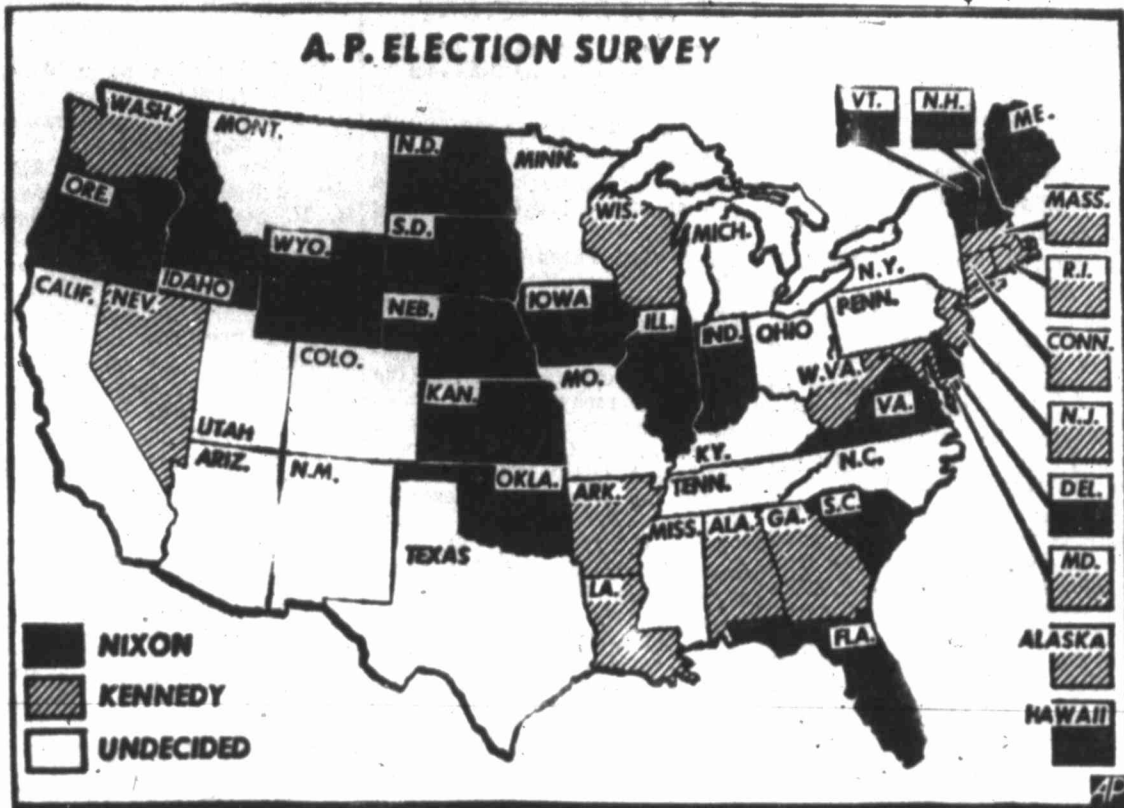

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Survey Shows Candidates Even But Race Still Tossup

By FRED S. HOFFMAN WASHINGTON (AP)—Democrat John F. Kennedy apparently has pulled almost even with Republican Richard M. Nixon as they sprint toward the finish in their hectic race for the presidency. But a new Associated Press survey indicates that, with election day only three weeks ahead, neither candidate has been able to grasp a clear advantage in 17 states numbering nearly half of the 537 electoral votes.

At the same time, some of the states in this group seemed to be tending toward Vice President Nixon—Minnesota (11), Utah (4) and New Mexico (4). EITHER WAY An in number of states credited either to Kennedy or Nixon, it was possible the balance might tip the other way before voting time.

The survey indicates: Nixon is ahead in 19 states with 141 electoral votes. Kennedy is credited with the lead in 14 states with 129 electoral votes. In a few Southern states, a scattering of Democratic electors might not vote for Kennedy even if he won their states.

Other tossup states: Ohio (25), Texas (24), North Carolina (14), Missouri (13), Tennessee (11) and Mississippi (8). As before, the new AP survey combined the observations of its own veteran political reporters, the judgments of seasoned newspaper analysts, the opinions of political leaders and the results of certain reliable polls.

# Yanks Slain; Castro Sees Navy Base Plot

HAVANA (AP)—A Cuban firing squad Sunday executed two more Americans from the small invasion force that Fidel Castro charged was part of a U.S. plot to provoke an incident at Guantanamo Naval Base.

The prime minister directly linked the 27-man expeditionary force that landed on Cuba's north-east coast Oct. 15 with mounting tension over the big naval base the United States holds on the island by treaty.

Castro said on television that the small band intended to create the pretext for U.S. intervention in Cuba by trying to form a "zone of operations and zone of perturbation" near the base.

The United States formally charged before the United Nations government's seizure of his father's Cuban plantation.

The two Americans were: Allan Dale Thompson, 36, a native of Queen City, Tex., who grew up in Mooringsport, La., and worked in fishing camps in that area.

Robert O. Fuller, 25, whose father moved to Miami, Fla., after confiscation of his property in Cuba.

Another American who landed with them, Anthony Zarba, 27, of Somerville, Mass., was executed with seven Cuban insurgents at the same firing range in San Juan Valley last Thursday.

A prediction of more invasions against the Castro regime came from Fuller's grieving father, William, in Miami, Fla.

"There'll be other expeditions," Fuller told newsmen. "Some may fail, but sooner or later the Castro regime may fall."

The younger Fuller, who served with the U.S. Marine in Korea, testified at his trial in Santiago that peasants had aided the invaders.

A similar revelation came from Angel Rivero, a Cuban member of the expeditionary force, who testified, "I came to combat communism in Cuba."

The court spared the lives of Rivero and another Cuban, Juan Gonzalez. They were sentenced to 30 years in prison.

The court rejected appeals for clemency for Thompson and Fuller, contending that the Americans and the Cubans should get equal treatment.

Fuller's mother, who remained in Cuba when the rest of the family went to Florida, attended the trial. Mrs. Fuller is a native of Massachusetts but has lived in Cuba since childhood.

Cuban prosecutor David Diaz charged the United States was backing the invaders and warned that future invaders "will bite the dust drenched in blood."

The U.S. State Department has denied any connection with the invasion.

Castro disclosed that one of his former cabinet members, Manolo Ray, was "one of the little leaders of the counter-revolution."

Ray, a bomb expert who fought with Castro against the regime of Fulgencio Batista, was replaced as public works minister late last year by left-winger Osmari Cienfuegos.

