Little Attention To Bond Election

Little interest is being displayed in the forthcoming county bond election on Dec. 3. Only two absentee ballots have been deposited with the county clerk. Deadline for absentee voting is Nov. 30. The Howard County Commissioners Court is disturbed over the apathy indicated. The commissioners initiated the proposal for a bond election to provide the county with funds to acquire right-of-way on four state road projects tentatively docketed for 1961-62. The Big Spring Chamber of Commerce circulated petitions at the request of the commissioners and presented them to the court. The petitions asked that the commissioners call a bond election for Dec. 3, to provide the county with \$150,000. This money would be used to pay for land needed to transform U. S. 87 into a four-lane highway from Big Spring north to the Martin County line; for right-of-way for FM 700 from IS 20 north to connect with SH 350; for FM

846 in the north-central part of the county and for FM 700 west from U. S. 87 to IS 20. The commissioners are gravely alarmed at the lack of interest in the project. They point out that unless funds are made available to insure the purchase of the land needed, the county stands to lose these important State High Department road projects. The county has been able to pay for right-of-way from Fairview northward to the Martin County line on U. S. 87 but needs much more money to pay for the right-of-way from Fairview to the Big Spring city limits. The commissioners pointed out that to retire the bonds, the tax rate would be increased only four cents. They also point out that after 1964, an earlier bond issue will be retired and the tax rate can be reduced. They urged that all qualified electors eligible to ballot inform themselves on the bond proposal and go to the polls on Dec. 3.

Jones Asks A Rehearing In School Annexation Case

Gil Jones, attorney for the Howard County School Board has filed a motion for rehearing of the appeal brought by Gay Hill and Center Point before the Texas Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland. The court recently overruled the holding of the 118th District Court in the case and remanded it to Big Spring for trial. Jones said that in the event the motion for rehearing is denied, he will immediately begin preparing to take the case to the Supreme Court on a writ of error. The case was before the Eastland court after Judge Ralph Caton of the 118th District Court held that he had no jurisdiction to try a protest brought by the two school districts against the action of the county board. The county board had annexed the two common school districts to the Big Spring Independent School District.

Congolese Oust U. N. Aide, Then Run Wild

Ghanian Probe Demand Rejected

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. General Assembly today rejected a demand by Ghana that the Congo debate be adjourned pending a full report on the clash between Congolese and U.N. forces in Leopoldville. The defeat of the Soviet-backed move opened the way for a speedy decision on a credentials committee recommendation that a delegation headed by President Joseph Kasavubu be given the Congo's vacant seat. The vote was 45 in favor of the adjournment, 50 against and 13 abstaining.

It appeared to foreshadow a victory by the United States and others supporting the Kasavubu delegation. Ghana's J. E. Jantush said it was impossible to resolve the question until it had full information from on the scene. "We cannot sit here in this assembly and debate and discuss the seating of a government which has attacked this very organization," he declared. It appeared Kasavubu was slated to win. U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold spoke of the clash as "a most regrettable incident." He said he had requested a report from the U.N. Command and he hoped to have it during the day. Yugoslav delegate Dobrovoje Vidic supported Ghana's adjournment motion. Under the circumstances, he said, "It would be senseless and improper to continue debate."

U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth blamed Ghana for the current situation. He said that if Ghana had observed the normal procedure and recalled its charge d'affaires, Nathaniel Welbeck, there would have been no difficulty. He said the Congolese forces were acting "to enforce a legitimate expulsion order of the chief of state." Wadsworth said the incident was regrettable but the Assembly should get on with its debate on the seating of the Kasavubu delegation.

Western delegates predicted he would win by a comfortable margin, but the issue was complicated by fighting in Leopoldville Monday night between U. N. troops and the forces of the Congolese army chief, Joseph Mobutu. BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)—Southern governors responded quickly today — both for and against — to a high-level secret conference seemingly cloaked in confusion. First reports said Gov. Jimmie H. Davis of Louisiana, fighting to preserve segregation in New Orleans public schools, had issued an invitation for a Nov. 30 conference of Southern governors here. But the governor's press secretary said Davis had not issued such a call. Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi, now touring South America, said he would attend the conference. It was Barnett's office that made the invitation public. Joe Bullock, executive assistant to his office through mutual friends of Barnett and Davis. "It was by word of mouth. I think you will find they will have a meeting." The office of North Carolina Gov. Luther H. Hodges said he had received an invitation, but later said the communique received concerned a speech Davis made and had nothing to do with a conference. The office of Virginia Gov. J.

All-Night Battle Precedes Action

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (AP) — The Congo army forced Ghana's top diplomat to quit the country today after an all-night battle with United Nations troops, then went on a rampage. After Ghana charge d'affaires Nathaniel Welbeck left for home on a Soviet plane, the soldiers arrested and beat up scores of U.N. officials in revenge for the death of their field commander, Col. J. Kokolo, in the battle. Some U.N. workers were hauled from their cars, others from their houses. Thirty were held at gunpoint throughout the night.

