Wider Engine Selection In Dodge Dart Line For 1961

The Dodge Dart, an automotive newcomer last fall, goes into its second year with 1960 models that have completely new styling, many engineering improvements and a wider selection of engines.

The Dart is on display at Jones Motor Co., 101 Gregg.

The '61 Dart, freshly styled on the outside, is also new on the inside. The interior of the car features new nylon and rayon fabrics, a distinctive instrument panel, a new door trim design, color-keyed steering wheels, and new contemporary color combinations.

The 118-inch wheelbase Dart will again be available in three series—the lowest-price Seneca, the Pioneer, and the deluxe Phoenix. Twenty-nine sedan, hardtop, station wagon, convertible and fleet models will be offered.

A choice of six different engines will be offered to Dodge Dart buyers in 1961. All standard six- and eight-cylinder engines perform efficiently and economically on regular grades of gasoline.

The Economy Slant Six, an advanced-design six-cylinder engine which was introduced last year, will again be available on all new Dart models. This engine, inclined at an angle of 30-degrees, has 145 horsepower and a displacement of 225 cubic inches. Its compression ratio has been reduced to increase its performance while using even the lowest grades of gasoline.

The standard eight-cylinder engine on the new Dart is a 230-horsepower, 318-cubic-inch V-8 which also provides adequate power for every driving need on regular gasoline. This standard engine has a two-barrel carburetor. A 260-horsepower V-8, with four-barrel carburetor, is optional on all models.

Three high-performance V-8 engines are also offered: the 265-horsepower D-500, a 325-horsepower Police Special; and a 330-horsepower V-8 with special ram induction manifold.

There is a choice in transmissions, too. The Dart offers a three-speed automatic which was designed to match the output of the V-8 engines, and a Torqueflite six three-speed automatic transmission for the Slant Six engine. There is a two-speed automatic Powerflite transmission for use with the standard V-8. A new manual transmission is standard on the 361 and 383-cubic-inch engines.

World Financial Leaders Focus On U.S. Situation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Financial leaders from more than 60 free world countries today focused their attention on the uncertain business situation in the United States.

Delegates to the annual meetings of the International Monetary Fund awaited a major policy address by Secretary of the Treasury Robert B. Anderson. The secretary was to discuss both the business outlook and the continuing problem faced by the United States in its financial dealings with the rest of the world.

Anderson is known to believe that the current mixed trends in the economy represent a "rolling readjustment" to greater price stability and increased foreign competition. He does not believe that the nation is headed into a recession, although some economists say one is already under way.

As for the continuing deficit in this country's transactions with other nations, Anderson again looks at the bright side.

He was prepared to emphasize that the deficit currently is running at the rate of no more than \$3 billion a year, compared with the 1959 total of \$3.8 billion. While heartened by the improvement, Anderson was willing to restate the American government's determination to reduce the deficit still further.

On domestic economic matters, Anderson's views closely parallel those of Per Jacobsson, the Swedish economist who is managing director of the International Monetary Fund. Jacobsson told a weekend news conference he expects the U.S. economy to remain relatively stable at high levels while, in his view, the nation is "learning to live without inflation." He said he sees an adjustment period in which there is neither boom nor bust.

The major development at Tues-

day's sessions was a pledge by West Germany to increase its assistance to the underdeveloped countries.

Ludwig Erhard, West Germany's minister of economics, said his country has completed its postwar reconstruction and now can "undertake in larger measure to cooperate energetically in the extensive work of development aid."

6 Samurai Swords Returned

TOKYO (AP)—Six Japanese Samurai swords of high artistic value were returned to their Japanese owners today 15 years after they were taken to the United States by occupation personnel.

Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, World War II Navy commander in the Pacific, was one of five Americans who returned the souvenirs. One of the two he sent back had been wrought out of a gun on the battleship Mikasa, flagship of the Japanese fleet that defeated the Russian Baltic fleet in waters near Japan in 1904.

