Kennedy Picks Williams As African Cabinet Aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect John F. Kennedy today picked Gov. G. Meemen Williams of Michigan to be assistant secretary of state for African affairs. Kennedy called the job second in importance to no other position in the new administration. It was his first major appointment outside of his White House staff. Kennedy made the announcement on the doorstep of his Georgetown home with Williams standing at his side. They had conferred at a breakfast meeting. Williams, who has served six

terms, will retire as governor of Michigan Jan. 1. The announcement here set advance indications that Kennedy had passed the talking stage and was at the point of making actual official assignments. In addition to Williams, he had appointments today with Robert A. Lovett, former secretary of Defense; Connecticut's Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff, and Rep. Stuart L. Udall, D-Ariz. All have figured in Cabinet and sub-Cabinet talk. Kennedy and Williams stood without topcoats or hats in freezing weather while Kennedy read a statement.

Soviet Union Orbits Dogs, Other Animals Into Space

Another Canine Rocket Flight

MOSCOW (AP) — A third Soviet space ship carrying animal passengers was launched into orbit today. The Russians said the vehicle was shot aloft for research. Two dogs were aboard the 5-ton orbiting vehicle, Tass said. There was no word on whether Soviet scientists will try to bring either the dogs or the ship back to earth. Two canine passengers were returned from orbit in August. Laika, the first Soviet space dog sent up two years ago, perished in space. The announced aims of today's vehicle, its equipment and even its weight was matched closely by the August space flight. A series of musical chimes, traditional for important announcements here, preceded a midday broadcast of the space flight communique over Radio Moscow. The announcement also was carried in the overseas service of the Soviet news agency Tass.

The 5-ton vehicle, Tass said, also carried other animals, insects and plants for Soviet scientists to study their condition via radio-television and other telemonitoring devices aboard. Its exact weight—not counting the carrier rocket that boosted into final orbit—was listed at 10,007 pounds. The dogs, latest in a series of Soviet canine space travelers starting with the space-dog Laika, were named Pchelka (Little Bee) and Mushka (Little Fly).

It was described as the "third space ship" by Tass. The launching was the first space exploit announced by the Soviet Union since Aug. 21 when the U.S.S.R. disclosed it had sent a 4½-ton space ship into orbit and safely recovered its cargo of two dogs and some rats, mice, flies and plants. The two dogs, Belka and Strizka, were later exhibited in their space suits before newsmen in Moscow. The Soviets said the animals were catapulted from the space ship and were landed gently in a capsule at a speed of 13 to 15 miles per hour. The first Soviet space ship was put into orbit last May 15. Altogether the Soviet Union has placed seven satellites in orbit around the earth since she opened

Ma Ferguson, Ex-Governor, Is Heart Case

AUSTIN (AP)—Mrs. Miriam A. (Ma) Ferguson, 55, suffered a heart attack at her home here Wednesday night.

Mrs. Ferguson was the first woman ever to be elected governor of Texas. She became ill at the home she and former Gov. James E. (Farmer Jim) Ferguson occupied here after their various terms in office, and was taken to Seton Hospital. Her condition was reported as fair today.

"I imagine she'll be in the hospital a few days," her doctor said. He said she had had a heart condition "for a long time." A resuscitator was brought to her home by the fire department and was used for about 15 minutes before she was taken to the hospital. Asst. Fire Chief Hollis Harrell said, Harrell said Mrs. Ferguson's doctor went in the ambulance to the hospital.

The doctor was quoted today as saying she is "doing a lot better." Mrs. Ferguson was first elected Texas governor in 1904 and won another term in 1932. After Jim Ferguson was impeached in his second term, Ma ran for the office on a platform of vindicating his name.

"Live and let live" is the motto of the state's only woman governor but she and her husband lived in the vortex of a political turmoil for a quarter of a century. Politics is still her main interest. When she turned 55 June 13, she declared, "I keep up with the news and I listen to what my friends say; then I do my own thinking."

The gentle, white-haired great-grandmother has in recent years been spending more time in her garden than, as she puts it, "visiting around."

Census Puts City Over 31,000 Mark

Big Spring crossed the 31,000 mark on the final population figures announced by the United States Census Bureau today. The exact figure was 31,230, an increase of 242 over the preliminary figures. This compared with a final figure of 17,296 in 1950, thus accounting for an increase of 80.7 per cent during the decade. All area cities gained somewhat on the final count, though some of them only slightly. Lamesa had 12,438 on the final count, a gain of 820 over preliminary figures and an increase of 16.2 per cent over the 10,704 population in 1950. 5,000 Ride In Santa's Sleigh

Radioactive Truck Stolen

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission says a mildly radioactive truck was stolen Tuesday from its test site at Camp Mercury, 40 miles from here on the desert. The pickup truck, contaminated by plutonium in a 1957 safety experiment, had been parked with four other contaminated trucks in the open beside a double fence. Trucks and fence bore radiation warning signs. The AEC said it is unlikely, however, that persons exposed to the stolen vehicle's radiation would suffer any ill effects.

Mahon Depicts Survival Fight

The United States is in a fight for its survival and the people must understand the gravity of this truth if disaster is averted. Rep. George Mahon, one of the nation's leading authorities on defense, gave it straight from the shoulder to a large crowd of service club members at the Settles Hotel Wednesday noon. Without any sugar coating, the 18th district representative warned that America had become too obsessed with soft living and luxuries and that the challenge of Soviet Russia would become more serious within the next four years. The congressman spoke from the advantage of nearly a score of years as chairman of the House subcommittee on military appropriations, a panel that passes an-

AF Commendation Medals Awarded

Three Air Force Commendation Medals were awarded to Webb AFB personnel during the Wing parade Wednesday. Col. Donald W. Eisenhart, Wing commander, made the presentations to Col. August F. Tautz, deputy wing commander; Capt. Ralph N. Hoffman Jr., Wing personnel officer; and S. Sgt. James C. Huckleby, Air Base Group housing supply section.

Col. Tautz distinguished himself as commander of the pre-flight training school at Lackland AFB to earn his award. He was cited for displaying unusual talents, leadership abilities, and professional ability in providing outstanding training for pilot cadets, navigator cadets and Air Force ROTC officers. He dedicated the school principally to producing a professionalism in officer training which would inspire a sound and correct interpretation of the rule of the Air Force in national and international affairs. During the period from August, 1957 to May, 1960, he started the Drum and Bugle Corps, first of its kind among pre-flight cadets, which played a large part in better community-Air Force relationships in South Texas.

Outstanding professional knowledge, initiative, and devotion to duty while assigned to the Alaskan Air Command, were the major factors attributed to Capt. Hoffman getting his medal.

During this period from June, 1957 to May, 1960, he served as chief of the education and training division with Headquarters, 11th Air Division at Lackland AFB. He used his technical knowledge of training and leadership abilities to develop an on-the-job training program for the division which received high praise from command inspection teams. During his first year in Alaska, Capt. Hoffman's performance was credited with increasing the proficiency of military testing activities to a point where no errors were noted during his last two years. He has served as OIC, officers division, Wing personnel, since arriving at Webb in July.

Sgt. Huckleby, 3560th M & S Group, was credited with providing invaluable service to the Japan-based personnel through his organizational and technical skill, superior supervisory ability and devotion to duty. During this period he was responsible for relocating

Appeals Court Upholds Ruling

Riley Edward Gunn, Odessa oil field worker who was convicted of murder in the bludgeon death Jan. 15 of Cecil Grady in Sterling County, must serve the life sentence imposed on him by a Sterling County district court jury. Gunn had appealed his conviction to the State Court of Criminal Appeals. Wednesday, the court upheld the district court findings. Grady was found battered to death beside a lonely oil field road in Sterling County last Jan. 15. Gunn, identified as Grady's companion the night before in San Angelo and Sterling City, was arrested.



Airman Escapes Unhurt

Visibly shaken, but miraculously unhurt, Airman Rodney J. Johnson, 15, Webb AFB, is pulled from the wreckage of his car which took a 50-foot plunge down scenic mountains late Wednesday afternoon. Investigating highway patrolman Jimmy Fuets said that Johnson climbed out of the front seat, walked around for a while before officers arrived, then got back in the car to escape the cold. A Nalley-Pickle ambulance carried the airman to the base hospital where he was held overnight for observation. He was released for duty this morning.

