLOWED LAW

"Not less than ten days prior to the first day of a term of court, the district clerk . . . and the sheriff . . . in the presence and under the direction of the district judge, if the jurors are to be drawn for the district court, . . . shall draw from the wheel containing the names of the jurors, after the same has been well turned so that the cards therein are thoroughly mixed, one by one the names of a specified number of jurors . . . for each week of the term of the

district or county courts for which a jury may be required, and shall record such names as they are drawn upon as many separate sheets of paper as there are weeks for such term for which jurors may be required. At such drawing, no person other than those above named shall be permitted to be present."

The drawing was held Aug. 11; the first day of the court session will be Aug. 22, thus making it 11 days prior to the first day of the court term. Present at the secret drawing were Choate, Fern Cox, deputy sheriff, and Ralph Caton, district judge.

DIFFERENCES

One of the major differences between the wheel system and the system formerly used, is that a person may be called to serve on a jury more than once a year. In the former system, whereby jury panels were chosen by a jury commission from the tax rolls, people were called only once during a year, and after they were called their names were checked off.

Under the stated law for the jury wheel system, the names of jurors who serve less than four days are put back into the wheel and may be drawn again at another session. Names of people who serve four or more days are placed

in a box and cannot be drawn again in that year. The names of people who are called on the panel, but not placed on the jury, are also put back into the wheel.

"This may cause some confusion," says Choate, "but that's what the law says we must do."

The jury wheel will be used again in the latter part of September when panels consisting of 50 names will be drawn for the county court session in October. When not in use, the wheel is kept locked in the district clerk's office.

Vocational Training Offered In 2 Courses

Louis Maneely and George Rice, Industrial Cooperative Trainers and Distributive Education instructors at the high school, have been busy the last few weeks placing students enrolled in the programs in jobs and signing up new applicants.

The ICT program provides juniors and seniors, 16 years of age or older, with the opportunity to receive training in skilled occupations. At present Maneely has 34 applications for such training.

Both the DE and ICT programs attempt to provide the opportunity for students to learn trades or occupations, and both instructors stress that this is not just part-time work. Students enrolling in either of the programs should have a preference for a certain type of work, with the idea in mind that they may be training for their life's work.

Students taking the programs should get their schedules worked out before school starts due to the fact that they have to take regular high school academic courses in the mornings in order to have the afternoons free for work. Two credits are given for both programs.

Your Child Will Attend School In Your District

Where your child will go to school this year depends largely on where you live. Generally, well-defined boundaries specify this out, but in a few instances there are exceptions.

South to U.S. 27 (Lagness highway), Airport Elementary School: Beginning on the north at the T&P railroad and Mesquite, then southwest to Hillcrest and Lakeview, south on Hillcrest to West 3rd, then east on 3rd to Mesquite, then south to 4th on a line with Mesquite, then southeast to the corner of the city limits on line with 11th Pl., then south to FM 700. Pupils from this line west will attend Airport school.

East boundary line is U.S. 27 and the south line is the T&P railroad. All 5th and 6th grade pupils from this area attend Bauer or Lakeview.

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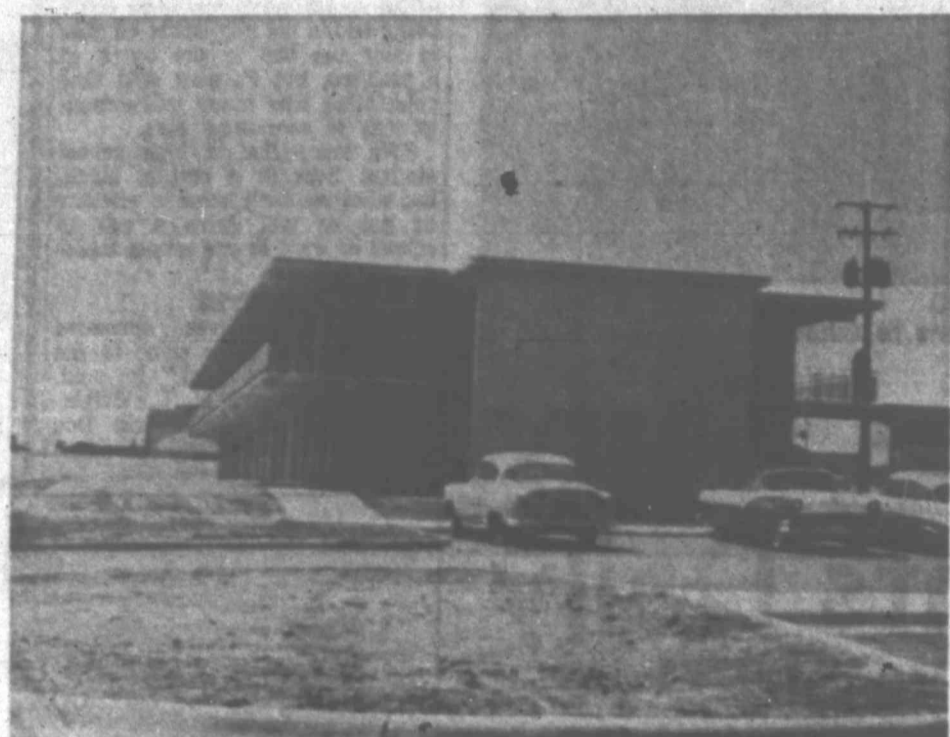