Fire Sweeps Luther Home

Fire swept the kitchen of a Luther farm home Monday afternoon causing an estimated \$1,100 damage before the owner and neighbors brought it under control. Fire Marshal A. D. Meador said the blaze was extinguished when Big Spring firemen reached Neal Spencer's home about 15 miles out on the Gail Route. Meador said the fire apparently started from the trash basket in the kitchen where a still-burning match or live cigarette had been accidentally tossed. Kitchen facilities were damaged, as were the room's walls and ceiling. There was minor smoke damage throughout the house, Meador said.

McCoy Goes To Liaison Work

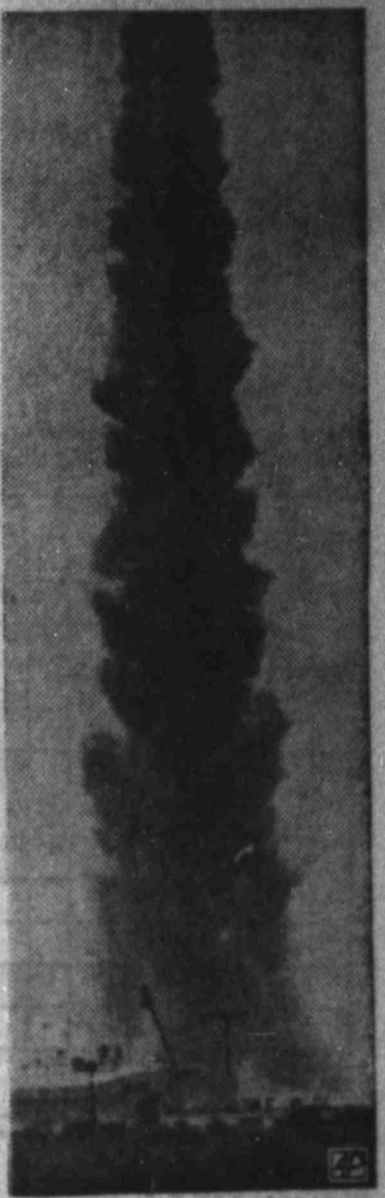

THP Checks 14 Accidents

Fourteen traffic accidents were investigated by the highway patrol officers in Howard County during October. In five of these, there were personal injuries. No fatalities were charged to the county during the month. Eight persons were sufficiently injured to require medical attention, the patrol reported. Property damage involved in the 14 accidents was \$16,562. This total was the largest for any of the counties in District 4A of the state highway patrol. The district comprises 24 West Texas counties. The highway patrol reported there were eight fatal accidents in the district during the month in which nine persons lost their lives. Ninety-five persons were injured in the 125 rural traffic cases investigated the state highway patrol. Total property damages were reported at \$92,692.

11 Cities Ballot On Water Project

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP)—Approximately 50,000 voters in 11 Panhandle and South Plains cities and towns ballot today on the aqueduct project. The proposal calls for the construction of the dam near Sanford northwest of Borger and 322 miles of aqueducts to carry the water to the 11 cities, if all decide to accept the water. Total cost of the project will be about \$86 million, of which about \$65 million will be for the aqueducts. The federal government will foot \$3 million of the total costs. The remainder will be repaid by the cities in 30 years from water revenues if the project is approved. No property taxes are involved. Two cities, Lamesa and Slaton will vote on only one issue—that of a contract between the federal government and the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA). Amarillo, Borger, Pampa, Lubbock, Plainview, Levelland, Tahoka, O'Donnell and Brownfield will vote on that issue and on a second question of a contract between their cities and the CRMWA. Slaton will vote Dec. 13 on the city-CRMWA. Lamesa will vote if its city government makes a final decision to take part in the project. Lamesa is studying whether it could obtain water cheaper from the Upper Colorado project.



Smoke Trail

When the engine shut down prematurely on a Redstone missile that was to carry a Mercury capsule on a test flight, the escape tower rocket separated from the capsule and ascended away at a 250-foot-a-second speed. The rocket, with capsule still on the pad obscured by the smoke at the Cape Canaveral, Fla., launching site.

AF Brings Back Capsule

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force has safely brought back to earth a 500-pound space capsule using a combination of a drag balloon and a parachute. The device, called a ballute, was tested successfully for the second time Monday at Santa Rosa Island, Fla. The capsule was shot to a height of 32 miles by a three-stage missile. Four other rockets were launched during the day in re-entry tests at the Eglin Air Force Base site. Three of these also involved ballutes. The ballute system, developed by Goodyear Aircraft Corp., worked this way: As the third stage of the rocket reached 75,000 feet, still coasting upward at 1,100 miles an hour, a nine-foot balloon was released from the tail section. The balloon popped into shape in a tenth of a second and was reeled out on a cable to stabilize the 500-pound capsule and slow it down by atmospheric drag. A strain gauge measured the amount of drag and radioed the information to the ground, while a camera recorded the balloon's performance. The capsule eventually reached a height of 170,000 feet. When the balloon had slowed it to less than the speed of sound (760 miles an hour), a parachute popped out and lowered the package into the Gulf of Mexico test range.

