# **Ghanian Probe Demand Rejected**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. General Assembly today rejected a demand by Ghana that the Congo debate be adjourned pending a full report on the clash between Congolese and U.N. forces in Leopoldville.

The defeat of the Soviet-backed move opened the way for a speedy decision on a credentials committee recommendation that a delegation headed by President Joseph Kasavubu be given the Congo's vacant seat.

The vote was 45 in favor of the adjournment, 50 against and 13 abstaining.



### Smoke Trail

When the engine shut down prematurely on a Redstone missile that was to earry a Mercury capsule on a test flight, the escape tower rocket separated from the capsule and scooted away at a 250-foot-a-second speed. The rocket, with capsule was still on the pad obscured by the smoke at the Cape Canaveral, Fla., launching site.

Force has safely brought back to earth a 500-pound space capsule using a combination of a drag balloon and a parachute.

The device, called a ballute, was tested successfully for the second time Monday at Santa Rosa Island, Pla. The capsule was shot to a height of 32 miles by a three-stage missile.

Four other rockets were launched during the day in re-entry tests at the Eglin Air Force Base site. Three of these also in-volved balloons.

The ballute system, devel by Goodyear Aircraft C worked this way: As the third stage of the rocke reached 75,000 feet, still coastin

upward at 1,100 miles an hour, a nine-foot balloon was released from the tail section. The balloon popped into shape in a tenth of a second and was reeled out on a cable to stabilize

the 500-pound capsule and slow down by atmospheric drag.

A strain gauge measured the amount of drag and radioed the information to the ground, while a camera recorded the balloon's performance.

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## John Garner To Be Honored On Birthday

UVALDE, Tex. (AP)-Former Vice President John Nance Garner marks 92 years of colorful life today by becoming honorary mayor of the hill country town where his political career began before the turn of the century. He expects to spend the day with old friends and a few visi-

tors, in comparative quiet com-pared to his oft-stormy 38 years in Washington and the sweeping celebration of his 90th birthday two years ago. Nevertheless, the occasion will be an impressive one for the still-

spry master politician and elder statesman who attains his longstatesman who attains his long-time ambition of spending half of his life a public servant and half in private life, the office of hon-orary mayor of Uvalde, conferred on bushy-browed "Cactus Jack" by Mayor Melvin Roland the City Council, will be the sixth he has

served as county judge state representative, congress-man, speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives and vice president between 1896 and 1940, when he retired from public life after breaking with Franklin D. Roose-

Garner has lived quietly since his unsuccessful opposition to Roosevelt's third-term bid, which provoked the vice president to tell a biographer "a president in his third and successive terms may not be a dictator, but he is the first cousin or half-brother of one, and he will act like one."

He opposed recognition of the Soviet Union in 1933 and "putting the government into business," which he termed "a violation of the nation's industrial and commercial fabric." Garner spends much of his time

chatting with visitors and shelling pecans from the trees that tower over his cottage. His callers range from former President Harry S. Truman, House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Adlai E. Stevenson to curious



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

## Marquis Childs Republican In The Treasury Post?

WASHINGTON - The Republican in the Kennedy Cabinet will be C. Douglas Dillon and the post he will in all probability hold will be Secretary of the Treasury. Although no one close to President-elect Kennedy would discuss this report, it is widely believed in Washington to be true. Dillon, Under Secretary of State for Economic Affairs, has been vacationing at his winter home at Hobe Sound, Florida, adjoining Palm Beach where Kennedy is staying at his father's ocean-front house.

KENNEDY SAID immediately after his election that he will not announce Cabinet appointments until after Thanksgiving and the conclusion of a brief rest period in Florida. When he met with Vice President Nixon they are said to have discussed the possibility of prominent Republicans serving in the Cabinet. Nixon is reported to have questioned the advisability of Republicans accepting high positions under a Democratic president.

But while Dillon is a Republican and many believed he would have been Nixon's Secretary of State, he did not take part in the campaign that ended two weeks ago. As a member of the top team in the State Department, he kept out of partisan politics in accord with a tradition that has held, with some exceptions, since the war. Secretary Herter and the political Ambassadors in leading posts abroad also stayed out of the campaign.