Castro admitted concern, however, about the allegiance of the Cuban navy. He threatened to dissolve the force unless it shapes up in thorough revolutionary fashion. He disclosed two big naval installations in Havana and Cienfuegos had been deactivated, along with several warships.

The prime minister indicated, too, that the revolutionary program may be slowed down on the home front. With the institution of an urban reform law the past weekend, he said "drastic measures" on the social and economic front have ended. The urban law gives Cubans the right to buy their homes by applying the monthly rent toward the purchase price.

## Kennedy Lashes Out On Money Policies

EN ROUTE WITH KENNEDY (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy lashed out today at what he called a high interest policy that benefits banks at the expense of people.

The Democratic presidential candidate, in a prepared speech, compared Richard M. Nixon unfavorably with former President Herbert Hoover, and sought to tie the vice president to the economic policies he (Kennedy) criticized.

The Dayton speech was his major talk of his huge swing into Ohio marked by increasingly direct jobs at his Republican opponent.

Kennedy has been saying it is time to stop talking about the Chinese offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu and instead discuss Cuba, Africa and what should be done to stimulate the U.S. economy.

Developing this theme in a national television interview (Meet The Press) and in several stump speeches, he said that what he termed Nixon's retreat to the Eisenhower administration position on the islands takes them out of the category of campaign issues.

**CHANGED APPROACH**  
He said Nixon has changed his approach to the subject and that

now everyone appears agreed that the United States should not be bound to defend them unless they are attacked as part of an assault on Formosa and the Pescadores.

But he said if Nixon insists on talking about the islands, he is willing to continue.

The first reaction from the Nixon camp indicated that the vice president would keep talking about them.

Kennedy said today that people are in trouble because of creeping unemployment, persistently depressed areas and farm problems that strike the small farmer especially.

The 1960 troubles are real, even if they are not exactly like the depression of the 1930s, he said.

"There may not be Herbert Hoover but there is Richard Nixon," he added. "And sometimes I wish it were Mr. Hoover instead."

**HOOVER CARED**  
Kennedy said "for at least Mr. Hoover cared," adding "at least he tried to do something. But Mr. Nixon says he's satisfied. He says we've never had it so good."

Kennedy said various interest rates have increased by 34 to 95 per cent under the present administration. "It has raised the rate on everything but the air we breathe," he said.

As a result, he said, farmers can't buy equipment, small businessmen cannot modernize to compete with big corporations, schools are not built—so that overcrowding and overwork of teachers results—and would-be home owners cannot buy, to the detriment of businesses dependent on construction.

"I oppose rigid management of the money system in any special interest," Kennedy said. He promised, if elected, to strike "a wholesome balance," although he acknowledged this is not an easy task.

**BREAKS GROUND**  
Speaking in Southwest Ohio today, Kennedy broke new ground in the state he has visited several times during his campaign. Ohio is a 25 electoral vote prize and one about which Democrats are hopeful.

Kennedy's thrust at Nixon brought delighted applause Sunday from partisan audiences at Levittown, N. J.; Wilmington, Del., and Silver Spring, Md.

He said the reason it is hard to debate with Nixon is "not because he is such a magnificent debater and not because he is using new lighting," but because "Nixon changes his position so fast."

### Herter Going On Mexican Trip

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter is scheduled to join President Eisenhower on Oct. 24 for his goodwill visit with President Lopez Mateos of Mexico.

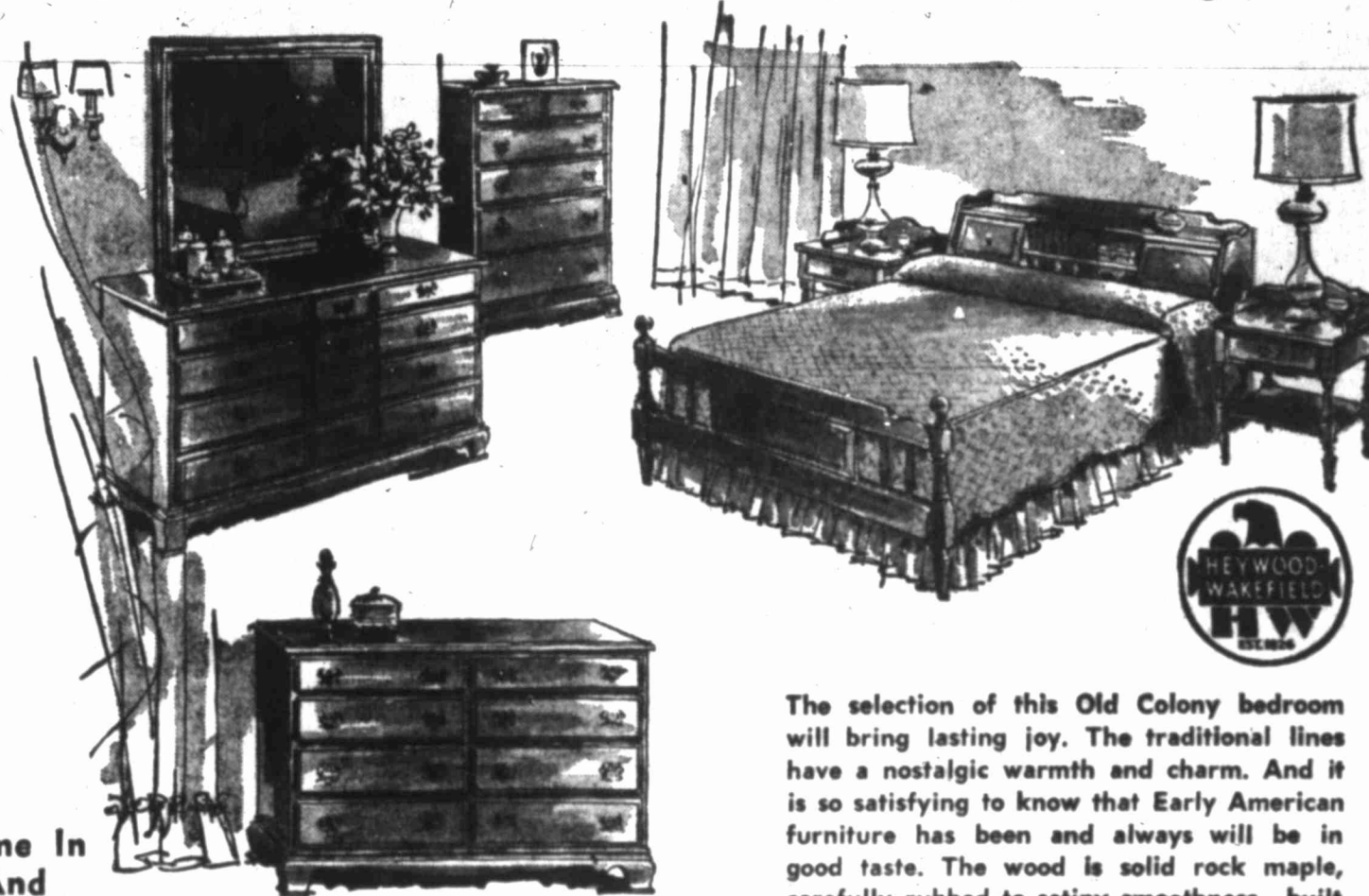
Eisenhower will fly from Palm Springs to Laughlin Air Force Base at Del Rio, Tex., on the morning of Oct. 24. Herter is due to fly from Washington some time on Oct. 23, a Sunday.

