



# Castro Regime Takes Over Freeport Sulphur Co. Plant

HAVANA (AP)—The Castro regime has taken over the Freeport Sulphur Company's 75-million-dollar nickel and cobalt plant in Cuba. The American-owned plant has been idle since March, when the government put a heavy export tax on its output.

Announcement Sunday of government intervention of Freeport's Moa Bay Mining Co. heightened fears in private business circles concerning the fate of 75 million dollars worth of other American mining properties still under private management.

President Osvaldo Dorticos announced the intervention—which can mean anything from token supervision to outright control—but gave no reason. It was expected, however, the government eventually would say it had taken over the plant to protect workers' jobs, claiming the management had abandoned it.

In New York, the Freeport com-

pany said it would take all possible steps under Cuban and international law to protect its legal rights.

The action against the Moa Bay company came a week after a government decree nationalizing

more than 700 million dollars worth of other American-owned properties in Cuba.

Moa Bay is the largest privately owned mining enterprise in Cuba. Started in 1957, it was not fully completed last March when officials of the company said they could not continue operations because of a new 25 per cent tax on the gross value of the plant's product regardless of income.

Moa Bay employed about 3,200 workers—most of them Cubans. When finished it was to turn out 50 million pounds of nickel and almost 4½ million pounds of cobalt annually.

Chief among the other American-owned mining properties in the NiCaro nickel plant, which was built by the U.S. government. Representatives of the U.S. General Services Administration and the Castro regime are still discussing sale of the plant to Cuba.

Other American investments still untouched by the Cuban government include an estimated 150 million dollars worth of insurance, pharmaceutical, rubber, and aluminum companies, and about 50 million dollars in banks and airlines.

## Father Named In Murder-Suicide

FORT WORTH (AP)—A father of two children Sunday night shot his ex-wife to death and then fired one bullet into his head as his father and neighbors watched in horror.

Justice of the Peace Jim Boorman ruled the deaths of Stanley Couch, 34, and his 28-year-old ex-wife, murder and suicide.

Mrs. Couch, hit by three .44 caliber slugs from a foreign-made pistol, died in a gutter in front of her ex-in-laws home.

## Dallas Firm Claims First Moon Talk

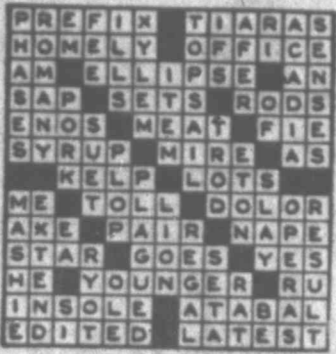

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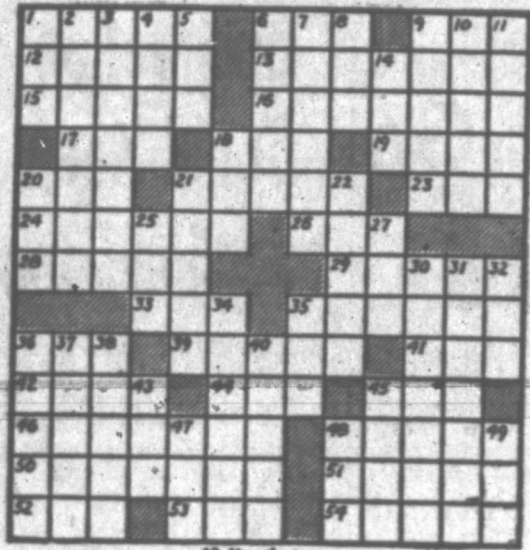

## Old Cuspidor Ends Up As Modernistic Decoration

WASHINGTON (AP)—Where, oh where, are those big brassy cuspидors that used to decorate the lobbies of post offices all over the country?

Well, you may be surprised. But if you look around, you will find many of them in the recreation rooms of "people who have everything" on garden terraces, in handsome clubs, in honored spots among the modernistic office furnishings of some of the brass in the Post Office Department.