Long-Time Local Resident Dies

Jefferson (Dee) Purser, longtime resident of Big Spring and in the furniture business for 30 years here, died this morning at 7:13 a.m. He was 60. His death followed an illness of 19 years, the last two spent in the Veterans Administration Hospital here. Mr. Purser came to Big Spring in 1900 from Lee County. He was born Dec. 29, 1899 and married the former Essie Payne Crenshaw on May 6, 1923. He was a veteran of World War I. Funeral arrangements were pending this morning at River Funeral Home. Survivors include his widow; two sons, J. W. Purser, Big Spring, Bud Purser, De Licia, Chihuahua, Mexico; a daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Mitchell, O'Donnell; one sister, Mrs. V. E. Jones, Big Spring; and five grandchildren.

Sophie Song Spot, Stork Club Get Licenses Lifted

NEW YORK (AP)—The night club where Sophie Tucker performed without a valid entertainer's license has been slapped with a four-day police suspension, beginning Wednesday.

Police added the name of Sherman Billingsley, owner of the Stork Club, to their growing list of violators of cabaret licensing laws.

Miss Tucker recently sang at Jack Silverman's International restaurant with an expired license. The suspension means that the establishment may serve food and drinks, but cannot offer entertainment. Comedian Joey Adams was to have begun an engagement at the club Wednesday. Billingsley and three of his writers were found to have no

identification cards when police inspected the Stork Club Monday.

Under a 1941 ruling, all cabaret employes and performers must have identity cards—in effect, licenses—to work. They must be photographed and fingerprinted and pay a \$2 fee.

A citizens' committee touched off investigations when it charged that police corruption was involved in the issuing of the licenses.

A hearing was scheduled today for Jules Podell, owner of the Copacabana where Frank Sinatra has admitted singing without license.

Police said they found violations of work, state liquor or health laws at El Morocco, the Embers, Armando's and many other of the city's 1,200 cabarets.