Police Crack Down On Caviar Black Market

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Tehran's police, with no sympathy for gourmets, are cracking down on a unique racket—a black market in caviar.  
 The fishy delicacy is a government monopoly, and a non-authorized or cut rate caviar peddler can get up to two years in prison under a new law.  
 Iran is almost the world's only source of the genuine stuff. Russia's famed caviar usually isn't Russian; they buy it from Iran.  
 Caviar comes from fish eggs, and the eggs come from the sturgeon—a big brown fish caught almost exclusively in the southern reaches of the Caspian, the half owned by Iran. The Soviet Union owns only the northern Caspian, where sturgeon for some reason don't get hooked.  
 Caviar is by no means a staple food in Iran, but a pound of the finest black imperial grade costs about 12 dollars a pound here. In a New York nightclub it can come to 10 dollars a spoonful.  
 Smugglers or black marketers buy direct from Iranian fishermen, pack the caviar in used government tins which are sealed only with tape, and sell it for about half the government price.  
 Only four government shops handle caviar in Tehran, and the caviar pirates operate from fish stores or by door-to-door peddling.

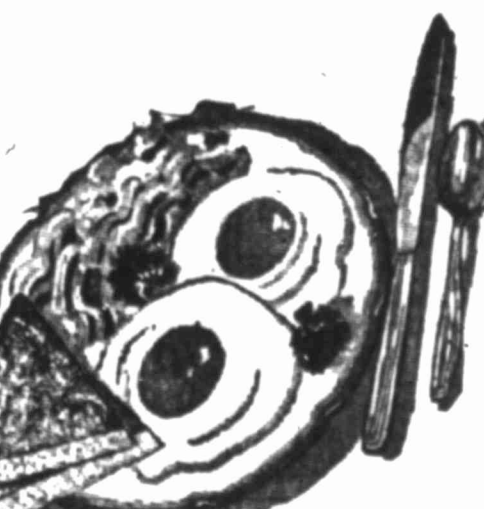

**Nixon Keeps Fire Under Isles Issue**

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon kept Quemoy and Matsu alive as a campaign issue today as he sought again to puncture Democratic strength in New England.

Herbert G. Klein, Nixon's press chief, said the Republican presidential candidate will have more to say about the status of the offshore China islands in campaign appearances here and in other Connecticut cities on which Sen. John F. Kennedy votes heavily for Democratic counts in November.

Kennedy repeated Sunday night that his stand on the defense of Quemoy and Matsu apparently jibes with that of the Eisenhower administration. And he said he is prepared to drop the islands from the campaign.

CONTINUE TALKING  
While Nixon himself weighed possible approaches to success in the last three weeks of the contest, Klein had this to say on the vice president's behalf:

"Until the senator clarifies his position, whether he is still in favor of surrendering the islands, we will feel it is incumbent upon us to discuss Sen. Kennedy's own stated views."

"If Sen. Kennedy now chooses to say that he no longer is in favor of surrendering the islands, I think it will be for the good of the country."

The White House Saturday declared President Eisenhower and Nixon are in agreement on the little islands a few miles off the coast of Communist China: That they should be defended against aggression that is ultimately pointed toward the Formosa stronghold of Nationalist China.

DIFFERENCES  
In the second of their televised debates, Nixon had said Quemoy and Matsu must be protected as segments of "the area of freedom." Kennedy had said they should not be abandoned under the muzzles of Communist guns, but he termed them indefensible and called for a clearly drawn line of defense around Formosa.

Nixon met Sunday with former U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, his vice presidential running mate, and other GOP leaders to map out the conclusive last three weeks of the campaign.

Nixon and Lodge huddled in a Hartford hotel for the better part of an hour Sunday as they took time off from active campaigning to take a sight on the home stretch of the campaign. Lodge later accompanied the vice president to a conference of high echelon political advisers.

STANDARDS  
When they came out, Nixon said in answer to a question that he would name his cabinet members

on a standard of caliber rather than race or creed. This, he said, did not signify he would—or would not—appoint a Negro.

Lodge had told a Harlem audience last Wednesday night that the next administration, if Republican, would include a Negro in the cabinet. Later, he said this could not be considered as a pledge, inasmuch as vice presidents don't appoint cabinet members.

Reports of the remarks had disconcerted some Southern Republicans. Lodge said again after his meeting with Nixon that he could make no pledge, and he had set forth no commitment. But, he said, "it would be a wonderful thing to have a Negro in the cabinet." He said on the basis of his U. N. experience the effect would be the same on other nations.

Nixon maintained "there was no lack of understanding" between himself and Lodge.

After Lodge departed for Washington, Nixon spent additional time conferring with campaign managers Leonard W. Hall and Robert Finch. They were joined by 21 others including Secretaries of Labor James P. Mitchell and Interior Fred A. Seaton, Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers, Undersecretary of the Treasury Fred C. Scribner J. and Lodge's son, George. Secretary of Welfare Arthur S. Flemming arrived later in the afternoon.

