# **Another Canine** Rocket Flight

MOSCOW (AP) — A third Soviet space ship carrying animal passengers was launched into orbit today. The Russians said the vehicle was shot aloft for research.

Two dogs were aboard the 5-ton orbiting vehicle, Tass said. There was no word on whether Soviet scientists will try to bring either the dogs or the ship back to earth. Two canine passengers were returned from orbit in August. Laika, the first Soviet space dog sent up two years ago, perished in space.

The United States has orbited nearly 30 earth satellites and two satellites around the sun.

(In Washington a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the agency could not make any official comment on the Soviet launching until it received more details. But he added that on first glance the Soviet project "does not look like anything new.") dog sent up two years ago, per-ished in space.

The announced aims of today's vehicle, its equipment and even its weight was matched closely by the August space flight.

A series of musical chimes, traditional for important announcements here, preceded a midday broadcast of the space-flight communique over Radio Moscow. The announcement also was carried in the overseas service of the Soviet news agency Tass.

Editor's Note—While recommending goals for economic growth at home, a presidential commission said means must be found also to counteract the aggression and subversion of world communism in other nations. By STERLING F. GREEN WASHINGTON (AP)-"The nation is in great danger. Communist aggression and subversion threaten all that we seek to do both at home and abroad."

With that warning, the President's Commission on National Goals has underscored its call to Americans to shoulder still heavier burdens of armament and foreign aid in the 1960s. In a soberly phrased section

titled "Goals Abroad," the commission's report-placed this week in the hands of both President Eisenhower and President-elect John F. Kennedy-recommends this posture for the United States in the coming decade:

Stay stronger than the Soviet Union "at whatever cost"; hold firm in Berlin and wherever else the cause of democracy is men-

But strive constantly for peaceful solutions; stand ready to negotiate "on any reasonable basis"; and seek international control of nuclear weapons - "disarmament should be our ultimate goal." The report proposed no sharp deviations from the present poli-

It was only yesterday that individuals the world around, no matter what the currency regulations in the respective countries, were willing to risk jail-if neccessary-to squirrel away any of that lovely, rock-hard American coinage. As an umbrella for a rainy day, it was the greatest

BUT WITH GOLD draining out of this country at an alarming rate and the dollar under continued pressure, if not assault, the old gray mare-or cock-ain't what she used to be.

And if anyone doubts it, listen to this absolutely true story of the dollar venture of two of my old friends who have just returned from a holiday in Greece, which was literally saved by the Truman Doctrine and the American dollar after World

IN 1947, when Great Britain could not ment financially and militarily, the United States took over the burden or the duty or the responsibility-call it what you will The U.S., as its first gesture in this rescue mission, voted \$300,000,000 in economic and military aid. That was just the beginning. And the dollar was the most beautiful object that Greeks had seen since the Parthenon.

GREECE WAS A poor country and it is still poor, but the dollar preserved its independence and has continuously eased the nation's financial problems. Greece's unit of currency, the drachma, has been stabilized at 30 to the dollar for a number

Now what happened to my friends in Athens last week is not intended as criticism of Greece or Greeks. But the incident is shocking as a revelation of the once-proud dollar's current position in the eyes of too many Europeans.

It is understandably hard for Americans friends hired as a guide a woman whom they both liked very much. On their final day in Greece they planned to make her a substantial cash present, to show their appreciation, when they paid the regular

Like many Americans after World War II, these two pleasant, kindly Americans, who have traveled widely all their lives. discovered that the gift most coveted "abroad was American bills. So, like many other American travelers, they never go abroad without a supply of small bills for

Invariably the recipients were delighted. But not in Athens in November, 1960. Not in Athens, au courant with worldwide speculation that the dollar will be devalued and with the heavy drain on American gold stocks.

THE GUIDE, when she was given the gift of American dollars, was obviously distressed. That also distressed the two Americans, who couldn't quite fathom the situation until the woman blurted out that she didn't want American dollars

"Tomorrow they may only be worth half what they are today," she said dubiously. "No one knows what the dollar is going to do or how long it will be worth anything. Can't you get rid of them some

MY FRIENDS literally staggered under the blow to national pride, not to speak of their own. They were particularly upset to learn that their guide felt they were trying to "get rid" of worthless dollars by forcing them on innocent Greeks!