THE FACT that he was not active in the campaign is said to be one reason why Dillon could accept a post in the Kennedy administration without comprising his party. His appointment to the Treasury would reassure Europeans who have been concerned over reports that the dollar would be devalued and that the new president's spending policies might further weaken America's fiscal position and lead to a continuing drain of gold reserves, in the view of those urging the appointment on Kennedy.

Dillon was named Ambassador to France by President Eisenhower in 1953. Before that he was chairman of the board of Dilion, Read & Co., a large investment firm founded by his father, Clarence Dillon.

ONE OF KENNEDY'S major problems is to find a way to correct the balance of payments which for the past two years have been running against the United States and to stop the drain on the nation's gold. During the campaign Kennedy pointed out that if all the dollars held by foreign owners were presented with a demand for gold there would be a deficit instead of the present \$18 billion gold

The herculean nature of this task in a Cabinet presumably dominated by Democrats subscribing to the views Kennedy advanced on the necessity of government intervention in the economy is one reason Dillon may be reluctant to accept the Treasury post. But he likes public office and he has demonstrated his capacities both in the ambassadorial post in France and in charge of economic affairs in the State Department.

DILLON HAS had a leading part since

1958 in trying to bring the two European trade areas-the six nations under the domination of France and West Germany and the seven under the direction of Britain-together to prevent a disastrous trade war. At one point the British were deeply resentful of Dillon, feeling that he had

thrown all his weight behind the six. He has also been instrumental in bringing the United States into cooperation with all European powers for economic consultation and coordination. Dillon is shortly going abroad with Secretary of the Treasury Robert Anderson. One of their chief objectives is to persuade European powers, now completely recovered and enjoyng high prosperity, to take a greater part in helping the under-developed countries.

MAKING THE Kennedy Cabinet is, during this interval, one of Washington's chief indoor sports. It has been eight years since such an opportunity presented itself to Washingtonians who are habitually addicted to speculating over place and power, and this political capital is making the most of it.

There would be precedent for Dillon's appointment to the Treasury post. President Roosevelt in 1933 named William H. Woodin, wealthy manufacturer and at least a nominal Republican to be Secretary of the Treasury in his New Deal Cabinet. The Under Secretary was T. Jefferson Coolidge, a conservative Democrat, who later became a Republican. Roosevelt, like Kennedy, had promised a balanced budget. Woodin died after only a few months in office and Coolidge resigned in indignation over New Deal measures and the deficit spending they meant.

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### WHAT OTHERS SAY

National courage stands out in some of the British government's more important decisions on defense. The expected decision to permit a new kind of military base in Britain is definitely in this category. British officials reportedly have agreed to allow a submarine tender to be based at a port in Scotland. Its mission would be to supply nuclear-powered submarines armed with Polaris missiles

The Soviet government is certain to be enraged by this decision. Premier Khrushchev regards United States plans to deploy Polaris submarines in the North Atlantic as a policy "at the brink of war." Actually it is no more than a countermove to Russia's aiming large numbers of longrange ballistics missiles at the U.S. and targets in Western Europe-especially

The utterly exposed position of the British may not be fully appreciated in this country. More than 50 million British people live on an island whose area is slightly smaller than the state of Oregon. It would not take more than a dozen hydrogen bombs to obliterate the island's large population centers.

Much of the pacifist thinking by a British minority is based on fear of the "tight little island's" vulnerability. Early this month the Labor party voted down its leader, Hugh Gaitskell, and approved a resolution calling for unilateral disarmament. Now Laborites plan to oppose the Polaris base project in Parliament.

But the great majority of the British do not support this point of view. The government therefore is willing to increase that country's support of the Allied deterrent force. Already 60 U.S. Thor missiles -with a 1,500-mile range-are in launching position on British soil. Britain also provides bases for at least 200 bombers of the U.S. Strategic Air Command.

Now the British are willing to go one step further to provide needed facilities for Polaris submarines. This revolutionary fleet will include five vessels by next year. Each will be outfitted with 16 missiles.