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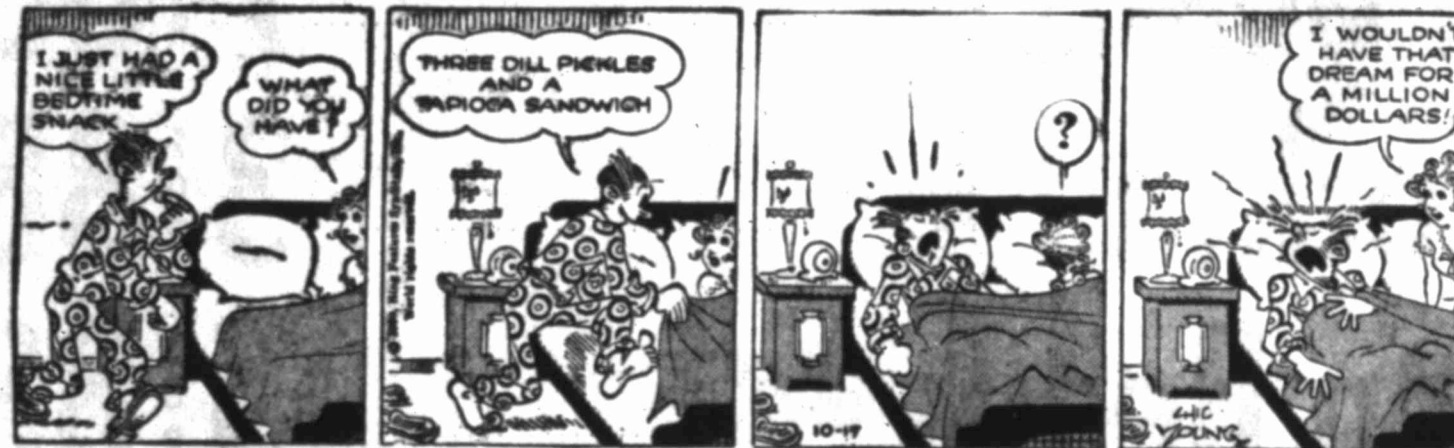
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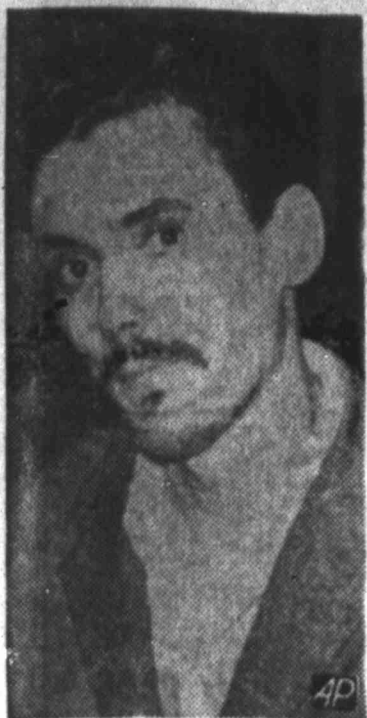

### Anti-Catholic Sunday Drive Is Lambasted

NEW YORK (AP)—The executive director of the Fair Campaign Practices Committee has protested what he calls the plan of many Protestant churches to "pervert" Reformation Sunday by turning it into an anti-Catholic, anti-Kennedy rally.

Some conservative Protestants, seeking to defeat Sen. John F. Kennedy because he is a Roman Catholic, have announced plans to deliver anti-Catholic sermons on the anniversary.

Meanwhile, a prominent Protestant Episcopal churchman says a flood of anti-Catholic literature has all but stopped rational discussion of legitimate issues in the presidential election.

Bruce K. Folkner, director of the Fair Campaign Practices Committee, said in a lay sermon at the Bedford, N.Y., Presbyterian Church Sunday: "I am ashamed to say to you that this anniversary in 1960 will be perverted from a sacred to what I think is a quite profane use in many churches in our country."

Reformation Sunday, Oct. 30, marks the day in 1517 when Martin Luther nailed to a Wittenberg Cathedral door his "ninety-five theses," thus initiating the Protestant Reformation.

Folkner, a Presbyterian, said: "In every election cursed by dirty campaigning, the worst lies always appear at the last minute. Article VI of the Constitution is unequivocal: 'But no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.'"

Dr. George Ford, Wheaton, Ill., director of the National Association of Evangelicals, announced Saturday that a massive campaign will be launched next Sunday dealing with the role of the Catholic church in the presidential election. The movement will be climaxed reformation Sunday, he said.

### Evolution Called Hope Of Freedom

PITTSBURGH (AP)—An exiled leader of the Polish government says his country will shed the bonds of communism "by evolutionary steps, not by revolution."

"It will be a slow process, but we must be patient, so that not only Poland, but all nations will be free again," Prince Stanislaw Radziwill said Sunday.

Radziwill, a brother-in-law to Sen. John F. Kennedy, Democratic candidate for president, spoke at the annual Pulaski Day dinner of the Western Pennsylvania Division of the Polish-American Congress.

The Democrats were buoyed by newly-announced figures showing Democratic voter registration at 4,295,330 and Republican at 2,926,406—a Democratic advantage of nearly 1.4 million. Patrick Hillings, Los Angeles County Republican chairman, professed confidence that "a great number of people registered as Democrats... will cross over to Nixon."

**PHOTO FINISH**

Colorado (6)—It may be a photo-finish here, the AP survey two weeks ago credited Nixon with a trail lead. But there seems to have been a slight drift toward Kennedy largely, observers say, on the basis of his first TV tilt with Nixon. Several experts believe Nixon still may be in front.

Florida (10)—Nixon the front-runner, but Kennedy-Johnson forces appear to be pulling up. Johnson's two-day swing last week was counted on to help and

some Democrats feel the TV debates with Nixon are boosting Kennedy's stock. Withdrawal of Faubus from Florida ballot as presidential candidate of the national states rights party figures to help Kennedy.

Illinois (27)—Nixon setting the paces despite Kennedy's good reception in downstate areas. Long-time political writers agree Nixon is leading, and some predict he'll take the state by 100,000 votes.

**LEAD GAINS**

Indiana (13)—A 100,000-vote lead for Nixon in Indiana, too. There are indications Kennedy has made gains recently.

Iowa (10)—Recent polls in scattered sections point to a Nixon lead in Iowa. Reporters agree the religious issue is a silent factor in Nixon's edge.

Louisiana (10)—Reports indicate Louisiana is moving firmly into the Kennedy camp after being rated doubtful. The move toward Kennedy may have been pushed along by recent Supreme Court refusal to grant Louisiana a rehearing in the controversial tidelands case.

Michigan (20)—Could go either way, political specialists say. Judging by the latest Detroit News poll, Kennedy appears to have spurred into the lead, perhaps only narrowly.

Missouri (12)—Can't be earmarked for either candidate yet. But on the strength of unusually heavy voter registration recently in St. Louis, the state appears to be leaning toward Kennedy. Religion may still prove a key issue in some areas.

**OUT FRONT**

New Jersey (16)—Kennedy seems to be out front. Both candidates recently stumped in the state. Reporters thought Kennedy drew somewhat bigger and more enthusiastic crowds in most places. A number of political writers, formerly on the fence or leaning toward Nixon in their estimates, now feel Kennedy will carry New Jersey.