Junzo Sato, official of the Japan Sword Association, said Americans had responded warmly to his appeal for return of swords of historic or artistic value. He estimated nearly half a million swords are still in the United States.

2-Nation School

BERLIN (AP)—West Berlin authorities have approved the city's first German-American school for the children of West Berliners and members of American forces here. Classes in the elementary school begins Oct. 1 with both German and English being used.

N.Y. Crowd Cheers Ike

NEW YORK (AP)—Crowds of one million cheering, waving New Yorkers gave President Eisenhower one of his greatest ovations when he departed for Washington after a round of talks with various world leaders.

The President stood in his open limousine and acknowledged the

cheers and applause Tuesday by waving his arms and giving the victory sign.

His smile was broad as he received the plaudits from the crowds standing six and seven deep on some streets. Police said many had waited hours to get a glimpse of the President.

A blizzard of confetti and shredded telephone books nearly engulfed his car at several points as the motorcade rolled slowly from the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel to his plane at Newark Airport in New Jersey.

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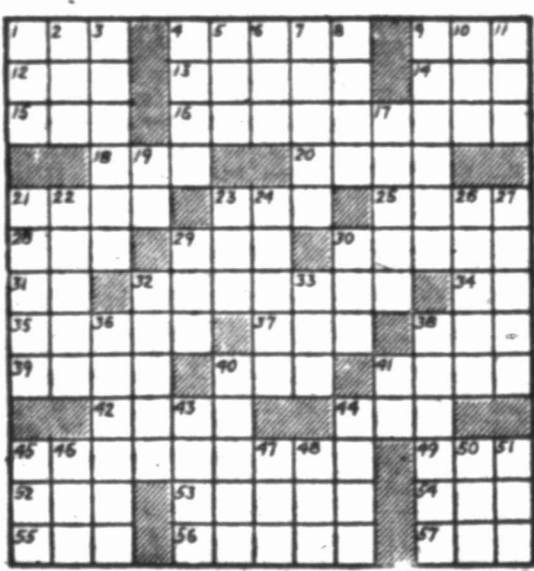

Judges Name Pt. Arthur Man

HOUSTON (AP)—Lamar Lawson of Port Arthur Tuesday was elected president of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas.

Lawson is a commissioner of Jefferson County. He was secretary-treasurer of the group this past year.

A brief business session ended the convention today.

The group chose San Antonio as the site of the 1961 convention.

and I agree," the bouncy Khrushchev told his first host of the evening, Uruguayan U. N. delegate Eduardo Victor Haedo, who initially broached the scheme.

The Uruguayan referred to the Roman Catholic Church's method of picking its Pope. The cardinals are locked inside the Vatican for their deliberations. Not until white smoke pours from the chimney of their stove does the outside world know they have agreed on a new Pope.

After Khrushchev retold the story with gusto at a Czechoslovak reception, a newsman suggested the Kremlin chief under this method might find himself rooming with Eisenhower for quite a spell.

"If they lock you in, what can you do?" Khrushchev replied.

And, Khrushchev added, he is prepared to wait the smoke signal from the Indian peace pipe a New Yorker gave him last week.

Prospects of an Eisenhower-Khrushchev get-together actually

seemed more remote than ever. Khrushchev, blaming Eisenhower for the collapse of their 1959 Camp David harmony, made plain he would not move first for another meeting. Eisenhower left town determined not to see Khrushchev until the Soviet leader changes his tune.

Khrushchev did assure newsmen that if the United Nations isn't revamped to his liking, "We won't start a war—sleep in peace."

He professed ignorance and indifference as to whether his plan to split the U. N. machinery into three veto-wielding blocs would win out in a U. N. vote. Predictions are it won't.

On disarmament, he said: "If you accept my formulation on disarmament I will accept any formulation you make on controls."