Highways For Progress

Howard County is in top position—financially, and in its over-all road program—so that the absorption of \$150,000 in bonds to finance new highway right-of-way can be handled without burden.

On Saturday, taxpayers of the county will be asked to vote on the issuance of this amount in bonds, so that highway development, as outlined by the state, will be continued at a steady pace.

PROJECTS INVOLVED are four-laning of Highway 87 North, extension of FM 709 as a connecting loop between Highway 80 and State 350, and closing of a gap in FM 846, in the north part of the county.

It is proposed to make the \$150,000 issue a seven-year affair, and this calls for a county tax of 4¢. Under the county's 20 per cent level of valuation, this makes the tax assessment very moderate.

BIG SPRING HOMES of eight employees at The Herald were checked for the cost of this issue. They run from 53¢ per year to \$1.24 per year. The average was 86¢ per year. These homes represent a good average cross-section of those in the city.

The county's bonded debt at this time is only \$1,405,000, represented in highway bonds of 1954, the courthouse construction bonds, and the more recent airport bonds.

THE HIGHWAY issue, set up for 10 years, will expire in 1964. This bond series carries a tax rate of 7¢, and this levy will automatically go off in 1964. The increase of 4¢ thus is in full effect for only four years.

There is no cheaper way to acquire more than \$2 million worth of vital highway construction.

FOR SEVERAL YEARS, the county has operated soundly enough to purchase required right-of-way out of current funds, but this has created a drain that affects the local road system. The availability of bond money for state highway projects means more current funds for the lateral road program.

This means that Howard County can have more and better state thoroughfares, and continue its splendid lateral road program. Few counties are so fortunate as to be able to take advantage of such a progressive program.

Jobs, Parade Seats Are Big Headache For Texas Solons

WASHINGTON (AP)—As soon as the outcome of the Nov. 8 election was apparent, Texas members of Congress began to receive telegrams and letters asking for job appointments and tickets to the presidential inauguration.

Most of them were from constituents wanting on the government payroll — seeking positions that turn over with a change in administration. While these jobs lack the security of those under civil service, they usually mean more pay and power.

The requests for credentials for the inauguration next Jan. 20 came, as a rule, from well-off Texans who want in on the fun and excitement of the inaugural events. Members of Congress get only a half dozen or so tickets for the inaugural ceremony, but they help out in getting inaugural ball tickets and hotel reservations and in other ways. Hotel rooms which overlook historic Pennsylvania Avenue, the parade route, already are booked up.

Warner Ruled On Suspension

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The president of Warner Bros. studio says he personally decided to suspend actor James Warner, of television's "Maverick" series, during a writers' strike.

Jack Warner testified Wednesday he did so after learning there were no available scripts for the series starring Garner.

Warner Bros. is suing to force the actor to resume work under his \$1,750-a-week contract. Garner contends the studio broke the contract with the two-month suspension. He asks \$341,000 damages.

ample, one letter recommended that Tom Wrenn, chief examiner of the Civil Aeronautics Board, who hails from Sherman, be appointed to the board itself. Wrenn knew nothing of this letter until a congressional aide told him about it.

Some mail on the subject of political patronage has been exchanged among congressmen themselves. Rep. Olin Teague of Bryan asked his colleagues to endorse Lewis David, Corsicana farm operator, for appointment as chairman of the Texas ASC (Agricultural, Stabilization and Conservation) committee.

Rep. John Kilgore of McAllen, Jim Wright of Fort Worth, J. T. Rutherford of Odessa, John Young of Corpus Christi and Bob Casey of Houston came to Congress after Dwight D. Eisenhower had won the White House in 1952.

"People who are wise in the ways of patronage tell me it is a mixed blessing," observed Kilgore.

"They say you may have a hundred persons seeking a job. Ninety-nine will be disappointed and frequently the 100th feels he was entitled to the position anyway. Competence and ability, however, certainly should be sought in finding the man to recommend for a job."

FBI Finds More Ransom Money

LOS ANGELES (AP) — FBI agents have found another \$100,000 of the ransom paid kidnappers of sportsman Anthony Alessio. To date \$182,515 of the \$300,000

paid has been recovered. Agents discovered the money Wednesday in a Los Angeles apartment occupied briefly by Frank Marrone, 31, one of five arrested suspects. The money was in a panel on the inside of a refrigerator door.

Alessio, kidnaped in San Diego Nov. 21, was freed unharmed after payment of the ransom.

Student Held In Attempted College Blast

AUSTIN (AP) — "The screws have got me, and I think they're going to put on the heat."

It was a 19-year-old University of Texas student speaking to his lawyer father by telephone Wednesday night.

The young law student telephoned his father in Dallas after Austin officers arrested him and a 20-year-old physics student for the attempted bombing 24 hours earlier of a student integration meeting.

Neither of the students was charged immediately although police said the physics student, from Kerrville, signed a statement admitting he made the bomb.

A meeting of 12 white students and eight Negro students of the University was started Tuesday night when the bomb struck a window of their meeting place in the University YMCA, teetered on the window ledge, and then exploded as it fell into a basement stairwell. Nobody was injured.

ONLY DAMAGE

The only damage was a broken pane, but police said the blast could have killed several of the students if the bomb, fashioned of one-inch pipe filled with an explosive, had gone through the window.

Detective Capt. K. R. Herbert said the 20-year-old student told him the device had been placed in a position to keep anybody from being injured.

The Dallas student declined to answer questions but was quoted by Herbert as asking "What was this alleged bomb made of?" He later told police such a device is not covered by bombing statutes.

Herbert quoted the law student as telling his father by phone: "The screws have got me, and I think they're going to put on the heat."

INTEGRATION

The integration group was meeting to discuss demonstrations at five segregated restaurants near the campus. Some restaurants around the campus have served Negroes for years.

Herbert quoted the Kerrville student as saying he had nothing against Negroes but he didn't want to eat with them. Herbert said the student claimed he just wanted to "shake them up."

The detective captain said the two students were arrested after the Kerrville student boasted to campus associates of the incident. The bomb explosion is the only violent incident which has occurred in Austin since integration began in the early 1950s.

addresses to which the cards are dispatched are correct.

The post office pointed out that by placing return addresses on the cards and by exercising special care in the matter of addresses, there will be less likelihood of the Christmas greetings going astray. The post office also recommends that all Christmas cards be mailed first class.

E. C. Boatler, postmaster, also called attention to the nearness of the Christmas holiday.

"It's later than you think," he said. "Let's not wait until mid-December to get the Christmas cards and gifts in the mail. By mailing now, you can avoid disappointing your friends and loved ones at Christmas time."

He pointed out that if you send your Christmas cards first class, you have the privilege of handwriting some personal message on the card. This is not permitted unless the mail goes first class. This makes your Christmas greeting more personal.

Mail your Christmas cards in two bundles, Boatler recommends. Free labels to go on each bundle are yours for the asking at the post office. These read "All for local delivery" and "All for out of town delivery."

The post office also asks the cooperation of all business firms to delay mailing any circulars or catalogs until after Dec. 25. This will help keep the way clear for the regular Christmas mail.

It was also pointed out you can avoid having to stand in line to mail packages or buy stamps if you go to the post office before 10 a.m. and between 1:30 and 3:30 p.m.

Christmas cards and gifts for all out-of-town destinations should be in the mail not later than Dec. 10 to insure they will reach their destination by the holiday. Those for nearby points should be in the mail not later than Dec. 15.