New Mexico (4)—Though it's not conclusive, the state looks to be tending toward Nixon. Recent polls in usually Democratic rural Protestant counties turn up preference for Nixon. Coupled with generally GOP majorities in Albuquerque, this could overcome expectable Kennedy sentiment in Spanish-American, Catholic counties.

New York (45)—No breakthrough yet for either man. But Kennedy may have a bit the better of it because of apparently favorable acceptance in New York City. Predictions are that Kennedy may take the city by from 600,000 to 900,000 votes. Indications are that Nixon can expect an upstate plurality of from 500,000 to 600,000, although the pre-Nixon Herald-Tribune, after a survey, reported a strong Kennedy tide running upstate. Reporters accompanying Gov. Nelson

Rockefeller say his campaigning for Nixon is drawing lukewarm response.

**BATTLEGROUND**

North Carolina (14)—A battleground, with both sides sending in top party figures to try to sway the balance. Veteran political writers agree it's close, but split on any trend. Some say the Democrats are on the upbeat, others give the nod to Nixon. Two polls by the Charlotte News and the Greensboro Daily News show Nixon leading in their areas.

Oklahoma (8)—Nixon appears to be staying in the lead, although Kennedy gives evidence of being on the move. Travis Walsh, Tulsa World reporter at the state Capitol, says he finds considerably more support for the Democratic candidate than he did three weeks ago.

Pennsylvania (32)—It's not clear yet whether Nixon or Kennedy will pocket this state's big packet of electoral votes. However, Kennedy seems to be picking up some ground. Many newspaper editors—preponderantly Republican here—think Nixon could win by a slight majority. Kennedy's fate in Pennsylvania appears to hinge on whether Democrats can get out a big vote in Philadelphia and other major city areas.

**RELIGIOUS ISSUE**

Tennessee (11)—Because the depth of the religious issue cannot be gauged with any certainty, Tennessee must be considered a tossup. Were it not for the religious question, Tennessee could be classified as leaning toward Kennedy.

Texas (24)—It's touch and go—even more in doubt, possibly, than two weeks ago. Republican sources claim a drift to Nixon because of the antics of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev at the United Nations and development of the Quemoy-Matsu controversy between Nixon and Kennedy. The Democratic drive was stepped up when former President Harry Truman entered the state in an effort to knock the religious issue on the head.

Virginia (12)—Despite a noticeable shift toward Kennedy in the past two weeks, Nixon appears to be clutching the lead here. Kennedy's campaign manager in Virginia and Gov. Lindsay Almond believe that if the Democrats can keep up their momentum, Kennedy should be able to come out on top. This view gets support from newspaper polls in Richmond and Norfolk. Some Democratic chiefs say the outcome may turn on whether Kennedy personally carries his campaign to the state's big population areas.

Wisconsin (12)—Stacks up as a very close struggle, but Kennedy looks like the probable winner. Nixon may have collected support in recent appearances at Milwaukee and La Crosse.

The Rev. Lennart G. Blomquist, Swedish-born missionary of the Methodist Church (U. S. A.) serving in British-ruled Southern Rhodesia, Africa, will be the honor guest at a special coffee at 10 a.m. Tuesday at the First Methodist Church of Big Spring.

The missionary will give an in-

Rev. Blomquist has supervision of the agricultural training of African youth at the "Woodlands Farm." He also is an ordained minister, serving as pastor in Old Umtali, and supervising churches in the district.

At the Woodlands Farm attention is given to food production for the schools and hostels; there is a dairy and instruction in animal husbandry. Graduates can care for their own gardens and farms scientifically, and carry on most building and household arts.

Rev. Blomquist was born in Vasteras, Sweden, and makes his permanent home in Stockholm. He was graduated from the Swedish Industrial College in Gothenburg; has his B.D. degree from Union Theological Seminary, New York; and has taken specialized agricultural training at Texas Tech., Lubbock. He was ordained to the Methodist ministry in Sweden by Bishop Arvidson in 1940, and was a pastor in his homeland until 1947 when commissioned a missionary to Africa. He served in Nyadiri and Mutambaqa, both in Rhodesia, prior to his present assignment.

Rev. Blomquist is spending a year's furlough visiting and speaking in churches in the United States.

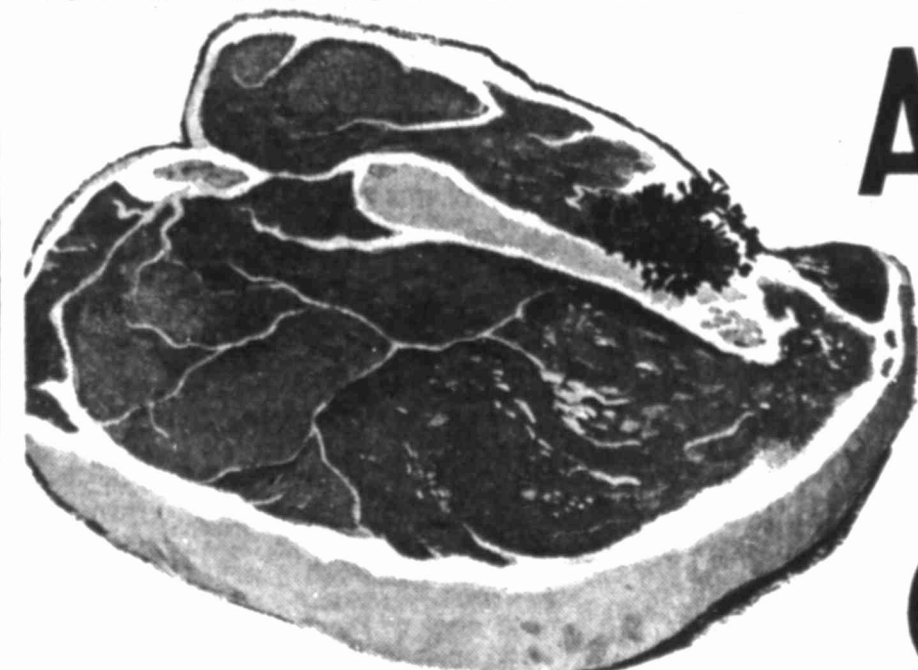

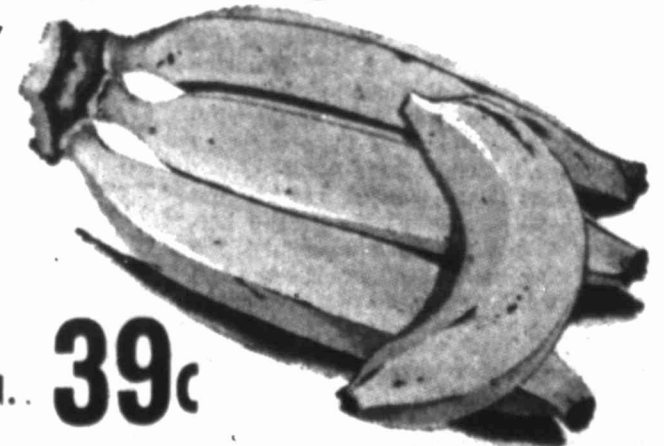

Perhaps he got a message from Parnassus, for the next day he said that there should be a Negro named to the Cabinet, but that he had not discussed the matter with Vice President Richard Nixon, the GOP presidential standard-bearer. Lodge went on to add that: "I believe all Cabinet posts should be filled without regard to race, creed or color." Of course, the prime reason for naming anyone to any governmental post, the Cabinet included, is ability.