Khrushchev joked chin-to-chin with a press of reporters for much of the evening in seeming unconcern over his latest U. N. setback, the decision not to consider now admitting Red China to the world body.

Although he has protested that the American press has tried to portray him as a drunkard, he bypassed his usual orange juice in favor of champagne at the Uruguayan reception.

With the Czechs he took to beer. He just couldn't refuse this product of his hosts, he explained.

Then he warmed up for his third social engagement of the evening, a dinner served by India's Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, by eating two large pieces of knock-wurst.

Kennedy Wages 2-State Drive

ERIE, Pa. (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy wages his presidential campaign in crucial Pennsylvania and New York today, inspired by huge crowds showing increased fervor since his debate with Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Kennedy, the Democratic nominee, arranged to address two party rallies here during the morning in a fresh bid for the Keystone State's 32 electoral votes. Then he goes after New York's 45, juiciest plum of all, with speeches at North Tonawanda, Niagara Falls, Lockport and Rochester.

Kennedy arrived in Erie late Tuesday night after a day-long tour of northern Ohio communities where he was greeted with wild enthusiasm—as he was here—by great crowds all along the way. His staff called it the biggest turnout for Kennedy in any one day since his nomination.

NO STRETCHING
"If I were to say this (turnout) was between 600,000 and 700,000 people, I would not be exaggerating," Ohio's Democratic Gov. Michael V. DiSalle told Kennedy's final Ohio audience at Canton. If DiSalle's figure was somewhat higher than some other observers, he appeared to be not far enough off the mark to start any major controversy.

On the last motorcade leg of the Ohio tour—into Akron on to North Canton and then to Canton—J. Grant Keys, state highway safety director, estimated that 100,000 persons lined the route and cheered for him.

In Cleveland Tuesday morning the Democratic candidate got a rip-roaring welcome from an even larger crowd than greeted him when he made a major address there Sunday. Police had estimated the earlier crowd at up to about 300,000. DiSalle said he never had seen anything "like the depth of enthusiasm and sincerity" for Kennedy.

Frank J. Lausche, a Democrat-

ic maverick who publicly threw his support to Kennedy Tuesday, expressed the same view.

Evaluating the crowds, DiSalle told the Kennedy rally at Akron: "there is only one reason: last night the people of America found a leader for the nation who captured their imagination."

That was an allusion to Kennedy's nationwide television-radio debate Monday night with Nixon, his Republican rival. Kennedy aides gave him a report, based on a survey made by a national Arbitron rating system, that 73.5 million Americans watched the debate on TV.

Whatever the cause, Kennedy crowds in Ohio in the wake of the debate greeted him almost frenziedly at times.

In his rallies in Akron and Canton, there was pandemonium. The Akron armory, which seats about 3,200, was crammed with a great overflow crowd. There are seats for 5,630 in Canton Municipal Auditorium, but it was estimated about 7,500 were packed in there.

In all his speeches, Kennedy pounded away at the central theme of his campaign—that it is time for America to be moving ahead, and that it has not been moving under a Republican president at the pace it should.

"I don't think Khrushchev has had it so good as he has had it lately. He has been moving outward and he has done it by unrelenting efforts to demonstrate that his society represents the way to the future," Kennedy said.

There was thunderous applause when the Massachusetts senator added:

"I want to entertain him (Khrushchev) with a vision of a United States on the move. I am tired of reading every day what he says and what (Cuba's Prime Minister) Castro says. I want to begin to see the United States moving ahead."

Cuba To Release Murder Suspects

HAVANA (AP) — The Cuban government, after holding two Americans wanted on murder charges in the British Bahamas for five months, has finally agreed to their extradition.

The cabinet announced Tuesday night that Alvin Table Jr., 25, Torrance, Calif., and William Sees, 23, Etowah, Ark., would be sent to Nassau to face trial.

The men are accused of murdering Capt. Angus Boatwright, 55, of Key West, Fla., and pirating his fishing boat, Muriel III.