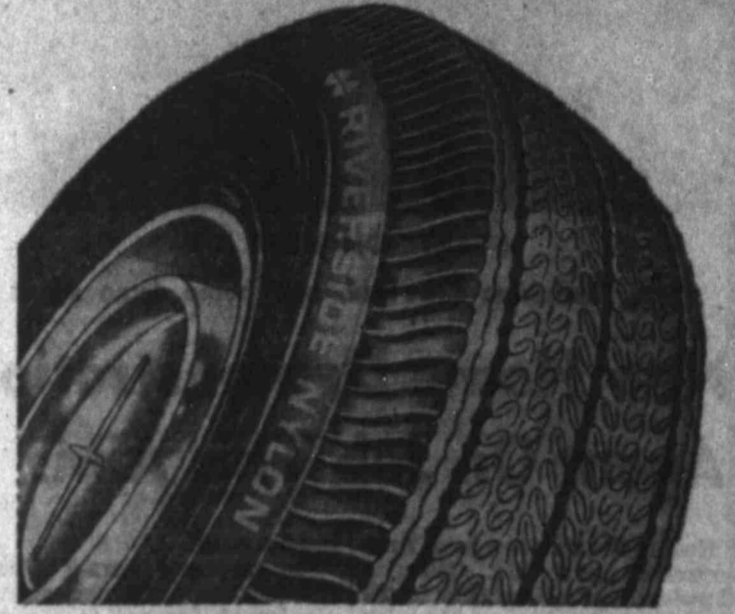

Foreign Goals Mean Work

Editor's Note—While recommending goals for economic growth at home, a presidential commission said means must be found also to counteract the aggression and subversion of world communism in other nations.

By STERLING F. GREEN WASHINGTON (AP)—"The nation is in great danger. Communist aggression and subversion threaten all that we seek to do both at home and abroad."

With that warning, the President's Commission on National Goals has underscored its call to Americans to shoulder still heavier burdens of armament and foreign aid in the 1960s.

In a soberly phrased section titled "Goals Abroad," the commission's report—placed this week in the hands of both President Eisenhower and President-elect John F. Kennedy—recommends this posture for the United States in the coming decade:

Stay stronger than the Soviet Union "at whatever cost"; hold firm in Berlin and wherever else the cause of democracy is menaced.

ULTIMATE GOAL

But strive constantly for peaceful solutions; stand ready to negotiate "on any reasonable basis"; and seek international control of nuclear weapons — "disarmament should be our ultimate goal."

The report proposed no sharp deviations from the present policies of the Eisenhower administration in the military or diplomatic areas, except in the output of money and effort.

It moved into highly controversial ground, however, in the realm of trade, tariffs and foreign aid. The commission took an internationalist view on issues over which legislators are bound to clash in the 87th Congress as they have in the past several congresses.

The bipartisan, 11-member commission of leaders in industry, science, labor, education, and public affairs, called for these measures to bolster the economy of the West under cold war conditions:

1. A "substantial increase" in foreign aid, started equitably by the larger free nations.

DOUBLED

The growth rate of the underdeveloped countries would be doubled—from 2 per cent to 4 per cent annually—within five years, the commission said.

"The U. S. share of such an effort would require by 1965 an outflow of \$5 billion to \$5.5 billion a year of public and private capital, as compared with \$3.4 billion a year in the 1956-59 period," the commission estimated.

2. A step-by-step, reciprocal lowering of tariffs and import

quotas by the United States and other industrial powers.

Two provisions which protect domestic industry from lower-cost foreign competition, the "peril point" and "escape clause" sections of the Trade Agreements Act, may have to be changed because they prevent further lowering of U. S. tariffs on some commodities, the commission said.

SEEK GOAL

"We should seek this goal while safeguarding the national economy against market disruption, against destructive competition as a result of grossly lower unit labor costs, and to preserve national defense," the commission said. In some rare cases, it said, tariffs might be increased.

Yet the commission recognized that even gradual tariff cuts would hurt some American industries and cities. It recommended government help to cushion the blow.

3. Correction of this country's deficit in international payments, which caused a net outflow of \$3.5 billion of capital last year, perhaps more in 1960.

On this point, a major current goal of the Eisenhower administration, the commission said: "At least three steps are essential to rectification: A much higher export surplus; larger participation of other developed countries in assistance to the underdeveloped; and more equitable sharing of defense costs among the Allies."

OTHER IDEAS

Many other proposals were offered to bolster the economic advance of the West and to bulwark America's cold war effort.

They included: Strengthening of U. S. overseas information programs; encouraging "far larger numbers of qualified Americans to live and work abroad"; developing better coordination of all existing aid programs, including those of international organizations; and devising "new forms of cooperation" to industrialize the poorer countries, in which those countries themselves would have opportunity to participate.

Of the over-all problem, the report said: "The power and opportunities of the Sino-Soviet nations are such that it will be a major task to prevent their expansion in the coming decade.

"Nevertheless, we must never lose sight of our ultimate goal: to extend the opportunities for free choice and self-determination throughout the world.

"We must stand firm wherever, as in Berlin, our commitments and interests are squarely opposed to those of the Soviets.

"A secure deterrent is essential. We must be ready to make the sacrifices necessary to meet the rising costs of such military capabilities.

"Nonetheless, we should try continually to find a basis for mutual tolerance and reduction of tensions. We should be prepared to negotiate on any reasonable basis."

Woman Denied Dollar Alimony

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A judge denied Ronnie Dick \$1 a year alimony when she divorced television actor Douglas Dick Tuesday.

She said she wanted the token payments so she could petition for a future increase if needed. Superior Court Judge Frederick Houser denied her plea when she said she will receive support from a previous husband until 1964.

Mrs. Dick, 32, alleged cruelty, testifying the 39-year-old actor was moody and anti-social. They married Sept. 5, 1955.

Lot Of Suspects

BALTIMORE (AP)—Baltimore police reported Tuesday there are about 1,400 prime suspects in the theft of \$40 from a concession stand.

The money was taken from the cash box of a concession at the city jail. Authorities said one of the inmates may have hidden the loot in his cell.

Latin Investment Opinions Differ

NEW YORK (AP)—American investors are taking a new look at Latin America. They've poured nearly \$9 billion into it. And stockholders of American companies with about \$1 billion invested in Cuba have seen their assets seized. Castro-like anti-Americanism rumbles today in other Latin lands.

But both the present and incoming administrations are on record as favoring more aid, private and governmental, to Latin development wants and needs.

Twenty-eight U.S. governors, just back from looking over investment possibilities in Argentina and Brazil, express views on the risks today that range from enthusiasm and caution to plain bearish.

American manufacturers already have stepped up their expenditures this year. The Department of Commerce reports they are pouring nearly \$75 million more into Brazil this year for new plant and equipment. In Argentina expenditures have risen to \$70 million this year, more than double the 1957-59 average.

Total U.S. investments are put at \$1.3 billion in Brazil and \$517 million in Argentina.

The views of the returning American governors were obtained by Alan Hathaway, managing editor of the Long Island paper, Newsday.

On one thing they seem agreed—Argentina and Brazil have more than four million square miles high in potentials for agriculture and hydroelectric power and rich in mineral deposits. In both countries the areas are waiting and anxious to be developed.

The questions private American investors will be asking the governors: Are Latin-American investments in general safe from future government interference? Are

prospects of returns greater than the foreseeable risks?

Here are the views of some of the governors as copyrighted by Newsday. First, the enthusiastic ones:

Arizona, Paul Fannin: "On investment, I feel there is a great potential, and Brazil has the greatest material resources." California, Edmund G. Brown: "I would recommend that industry invest in either country." Colorado, Stephen McNichols: "Looks like a sound opportunity."

But a note of caution is sounded by some.

Indiana, Harold W. Handley: "Investment advisability is predicated on stability in government." Kansas, George Docking: "Would depend on whether an industry had enough properly trained people to come down to live and supervise." Minnesota, Orville Freeman: "I was impressed with the difference between the historic development and institutions of North and South America, and I wonder why this is so."

Opinions leanings toward the bearish: Iowa, Hershel C. Loveless: "I do not believe that as a governor I could recommend investment outside continental United States." And Utah, George D. Clyde: "There are too many people who want something for nothing and (have) a lack of interest in real hard work."