By furnishing these vital bases in defiance of Soviet threats, the British are making the very finest kind of contribution to the defense of the West. Their determination surpasses anything that they might be able to offer in the way of planes, weapons or manpower.

As I said at the outset, it's probably because I never voted this way until a few years ago. The state where I cast most of my ballots prior to 1956 employed an entirely different method.

THE BALLOTS WE handled listed the candidates and the offices, just as do the Texas ballots. The Democratic candidates were named in one column, the Republicans in another, the Socialists or whatever other party there might be in a

At the top of each column was a symbol. Clasped hands, I recall, was the Socialist mark; an eagle over the Democratic column, and so on. Underneath each symbol was a large circle.

If a voter wanted to vote a straight Democratic ticket, he stamped an "x" in the circle under the Democratic symbol. He was then through voting. If, on the other hand, he wanted to vote for some Democratic candidates and for other Republican candidates, he placed an "x" in small squares to the left of their names.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES was he permitted to write on the ballot, mark on it with a pen or pencil or otherwise indicate his choice other than by the rubberstamp "x". If he was foolish enough to disregard this rule, his ballot was ruled as invalid and none of his votes were count-

Another thing which baffles me is the lack of privacy I find when I go to the polls to vote. Everyone votes at tables,

It's what you are accustomed to do that with no barrier between one voter and the next in line. All you have to do, if you want to, is look over the fellow's shoulder sitting next to you and you can see exactly how he is voting. How I vote is strictly my own business, and I do not enjoy having some passerby scanning my

WHERE I CAME from, we voted in booths, curtained in such a way that the voter is invisible to any other person. Further, persons who are not actually voting are forbidden to approach too close to the booths. When you had balloted, you folded your vote so that no one can see how it was marked and deposited it in the

Another system which I think has an element of fairness not encountered in the Texas method is the position of the names on the ballot sheet itself.

The plan I refer to, shifts the bottom name to the top of the list of candidates for any office each fifth ballot. In other words, if John Jones, Robert Rowe and Dick Dare are candidates for sheriff, Dick Dare's name would be at the top of the first five ballots. On the sixth through the 10th ballot, Robert Rowe would be at the top. Dare at the bottom. The 11th ballot would see Robert Rowe drop to the bottom again and John Jones take the top spot. Everyone gets an equal shake.

As I said, it's largely what you are used to which makes a thing seem easier and better than some other method with which you are not familiar. Texas voters. I know have been voting as they do for a long, long time. They seem to like it, but they did mess up and lose a lot of ballots recently.

Voting is a pretty important thing, I hold. And if there are ways and means to make it easier to ballot and simpler to tabulate, I'm in favor of their adoption. -SAM BLACKBURN

Who or what can add jot or title to a city long since glorified by Michelangelo, Botticelli, Ghiberti, Cellini, Da Vinci, Brunelleschi, Donatello, et al? YET, TWO NEW somethings are being

added to Florence that are certain in one instance to delight the citizens and, in the second, to bring aid and comfort to tourists who pour in here from all over the world. Florence, which was a flourishing Etruscan city before the Romans moved in and took over, is about to be blessed with

its first American-style supermarket.

red-letter day for its formal opening, com-

plete with carts is Dec. 1. THE SUBSTANTIAL shadow of Gov Nelson Rockefeller of New York will hover over the supermarket premiere. It was his idea to establish such markets in Latin America and, when they proved successful South of the Border, to branch

What a boon to next season's footsore sightseers! To ease the arches by even one elevator, especially in Florence, is a great missionary work.

One would really have to live a lifetime in Florence to savor all its beauties. What the sensible sightseer (me, of course' does is to make up his mind what he really has time to see and digest. and stick to that schedule come hell or high water One man's art choice may be another's

anathema. But I come to Florence to commune with Michelangelo, Ghiberti and Benyenuto Cellini, that thorough rascal and braggart who was not only a genius as sculptor and goldsmith, but who wrote one of the most lively, dynamic and entertaining autobiographies on record.

