



Consequently the final settlement of the nomination was thrust back into the lap of the state convention, which met in Dallas on August 14.

At least one account states that Campbell was the victor through the inadvertent efforts of Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey. In an eloquent speech in support of M. M. Brooks of Greenville, the Senator recited the story of the siege of Lucknow. As he reached the stirring climax, "The Campbells Are Coming," the convention took up the chant and forthwith gave the nomination to Campbell.







Time Now For The 'Great Debate'

WASHINGTON - There's a lot of talk about a "great debate" between Kennedy and Nixon. It's supposed to take place when Congress repeals a provision of law which requires radio and television stations to give "equal time" to all candidates for a public office, irrespective of the size of the "political party" they claim to represent or of the new interest in what they have to say.

But what has Congress got to do with it? The Constitution says Congress "shall make no law abridging the freedom of the press." The so-called "equal time" provisions are as invalid today as if the Congress had passed a law telling newspapers what kind of headlines they may put over their news articles.

"WHY, INDEED, does anybody wait for Congress to act before the "great debate" can take place? Why do the press associations and the newspapers wait? The candidates say they are ready and that they will not speak from notes but will go at the controversial questions in a wholly

impromptu manner. Why, therefore, shouldn't the Associated Press and the United Press International, which serve newspapers publishing more than 58,000,000 copies a day, take the initiative and arrange for the debate? There's no law that says the debate can be car-fied on only by television or radio.

THERE IS, moreover, today a remarkable electronic invention, called, "video tape," which permits television cameras to record any scene, along with sound, on a magnetic tape. Such recordings can not only be televisied but can be duplicated on other tapes which also can be used over and over again on as many television stations as desire it.

A suitable studio is available in the Capitol building here-paid for by the taxpayers-which is used every day for television or radio interviews with members of Congress. While these can of course, be exhibited immediately after being recorded, the conversations often are taped several days in advance and are sometimes shown to the public a week or more later

SO IT WOULD be easy for the Associated Press and the United Press International to invite Messrs, Nixon and Kennedy to a joint debate on perhaps one topic a week throughout the campaign, and furnish the video tape to the television stations, individually or as networks, to use as they please just as would the newspapers. The newspapers could easily print a sequence of snapshots from the film recording showing the facial expressions and gestures of the candidates that would be of interest to the people. Such publication has the advantage, too, of permitting those citizens who work in the evenings and can't see television to pick up their favorite newspaper and read the "great debate"

whenever it is convenient to do so. But there is no reason why the whole thing couldn't be released simultaneously for public reading, television viewing and listening by radio, Lots of new material is given out for publication in print or over the air at a fixed time in the day.

IF THE AMERICAN people are really panting to hear or read the "great dehate" between Nixon and Kennedy, there is no good reason for waiting on a dallying Congress to enact superflous legislation de signed to spare the television and radio stations some embarrassing controversies with would-be candidates for President on tickets of minor parties.

It would also furnish the television and broadcasting companies a good opportunity to fight in the courts the unconstitutional laws that seek to control the freedom of the press. The truth is radio and television are just as much a part of the "press" as are books, magazines, press associations and newspapers, and they are entitled to present as much or as little of the "great debate" as they think the public wants. So Now Everything Is Settled

It is no news that reporters fascinate each other. Once they start talking shop, the only way to get them to disperse is to turn out the lights and close the bar. At a shop-talk session at the Overseas Press Club the other evening, those of us who had attended both the Democratic and Republican national political conventions were asked to stand up and testify, diagnose and criticize the antics and to answer questions of the membership.

DEMOCRATS AND Republicans were equally represented on the panel, which included E. Wilfred May, executive editor of the Commercial and Financial Chronicle; Sam Zelman of the Columbia Broadeasting System, Columnist Bob Considine and Victor Lasky, political writer.

The panel, despite the divergence of individual political views, saw eye-to-eye on a number of points, not the least of which were:

1, No matter which party wins in November, none of us is going to flee the United States and head for Tahiti, the Riviera or Majorca. We share conviction that life will not only be endurable but good, and certainly no more ulcerous, under the administration of John F. Kennedy than that of Richard M. Nixon. (In fairness to May, he will stick around, but he's going to be might itchy if it's Kennedy.)

2. WE BELIEVE both parties picked men who are brilliant, politically skillful, tough, rough and able to handle the big,

tough, rough problems ahead. 3. Age-schmage! We don't find Nixon too old or Kennedy too young. In fact, we like the idea of youthful vim, vigor and vitality in there whaling the daylights out of any given situation.

4. We believe that the political situation in the United States tends more and more to develop into a one-party system; that it is difficult to tell the players without. a score card, and that the party platforms have much more in common than reverse. We are pretty generally agreed that the difference between the two parties is not so much in their aims, but in how each hopes to achieve those goals.