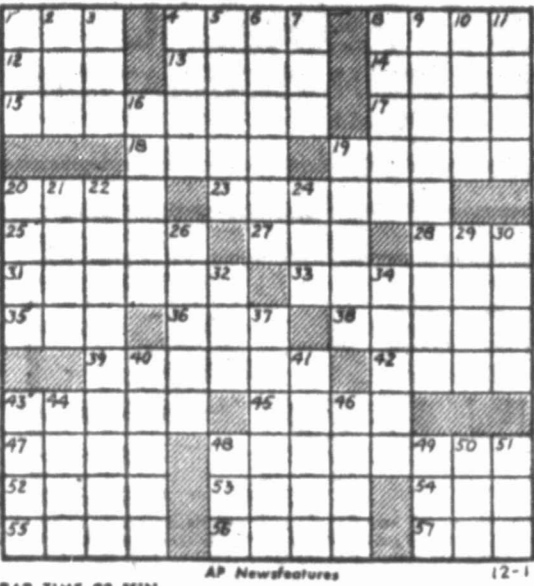

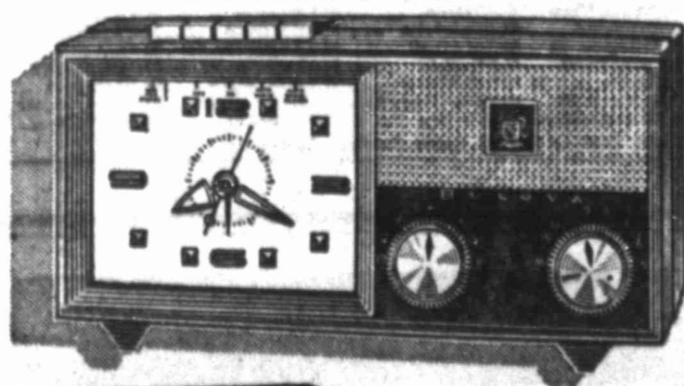

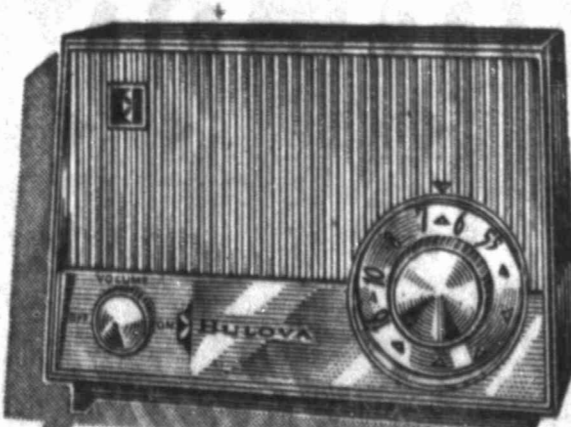

Vote Check Looms Larger By Governor's Statement

CHICAGO (AP) — Will the recheck of ballots in Chicago have any effect on the presidential election?

That question loomed larger today in the wake of Gov. William G. Stratton's statement that the Illinois Electoral Board may not certify the state's 27 Democratic electors if "strong and tangible" evidence of vote frauds is presented.

Stratton, a Republican, is chairman of the GOP-dominated board.

The board's function is to canvass the vote reports from the state's 102 counties and make an official proclamation of the results.

Reports from the 102 counties show President-elect John F. Kennedy is entitled to the electoral votes on the basis of his defeat of Richard M. Nixon by 8,849 votes.

Across the nation, Kennedy has 300 electoral votes. If the 27 from Illinois were withheld, he still would have 273—four more than the 269 required, if there are no shifts elsewhere.

Stratton, who lost in his bid for re-election, made his statement Wednesday at a news conference in Springfield. The board is expected to meet there next week. Unless there is a hitch, the elec-

toral votes will be cast there Dec. 19.

The Chicago Board of Election Commissioners went into its third day of checking 486,000 paper ballots cast in 863 precincts in the Nov. 8 election.

In the first two days, the board rechecked ballots from only five precincts. There was a net gain of 23 votes for Nixon and a net loss of seven for state's Atty Benjamin Adamowski.

Adamowski, a Republican, lost a bid for re-election to Democrat Daniel Ward by 26,000 votes. The recheck was requested in behalf of Adamowski. The Democratic-controlled board has ruled that the only official business is a second look at Adamowski's votes. GOP watchers are scanning the Nixon vote anyway.

The board is going through what is known as a "discovery" procedure. It can form the basis for a suit for a recount.

Georges Dapples, attorney for the Nixon recount committee, complained that the one-precinct-at-a-time process might take 173 days. A suit for a recount of the county vote must be filed by Dec. 23.

"You can go into court any time," said the board chairman, Sidney Holzman. "If you charge fraud, as has been done, then why look for evidence? Present the evidence to the court in a recount plea."

Fired Teacher Denies Making Statements About Church

BOERNE — A teacher fired for allegedly making anti-Catholic remarks to students said Wednesday he simply read aloud portions of the U. S. Constitution dealing with separation of church and state.

"If that constitutes criticism of the Catholic church, let it stand," Harry Benson told the San Antonio News.

Supt. Roy Liesman said Tuesday Benson was dismissed after parents complained the teacher said "Once you have a Catholic president, the country usually becomes corrupt."

Benson, 48, denied making the statement and said he may take legal action to secure pay due him under his contract.

He said he told his students: "Separation of church and state is called for and demanded in the Constitution and many thousands of persons are concerned that this remain so."

"It was not even questioned by the board," he said. "They just took the word of an emotional girl without even listening to what I had to say."

Liesman said Benson did not appear before the school board, which Liesman said decided in a closed meeting last week to ask for Benson's resignation.

Benson said Liesman "drove in front of my house, honked the horn and said 'You're fired.'"

"I asked him 'Don't you want to hear anything I have to say about it?'" Benson said. Liesman,

he said, replied "We don't want to hear anything from you."

Benson said he avoided discussion of the religious issue until two days after the Nov. 8 general election.

When it did come up, he said, it was at the request of students.

"Some of my very excellent, intelligent students asked an intelligent question and I thought they were due an intelligent answer so I told them what the Constitution stated," he said.

"I teach civics and it is my business to tell students why there was a religious aspect to the last election."

"I pointed out that in order to establish such a government (in which there is separation of church and state) people had braved the ocean and starvation

