

K Suffers Setbacks In **U.N. Drive**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) -Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, smarting under sharp defeats on two of his major objectives, figured prominently today in critical huddles of government chiefs in advance of U.N. General Assembly showdown votes.

The Assembly's 21 - member Steering Committee wrangled until the early morning hours in a meeting which resulted in setbacks for the Soviet premier on the admission of Red China and immediate debate on his charges of Western "aggression" in Accas ca's Congo He also failed to build support for his efforts to undermine the office of Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold.

As the Assembly policy debate resumed. Khrushchev was in conference with President Tito of Communist-ruled Yugoslavia at Soviet U.N. delegation headquarters. That was only one of a whirl of high-level conferences. Khrushchev meets Britain's prime minister. Harold Macmillan, Thursday afternoon.

U.S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter held a series of meetings with delegates of various nations in advance of a major Western reply to Khrushchev to be delivered in the Assembly by Macmillan Thursday.

BIG TEST

The big test of relative strength of the Soviet and Western sides in the fateful debate will come when the 96-member Assembly discusses in full session the agenda items taken up in the long overnight wrangle by the Steering Committee. The world will watch closely to determine just how much strength either side has picked up or lost There is no chance, however that the Assembly will override the decisions of the Steering Committee, which recommended for the 10th year not to put the guestion of seating Red China on this year's agenda. The Soviets lost out, too, in their pressure for immediate debate on Khrushchev's contention of "aggression in the Congo and the creation there of a breeding ground of tension. The committee stopped Almost Completed of tension. The committee stopped the Assembly at once. This was a foundation of Khrushchev's assault upon Hammarskield and of his use of the term 'stooges" in his charges that the secretary-general abused the office to the advantage of the West in the Congo crisis. The committee approved a British motion to adjourn debate on Congo, thus to complete the top level parking putting off action until later. Assembly delegates will be watching closely for the votes and attitudes of new African members on such issues when they come up for full dress discussion eventually in the Assembly Khrushchev's powerhouse drive to marshal neutralist support against Hammarskjold apparently has failed, a U.S. spokesman said. A Record For Intemperance

Fidel Castro set a record with his 41/2 hour speech before the United Nations Monday, not only as to length but also for sheer recklessness. Not even Nikita Khrushchev, who might as well have written the peg points of the rambling verbal marathon, has gone to such extremes as did the bearded dictator of the small island off Florida.

He threatened (although hedging enough to leave himself a loophole) to throw the United States out of the Guantanamo naval base. He urged Latin-American nations to overthrow their governments. He drew cheers from Russia with his declaration that if Cuba were attacked it would not stand alone. He tore into New York hotels for the manner in which they handled his accommodations. He blasted both U.S. presidential candidates as brainless and ignorant. He accused the United States of being an imperalist power which, until his regime, had been a puppeteer setting up the motions for Cuba.

This cascade of intemperance and slander would be almost amusing were it not reminiscent of a man with a mustasche a generation ago in Germany. Happily, this power-crazed Cuban has no such resources at his command. His chief current prop-and this is a matter of concern to the Western hemisphere-is Russia. From a practical point most of this support is in the form of talk and prodding, but in such illicit relations there is always the chance that they may get out of hand, Certainly Fidel Castro has; perhaps the other half of the friendship will, when the chips are down, be more mature in its approach, sensing just how far is enough.

A Nice Meeting

The debate between Vice President Nixon and Sen. John F. Kennedy over a nationwide television hookup Monday evening was historic in that it marked the first time for two presidential candidates to appear simultaneously on the same platform before the eyes of the nation. This is within itself an amazing feat, considering that it was less than two score years ago that radio was first used in compaigning. It is only within the past 15 years that television has mushroomed into a national medium.

This meeting, however, did not live up to its billing as a historic debate in the sense that it changed the basic approaches to any of the current issues.

Both men were refreshingly lucid and fluent in their extemporaneous talks, in their answers to questions, and in their summations. There was no groping for words, or hesitancy in calling up ideas and in quoting statistics.

The performance was in good taste, and there was a minimum of resort to personalities. In fact, it was almost too nice. The absence of an audience reduced the meeting to almost pure academics.

Thus, those wks had been induced to believe another. Lincoln-Douglas debate was about to be re-enacted over a mod-

Around The Rim **Cotton Growing Grows Up**

Two score years ago, harvesting the a continuous fire hazard for cotton on the cotton crop was a laborious process that somehow managed to get accomplished by round-the-clock operations for most of three months.

