Survey Shows Candidates 3 Big TV Quiz Even But Race Still Tossup Face Perjury Show Winners

By FRED S. HOFFMAN WASHINGTON (AP) - Demo crat John F. Kennedy apparently has pulled almost even with Republican Richard M. Nixon as they sprint toward the finish in their hectic race for the presihectic race for the presidency.

But a new Associated Press survey indicates that, with election day only three weeks ahead neither candidate has been able to grasp a clear advantage in 17 states numbering nearly half of ... the 537 electoral votes.

It is among this undecided group that the winner likely will be decided. He will need 269 electoral votes

This latest AP checkover of the political situation in all 50 states gave some evidence that Sen. Kennedy might be gaining an edge in some of the big doubtful states -like New York (45), Pennyslvania (32), California (32), and Michigan (20).

At the same time, some of the states in this group seemed to be tending toward Vice President Nixon-Minnesota (11), Utah (4) and New Mexico (4).



render on the charges in the near future, making a total of 20 contestants accused Van Doren, Bloomgarden and Miss Van Nardroff all were top winners on the defunct show "Twenty-One."

Each is charged on two misdemeanor counts-giving false testimony before a September 1958 jury which investigated grand rigged TV quiz shows, and giving different testimony on the same subject before a July 1960 grand



Cloudbursts measuring up to 13.4 inches at Refugio flooded parts of South Texas Monday, forcing 400 families from their homes. Tornadoes caused more than half a million dollar damage in Seguin alone and left 14 people hurt.



Rains Delay Paving Job

Weekend rains which extended through today have forced a de-lay in laying the first hot-mix pavement under the assessment paving program.

Contractors, H. G. Counts and W. D. Caldwell had scheduled today as the day for beginning final work on 6th Street. Provided no more rain falls, however, the work should begin within two days, ac-cording to City Manager A. K. Steinheimer.

At the present time about 45 blocks have been signed for paving under the assessment program. This is slightly less than half originally outlined by the city for

Mechanics liens have been secured in the amount of \$204,789.-19, which includes the cost of all phases of the program such as inspection, engineering design, test-ing and field surveys. Of the amount thus far approved

for paving, the property owners' bill comes to \$146,861.88, Steinheimer said. The city's share to date is \$57,927.31. The total cost of the program is \$446,688.07.

Kennedy had said they should not be abandoned under the muzzles of Communist guns, but he termed them indefensible and called for a clearly drawn line of defense around Formosa.

Nixon met Sunday with former U.N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, his vice presidential running mate, and other GOP leaders to map out the conclusive last three weeks of the campaign.

Nixon and Lodge huddled in a Hartford hotel for the better part of an hour Sunday as they took time off from active campaigning to take a sight on the home stretch of the campaign. Lodge later accompanied the vice president to a conference of high echelon political advisers. STANDARDS

Changes In Industrial Trends

In a recent analysis of Texas industrial trends, The Bureau of Business Research. University of Texas, concludes that Texas economy is entering a new phase that will call for a change in approach.

Examining the factors which produced industrial growth in the past and those which are favorable for Texas now and in the future, the study thinks that "more active measures will have to be taken in the future to maintain the rates of over-all development that have matured in the past. For the kinds of industry that appear to offer the best growth potentials are those for which very active interstate competition exists. This competition will undoubtedly become stronger as time goes by.

The consensus, it goes on, is that the future crude oil producing activity in the state will most probably decline slowly; the outlook for natural gas marketing is much brighter. Refining may grow, but more slowly and any event this type of operation will not provide a dynamic basis for further expansion. This will cause slower expansion in allied industries. Similarly, the airframe industry has come to a definite slow down if not a shutdown,

and unless versatility is achieved it is in for bad sledding.

The long-range prospects for the petrochemical industry appear very good, but some slowdown in the postwar expansion rates is due for the next four or five years. The electronics field offers considerable possibilities, possibly 10,000 more jobs within the next decade.

Steel, on the contrary, will increase about a fourth instead of trebling within the next decade, largely due to stiff import competition. A few other areas of industy don't offer the rates predicted for them a few years ago, but on the whole the picture isn't dark.

Aside from what we will be making for the growing national market, Texas will need to supply almost two million more people by the end of this decade. "This increase...combined with continued advances in per capita incomes, will generate substantial support for expansion in those segements of the industrial economy geared to state and regional markets," observed the analysis. Perhaps this latter observation is something for localities to keep in mind in their program of industrial development.

Around The Rim How To Bake An Elephant's Foot

You've heard the story about the fellow who strolled into the restaurant which had boasted that it could fill any order the customer placed and put the claim to the test by ordering "elephant ears." The waiter, in time, came back and had

to admit the cook couldn't fill the order because "We don't have any buns that big."

A SERIOUS ARTICLE entitled "How to Bake an Elephant's Foot," was once printed by McMillan and Co. in London, however. It was written by Sir Samuel White Baker, who obviously had partaken of the morsel.

Perhaps it's just as well self-rule is becoming the order of the day in Africa. How would you like to exist on such a diet until the end of the monsoon season?

AT ANY RATE, here's the recipe: "Although the flesh of the elephant is extremely coarse, the foot and trunk are excellent, if properly cooked. "A hole should be dug in the earth, about four feet deep and two feet six

inches in diameter, the sides of which should be perpendicular; in this a large fire should be lighted, and kept burning for four or five hours with a continual supply of wood, so that the walls become red-hot.

"At the expiration of the blaze, the foot should be laid upon the glowing embers, and the hole should be covered closely with thick pieces of greenwood laid para-Ilel together to form a ceiling. This should be covered with wet grass, and the hole should be plastered with mud, and stamped lightly down to retain the heat.