### Changes In Industrial Trends

In a recent analysis of Texas industrial trends, The Bureau of Business Research, University of Texas, concludes that Texas economy is entering a new phase that will call for a change in approach.

Examining the factors which produced industrial growth in the past and those which are favorable for Texas now and in the future, the study thinks that "more active measures will have to be taken in the future to maintain the rates of over-all development that have matured in the past. For the kinds of industry that appear to offer the best growth potentials are those for which very active interstate competition exists. This competition will undoubtedly become stronger as time goes by."

WASHINGTON—Nikita Khrushchev has defied all the rules of fair play in diplomacy—he has deliberately interfered in a national political campaign inside a foreign country.

By coming to the United States in the midst of a presidential contest and carrying on a sustained attack against the policies of the Eisenhower administration, he has endeavored to arouse the American people to repudiate their own government at the polls.

MR. An afternoon with Brendan Behan is like—well, it's like an afternoon with no one else in creation, save possibly a can of creative worms. The Irish playwright is one man who can go off in all directions simultaneously, and frequently does.

And even for an Irishman, Behan is singularly gifted with gab, exuberantly so. So much so, indeed, that I doubt even a tape-recorder could do him justice. Maybe three or four of them, but not just one!

### Expelled American Tourist Convicted Of Russ 'Spying'

MOSCOW (AP)—An American tourist expelled from the Soviet Union was convicted of spying, the Soviet news agency Tass said today.

The tourist, Mark I. Kaminsky, 26, a teacher from Jefferson Township, Mich., was sentenced to seven years imprisonment but was expelled after he pleaded for clemency and showed "sincere repentance."

The report said Kaminsky confessed before the military tribunal that he had collected intelligence information.

It specified that Kaminsky photographed military installations and carried a notebook containing "coded notes about the location of an artillery base, radar installations and a military airfield."

Kaminsky had entered the Soviet Union last July 27 by automobile with another American tourist, Harvey C. Bennett, 26, of Tracy, Calif. About three weeks

later they disappeared. Nothing further was heard of them until the U. S. State Department announced last Friday that they had been expelled for being in a forbidden area.

The two were said to have been ousted at the Soviet-Czechoslovak border town of Uzhgorod. So far they have made no contact with U. S. embassies on the western side of the Iron Curtain.

Tass said Kaminsky had been financed as a spy by an American organization it called the "Fair Craft Fund." It said that Kaminsky told the court at Kiev that he "wanted to make some money."

Moscow Radio said Bennett testified against his friend, denouncing Kaminsky's activities and declaring "they were incompatible with tourism."

The two were arrested on Aug. 25 as they were going by car from Moscow to Minsk.

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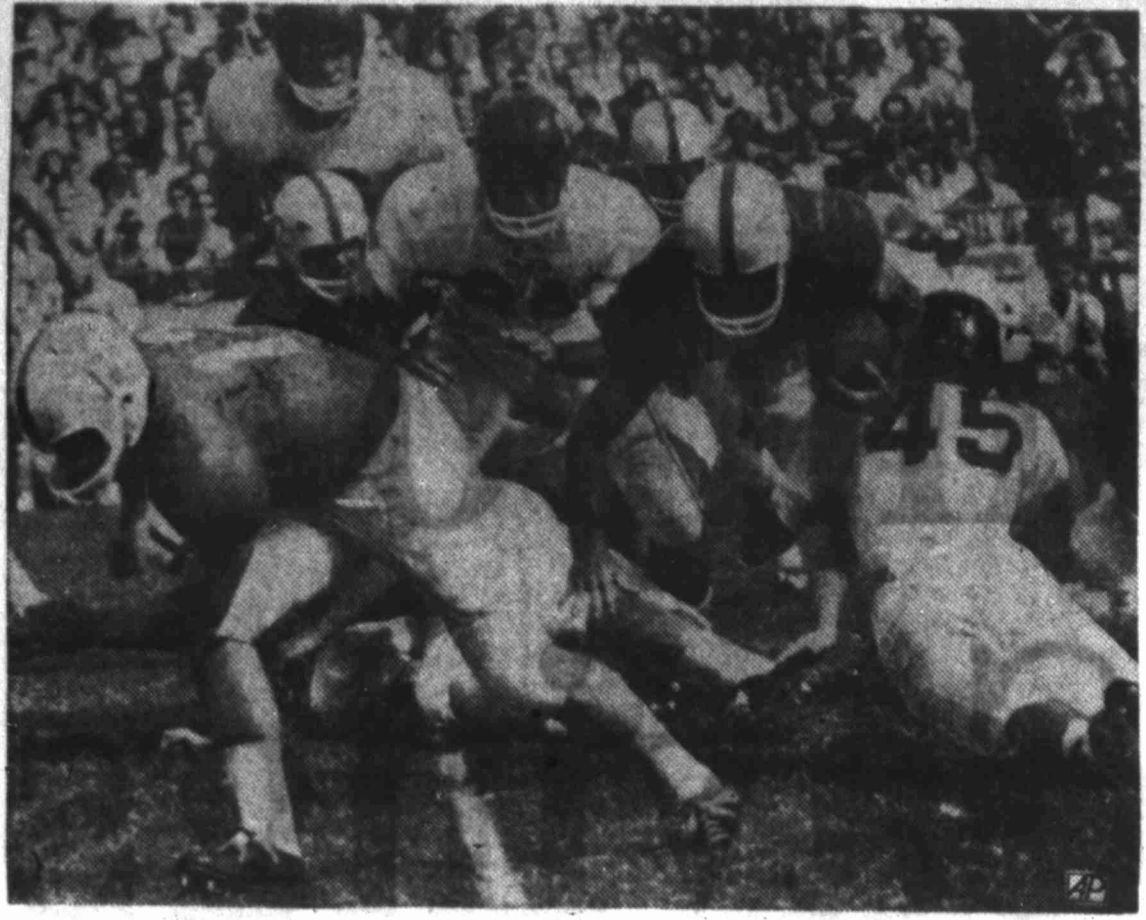
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Longhorn Finds A Hole

Earl Stewart Jr. of Dallas blasted Austin's Terry Dill 3 and 4 in the most decisive victory of the day for the pros. He was six under-par for the 14 holes.