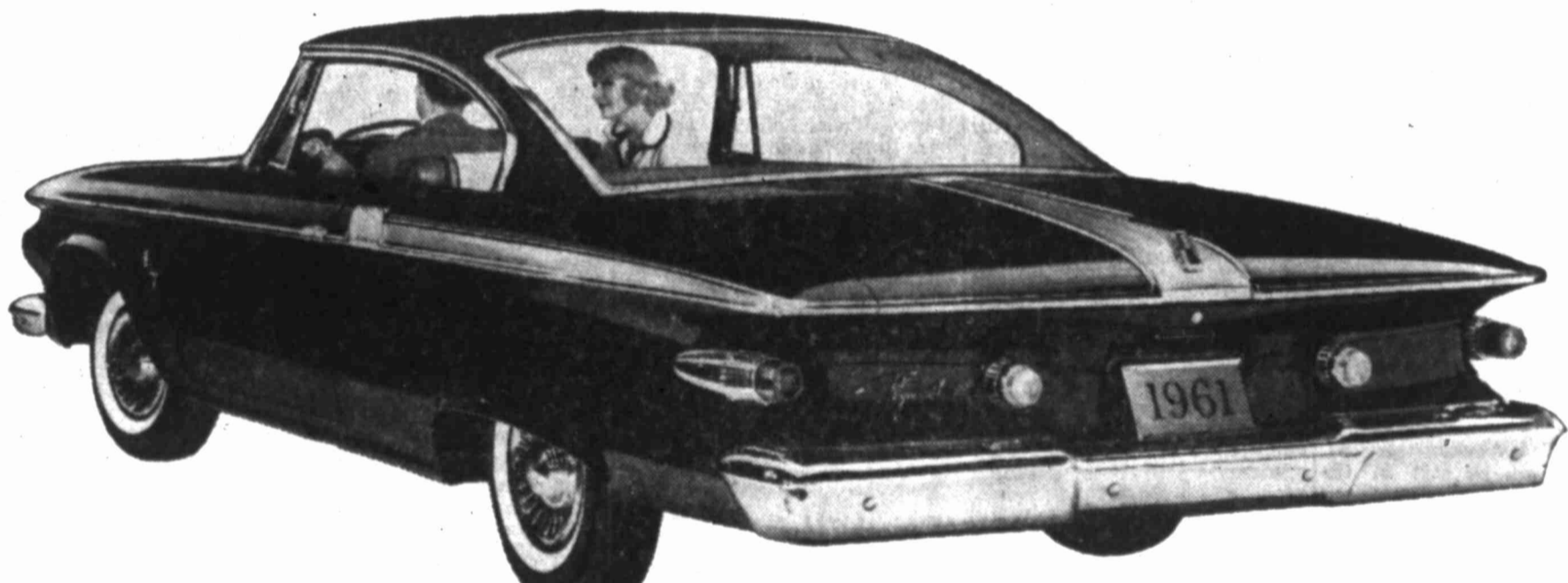
The pair and Table's wife, Barbara, 18, ran aground in a stolen boat on Elbow Key in the Bahamas last April. The Muriel's mate said that when Boatwright responded to their distress signal, "Sees swam out and shot the captain. Sees and Table then made off with the Muriel, leaving the yacht's mate and four passengers and Mrs. Table marooned on the island.

Cuban navy men captured Sees and Table on a small island 200 miles east of Havana on April 25. The U.S. Coast Guard rescued the five castaways.

Shivers Kicks Off Pro-Nixon Drive Tonight

DALLAS (AP)—Former Texas Gov. Allan Shivers, who backed President Eisenhower in 1952 and 1956, kicks off a "Democrats for Nixon" campaign here tonight.

He said that in his remarks tonight he will try to summarize some of his reasons for backing Vice President Richard M. Nixon and the reasons of some delegates to the recent State Democratic Convention in backing the Republican ticket.