"UPON THE MUD a quantity of earth should be heaped, and the oven should not be opened for 30 hours or more. At the expiration of that time, the foot should be baked and the sole will separate like a shoe and expose a delicate substance that with a little oil and vinegar, together with an allowance of pepper and salt, is a delicious dinner that will serve about 50

The ugly, polysyllabic business of homosexuality seems to be the accepted iniquity of our declining republic. At least, there is much testimony to that effect. ALLEN DRURY'S Pulitzer Prize novel, "Advise and Consent," now on the boards as a play, turns upon the suicide of a senator whose World War II love affair with a man is threatened with expo-

sure. An international crisis, involving the death struggle between the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R., is made to hang and swing upon this scarlet secret. But the villains of the piece are not the sinners-the villains are the ruthless power-seekers and ranting demagogues who wrongly used the dirty information for selfish ends.

Gore Vidal's Broadway hit, "The Best Man," also uses male homosexuality as a central cog. In this play the hero and the villain are deadlocked at a Philadelphia national convention for the party nomination. The liberal hero is brought some court martial evidence concerning another of those World War II homosexual orgies (that's all our boys had to do, you see)

"I FIT INTO THIS town like a hand in a glove," said the exuberant Behan in a green suit of Irish tweed, his white shirt opened in Byronic splendor at the throat, as we met in the lobby of New York's Algonquin Hotel at 3:15 p.m. "If this town is hell, then I'm a devil; I fit it so well

"Ah, sweetheart, I've had no luncheon," he went on in his Dublin accent. And although he is off "the gargle." Behan has taken a great fancy to Tim Costello's and other Third Avenue oases, and we headed in that direction.

LIKE HARRY S. Truman, Behan is a walker and death on New Yorkers who take a taxi to go around the block.

David Lawrence Khrushchev Enters The Campaign

WASHINGTON - Nikita Khrushchev has defied all the rules of fair play in diplomacy - he has deliberately interfered in a national political campaign inside a foreign country.

By coming to the United States in the midst of a presidential contest and carrying on a sustained attack against the policies of the Eisenhower administration, he has endeavored to arouse the American people to repudiate their own government at the polls.

MR. KHRUSHCHEV knows well that all over the world the American presidential election is being watched by foreign governments and peoples, and that the outcome of the contest is being awaited to learn primarily whether the American people have given a "vote of confidence" or have voted "no confidence" in the present administration

Mr. Khrushchev in his speeches has dwelt on various aspects of the foreignpolicy issue that is being debated by the supporters of Vice President Nixon and Senator Kennedy. He keeps emphasizing the U-2 issue and goes out of his way to embrace Fidel Castro at a time when opposition speakers in the campaign are blaming Communist ascendancy in Cuba on the Eisenhower administration

EVEN THE DORMANT issue of admitting Red China to the United Nations was revived by the Soviet premier during his visit here. He knows full well Democratic party speakers in the campaign have begun to hint that Red China eventually will be admitted and that the United States will soon start appeasing the Peiping government through negotiations that plead for concessions to this country in return for a willingness to admit Red China to the U. N.

AT A TIME when there is discussion of the subject of admission of Red China to the U. N. - the recent vote on which has been referred to by Democratic party speakers as a defeat for the United States - the issue of defending Quemoy and Matsu is brought up by Senator Kennedy. There is naturally a good deal of confusion about it, and plenty of demagoguery. The United States has never taken the position that Quemoy and Matsu in and of themselves are strategically important and worth defending by our forces. Nor had Vice Presidnent Nixon modified in the slightest degree the position taken by the Eisenhower administration, which s that America will defend the off-shore islands only if a military operation is begun that can threaten Formosa.

FOR. SINCE nobody knows just how far the Red Chinese will go if they attack the islands, the American military judgment has been and is today that it is better not to be explicit about what

the United States will or will not do militarily. As a matter of fact, there have been intermittent bombardments of the islands for the past several years, and the United States has not become involved in any counterattack or defense of the islands themselves.

To say now that the islands will not be defended means telling the enemy that it is all right to begin an all-out attack on them and that perhaps the United States is weakening in her determination to defend Formosa, too,

IT IS ALSO of greaat advantage to Mr. Khrushchev to have American speakers debating just now whether Quemoy and Matsu are to be defended. It tells the people of Formosa and the people of the Philippines that, if Senator Kennedy is elected, there may be a change in American policy. This tends to weaken the alliance in the Far East between the United States, Formosa, the Philippines and South Korea, and has subjected it to new strains, which the press dispatches from those countries have revealed in the last few days in commenting on the American campaign speeches.

Most dangerous of all to the defense policies of the United States today are the Communist inroads into Britain, where the British Labor party indicates now that, if it comes into power, America may be deprived of her nuclear bases there. This would weaken the retaliatory power of the United States and would be worth a great deal to the Communists in the event of war.

THE MOVEMENT in Britain, inspired by the Communists, started out as a debate merely on "banning tests." It now has taken on all the aspects of a crusade to "ban the bornb." Meanwhile, the Soviet Union refuses to agree to an inspection system to guarantee her good faith in banning tests.

The Communists make headway when the Western countries are lulled to sleep by cries by "hysteria" and "McCarthyism," which seem to be the customary way to try to stifle protest against Communist infiltration in every country in the West.

MR. KHRUSHCHEV may not appear to have gained much by his visit to the U. N. itself, but he has managed to help embarass the American people in their presidential campaign and, if the Eisenhower administration is repudiated next month with a "vote of no confidence" by the majority of citizens who go to the polls, Mr. Khrushchev will surely claim credit for his part in bringing about that result.