Once pretty unsightly, the cuspидors are now immaculately polished, sterilized, austere — and quite retired from their original purpose.

In short, the old brass post office spittoon has become something of a collector's item.

Many now in private use—pardon, private display—repose on round rubber mats like the ones which once theoretically protected surrounding floor space in the post office lobbies. They frequently hold growing green things, large floral sprays or umbrellas.

Their owners regard them as real conversation pieces.

The old-fashioned brass cuspидor made its appearance as standard equipment in post offices before the turn of the century, principally as a convenience for tobacco chewers.

The spittoons came in a variety of shapes and sizes, bell-shaped, funnel-shaped, and the bowl-like executive type which had a removable enamel container inside.

They survived for decades as a necessary nuisance. But the maintenance problem eventually doomed them—coupled with the fact that brass, once cheap, became dear.

Post Office officials say the cleaning chore, frequently handled on outside contract, just became impossible during the manpower shortages before World War II. During the war, the department ordered them banished everywhere, for good.

A leading auction house here reports the old brass containers go fast, but are increasingly hard to come by.

## THIS DAY IN TEXAS

The man who won the Democratic nomination for governor on this day in 1906 had never held a public office in Texas, but as a friend and protégé of Jim Hogg he had won considerable confidence in political circles.

He was Thomas M. Campbell and he was a candidate for the nomination in the first primary election held in this state. Campbell and Railroad Commissioner O. B. Colquitt were the two high men in the primary, but neither received a majority. At that time no provision had been made for a run-off. Consequently the final settlement of the nomination was thrust back into the lap of the state convention, which met in Dallas on August 14.

At least one account states that Campbell was the victor through the inadvertent efforts of Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey. In an eloquent speech in support of M. M. Brooks of Greenville, the Senator recited the story of the siege of Lucknow. As he reached the stirring climax, "The Campbells Are Coming," the convention took up the chant and forthwith gave the nomination to Campbell.

Campbell was the second native-born Texan to hold the office of governor.

NEW YORK (AP)—Author Alan Paton of the Union of South Africa has won the 1960 Freedom Award.

Paton, author of "Cry, the beloved Country" and "Too Late the Phalarope," will receive a plaque with this inscription: "Your words and deeds are mighty weapons in the struggle for the rights of man."

Dr. Harry J. Carrman, chairman of the Freedom House board of directors, said Sunday Paton was the unanimous choice for the award.

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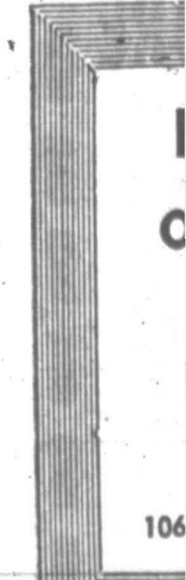