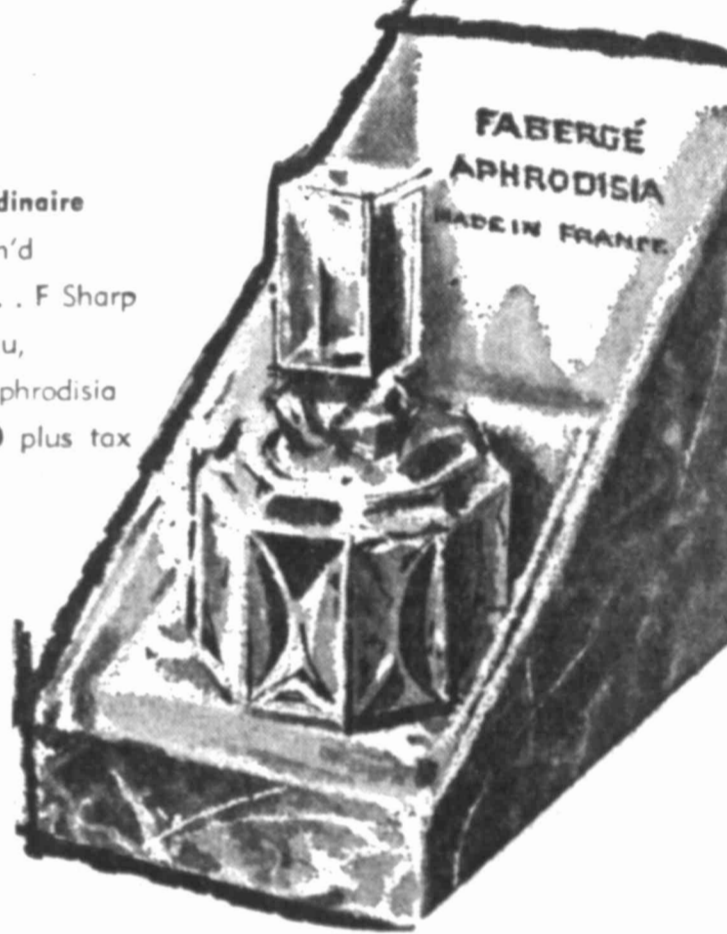

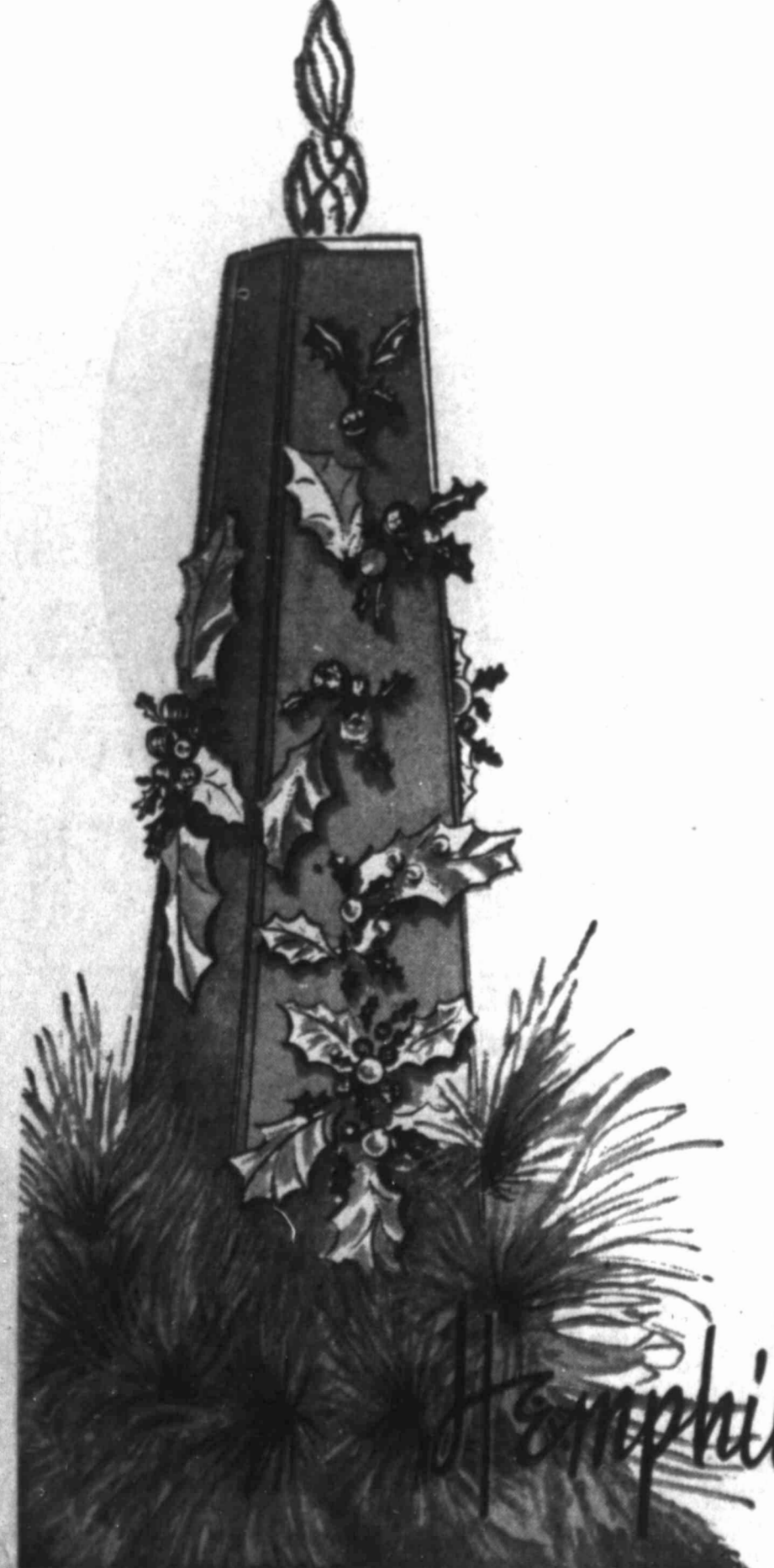

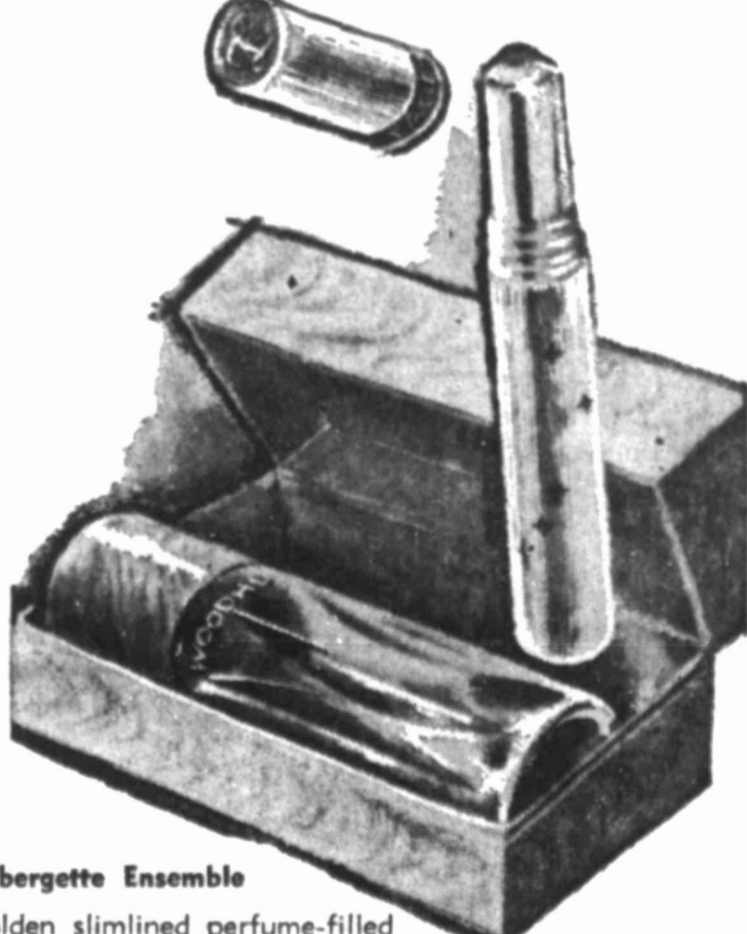

Millie Perkins No Longer A Fragile Bird

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Millie Perkins may have seemed like a fragile little bird, but she has changed. She's doing her first film in more than two years, and she credits her own outbursts for the return to work.

From Anne Frank to Elvis Presley's girl friend appears a long distance in movie roles. The time between those two parts seems an eternity to Millie.

"I finished 'The Diary of Anne Frank' in August of 1958," she recalled. "When the picture was released in April of 1959, I toured the country for two weeks and later toured Europe for a month. 'Aside from that, I have done nothing. Absolutely nothing. I merely waited for the studio to find something for me to do. They turned down outside pictures that I was offered because they argued that I was 'special.' They said I couldn't do just anything. 'Finally, I got fed up. I went in to see the bosses and I shouted and I screamed and I carried on. I told them I didn't think I was 'special,' that I wanted to act and I wanted them to let me out of my contract."

Her performance brought about a change. Whether the 20th Century-Fox execs were impressed with her fire or whether her arguments themselves were convincing, she got a role. But once again the studio learned of her independence.

"They wanted me to do 'Tess of the Storm Country,' a 10-day picture," she said. "I didn't think I could or should do a 10-day picture after working five months on 'Anne Frank.' So I refused and was promptly put on suspension."

She was taken off because the studio wanted her and Dean to go to the Soviet Union on a junket. The junket was later called off, but she remained on salary and was given the role as Presley's steady sweetheart in "Wild in the Country." So finally she's back at work.

U.N. General Assembly Plans Recess To Await U.S. Change

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The General Assembly is planning an unusual winter recess to await the views of the new Kennedy administration in Washington.

The Assembly, still in sort of a state of shock since Soviet premier Nikita Khrushchev's table-thumping antics at the start of this session, has not taken action on a single major issue in the past two months. It has given up hope of ending its business on the target date of Dec. 17.

Most delegates feel that the United States cannot make any hard decisions until Sen. John F. Kennedy takes over the presidency. They do not want the 99-nation Assembly to reconvene before the middle of February.