In Austin, state headquarters of the Democratic ticket of Sen. John F. Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson said State Sen. Dorsey Hardman of San Angelo will make a television address challenging Shivers endorsement of the Republican candidates. Hardman's talk will be carried by an Austin television station prior to the time the Austin station carries Shivers' talk.

"Delegates were not given an opportunity to discuss the platforms (of the two parties)," Shivers said Tuesday. He also said that he had been told that many Texas Democrats will not support the Democratic platform or ticket in 1960.

In his two previous bolts from the Democratic party he led the "Democrats for Eisenhower" organization and is given much credit for swinging Texas to the Republicans.

Shivers, who spent 22 years in public office, served three terms as governor, leaving office in 1957 after deciding not to run for reelection.

The "Democrats for Nixon" organization is expected to be a separate one from the two Republican organizations in the state, "Texans for Nixon" and "Volunteers for Nixon."

Shivers' address will be at 6:30 p.m. in the Hotel Adolphus Roof Garden.

The speech, according to Shivers' office, will be carried later on 27 Texas television stations.

Negro To Present Case On Housing

DALLAS (AP)—Supporters of a Negro teacher allegedly fired last spring because she and her husband bought a house in an all-white residential area, hope to present her case to the Dallas school board tonight.

Supporters of Mrs. Sallie Fagan said they felt she "was treated unjustly and will continue to feel that way until they (the school board) can prove differently."

Mrs. M. A. Barnett said "We'll be wanting to know Wednesday what they propose to do."

School Supt. W. T. White said the case was not on tonight's agenda. But Mrs. Fagan's sup-

porters could ask to be heard at the meeting.

An official of the Dallas Independent School Board said that although the board was cordial when a petition was presented two weeks ago "the last thing it will stand for is pressure or demands."

The petition, signed by 165 persons was submitted Sept. 14 to the board. It said school trustees had used "unjust and unconstitutional" action in dismissing Mrs. Fagan and urged reconsideration of her case.

The former N. W. Harlee school teacher said she wasn't notified that her contract wouldn't be renewed in September until late May when she failed to receive a temporary contract for the 1960-61 season.

She said Dr. Ewell D. Walker, assistant superintendent in charge of personnel for the district, told her "The district couldn't use me because of the house incident."

She added, "He also suggested I seek employment outside the Dallas district if I still wanted to teach."

Nixon Is Getting Tough With Rival

By ERNEST B. VACCARO
NEW YORK (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon's increasingly tough and personal attacks on his Democratic rival added a more belligerent tone to the presidential campaign today.

Nixon, the GOP nominee, turned his attention to New York's 45 electoral votes with a series of speeches in this area after slugging at Sen. John F. Kennedy in Tennessee and West Virginia.

At Charleston, W. Va., Tuesday night, for instance, he accused Kennedy of having made a "false statement" that 17 million Americans go to bed hungry every night. Nixon called it "grist for the Communist propaganda mill" and demanded Kennedy retract it.

Nixon charged that responsibility for not getting action on a bill for the relief of the distressed areas of West Virginia and other

states "rests squarely on the Democratic presidential candidate."

That charge was made before a crowd in the Charleston armory that observers said exceeded a turnout for Kennedy eight days earlier.

Immediately afterwards, in an impromptu talk to others who overflowed into an adjoining building, Nixon repeated a previous claim that Kennedy's campaign promises would boost federal spending \$13 to \$18 billion a year.

"This \$13 to \$18 billion isn't Jack's money," Nixon said of his opponent, the son of a millionaire. "It's your money he is spending."

"I know what it means to meet a family budget at the end of the month," Nixon continued, "and what a tremendous effort it is for most folks to pay their taxes and meet their bills."

That is why, Nixon told them, he, Nixon, is not trying "to buy the people's votes with their own money."