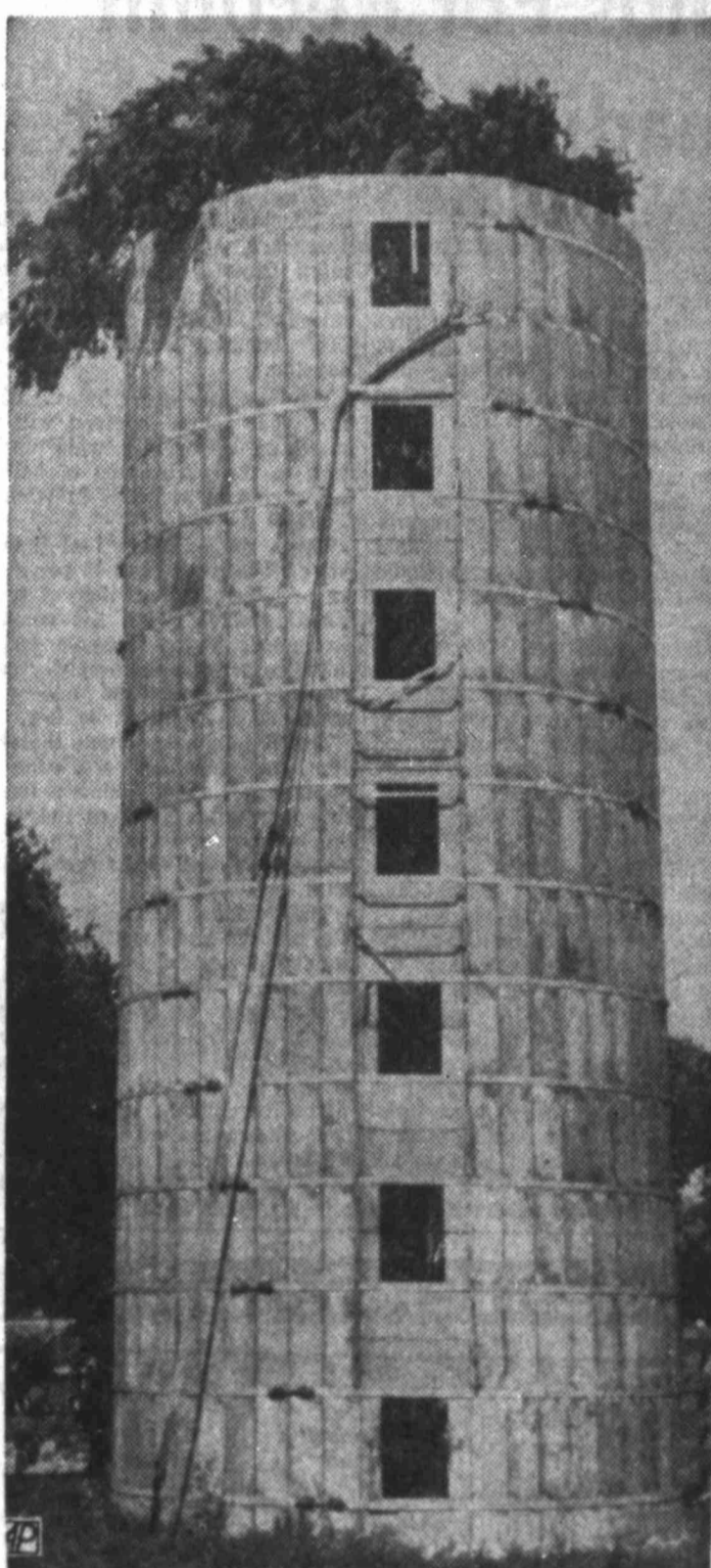

Transfer, Income Taxes Get Attention

DALLAS (AP)—The "transfer tax" and a state income tax appeared to be getting top consideration as the Governor's Tax Advisory Commission, meeting here Monday, wrestled with the state's financial problems.

The commission, which wound up its hearings at 11 p.m. Monday, is expected to turn over its findings and recommendations to Gov. Price Daniel in about a week.

The group worked on the projected state budget for the next two years and possible recommendations for new taxes to be presented to the Legislature in January.

Gov. Daniel attended the session, presided over by John S. Redditt of Lufkin, chairman of the commission.

The Dallas Morning News said a 2 per cent transfer tax probably has top priority although the State AFL-CIO is pushing for a graduated state income tax.

The "transfer tax" label was suggested because the term "sales tax" is unpopular in Texas and many legislators are on record as being opposed to it. Daniel has also stated his opposition to a sales tax.

As now proposed, the transfer

tax would be placed on practically all items except food and medical services at the retail level.

A flat 2 per cent, the News was told, would put about \$117,000,000 annually in the state's coffers—more than enough to cover the state's deficit.

State labor organizations are already on record as opposing any kind of sales tax, though they have agreed that a new evaluation of the state's tax structure should be made. The state AFL-CIO has recommended a corporate net profits tax, personal income tax and a mineral resources severance tax.

At the same time the union made its position known, it endorsed the proposed plan of Daniel for the state to seize all unclaimed accounts in banks, utilities, pipeline companies and the like.

John Garner To Be Honored On Birthday

UVALDE, Tex. (AP)—Former Vice President John Nance Garner marks 92 years of colorful life today by becoming honorary mayor of the hill country town where his political career began before the turn of the century.

He expects to spend the day with old friends and a few visitors, in comparative quiet compared to his oft-stormy 38 years in Washington and the sweeping celebration of his 90th birthday two years ago.

Nevertheless, the occasion will be an impressive one for the still-spry master politician and elder statesman who attains his long-time ambition of spending half of his life a public servant and half in private life, the office of honorary mayor of Uvalde, conferred on bushy-browed "Cactus Jack" by Mayor Melvin Roland the City Council, will be the sixth he has held.

He served as county judge, state representative, congressman, speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives and vice president between 1896 and 1940, when he retired from public life after breaking with Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Garner has lived quietly since his unsuccessful opposition to Roosevelt's third-term bid, which provoked the vice president to tell a biographer "a president in his third and successive terms may not be a dictator, but he is the first cousin or half-brother of one, and he will act like one."

He opposed recognition of the Soviet Union in 1933 and "putting the government into business," which he termed "a violation of the nation's industrial and commercial fabric."

Garner spends much of his time chatting with visitors and shelling pecans from the trees that tower over his cottage.

His callers range from former President Harry S. Truman, House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Adlai E. Stevenson to curious teen-agers who know Garner's name only from history books and their parents' conversations.

Until his 90th birthday, Garner often broke out a bottle of bourbon and joined guests in "striking a blow for liberty"—his term for having a friendly drink.

He gave up bourbon and cigars two years ago. He eats sparingly and is said by his friends to be in good health.

Professor Dies

GOP Demands For Recount In Texas Heading For Court

AUSTIN (AP)—Republican demands for investigation of what they claim was fraud in counting Texas' presidential votes headed today for a legal test in district court here.

State GOP officials, still hoping they may be able to swing Texas 24 electoral votes to Richard Nixon from John F. Kennedy, protested sharply when Atty. Gen. Wil Wilson refused to grant an immediate statewide investigation.

"All this does is to try to sweep the matter under the rug and forget it," Austin attorney Hardy Hollers told Wilson. Hollers was Travis County director of the Texas GOP for Nixon Organization, which

included many conservative Democrats who worked with the Republicans.

Wilson said he felt he was "leaning over backwards" to give the Republicans a court test of their claim that irregularity and apparent inconsistency in tossing out ballots in the presidential race constituted fraud.

The attorney general, a Democrat, told the Republican delegation he would do his duty regardless of party affiliation. He said his future action in the case would depend on what the district court rules.