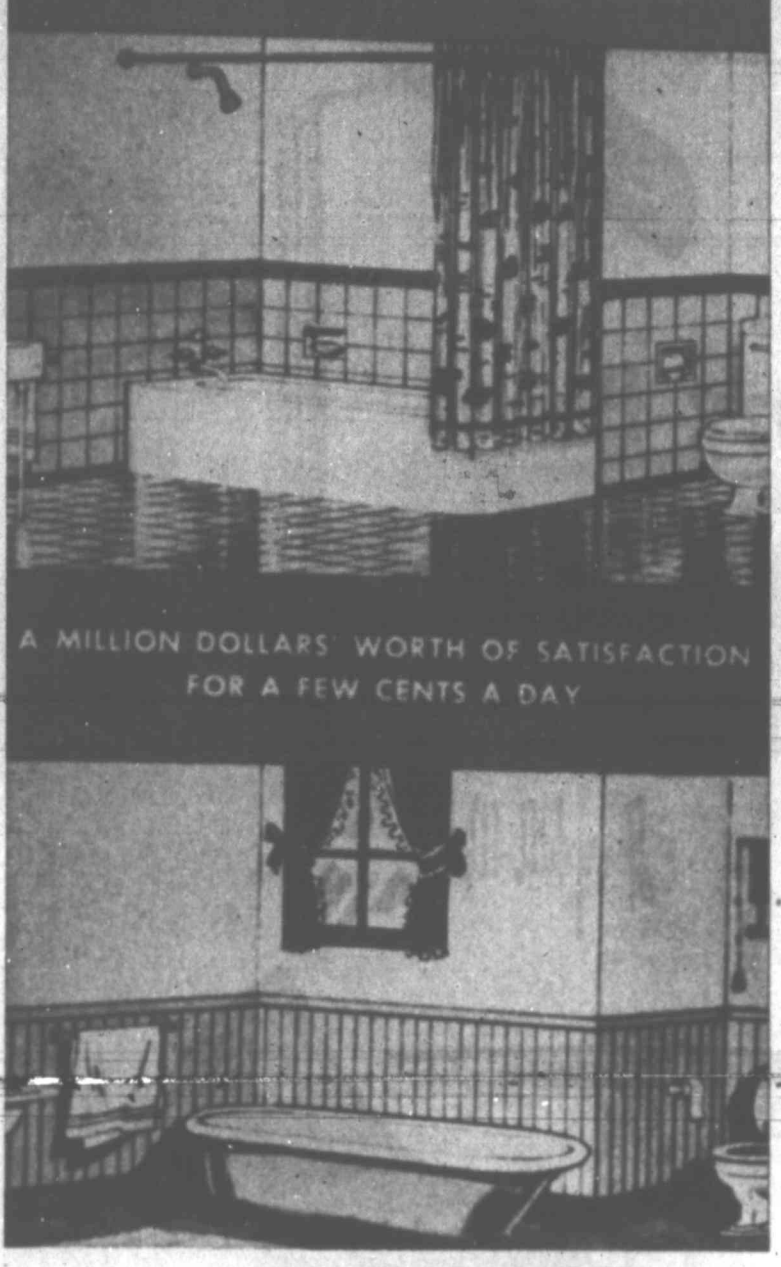

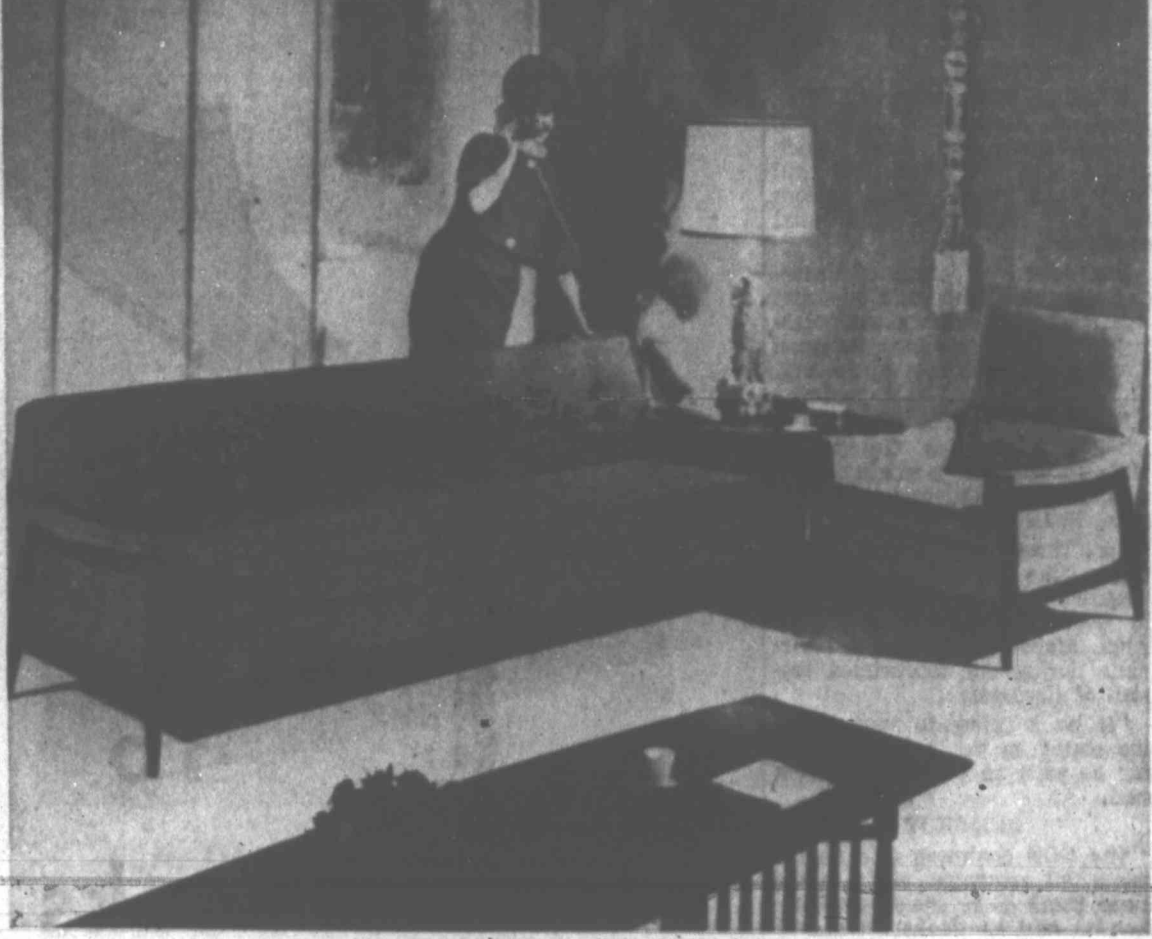

Mrs. Anna Shannon, who lives on the Sterling City Route, is the next up for the Desert Sands. Her paintings, most of which have won ribbons, will hang there for a month beginning Aug. 13. One major painting not available for the local hanging is "Oil in the Rough." That particular work is now on tour with the Texas Fine Arts Association exhibit which visits major Texas cities during the year. Another not available is "Pony and His Barn," which marks the first painting Mrs. Shannon has sold—a rarity for most West Texas amateurs. And she's been painting for only two years.

Mrs. Shannon was inspired to take up the palette when a daughter's painting took second place in a statewide exhibit. She took some lessons, but for the most part was self-taught. She has executed some 200 works altogether, and has exhibited and won ribbons in shows all over the state.

Mrs. Shannon's most prized painting is "Oil in the Rough," apparently for more than just artistic reasons. She tells me: "This picture was painted of an oil field scene with Signal Mountain in the background...the oil field has been my inspiration for many pictures. As well as revealing the rugged terrain it reveals the courage and moral stamina and strength of those pioneers in the old fields who mastered this hard life...there was no place too difficult for the oil workers to attempt...thus, the name of the picture, 'Oil in the Rough.'"

There will be a total of 32 paintings offered for the Sands exhibit.

**BERENSON.** By Sylvia Sprigge. Houghton Mifflin. \$5.  
**THE PASSIONATE SIGHTSEER:** Bernard Berenson. By Raymond Mortimer, from Bernard Berenson's diaries 1947 to 1956. Simon & Schuster. \$10.  
Aged 94, Berenson died last October in his famous villa, "I Tatti," near Florence. He was born in 1865 in the Pale of Settlement, all-Jewish land visited by pogroms whenever the all-powerful czar willed it; and his family, losing its property there, came to America and Boston in 1875. The father was a peddler;

a couple of times he spared his children embarrassment — and they appreciated it — by sneaking out the back door of a home they entered through the front door as guests. The boy read insatiably, and always remembered his indebtedness to the Boston Public Library. He turned Episcopalian — he would later become Catholic, his wife said — and he was married by priests as well as a city clerk in Florence. He entered Harvard in a class in which no Jew was registered. In 1888 he first set foot in Italy, and rarely returned to this country.