Many hope that with a new U.S. president not bound by the commitments of the Eisenhower administration, the Soviet Union may take a more conciliatory position on its major conflicts with the United States.

So far the major accomplishments of the Assembly have been the perennial decision to shelve Communist China's bid for membership and seat the Congo delegation backing President Joseph Kasavubu.

But other debates have so bogged down the schedule that night and Saturday meetings are set in the trusteeship committee and the Assembly itself in a drive to clean up a bulging agenda of colonial issues before the recess in mid-December.

The Assembly itself is confronted with a staggering list of 64 speakers who want a say on the Soviet proposal to abolish all colonies at once. This idea was proposed by Khrushchev during his four-week visit here.

Another of Khrushchev's ideas, a three-man board to replace Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld, has not been made into a formal proposal by the Soviets. But Communist spokesmen have taken a lot of time talking about Hammarskjöld and his secretariat in various Assembly committees.

Autumn Colors Mean Trees Are Growing Up

Several people have called my attention to the autumn colors this fall. I have noticed that we have probably had more color than in a long time.

There is a good reason for this. Our city is growing up. Trees that were once saplings are beginning to mature. People are more fall garden-minded, too. I believe the fall flower shows have placed a special meaning on autumn blooms. At any rate, a drive through our streets is a refreshing experience when the leaves are in full color.

The native plants lend a little to this display, but very little. It is the introduced plants and trees that do the most for our general appearance. As a country matures it begins to place values on its appearance and landmarks. I wish I could take pictures of every landmark tree in our area and preserve it because some won't be around much longer. An example is the cottonwood grove where the Old Settlers used to hold their reunions down near the railroad tracks east of town. Those trees are nearly forgotten. The desert willow behind Lucelle's on Scurry Street is a specimen that takes years to mature. The grove of Arizona cypress trees on NW 12th St. at the Experiment Station will soon be removed to make way for Interstate 20 Highway. Our

"Christmas tree" on the old Split and Whittle corner has already fallen to progress.

There are many more such plants that we all love and remember. There is a happy side to this picture though. These landmarks are being replaced by new and younger landmarks for the future. They may be seedlings or saplings or even acorns today, but in time they will be the charter oaks and old friends of future generations.

Whenever anyone plants a tree, he makes a pact with the future. We sit under the shade of trees planted by previous generations, and when we plant new trees, we do it for the pleasure of our grandchildren and their grandchildren.

This morning I learned that E. C. Dodd passed away. Mrs. W. R. Douglas gave me a little coffee tree, so this morning I planted it on the campus of Howard County Junior College, and in the memory of Mr. Dodd, the first president of that school. The tree will never be large and impressive as it is by nature more of a bush. Mr. Dodd's contributions were but a part of the great growth and development of this school, but some one had to be there for the beginning.

Found Guilty In Ape Theft

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—Robert Tomarchin was found guilty of burglary and stealing and sentenced to four years in prison by a jury Thursday night for the theft of Mr. Moke, the St. Louis Zoo's talented, talking chimpanzee.

Tomarchin, 28, admitted taking the animal, which can utter the words "no" and "mama," from a cage in the zoo last Dec. 21 and removing him to Miami, Fla. He sought to prove that he had a change of heart after selling Mr. Moke to the zoo for \$1,575. He claimed the zoo had failed to live up to an oral agreement to give the animal special treatment and care.

But the jury apparently agreed with Robert D. Kingsland, assistant circuit attorney, who maintained that this was a simple case of burglary and stealing and Tomarchin should be convicted.

Tomarchin, the only defense witness, told the jury: "Moke is the only thing I ever loved."

The day before, however, the zoo's chimp trainer, Mike Kostial, had told the jury that Tomarchin said upon selling the animal he was glad the zoo had it.

Tomarchin left a \$1,000 cashier's check in the empty cage, along with a promise to pay \$2,000 more, when he took the chimp.

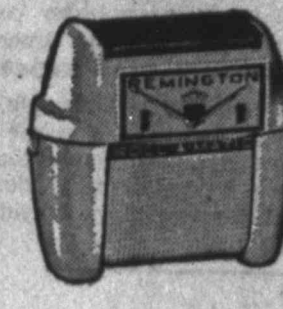

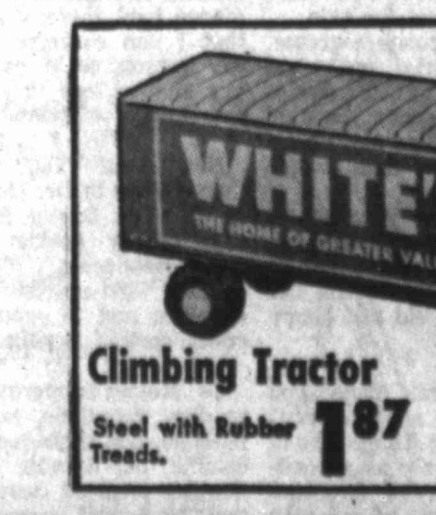

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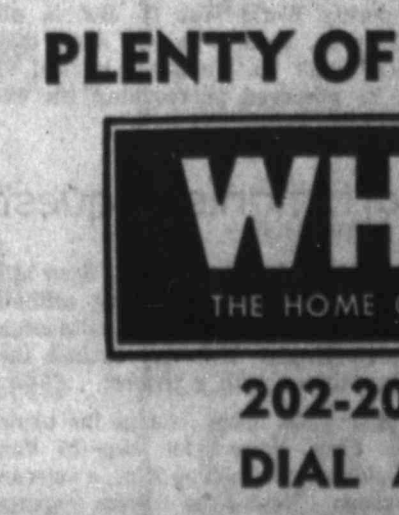

Mrs. McMurray teaches plaster crafts at the YMCA. In her home may be seen many plaques made by the homemaker; they include ballerina figurines, fighting cocks and butterflies.

Mrs. McMurray has been a resident of Big Spring for 24 years, coming here at the age of 14. Before that, she had lived in Stephenville. Soon after her arrival she met her husband, who is a lifetime resident of Big Spring. They have one daughter, Geraldine, who recently became Mrs. Donald Zant and is now residing in Abilene.

Cake decorating is another hobby of the homemaker. She uses powdered sugar icing, which she says has more body and is easier to use. For Christmas she decorates cakes with Santa Claus and Christmas trees. Mrs. McMurray likes the cooking of desserts best of all; they are the only things she actually uses a recipe for.

Here are some of the recipes she suggests you try.

COCOA PIE

1/4 cup cocoa
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
2 cups milk
2 tps. vanilla
3 eggs
1/4 tsp. salt

Mix and sift cocoa, sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add egg yolks with milk and stir well. Cook until thick and put into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue made by beating egg whites until stiff and adding 1/4 teaspoon baking powder and 6 tablespoons sugar.

PECAN PIE

3 eggs slightly beaten
1 cup syrup
Pinch of salt
2-3 cup chopped pecans
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup sugar

Mix all together, adding nuts

Bones from an elegant roast make this soup.

BEEF BROTH WITH VEGETABLES

Bones from 3-rib rolled beef roast
5 cups water
1 tsp. salt
6 peppercorns
3 whole cloves
1 whole allspice
1 bay leaf
1 medium onion (quartered)
2 ribs celery (sliced)
6 sprigs parsley
1 cup diced cooked mixed vegetables

Simmer beef bones with water, salt, peppercorns, cloves, allspice, bay leaf, onion, celery and parsley for 1 1/2 hours.

Strain; chill; remove fat. Bring to a boil with a raw egg white and the broken-up egg shell, stirring a few times, to clarify. Strain through double thickness of muslin. There should be about 3 1/2 cups.

Reheat with cooked vegetables adding salt and pepper to taste. Makes 4 servings.

Choose a mixture of such cooked leftover vegetables as peas, carrots, snap beans and celery.

Superb Green Beans

For a luncheon, prepare a tasty green bean side dish. Cut fresh green beans into pieces the size of peas. Heat 3 tablespoons of salad oil in a large skillet over a high heat. Add the chopped green beans and toss well, cooking over the high flame until beans are coated with the hot oil. Add 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 1/4 teaspoon sugar and 1/4 cup chicken broth and cover the skillet. Steam for 5 minutes or until beans are cooked and bright green.