5. THAT THE professional politicians of both parties chose the man they felt most likely to succeed in November, with the consequence that charges of rigging, fixing and in-the-bagging at both conventions fail to stand up. 6. That money is no handicap for a

candidate seeking the nomination, that politics is an expensive game, that the rich man seeking the party nod has the edge and that this is no scandal but a tough political nut for each party and the country to examine carefully in an effort to equalize the disparity between rich and poor candidates. And that a rich little boy has as much right to grow up to be President as a poor one, but that the latter shouldn't be handicapped.

8. THAT IF MONEY is no handicap, neither is a standing start from an office such as the Vice-Presidency.

9. That an American Presidential election simply cannot be bought. Nobody, repeat nobody, has that much money, or the electorate that little integrity.

10. That television has not ruined political conventions, but quite the reverse: Conventions have ruined teevee. Zelman came to the forum with a suit of chain mail under his gray flannel, the better to protect himself from the slings and arrows of newspapermen. He found, instead, sympathy for teevee's problem with politicians of both parties who would do anything, repeat anything, for two minutes on a network program.

11. And, finally, that hell surely hath no surprises for a newsman who has covered a political convention in Los Angeles.

Nobody Worries About The Other Fellow

THE-HAGUE - Viewed from Europe, Mr. Eisenhower's impending retirement from public office is far more epochal than it looks from home. There was never one quite like Ike to

Europeans. He held the center of a military stage where great commanders before him have strutted - but there was no strut in him. In the conquering of huge armies, and the liberation of millions. Ike was never more than affable, earnest, successful. No man alive was more beloved when World War II ended.

FIVE YEARS after V-E Day, General Eisenhower was back, this time to establish NATO as a buffer against Russia. As in the first instance, he accomplished more by personality and good-will than by any outstanding brilliance of mind or spirit. His average ability kept him close to people. Then, last spring, the President came again to Paris as the nominal leader of the West. This time he was outmatched by Khrushchev and outshone by De Gaulle. There was no turning against Eisenhower as a fallen hero or idol. He can be loved at all stages of his career.

But the Eisenhower era is passing, and with it the American leadership of West Europe. This may not be such a bad thing. It may be time, or past time, that Europe should fully function on its own.

THE FADING of American forcefulness is seen in Europe's efforts to unify it self. For some days now I have been traipsing around with Agriculture Secretary Benson who is missioning (a) for a European integration and (b) for a European trade policy - both of them related lo Eisenhower policies.

Mr. Benson is well liked and well received, but he is not getting anywhere with these people. That is because these people have problems and situations which are not clearly visible from America. Today a Dutch newspaperman bitterly regaled some of us with tales of German atrocities in Rotterdam during World War II. The massacres, reprisals, assassinations, rapes, murders and iron rule by the Nazis may be forgotten, he said, by the "politicians" -but German tourists are not welcome here. A documentary motion picture, "Mein Kampf," has been prepared and released in West Europe by producers in Sweden, a neutral country.- The film, writes the deadpan London Times correspondent in Bonn, raises a great many questions for this new (West German) republic, and they are not all answerable."

IN THIS ATMOSPHERE, and amid these emotions, the Americans influence is neither very pertinent nor very powerful. Starved Con s Cut Down In Gun Battle

JENNER, Calif. (AP)—A ragged and half-starved prison fugitive died in a gunfight with sheriff's deputies Sunday a few hours after he had invaded a home and held seven persons hostage two hours while he wolfed stew and potatoes. George F. Winn, 33, who fled

the prison ranch just outside San Quentin Aug. 2, charged into the Larry von Arx home Saturday night, brandishing a knife.
"Do what I say or I'll kill you—I've killed before," he snarled.

"He just rapped on the kitchen door and came on in" said you Arx, a lumber hauler, "He stuck this knife in my back and said he wanted something to eat, Told us he'd been living on water and a little raw fish for over a week. "The wife fed him what the boys would have had for supper, stew and potatoes. The boys missed

their supper because they were Fifteen minutes later, the two von Arx sons, Victor, 18, and Bill, 16, entered the house.

The captives were joined ten minutes later by friends David Nelson 11, his brother Leslie, 16,

and Don Lang, 15.
"The fellow told us he'd been in a lot of trouble for many years," von Arx said. "He told us he'd. got a couple of deputies and they didn't scare him none.

"He told us he'd been watching our house from the hills all day long. He knew one of my boys had been out hunting all day with the deer rifle and the other had gone shooting birds with a .22. "He said he picked on our house because he knew we had guns in-side. He grabbed that deer rifle and a box of my ammunition."

"He was going to take the Nol-son boys with him, but we talked him out of it. We told him he wasn't taking anybody with him but to take the car if he wanted

Winn ripped a telephone from the wall and fled north in the family car. He missed another phone in the house.

Von Arx called the Sonoma

County sheriff's office and an allpoints bulletin was issued.

Sheriff's deputies Erwin Carlstedt and Dick Huls of adjoining Mendocino County set up a road-block and flagged down an auto fitting the description of the von

The driver leaped out with a rifle and disappeared behind the

car.
Then he shouted, "T'm coming out," and fired two shots, both wild. The deputies fired nine times hitting Winn in the leg and head. He died an hour later.