Baylor won over inspired Texas Tech 14-7 on its home field, in mud and rain, and faced a tough stretch schedule with confidence. The Golden Bears play Texas A&M, another surprising outfit, in the homecoming game at Waco Saturday.

Texas A&M, which managed to

the Texas Tech—a team beaten 21-7 by Texas Christian—tied the Christians 14-14 and stayed in the championship race. The Aggies have one defeat against them, by virtue of being tied in both conference games thus far. Ties count half-game won, half-game lost in the conference.

The big game of the week will come at Houston Saturday night when Rice plays Texas in a traditional and bitter test. A defeat for Texas would eliminate the Longhorns from the running. Rice would still be very much alive even if it lost.

Southern Methodist and Texas Tech get together at Lubbock. SMU has to win this one to stay in the running, if feebly. Tech already has been eliminated with three defeats and a tie.

While their conference brethren are playing for keeps, Texas Christian and Arkansas will be engaging in highly important intersectional games. The Christians host Pittsburgh while Arkansas jousts mighty Mississippi.

What Arkansas does against Mississippi, the nation's No. 1 team, will be watched with great interest. They play at Little Rock Saturday night.

Speedsters Lenny Moore and Bobby Mitchell, elusive packages of swinging hips and flashing feet, are dancing a touchdown jig in the pass-conscious National Football League while driving their teams toward divisional titles.

Moore, former Penn State star now in his fifth pro season, scored touchdowns on runs of 1, 34 and 57 yards and caught a Johnny Unitas aerial for a fourth score as the NFL champion Baltimore Colts blasted the Los Angeles Rams 31-17 Sunday.

Mitchell, onetime Illinois standout in his third NFL campaign, returned a kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown, raced 30 yards for another and took a Milt Plum pass and ran 46 yards for a third score to pace the Cleveland Browns to a 48-7 thumping of the Dallas Cowboys.

Moore and Mitchell now are tied for the League's scoring lead with 42 points on seven touchdowns.

**TIE FOR LEAD**  
The Colt triumph, their third against one defeat, kept them in a tie for first place in the Western Division with the Chicago Bears, a half-game ahead of the Green Bay. The Bears kept pace with a 27-10 victory over San Francisco.

The Browns' romp gave them a 3-0 record and edged them ahead of the defending New York Giants (3-0-1) in the Eastern Division. The Giants were tied by the Washington Redskins 24-24 on a touchdown pass by Ralph Guglielmi with 25 seconds left.

The Pittsburgh Steelers defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 27-14 and the Philadelphia Eagles whipped the Detroit Lions 28-10 in other games.

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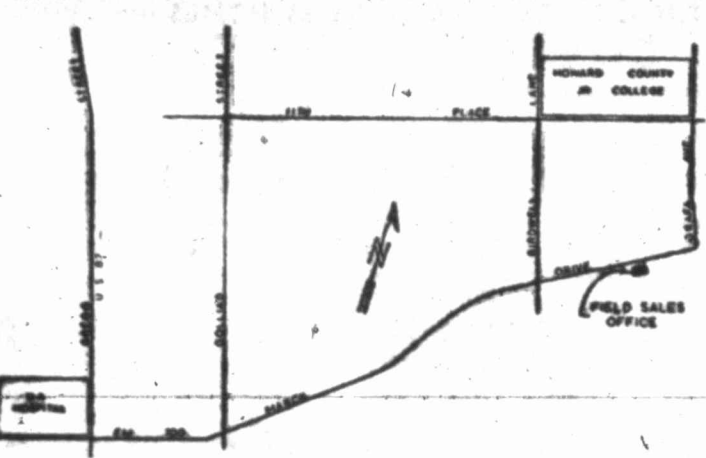

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## 'Satire' Without Wit Falls Flat

A new album, "The Republican Record — a Slightly Irreverent, Mostly Musical View of Dicky, Dad and All the Gang," is an at-

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tempt to inject satire or humor or something into the 1960 presidential campaign.

Or maybe it's just an attempt by "Current Personalities," a new firm, to make a fast buck. Whatever it is, it's pretty pathetic. In simple arithmetic, satire minus wit or humor should equal just plain old-fashioned invective. But here the parts are considerably less than the whole. Even the invective doesn't come off.

Using the topical review form, the album intersperses taped excerpts from Richard Nixon's speeches with unbelievably barren

bits of song parody that never come close to living up to the promise of their titles: "Bring Back My Checkers To Me," "Save the Golf Ball for the Hall of Fame," "When Dick is Chancellor," etc.

The parodies are so lame, the wit so lacking, and music and lyrics so hopelessly sophomoric that not even the most rabid Nixon-hater could be induced to laugh anywhere during the 44-minute presentation.

Some reviewers have suggested that in all fairness the company should do the same for Sen. Kennedy. That would be doubly disastrous. Two duds don't make a right, not even in a presidential campaign.

Let's forget the whole thing.

Peter Sellers, the British comic who scored such a hit in "The Mouse that Roared" and "I'm All Right, Jack," must lose something in translation to records. His first album, "The Best of Peter Sellers" (Angel), has everything but laughs. It demonstrates that Sellers, a gifted mimic, can do a reasonably good impersonation of Frank Sinatra, an even better impersonation of a travelogue narrator and a rather fetching takeoff on a rock 'n' roll singer who is "nine years old going on 10" and hasn't had a record in the top 20 in three weeks. Sellers indeed is a man of many voices and probably the only British comedian who can sound like an American gangster even to American audiences. But aside from reaffirming these talents, the album does nothing to justify his billing as the new Alec Guinness.



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## Israeli Music Well Played By Visitors

NEW YORK (AP)—The Israel Philharmonic Orchestra, playing its way around the world, made its first United States stop Sunday night in the Metropolitan Opera House.

The orchestra, 24 years old this fall, had performed here nine years ago, and New Yorkers remembered it affectionately. They turned out this time for old time's sake and also to welcome a new conductor, Italian-born Carlo Maria Giulini.

Presented under the auspices of the America-Israel Foundation, this was a benefit for the orchestra fund, and with orchestra seats at \$100, the evening may have brought in a record sum up to \$100,000.

The program contained three familiar numbers, Weber's "Freischuetz" overture, Stravinsky's "Firebird" suite and Brahms' Symphony No. 1.