Earlier, to a big and rain-soaked crowd on the Mississippi riverfront at Memphis, Tenn., also bigger than when Kennedy spoke there, Nixon voiced support of the GOP civil rights plank and said he talked the same about it in the South as in the North, East and West.

Dawson Commissioners Approve A Lower Budget

LAMESA (SC) — A decreased budget calling for total expenditures of \$395,919 for 1961 was approved by the Dawson County Commissioners' Court here Monday.

The new financial plan for next year is \$7,168 less than the estimate for the current year. Total expenditures, including a budget of \$333,562 for the hospital were listed at \$329,481.

Purchase of several pieces of heavy equipment, the erection of the fair barn and other sizeable costs, were included in this year's budget and were not required for 1961.

Offsetting some of the decrease, however, is planned paving projects in the amount of \$120,000 for the county in 1961. Precincts 3 and 4 have proposed \$40,000 in paving and Precincts 1 and 2 share the other \$40,000 earmarked for roads.

One item for \$115,000 that may be added as a capital improvement, a proposed library if the issue carries in the special election call for Oct. 8.

There are no tax hikes and only a \$600 raise for the county treasurer is provided in the budget. Total net outstanding bonds and time warrant debt was listed at \$709,000.

Approved budgeted expenditures were: jury fund, \$7,995; road and bridge fund, \$286,168; general fund, \$119,438; permanent improvement fund, \$2,928; officer's salary fund, \$90,080; interest and sinking fund, \$77,310.

The budget indicated an increase of county property values of \$337,830. County evaluation was listed at \$24,379,350 and state evaluation at \$20,509,580.

The Medical Arts Hospital budget included a payroll of \$180,000, operating expenses of \$137,500 and treasurer's commission, \$16,062 for next year. Fees of all county offices amounted to \$150,227.

Little Opposition At Paving Hearing; Proposal Approved

A public hearing concerning additional assessment paving drew only a small crowd Tuesday night and the city commission adopted an ordinance authorizing assessment on 33 blocks.

Audience response was largely in favor of the paving which will be a continuation of the current program. Only one resident expressed doubt concerning the value of paving in front of his property.

Edgar Ray, Western Hills Addn., asked why the paving was to stop at Western Hills, rather than extending farther south. Ray explained that he lives on Cactus Dr. and that as proposed, paving will take in his block but not those to the south.

It was explained that necessary right of way has not been secured farther south.

BIRDWELL

John Little, developing property at 4th and Birdwell, said he is in favor of paving all of Birdwell as outlined in the program, but said he is against leaving out the portion between 4th and 3rd.

City Manager A. K. Steinheimer, along with commissioner Paul Kasch, assured Little that all of Birdwell will be paved since it is in the assessment program. The portion between 4th and 3rd, may be delayed however, until the Highway Department lowers the 4th and Birdwell intersection.

W. S. Goodlett, 1802 Goliad, told commissioners he is ready for the paving on Goliad, as it will hold down dust.

ADDED STREET

The streets added to the initial 100-block program include 13th, Nolan to Goliad, one block; 13th, Settles to Dixie, one block; McEwen, part of street between Pioneer Hts. Addition and Stadium; 13th, Johnson to Nolan, one block; 13th, Lancaster to Gregg, one block.

And Settles, between 6th and Stanford Park Addition; Cactus, between Thorp and Western Hills Addition; Yucca, Cactus to Parkway; Parkway streets from Parkway to Wasson right of way; And Young, between 12th and 16th, four blocks; Locust, part of street from Wood to the alley; Goliad, between 13th and FM 700, 12 blocks; Birdwell, between 3rd and Purdue, four blocks.

The commission decided against adding a portion of Robin Street in the Mountain View Addition.

to the paving assessment program. The street is paved with the exception of three lots where owners did not volunteer under a private paving contract. Commissioners felt that paving of the unpaved portion is a matter to be worked out by the individuals.

LIEN RELEASED

A paving assessment lien against Grady B. McKee was released, and the commission accepted property at Settles and Lloyd to build a traffic island and realign Settles.