Some professors seem to have financed his trip. Mrs. Isabella Stewart Gardner of Boston's famed Fenway Court took an interest in him; and within a couple of years he bought for her, on commission, a good two dozen indisputable art masterpieces.

His mentors were Walter Pater, for pure sensuousness, and Giovanni Morelli and Giovanni Batista Cavalcaselle as masters of what we call expertise. Three quarters of a century ago Europe was full of paintings which their owners claimed were by top artists though most were by nonentities. It was before X-ray, infra-red and chemical analysis; to identify a master hand an authority had to know it intimately. By the most exacting and detailed research, by "tactile values" and "space composition," by painstaking comparison, Berenson became the man who served not only Mrs. Gardner's acquisitive career but also, for three decades, the dealer Lord Duveen until, as Miss Sprigge reminds us, nobody would think of buying picture within Berenson's competence without his authentication. In his early years he got bounced from an English manor for challenging an owner's claim for a painting. In 1895 he took to pieces the catalog of a London show of "Venetian art," saying that out of 33 so-called Titians, only one was authentic, allowing one of the few "Carpaccio" ruling out a "Mantegna" and a "Moroni" and dismissing a portrait identified as of a lady professor from Bologna, by Giorgione. The most spectacular decisions handed down from his eminence were for Duveen on "La Belle Ferroniere," owned in Kansas City, which he said was not by Leonardo, and against Duveen on our National Gallery's "Nativity," now labeled prudently Giorgione with maybe Titian touches.

His peddler father's children did very well. Besides Bernard, whose villa, land, pictures and library were left to Harvard, one daughter taught at Smith, one married philosophy professor Ralph Barton Perry. Bernard himself married Mary Smith; her sister Alys was Bertrand Russell's first wife; Mary left two children largely to her mother's care and deserted their father and her husband to spend some 10 years in and near Florence where Berenson was before their marriage, and the two had extra-marital affairs later. Both stayed bravely in Italy during the two wars, and in the second suffered danger and hardships.