"I'd rather have drachmas!" the wom-

My friends gave her drachmas, stuffed the offending American dollars in their pockets and brought them back to the United States where they still have some social and financial standing. But there's a whole Ph.D in the above story.

#### David Lawrence Included In Our National Goals-

WASHINGTON - An important report has just been issued by President Eisenhower's Commission on National Goals. It is about 20,000 words long. It contains some penetrating observations. But who will read the full text of it? It covers two newspaper pages. How many newspapers could possibly give space in a single day to such a big output of words without sacrificing other news? Yet the

"IN FAR TOO MANY communities are inadequate of their coverage of significant public affairs. The problem of interesting and informing mass audiences, which most media must serve, is a constant challenge." If this same Commission had given a

little thought to how its own report might have gotten wider attention, and if other government agencies would do likewise, there would be a greater spread of such information.

THERE IS, FOR instance, no reason why this same report could not have been divided into separate sections, with each one released on a different day through a whole week. Thus, the section on foreign trade could have been dealt with separately. So also the section on national defense is a problem by itself. Similarly, recommendations on foreign policy might well have been the subject of a single release. Education is too important a topic to be merged with several others in one

Many parts of the big report are, of course, highly controversial. It is too bad that a dissenting opinion of one or two points is buried at the end of the long report instead of being printed immediately after the section that deals with this topic. An example is what the Commission says on racial discrimination in em-

"ONE ROLE OF government is to stimulate changes of attitude. Additional municipal, state and federal legislation is essential. The federal government should enforce the principle that federal funds shall not be disbursed to employers who discriminate on the basis of race. Similar policies should progressively be applied to federal grants for universities, hospitals, and airports and to federal housing programs.

ductions to any business that doesn't hire the employes that the federal government may wish to select for that business, irrespective of efficiency. Naturally, it might seem to require an amendment to the federal Constitution to do such things. But this is no problem for those who believe the present amending process is too "time-consuming," as President Franklin D. Roosevelt once said, and that it is much simpler to pick new judges to do any rewriting of the Constitution that may be desired.

THE COMMISSION on National Goals says some very fine things in its report and does lay stress on individual responsibility and the need for preservation of the free-enterprise system. But this appears to be contradicted by recommendations for bigger and bigger outlays of federal money for sociological purposes. Almost nowhere, except in the dissenting portions of the report, is any concern exhibited over the high rates of taxation faced by both business and individuals. No suggestions are made on how to produce more tax money, though there are many thousands of words about how to increase national output and augment our national growth.

SOME GENERALITIES and abstractions are to be found in this report-as in many others and in public speeches by prominent persons in both political partiesin handling delicately the subject of relations between management and labor. The idea seems to be that these two economic groups, when properly exhorted, will cooperate in a Utopian manner, There is not a single sentence about the damage being done to the whole economic structure-both in domestic and foreign trade-by the political ambitions of labor-union leaders who capitalize on greed and selfishness and let the public interest suffer. Much is often said about the need for higher wages, but little is said about the need for higher productivity and the elimination of waste.

EVEN AN ANALYSIS of the Commission's report cannot be done in a single dispatch, especially as to those broad and significant recommendations about nuclear weapons and the whole Communist operation in the "cold war." This in many ways affects our "national goals" more

# Congo Breaks

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP)-President Joseph Kasavubu today broke off diplomatic relations with the United Arab Republic and ordered Ambassador Murard Ghaleb and all his staff to leave the Congo immediately. In a letter to U.A.R. President Abdel Gamal Nasser, Kasavubu said Ghaleb had plotted to overthrow the "established authority" in the Congo and sought to encourage "rebel elements"-mean-

ing ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba. Ghaleb said he had not received the formal notification declaring him and his staff persona non grata but he said he would not oppose any order from Kasavubu to quit the Congo.

There was thus little likelihood the incident would flare into a battle such as the one that raged round the Ghanaian Embassy residence last week when Ghana Charge d'Affaires Nathaniel Welbeck refused to comply with an expulsion order.

Col. Joseph Mobutu, the Congolese strongman, threw Welbeck out of the country after Congolese troops battled with U.N. forces protecting the envoy.