Today's harvest isn't exactly an easy chore by any stretch of imagination, but two or three times the volume of cotton may be handled in the same time. And as mechanization continues, as it inexorably will, the processes will become still more efficient.

Consider the methods at the close of World War I, Tillage was by single or double row plows, planters and cultivators pulled by a span of mules. Fortunately most of the land was relatively new as was this area's cropping in general, hence there was not too great a loss to insects.

PICKING WAS DONE by the family and such other domestic help as could be mustered. Occasionally a few talented pickers, those fabulous men whose rating started upward from 500 pounds a day. came in from East Texas.

Picked cotton was piled in wagons and at the close of day was pulled off to the gin, often times through pitch darkness over sandpile trails. The farmer had no choice but to stick around and pull his wagon a notch closer as his mumber for ginning neared. He was lucky if he got back by midnight; more often it was near the break of day. Sometimes he didn't make it by then, so pickers piled the cotton in the field.

GIN FURNACES belched plumes of smoke, and sometime sparks flew, as firemen sought to keep pressure in the boilers sufficient to run full blast. This provided

yard. Later equipment was developed for

cracking bolls, and a new phase of ginning started. Then came improved equipment for handling cotton burrs, and pulling came into prominence. Meanwhile, labor in the form of crews from South Texas became more plentiful. Some gins converted to electric power, then others swung to diesel motors. Highly efficient cleaners and driers came into being. Detachable trailers with pneumatic tires were provided by gins and farmers. Every step was toward faster, better operation.

On the farm itself, tractors, after a false start, began to supplant livestock as the prime source of power. This meant more plows could be pulled at once, that given good care the tractor could work all night as well as all day, thus making it possible to cover more acres in much less time. New tools for tillage were added

NOW THERE ARE new signs on the horizon. Flames and chemicals are being used for weed control. New insecticides are doing better jobs. Fertilizers are coming into greater demand. Mechanical cotton pickers are growing in practicality and before many years have passed they may be taking the place of sharvest hands as tractors did of work stock.

Cotton is steadily if not rapidly becoming a mechanized crop as much as milo. It must in order to stay competitive.

But all of this won't occur without a price, for there will be other facets of the farm problem such as how the little fellow can stay in the swim and what to do with thousands who depend upon the harvest for most of the year's income, -JOE PICKLE

Inez Robb Putting The Bee On Strangers

For Khrushchev was making an election speech. In the same way that Vice President Nixon and Senator Kennedy are doing, except on an even more far-ranging scale, he was addressing an electorate with an appeal to be confirmed in power.

TO UNDERSTAND what is happening here it is important to realize that in the conflict with Communist China Khrushchev must persuade the Communist bloc, and if possible the Chinese themselves, that he is in the right and that he is therefore the legitimate leader of the whole Communist movement. Election day for Khrushchev falls on November 7, which by an interesting coincidence is one day before our own election.

On that anniversary of the Revolution, it is now foreseen, the heads of all the Communist states will be assembled in Moscow. And from them Khrushchev will demand a vote of confidence. He is determined to prove that he can overcome the capitalist world without a nuclear war; and his harsh, implacable language was addressed primarily to the men in Peking who have defied him by saying that war must remain for Communism an ultimate weapon to be used no matter how great its destructiveness.

TO SPEAK OF WHAT is happening in the Communist bloc as an election, in the meaning of the word in the West, is merely to use a figure of speech. But the contest now going on, involving public opinion in the only sense that opinion exists in the Communist world, is the nearest approach to an election that is conceivable

For a dedicated Communist, a Central Committee member, to speak of the conflict at all with a Westerner is a form of treason. Officially it is not supposed to exist. This reporter has had from such a source, speaking with apparent frankness, an insight into what the conflict means. With due allowance for double talk and purposive deception, these points were made:

1. The Soviets are badly frightened by the fanaticism of the little group of men -Mao Tse-tung, Chou En-lai and the others-who have gained almost complete control over the more than 600,000,000 Chinese. They regard them, with a mixture of dread and awe, as capable of going to any lengths to have their way. 2. Notice has been served on Peking that if the Chinese become involved in a

3. NO FURTHER assistance is being given the Chinese in nuclear development that might lead to a weapons potential. The Russians believe that within three to four years the Chinese will have a nuelear device (American intelligence sources put it earlier) and they feel that they must before that time have put restraint on Peking.