CELLINI INTRODUCED me to the exuberant and lethal life of Renaissance Florence when I happened across his Autobiography" at the tender age of 12. I am certain my mother would have been as horrified to know that I had curled up with it as a latter-day mother at the thought of her 12-year-old daughter reading 'Lady Chatterley

But if there were rough passages in the "Autobiography" I was oblivious to them. It's only effect was to make me fall in love with Florence and Benvenuto. am always amazed, when I stand in front of the bust of Cellini on the Ponte Vecchio and the full-length statue of him in the courtyard of the Uffizi gallery, to note that this rascal and another of my heroes, the saintly Gen. Robert E. Lee, are dead-ringers for each other.

THE GOOD GENERAL would have recognized Benvenuto's gifts, but I feel certain he wouldn't have allowed him in the house. Cellini was a rowdy genious, but no one ever mistook him for a gentleman, which is probably the reason the centuries have not dimmed his "Autobiography"

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### Holmes Alexander Attack On Established Order

WASHINGTON-There is nothing sacred about the House Rules Committee and the Congressional seniority system unless you feel that men and institutions gain some reverence through long, honorable serv-The somewhat deflated apostles of the

"liberal revolution," although signally failing to stampede the country in the recent elections, are determined to demolish these two stalwart pillars of our republican form of government. It should be quite a fight. THE HOUSE RULES Committee began with the First Congress in 1789. Its membership climbed from five to 14 in 1935

(when it was packed by the New Deal) and is now at 12-eight Democrats and four Republicans. The committee was thought necessary because of the House's unwieldy size; the tendency of Congressmen to talk too much and to run in and out of the chamber on roll-calls and quorum calls; the plain requirement of this revenue-raising half of Congress to get its business done. Many speakers exercised "czarist" au-

thority-Clay, Reed, Cannon, Longworth -and the Rules Committee at first was an instrument of the Speaker. Later, after after many tussles for power, it became an instrument of the majority of the House. In 1939 during a revolt against the Roosevelt regime, Rules became (and has remained) the instrument of a conservative coalition. Its practical purpose has been to make the House stop and think before doing anything too rash. FDR PURGED ONE of its members.

John O'Connor of New York, and tried to purge the redoubtable Howard ("Judge") Smith of Virginia, But Rules survived many attempts upon its life down to last August, when a clique of 100 liberal members, known as the Democratic Study Group, laid out an assassination plan to be perpetrated this coming January. (Meanwhile, four of the six ringleaders were defeated for re-election). The salient points were that the committee be increased from 12 to 15 (that is, packed), majority (violating the classical structure till now. of parliamentary order), that a bill or res-

olution after 21 days in committee may be brought to the House floor by motion a method used in the 81st Congress and discarded

IN ADDITION, the liberals have discovered a target of opportunity in Rep. William Colmer (D., Miss.), who supported the successful unpledged electors slate of his state. In arguing that Colmer must be punished for committing Democratic disloyalty, the liberals are embarrassed by a precedent. In 1956, Rep. Adam Clayton Powell (D., N. Y.), bolted his party for Mr. Eisenhower, Powell, a Negro, was not punished. He retained his number two position on the Labor-Education Committee, of which he becomes chairman in January.

The seniority system also has a life span equal to that of the Republic. The First Congress, and all Congresses since have distinguished between the senior and junior Senators.

Against this very time-honored custom, Senator Joe Clark (D., Penna.) has given notice that he is taking arms.

LAST AUGUST, in a joint press conference with the present President-elect Kennedy, Clark blamed the seniority system for the falure of his party to put across its post-convention program of social welfare. Clark vowed that, along with Rep. Emanuel Celler (D., N.Y.), he would introduce legislation to heave the gray-haired chairmen from their posts. gerrymander the committees so as to make them fit the liberal mold and, in general, turn Congress into an automated stamper of leftist programs.

WE SEEM TO BE set, then, for an historical drama of familiar but fascinating plot. The revolutionaries of the left, from France to Russia to China to Cuba, have always attacked the standing institutions - the church, the crown, the courts, the vested wealth, the orderly