Wilson denied the GOP request for statewide impoundment of ballots and investigation of the election in which the Democratic ticket of Sen. John F. Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson won by an unofficial 45,264 margin.

The official State Election Board count comes Friday. The Republican officials said they are "contemplating" a formal contest and injunction proceeding there.

State Democratic Chairman Ed Connally at Abilene called the GOP action "sour grapes."

"I don't think there has been any fraud," Connally said. "Of course there are always chances for a mistake. But I am sure that there have been just as many mistakes on one side as the other."

Stickney Rights Plea Offered

FORT WORTH (AP)—The U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals was told here Monday that the rights of Howard Stickney of Houston, convicted murderer awaiting execution, were violated by Harris County officers.

John Rogge of New York, a lawyer for Stickney, asserted that the conviction was based on an illegal confession obtained by persistent questioning over a five-day period and that Stickney was denied effective assistance of counsel.

Stickney was sentenced to death in the beating death of pretty Mrs. Shirley Elaine Barnes May 24, 1958.

Recounts Could Delay Final Data

WASHINGTON (AP)—Recount requests could delay even longer than usual the final, official tabulation of the vote cast in the Nov. 8 election.

With President-elect John F. Kennedy's popular vote lead now cut below 175,000, Republicans were challenging the results in sections of Illinois, New Jersey and Texas, and looking for possible grounds for similar action elsewhere.

Few, however, expected any overturn of Kennedy's electoral vote margin over Vice President Richard M. Nixon. It is the electoral vote—not the popular vote—which elects a president.

In that tally, Kennedy led Nixon 309 to 225, with 269 needed for election. Fourteen other electors, in Alabama and Mississippi, are not pledged to either.

Cleric Denies Ballot Slap

CHICAGO (AP)—The archbishop of San Juan, Puerto Rico, has flatly denied that Roman Catholics in that country will be punished for disobeying a church order on voting in a national election.

The Most Rev. James P. Davis in a statement Monday night said sacraments would not be withheld from Catholics who defied church instructions to vote against Gov. Luis Munoz Marin's Popular Democratic party in the Nov. 8 election. Marin's party swept the election.

His statement followed a report that the Catholic woman mayor of San Juan, Felisa de Gauthier, was ordered by her pastor to do public penance before she can receive Communion because of the way she voted.

Archbishop Davis, in Chicago for a meeting of the Catholic Church Extension Society, said his statement covers all three dioceses in the church's Puerto Rico province—San Juan, Ponce and Aracibo.

The archbishop said he had instructed his clergy that no sanctions or excommunicatory penalties were provided when Puerto Rican bishops jointly issued letters urging Catholics to vote against the Popular Democratic party.

Cold Front Hits State

A fast moving cold front swept into the Panhandle of Texas early Tuesday and was expected to clear skies as it swept southward.

Heavy downpours, meanwhile, continued in scattered sections of Southeast Texas as heavy clouds, rain and fog prevailed over the southern half of the state.

College Station was soaked by a heavy downpour of 2.42 inches that fell in a six-hour period while early Tuesday a heavy rain was in progress at Lufkin.

Shortly before dawn rain was reported at Beaumont, Galveston, Corpus Christi, Alice, Junction, San Antonio, Fort Worth, Tyler, Dallas and Wichita Falls. There was fog at Houston, Palacios, Brownsville, Cotulla, Austin, College Station, Waco and Lubbock.

Skiies were clear in Northwest Texas and cloudy elsewhere. Early morning temperatures ranged from 46 degrees at Dalhart to 66 at Galveston.

Gusts up to 33 miles an hour whipped Dalhart as a north wind accompanying the front bit deep into the Panhandle.

The forecasts called for temperatures as low as 25 degrees in the Panhandle Tuesday night with clearing skies and slightly cooler weather in the central section of the state. Cloudy weather with continuing showers through Wednesday was predicted for the southern part of Texas.