FDR Championed Brussel Sprouts

It took a president to make the Brussels sprout memorable.

When Franklin D. Roosevelt was in the White House, he told Sir Winston Churchill's wife that he did not want to visit England because he disliked the way her countrymen cooked vegetables.

In particular, FDR elaborated, the British boiled Brussels sprouts and sent them to the table in their unappetizing cooking liquid. In America, he averred—imaginatively and rashly—broiled Brussels sprouts were a favorite dish.

By this time his listener was incredulous but undaunted—and so was FDR.

When Lady Churchill returned to England she straightway asked John Winant, then our ambassador stationed in London, how to broil the sprout. Mr. Winant, startled but grave, improvised an answer by saying that he knew nothing about cooking but would bring her the recipe.

Back in Washington the ambassador confronted FDR with the culinary tempest. The president answered by offering to create a new Cabinet post and appoint a secretary for the Brussels sprout!

A cousin of FDR's, Mrs. Kermit Roosevelt, writing in a magazine, reported how with a twinkle in his eye FDR had told her this story, and how she had offered to gather recipes for cooking the sprout from all over the United States to be relayed to 10 Downing St.

Actually it's the French who have contributed one of the best ways of treating Brussels sprouts by coupling them with chestnuts. Over the years this dish has ap-

peared on some of our best-set holiday tables, but not enough cooks know it. Here's the recipe—and worthy of Thanksgiving.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS WITH CHESTNUTS

2 pkgs (10 ounces each) frozen Brussels sprouts
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup flour
2 cups milk
1 tsp. celery salt
White pepper
1 cup shelled cooked chestnuts (quartered)

Cook sprouts according to package directions with the boiling water and salt called for; drain. Make a white sauce of the butter, flour, milk, celery salt and pepper to taste. Add sprouts and chestnuts; reheat. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Peanut Brittle

Make your own peanut brittle and you can have it as thin, delicate and brittle as you please. Heat 3 cups of sugar in a heavy frypan over a high heat. When it begins to melt, lower the heat and stir until the sugar is completely melted. Add 2 cups of whole salted peanuts and 2 tablespoons butter. Pour onto a greased cookie sheet spreading it quickly to thin out. When cool, break into pieces.

Green Lima Beans

Green lima beans (canned or frozen) are delicious when they are seasoned with butter and thyme. Black pepper helps, too!

Chesse Fruit Molds Ideal For Holidays

Chesse fruit molds make the most satisfactory salads for sumptuous holiday meals. They usually have the lightness and tang desired with heavier foods, and they also can furnish the festive color your menu may lack.

Select a chesse, however, that has "bite" to it. American blue chesse is one of the finest of these for its subtle sharpness harmonizes with fruits, yet does not mask delicate fruit flavors.

BLUE CHEESE FRUIT SALAD (10-12 servings)

1 No. 2 1/2 can sliced peaches, drained
1 pkg. lime flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1/2 cup peach sirup
1/2 cup crumbled American blue chesse (about 3 ounces)
1 pkg. raspberry flavored gelatin
1 1/2 cups hot water
1/2 cup canned whole cranberry sauce
1/2 cup peach sirup

Arrange peach slices in bottom of oiled 1 1/2 quart ring mold. Dissolve lime gelatin in 1 cup hot water. Add 1/2 cup peach sirup and chill until slightly thickened. Fold in blue chesse and cottage chesse. Pour over peach slices; chill until almost set. Dissolve raspberry gelatin in 1 1/2 cups hot water. Add cranberry sauce and remaining peach sirup. Chill until slightly

thickened, then pour over lime layer; chill until firm.

FRUIT CHEESE GELATIN MOLD (Six servings)

1 pkg. strawberry flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup pineapple sirup and water
6 mandarin oranges, cut up
1 cup pineapple chunks, drained
1/2 cup crumbled American blue chesse (about 3 ounces)
1 apple, diced
1/2 cup broken walnuts

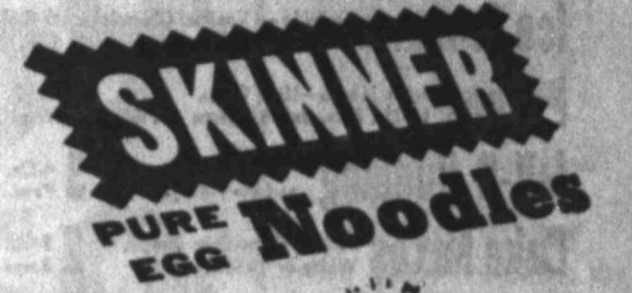
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add sirup and cold water; chill until partially set in a quart mold. Add fruits, blue chesse and nuts. Chill until firm. Unmold on greens.