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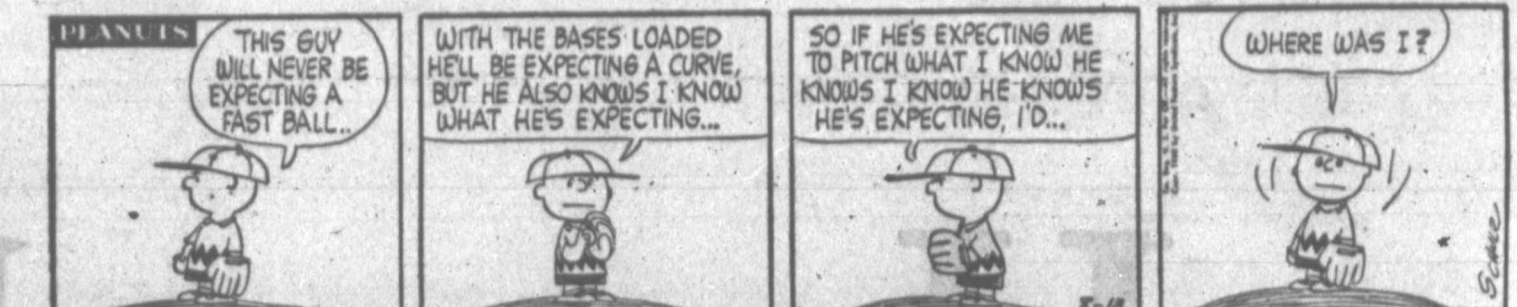
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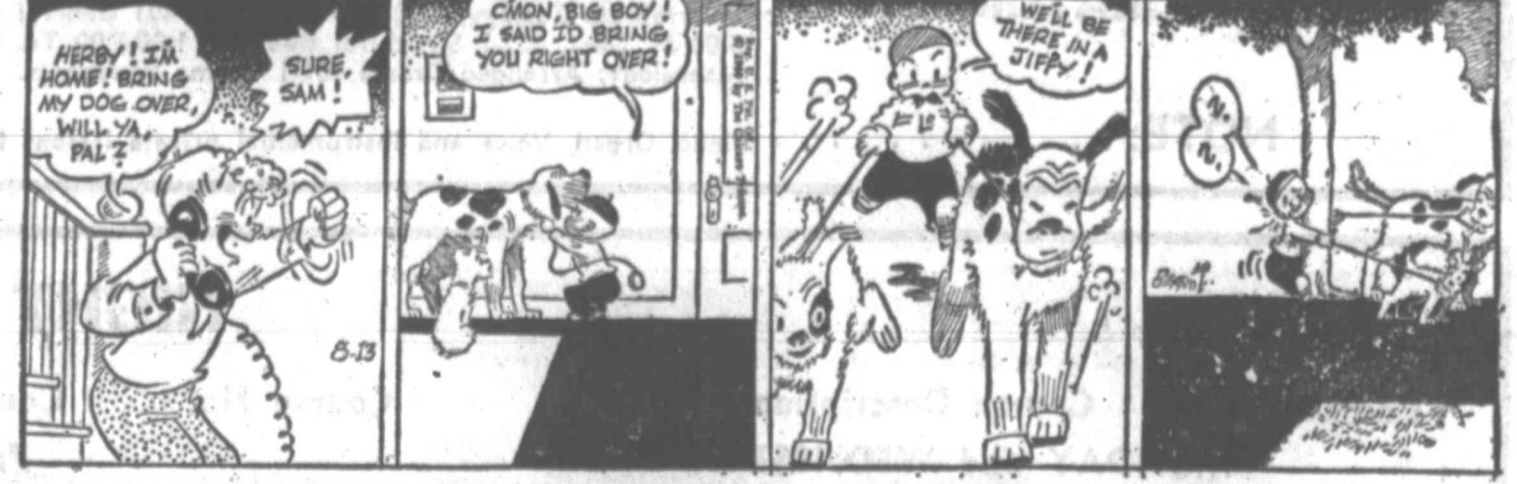
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