The property is owned by the Alcoholics Anonymous organization and has been offered to the city in return for assuming the paving assessment cost. Settles at that point is in the paving program.

The intersection will be straight-

ened and the re-design will correct a drainage problem. The intersection with its island control of traffic will be similar to that at 10th and State.

The commission decided to postpone action on the proposal from the Salvation Army to donate a block of property between 5th and 6th, east of San Antonio.

ASSUME ASSESSMENT

The paving assessment on the property would have to be assumed by the city if accepted. The commissioners, although in favor of acquiring the land for use as a park, felt that at the present time funds are not available. The assessment is \$2,871. It was decided, however, to look into other city funds in an effort to obtain the necessary money.

TV Public Affairs Show Is Top-Notch

NEW YORK (AP) — A serious contender for honors among the documentary programs, ABC's new "Close Up" series, made its TV debut Tuesday night with a thoughtful look at prejudice and discrimination north of the Mason-Dixon line.

None of the show's raw material was new. Yet this pictorial round-up, with its earnest, restrained commentary was a shocking indictment. Shown were the "Black Ghetto" of Chicago, a Jewish physician excluded from Gross Pointe, Mich.; Indians from a Nebraskan reservation complaining about police brutality, Puerto Ricans crowded in expensive, crumbling New York tenements, and a snarling neo-Nazi haranguing a crowd.

They were not pretty pictures, but they made a point. It is one

of the most important new series. Anyway, it should be.

While television is blazing new paths in the public affairs area, it is rumbling along dully in the deep rut of other seasons in its entertainment fare. Now at the end of the first month of the new season, there has not yet been one new show with a fresh approach. The comedies sound like rereads of last year's jokes. The Westerns and action tales are even more dedicated to small plots and great violence than ever before—in spite of all the pious talk by the medium's moguls.

Last week's "Thriller" on NBC drew some mail from horrified viewers with its tale about the mentally disturbed little boy bent on shooting out his hatreds with a rifle.

"Please, please," wrote one mother, "can't something be done to revise the code or censorship which allows a play like that to be shown?"

I guess not, madame. That series is dedicated to the proposition that exciting events befall an average citizen when a maniac enters his life, so it looks as if we are in for a full season of Tuesday night madness.

NBC tossed another little one into the day time channels Monday, this a stilted and coy item called "Here's Hollywood." The idea seems to be to catch entertainment stars in informal moments and ask them silly and stereotyped questions. Unfortunately victims of the first outing were screen star Rossano Brazzi and wife who were braced with such in-depth questions as whether Mrs. Brazzi was jealous of other women and if she was a good cook. This was followed by an interview with 21-year-old singer Connie Francis entirely concerned with the evils of teen-agers going steady.

Union To Decide On Picket Issue

DALLAS (AP)—A representative of the Transport Workers Union said Tuesday night his local will decide Thursday whether to honor a picket line set up by Braniff International Airline union members.

High Anderson, spokesman for Local 513, said the decision on whether to cross the picket line would be made by 8:30 a.m. Thursday.

If the decision is in favor of honoring the picket line, members of Allied Service Co. of Dallas, who belong to the TWU, might refuse to refuel Braniff aircraft.

The air transportation division of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks struck Braniff Monday in a dispute which union leaders said was over wages.

Lyndon Gets Bid To Make Negro Speech

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) —The man in charge of Republican campaign tours in New Jersey today invited Democrat Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas to address a rally in a Negro section of Newark.

Assemblyman Herbert Tate, R-Exeter, N.J., chairman for Nixon-Lodge tours, noted that the Democratic candidate for vice president has agreed to attend a luncheon given by wealthy industrialist Charles Engelhard.

"Sen. Johnson would use his time in New Jersey chiefly to reach the well-to-do and the influential," Tate said in a statement. "You won't find the people of New Jersey overtly represented at the Essex house luncheon."