The novelty was two movements, the second and third, from a full-length symphony called "Psalm" by 25-year-old Israeli composer Noam Sheriff. The selections ran only 10 minutes. The mood was veiled, and then broke out in jubilation. The restless sense of something stirring underneath, at the start, quickened into a warming song of a Biblical import. It was unfair to the composer and to us in the audience not to find time to play the entire work.

Giulini, a tall, personable conductor, got his warmest applause with the popular Stravinsky. But he was a master particularly of subtleties and nuances, and was heard best in the reflective passages of the Sheriff and the quieter measures of both the Brahms and the Weber.

## Air Crash Kills 4 Police Officers

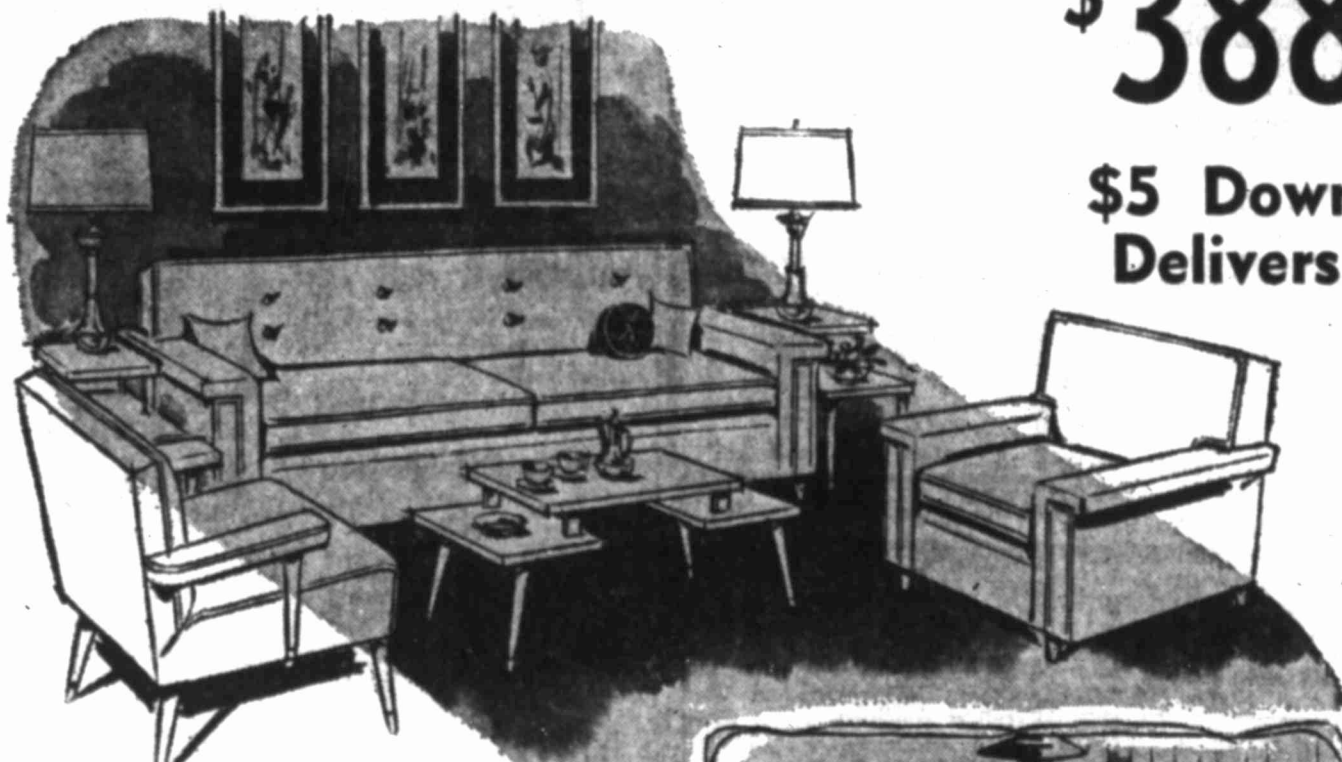

They were members of the Salt Lake City police force en route to Las Vegas, Nev., where the department said they planned to see about buying a plane for the police force.

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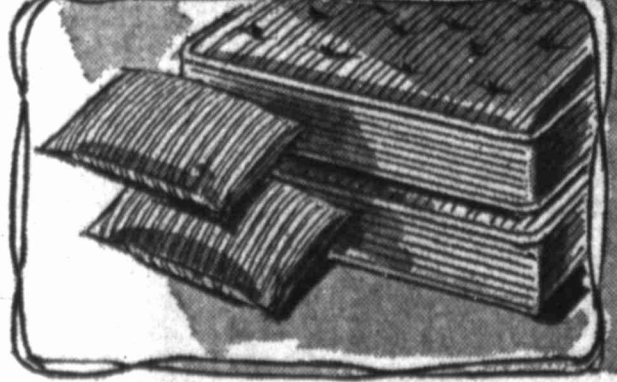
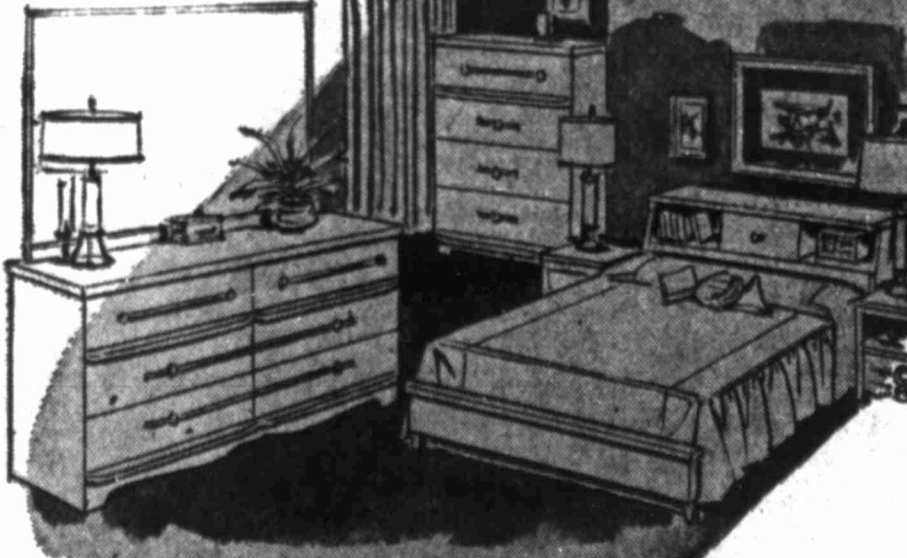
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