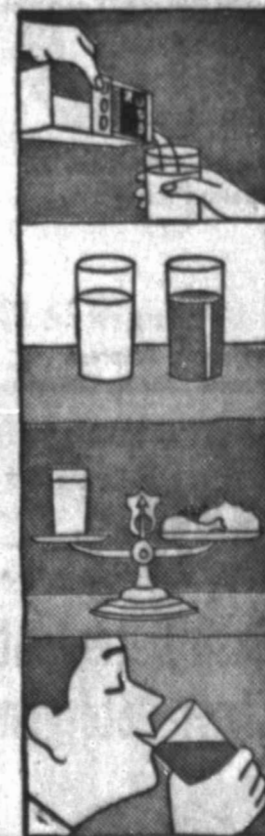

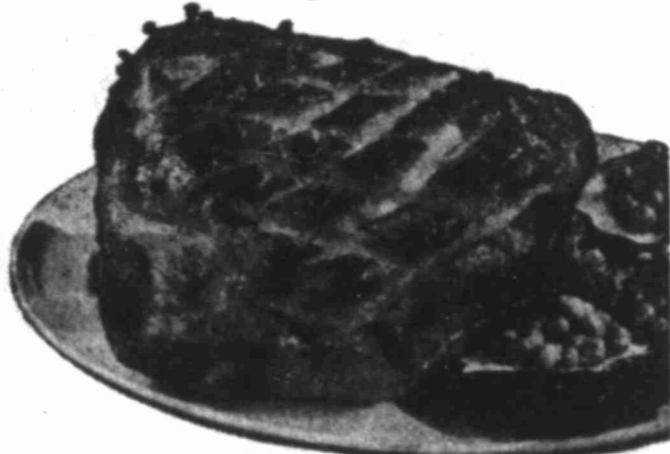

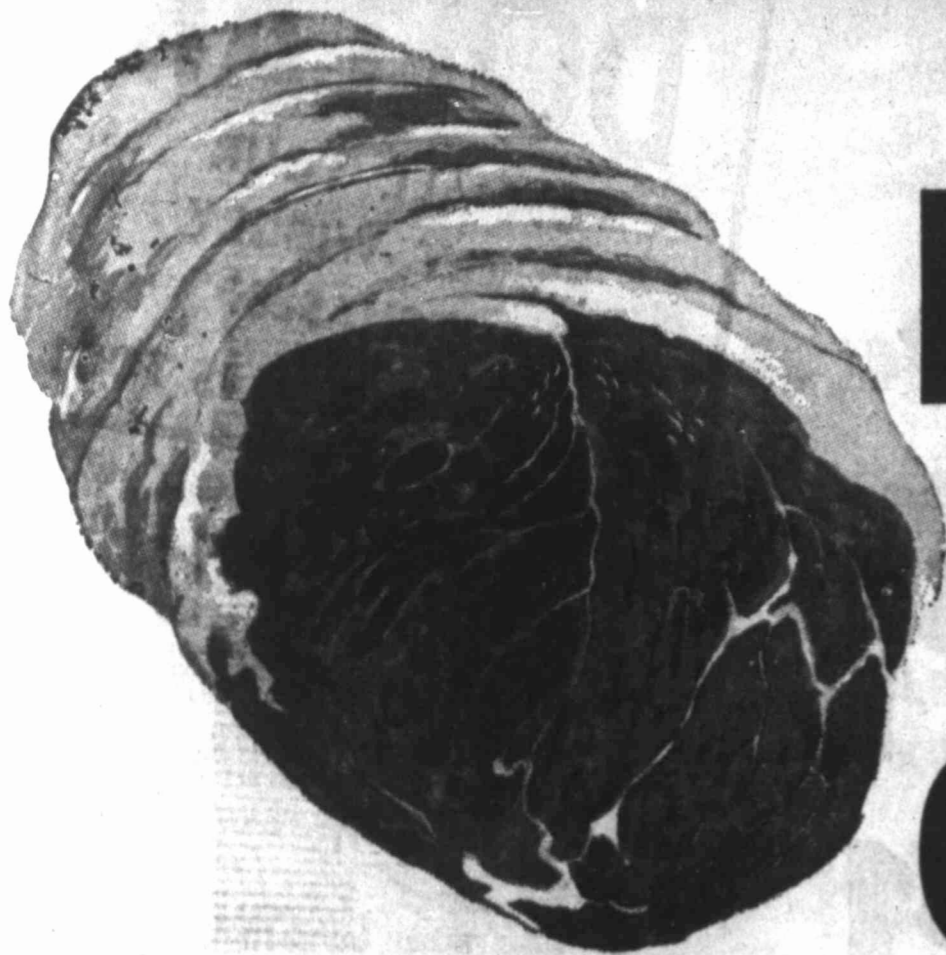

CORDIAL FRUITCAKE

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. double-acting baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 lb. candied orange and lemon peel
- 1/2 lb. citron, thinly sliced
- 1 lb. raisins
- 1/2 tsp. cloves
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 lb. butter or margarine
- 1 lb. brown sugar
- 10 eggs, well beaten
- 1/2 lb. nuts, chopped
- 1/2 lb. candied pineapple
- 1/2 lb. candied cherries
- 3 cups dates, pitted and sliced
- 1 cup molasses or corn syrup
- 1 cup honey
- 1/2 cup cider
- Grease three 10x5x3-inch loaf pans; line with heavy paper; grease again. Combine flour, baking powder and spices; sift together three times. Cream butter; add sugar gradually; beat till light and fluffy. Add eggs, nuts, peel, fruits, molasses, honey and cider. Gradually add dry ingredients; beat well after each addition till blended. Fill pans 2-3 full. Bake slowly at 250 degrees F., 3 1/2 to 4 hours.

For moist texture, place shallow pan of water on lowest rack of oven; remove the last 15 minutes.

To store, cool cake; wrap with cloth dampened in cider or grape juice. Overwrap with aluminum foil. Store in airtight container in cool, dry place for several weeks; remoisten once a week with cider or juice.

HOLIDAY SAUCE IMPERIAL

- Topping for fruitcakes and holiday puddings:
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 3 tbsps. flour
- 1 cup boiling cider or water
- 3 tbsps. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla or nutmeg.
- Combine sugar and flour; add boiling water and butter. Mix well and add flavoring. Serve hot.

Easy To Fix Chowder

Pantry shelf ingredients plus potatoes make an excellent chowder.

SALMON TOMATO CHOWDER

- 2 medium-sized potatoes
- 1/2 cup (1/2 stick) butter or margarine
- 1-3 cup finely diced onion
- 2 tbsps. minced green pepper
- 1 can (1 pt. and 2 ozs.) tomato juice
- 1 cup water
- 1 1/2 tps. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 to 1/2 tsp. dried crushed thyme
- 1 can (7 1/2 ozs.) salmon.
- Pare potatoes and cut into 1/2 inch squares—there should be 2 cups.
- Melt butter in medium-sized kettle; add potatoes and onion; cook slowly about 5 minutes. Add green pepper, tomato juice, water, salt, pepper and 1/2 teaspoon thyme. Bring to a gentle boil; simmer until potatoes are tender—20 to 30 minutes.
- Add salmon, breaking into chunks if necessary, with liquid in can. Add more thyme if necessary. Reheat. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
- To develop flavor store soup overnight and reheat before serving.

Season Soup With Ham Bone Flavor

Here's what to do with the bone from Sunday's ham.

GREEN SPLIT PEA SOUP WITH FRANKS

- 1 lb. pkg. (about 2 cups) green split peas
- 2 qts. water
- 1 1/2 cups chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery leaves
- 1 cup diced carrot
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 ham bone
- Salt
- Pepper
- Water or stock
- 1/2 lb. (about 4) frankfurters.
- Turn peas, water, onion, celery, carrot, bay leaves and ham bone into a large saucepan or kettle. Bring to a boil. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until peas are so tender they are mushy—about 1 1/2 hours.
- Remove ham bone; force soup, including vegetables, through strainer or food mill. Add salt and pepper to taste. (Makes about 2 quarts.)
- Thin, to suit taste, with water or stock, adding seasoning as necessary. Slice frankfurters into soup and reheat.

Few Calories

There is a low calorie way to reheat frozen French-fried potatoes. Reheat the oven to 425 degrees. Spread the frozen potatoes in a single layer in a shallow baking pan. Heat 15 to 25 minutes until crisp and brown. Shake the pan at least once during the heating. Season with salt and keep them in the oven until serving time.

Pumpkin Pie Spice

Pumpkin-pie spice lasts a long time when it is used only for pumpkin pies! Mix a little of it with sugar and use for filling the core-cavities of apples to be baked or in a Brown Betty.

Vary Swiss Steak With Spanish Olives

With the abundance of beef in stores this fall, beefy main dishes should be making frequent appearances on dinner tables. Swiss steak undoubtedly will be one of its forms. If you are an imaginative cook you can turn it into an epicurean entree just by adding imported Spanish olives. Home economists suggest onion, anchovy and pimiento stuffed

olives to lend an exciting flavor accent.

For a company meal, serve the steak on a large platter with a border of fluffy whipped potatoes.

SWISS STEAK WITH OLIVE GRAVY

- 2 lbs. beef chuck or round, cut 2 inches thick
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 carrots sliced
- 1/2 cup onion, anchovy, pimiento stuffed olives, sliced
- 2 1/2 cups canned tomatoes
- Pound meat with meat hammer or edge of heavy saucer. Dredge and pound in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Brown meat in shortening in heavy skillet on all sides. Add carrots, olives and tomatoes. Cover, and cook slowly 1 to 1 1/2 hours.
- Makes six servings.

For House-Hunters

If you're shopping for a new home you'll save a lot of shopping time by asking first about the heating system in the prospective house. Find out how old it is. How much does it cost a year to heat the house? If it's a modern heating system, inquire about the possibility of add-on air conditioning.

A Thought About Bread

Next time you put a slice of bread in the toaster, give some thought to the number of hired men you "employed" to provide that bread.

Exact figures are hard to come by. Our economy is complex, and many farm products are involved in a loaf of bread. And many folks who work with wheat, wheat flour and bread do other things, too.

But statisticians have an uncanny way of developing formulas to arrive at accurate estimates.

Did you know, for example, that 1.3 per cent of total civilian employment in this country was devoted to wheat in 1959? The figure is about 876,000 man-years.

Wheat is grown on about 1,300,000 farms. But these farms grow other things, too. Figures show wheat production accounted for 164,000 full-time man-years of labor.

Likewise, wheat processing involved about 360,000 man-years. Storage, transportation and distribution accounted for some 344,000 man-years, including 228,000 in retail bakeries, stores and eating places.

Of course wheat is important in our diet. U. S. consumers spent about 7 per cent of their food money for wheat products—more than \$4 billion in 1959. In the normal diet, wheat flour and cereal products contribute 17 per cent of the calories and protein, 21 per cent of iron and niacin, and 28 per cent of the thiamine.

They will taste good and look pretty on your table next winter. Skin and cut up five pounds of tomatoes. Add five pounds of sugar, one lemon slice very thin and a small piece of ginger root. Place the kettle over a burner and turn the heat to high. When the tomatoes start to boil turn heat back to simmer and cook the preserves 45 minutes or until shiny and quite thick. Stir frequently. Pour into hot sterilized glasses. This recipe will make four six-ounce glasses.

Thin Onion Slices

When paper-thin slices of onion are wanted, some cooks like to use the long straight narrow blade of a ham carving knife for the cutting.



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