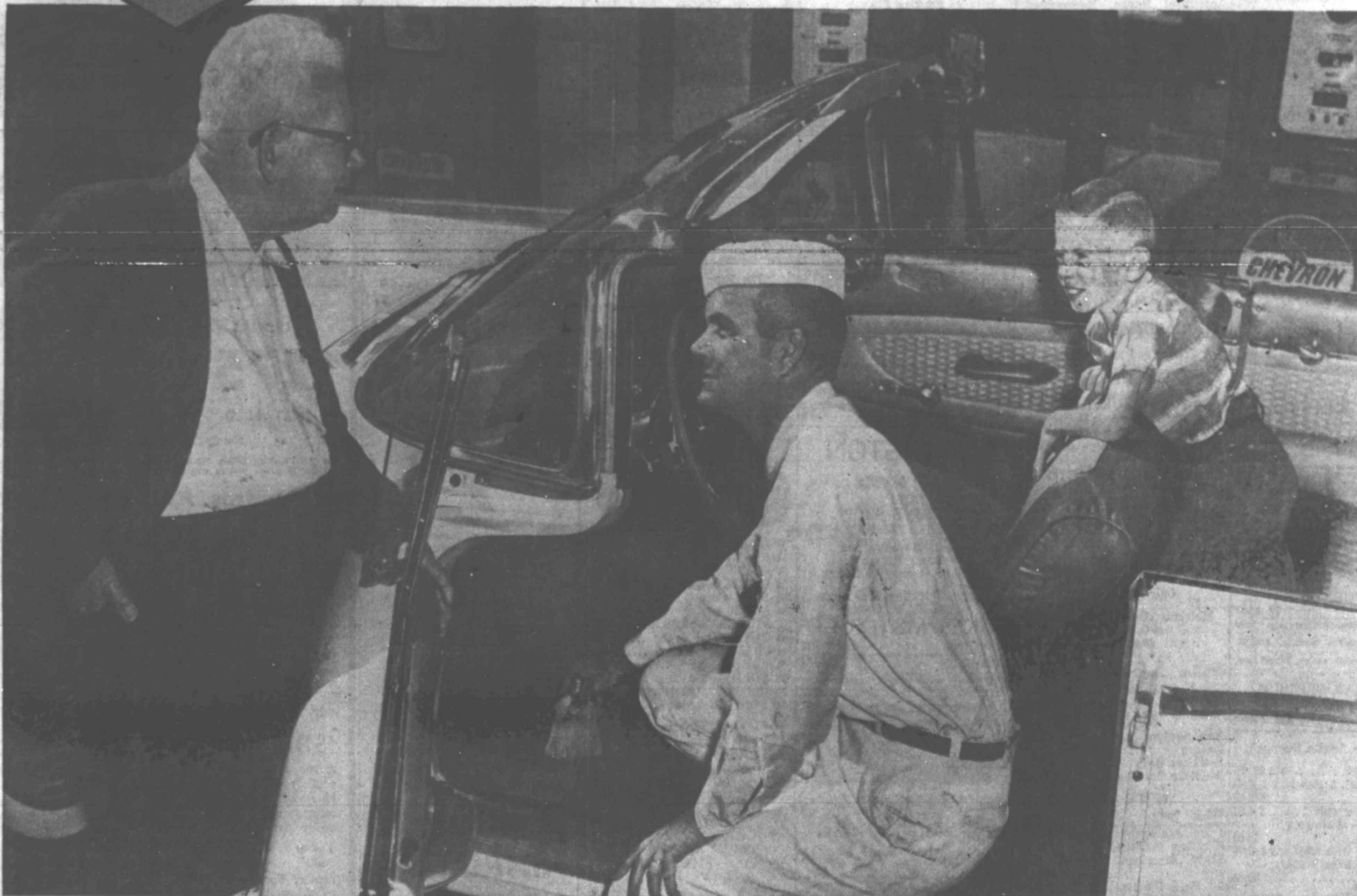
The diaries show a man hostile to some of the "progress" we boast of; he hates Rome's sprawling new suburbs, and new buildings around the approaches to Florence's Ponte Vecchio; and he's savagely critical of traffic whose "needs are the greatest enemies to the beauty of Italy's most famous towns" — as they are on the American scene, too. Though he was sociable, he liked to be alone with the object of his study — painting, ruin, vista, even the moon to which he bowed every night he glimpsed it.

A great scholar, marvelously sensitive, he is a key figure in the art activity of our time, and we sometimes unfairly forget the sensuous enjoyments of his rich years as we pay undue attention to his association with Duveen. But he missed some delights, too; he thought this was a period of artistic decadence, he didn't like modern art or modern writers like Joyce. It's a point of view which I suspect Miss Sprigge abets unnecessarily.

The Big Spring Texas Employment Commission office will observe the date by taking about 50 new job applications, placing workers on some 75 jobs and taking about 35 initial claims for unemployment insurance in addition to counseling other workers, according to Leon M. Kinney, manager of the office.

**DEPRESSION**

Unemployment insurance was created during the depression days of 1935 to safeguard the American economy, Kinney explained.

As to its effect in this area, Kinney pointed out that \$192,461.10 has been paid workers in Howard, Martin, Glasscock and Sterling counties in the 12 month period ending July, 25.

These payments have enabled jobless workers to pay their own bills, thus the payments helped not only the workers, but also the merchants.

"In these counties there are 323 employers and 6,590 employees covered by the insurance," Kinney said.

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