"But I would like to extend an invitation of my own to Sen. Johnson. I offer him a chance to speak to a nonpartisan audience in Newark's central ward even as Richard M. Nixon is going to one."

The Republican presidential candidate is scheduled to address a meeting at a Newark housing project Oct. 4.

Tate, one of two Negro legislators in New Jersey, said residents of the entire state "ought to hear from the top of the Democratic ticket."

GREEK PLAY SET 2 NIGHTS

A Hercules who isn't much like the legendary Greek hero is featured in "The Warrior's Husband," a tale of Amazons and ancient Hellenes.

The stage farce, by Julian Thompson, will be presented Thursday and Friday evenings in the Howard County Junior College Auditorium. Curtain time is 8 p.m.

The cast is reported to include some 37 people.

Improvements In 1961 Falcon Line

Economy, six-passenger comfort, handling ease and dependable operation, all are part of the Ford Falcon history, which goes into the 1961 model year with some styling alterations and a new 101 horsepower engine as an option.

Falcon has been widely accepted, with sales of nearly a half-

million. The 1961 version is on public display beginning Thursday, with Tarbox-Gossett showing the models locally.

Numerous durability improvements in the 1961 Falcon are said to result in greater savings and less inconvenience to Falcon owners. Among these improvements are 2½-times thicker anodizing on the aluminum surfaces, double-wrapping of the aluminumized muffler, galvanizing of additional underbody parts for greater rust and corrosion protection, and more effective use of stainless steel for parts such as the new hub caps.

The 1961 Falcon will be offered in four models—two- and four-door sedans and two- and four-door station wagons.

The manufacturers said the Falcon has firmly established its fuel economy reputation by delivering up to 30 miles per gallon of gasoline. Recommended oil change interval with the Falcon's Full Flow oil filter is 4,000 miles.

For those who want increased performance — about 15 per cent better than the standard 85-horsepower, 144.3 cubic inch engine—Falcon will offer an optional 170-cubic-inch, six-cylinder engine that is rated at 101 horsepower.

Two transmissions—three-speed manual shift and Fordomatic—can be matched with either the standard or optional engine. Heavy-duty transmission and drive-line components are used with the Falcon 170 Special.

Falcon styling is simple and functional, with a minimum of decorative chrome. The front fenders and hood slope downward to provide maximum visibility. Single seven-inch headlights, set into the new grille, provide illumination comparable to that of the smaller dual headlights on other cars. Other new appearance items include headlamp rims, rectangular parking lights designed to blend with the new grille, and new Falcon emblems on the sides of the front fenders.

Ike Gets Delayed Japanese Award

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower now has a top Japanese award he was to have received in Tokyo last June.

Crown Prince Akihito Tuesday night presented Eisenhower with the highest decoration Japan has ever bestowed on a head of state — the Supreme Order of the Chrysanthemum with collar.

The award had been arranged as a feature of Eisenhower's planned goodwill visit to Tokyo last June, but the trip was canceled because of leftist demonstrations against the Japanese government and the United States.

The heir to the Japanese throne pointedly gave the highest praise to Eisenhower in a toast at a White House dinner.

"You are held by all free peoples the world over in the highest respect and affection because of your candor, sincerity, your warmth of heart and above all your love of peace," Akihito said.

Quemoy Shelled

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Chinese Communists fired 132 shells at the Quemoy Islands Tuesday night, the Chinese Nationalist Defense Ministry reported. The attack was the heaviest in three months against the Nationalist-held offshore islands.

Oklahoma Oil Allowable Boosted

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—The Corporation Commission Tuesday boosted Oklahoma's oil production allowable to a 15 barrel a day per well minimum for October.

It lifted the allowable to the June level. Last month it was 12 barrels a day per well.

The estimated production for October was 508,000 barrels—more than purchasers wanted. They nominated 499,200 barrels.