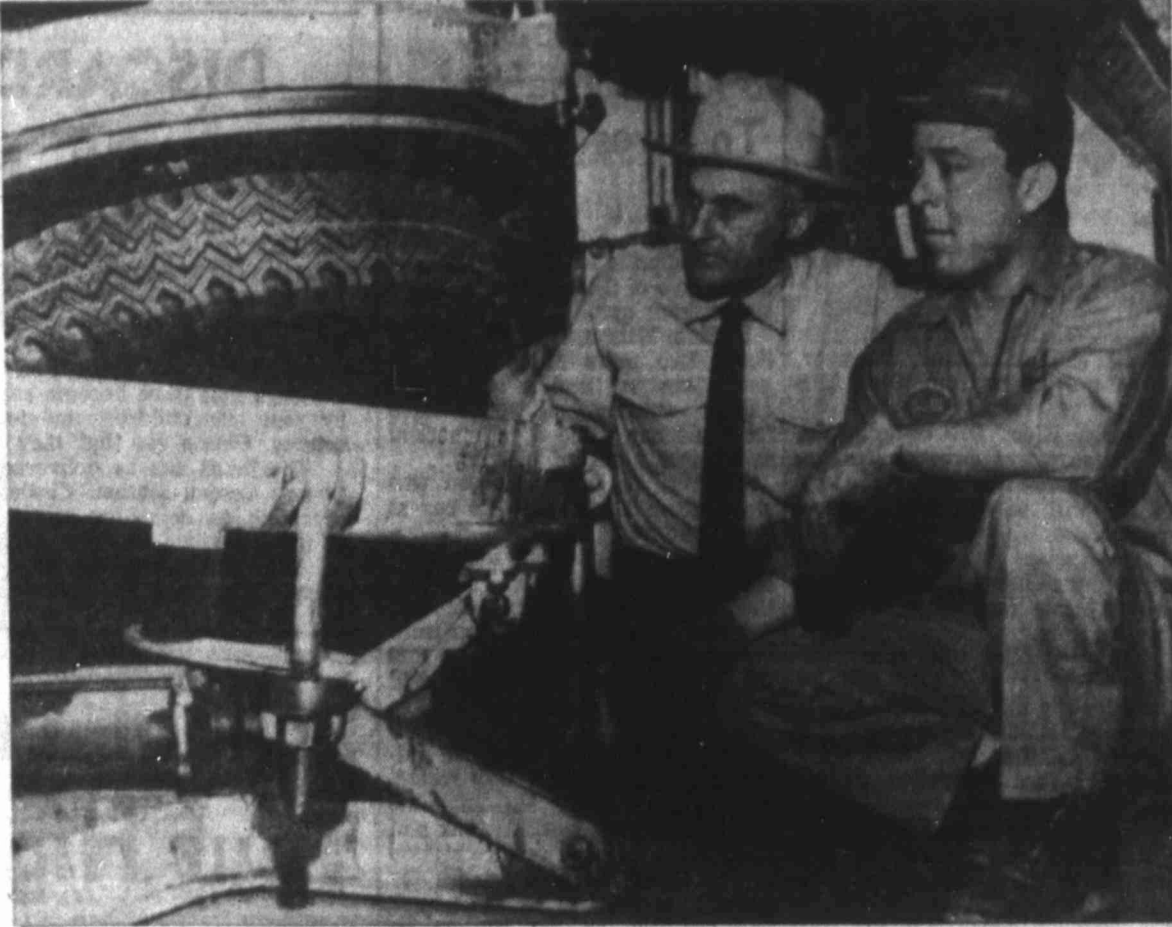

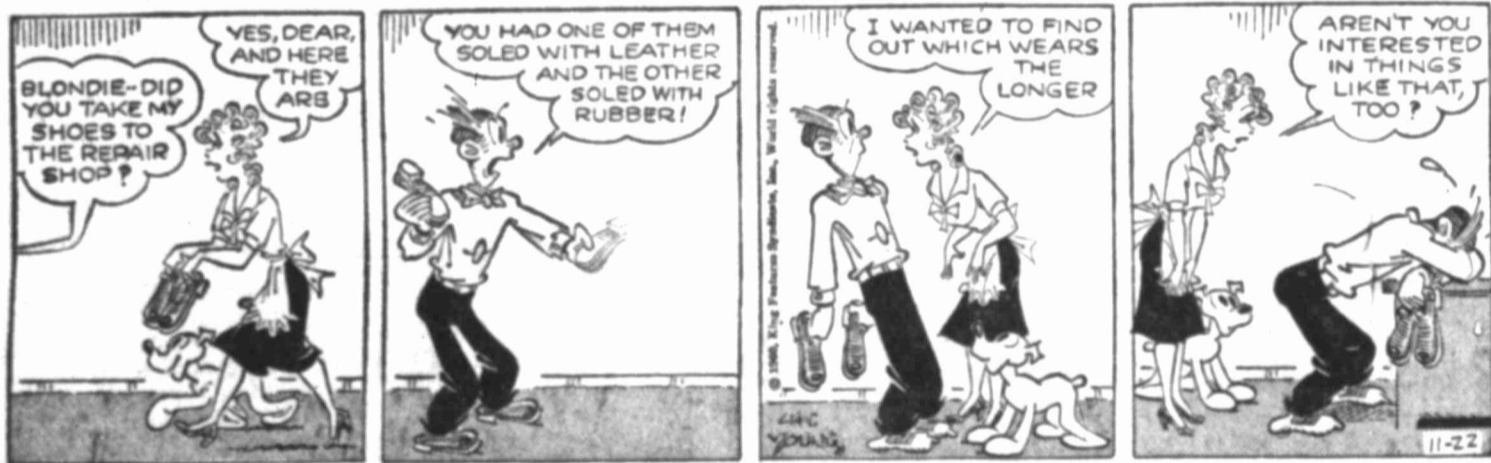

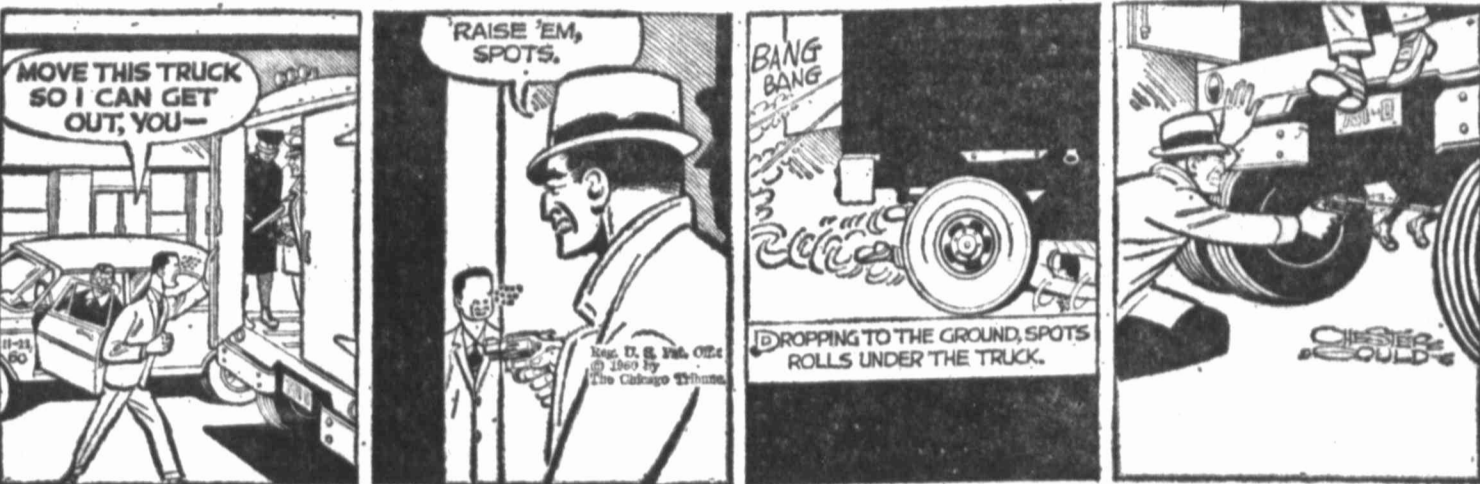

'Sing Along' Show On Video Schedule

NEW YORK (AP)—There's a pleasant little success story in NBC's announcement that "Sing Along with Mitch" will soon alternate with the Telephone Hour as a regular Friday night program.

Mitch Miller, the bearded man-about-town, had a fierce and long fight getting his first "Sing Along" special broadcast last spring.

Miller had reason to believe in his idea—a musical program consisting of old, well-known songs presented so that the home audiences could sing or hum along with the performers. He had made a series of "Sing Along" records and they were selling like mad, and not just to the teenage crowd either.

But the network had some doubts that such a simple, unsophisticated program would go over.

Came the day, however, and the hour-long special not only pulled a healthy audience, but resulted in an avalanche of mail from the approving public. Starting Jan. 27, it will have a regular berth on the NBC channel; a clear victory for the letter-writing public.

There is a touch of irony in the probable choice of presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty to succeed John Daly as ABC's chief of news and special events. Hagerty and Daly have been cronies since their days as reporters.

In the spring of 1959, Hagerty was chosen to award the TV news Emmy. The press secretary, with the nation's eyes upon him, opened the sealed envelope, broke into a pleased smile and announced enthusiastically: "It is my special pleasure to award this Emmy for news to my good friend, John Charles Daly." He paused, suddenly looked very flustered and then said, "I mean, to John F. Day of CBS."

There has been considerable confusion over the similarity of names of the two network news executives. Presumably, however, Hagerty will bone up a bit more on broadcasting personnel before he joins the industry.

Dinah Shore, warbling a few notes of "Jingle Bells" Sunday night inaugurated the Christmas music season a few days ahead of schedule. Before we've reached the hash stage of our Thanksgiving turkeys the TV screens, particularly during commercials, will be full of fake snow, carol singings, mistletoe and hard gift sells.

Patti Page and Dinah, incidentally, sing well together—but that series of sketches the star and Art Carney did together was a pretty dismal comedy effort.

Fred Astaire Gives Up TV, Aims At Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—It is cheering to us old movie fans to learn of a star who is giving up television for films, instead of vice versa.

The star: Fred Astaire, 60.

No other personality has won so many Emmies. Ironically, he was never nominated for an Oscar, but was given an honorary one for his contributions to the screen.

But honors have never swayed Fred. Though TV continues to pay him homage—for a while, at least.

"I've had fun doing television," he remarked. "It gave me the chance to do some things I never could do in films. For instance, in the last show, I worked with Count Basie, which I've long wanted to do. I had wanted to do a number, 'Miss Otis Regrets,' and I did. I could do a number in which I improvised 75 per cent of the dance—things like that.