The Khrushchev speeh-his entire conduct at this conclave of heads of state -can be read in the light of the pressures that are on him in the Communist, bloc; pressures to prove that his shortof-war method will result in the inevitable triumph of Communism over capitalism as promised by Lenin in what for dedicated Communists is holy writ.

SO KHRUSHCHEV must be tough. There is no room for the kind of compromise course which he seemed to be following before the U-2 episode, when he traveled from one capitalist country to another preaching peacful co-existence and competition of the two systems. The Chinese heaped ridicule on him for the way in which, in their view, he was repaid for his courting of the Western nations with the espionage plane.

In this light, his bear hug with Fidel Castro is a way of saying to Peking: "You see-right on their doorstep I have won over a convert to our side and I've done it without war. You can count on me for more victories like this."

IN HIS INFLAMMABLE denunciation of "colonialism," with something close to an appeal to rebellion in territories still lacking independence, he was rallying the African states to his side. He must win them in competition with the Chinese, who are sending their own emissaries into the new and struggling nations.

For in his election campaign Khrushchev is hardening attitudes everywhere. And here at home our own election-"Who can be toughest with Khrushchev?"-is having somewhat the same effect. For those concerned over how negotiation can ever be resumed and the drift toward war checked, these are fairly grave matters. (Copyright, 1950, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

TOURING NEW ENGLAND-The lean. question-mark shadow of Senator Jack Kennedy lies across all of the State races in New England. The Democratic candidate is expected to sweep his home state of Mässachusetts and to show real power in neighboring New Hampshire. The question is-how much?

ANOTHER LEAN man, but a figure of rock-like strength and duration, stands in Kennedy's line of march. Republican Senator Leverett Saltonstall has been in public life since 1920. The two Bay State Senators are not at all hostile. In fact, they have worked very closely in the Senate on regional projects. There is a presistent suspicion that Kennedy did not mind very much in 1954 when Saltonstall stalled the drive to power of Foster Furcolo who apparently ended his career when he, a sitting Governor, was mowed down in the recent Democratic primary.

BUT THIS YEAR, as head of the national ticket, Kennedy cannot hold back as he is believed to have done six years ago. His money, his organization, his Laborite connections are bound to go off with the unfettered fury of a political H-bomb in the home territory. A less stalwart person than Saltonstall would be a foregone goner.

But the Republican Senator has a record for survival. He won State-wide elections twice when Massachusetts was being blitzed by Franklin Roosevelt and once when it succumbed to Harry Truman. Saltonstall is a special case of Old Reliable. His home credentials include recordholding tenures of the Speakership and Governorship. During nearly eight years of the Eisenhower Administration, Saltonstall has been able to bring Defense contracts to the shipyards and to small arms



Shivers Kicks Off Pro-Nixon Drive Tonight

DALLAS (AP)-Former Texas Gov. Allan Shivers, who backed President Eisenhower in 1952 and 1956, kicks off a "Democrats for Nixon" campaign here tonight.

He said that in his remarks tonight he will try to summarize some of his reasons for backing Vice President Richard M. Nixon and the reasons of some delegates to the recent State Democratic Convention in backing the Republican ticket.

In Austin, state headquarters of the Democratic ticket of Sen. John F. Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson said State Sen. Dorsey Hardman of San Angelo will make a television address challenging Shivers endorsement of the Republican candidates. Hardman's talk will be carried by an Austin television station prior to the time the Austin station carries Shivers' talk

"Delegates were not given an opportunity to discuss the plat-forms (of the two parties)," Shivers said Tuesday. He also said that he had been told that many Texas Democrats will not support the Democratic platform or ticket in 1960.

In his two previous bolts from the Democratic party he led the "Democrats for Eisenhower" organization and is given much credit for swinging Texas to the Republicans.

Shivers, who spent 22 years in public office, served three terms as governor, leaving office in 1957 after deciding not to run for reelection.

The "Democrats for Nixon" or-ganization is expected to be a separate from the two Republican organizations in the state, "Texans for Nixon" and "Volunteers for Nixon."

Shivers' address will be at 6:30 p.m. in the Hotel Adolphus Roof Garden.

The speech, according to Shivers' office, will be carried later on 27 Texas television stations.