"I wouldn't say that I have done everything I wanted to do. But I think I will let TV go for a while. I've done three shows in the past three years, and they take up a good part of the year.

"Now I'd like to devote myself to movies before I get too decrepit to do them any more. Movies have been good to me, and I've been lucky in the past few years to have done films that have been interesting for me and have been successful.

"I don't have any plans. And I won't make a film just to make a film. But I'm available."

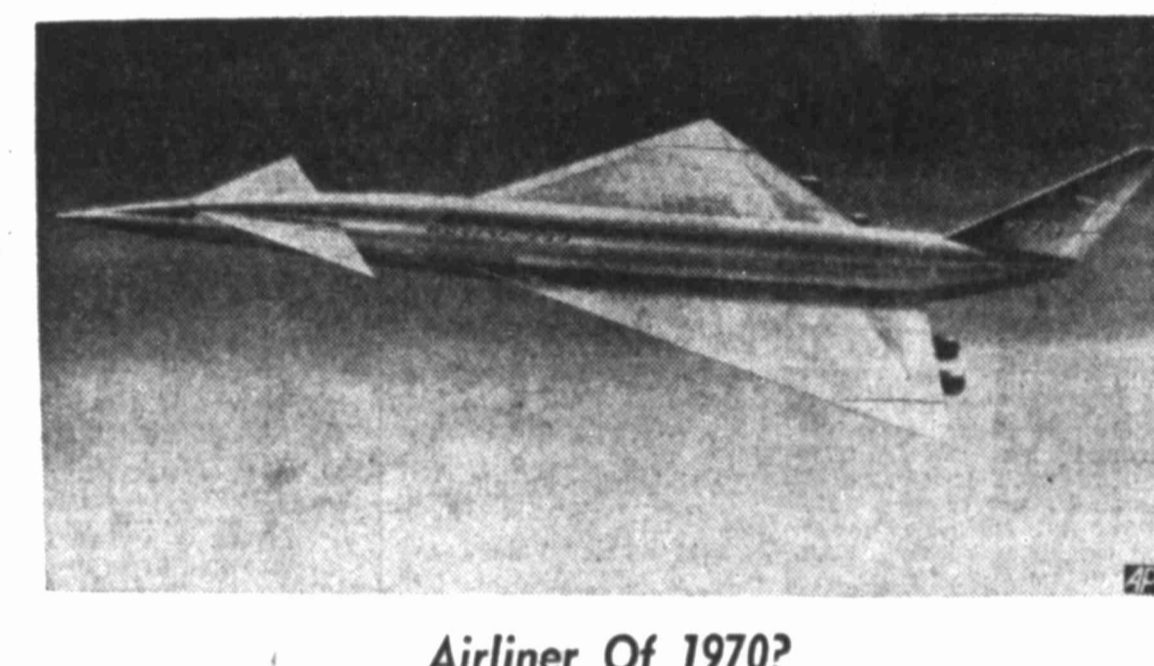

Author Norman Mailer Held In Stabbing Of Wife At Party

NEW YORK (AP)—Author Norman Mailer, 37, whose latest book is "Advertisements for Myself," has been arrested on a charge of stabbing his wife, Adele, during a party in their Manhattan apartment.

A similar action has been taken by the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists, with whom the SAG has been negotiating jointly with producers, TV networks and advertising agencies. Both unions' contracts expired last Tuesday.

Mrs. Mailer, 35, in critical condition with a knife wound in the stomach and one in the back, told police: "He didn't say anything. He just looked at me. He didn't say a word. He stabbed me."

Mailer had a penknife when detectives arrested him Monday night when he arrived at University Hospital to visit his wife. He was booked on a charge of felonious assault.

He refused to discuss the stabbing with newsmen. Later, his attorney, John Cox, told detectives that when he conferred with Mailer he had "encountered difficulty in talking" with him.

Police quoted Mrs. Mailer as saying her husband had "homocidal tendencies" and that his family had been trying to persuade him to see a psychiatrist.

Mrs. Mailer showed up at the hospital about 8 a. m. Sunday, three hours after the stabbing. She first told doctors she had slipped at a party and fallen on broken glass. They doubted the story and notified police. After an emergency operation she told officers of the stabbing.

It was the second time in eight days that Mailer had been arrested. A week ago Monday he was arrested at Birdland, a jazz nightclub, on a disorderly conduct charge after he argued with the management over a \$7.60 bill. A hearing was scheduled today.

Last June, Mailer, acting as his own counsel, was found guilty of drunkenness by a Provincetown, Mass., judge. Mailer was acquitted, however, on a charge of rude and disorderly conduct.

Sir Winnie Is Reported Better

LONDON (AP)—Sir Winston Churchill continued to recuperate today from a back injury suffered in a fall a week ago.

He had no callers this morning, but one of his friends said that "Sir Winston is continuing to progress."

The former prime minister will be 86 on Nov. 30.
