

In the closest county race in years, Ed Bennett eked out a 13-vote victory over Dean San-ders in the Democratic runoff primary Saturday to become the new Precinct 1 commission-

THE FINAL tally was 266 votes for Bennett and 253 for Sanders. The two Hart men. both political newcomers, had a five-man field in the May of primary. Of the 575 Precinct 1 residents who voted in the first primary, 519 returned to 12 Pages the polls for the runoff Satur-

> After the formality of the November general election, Bennett will succeed longtime Commissioner E. I. "Tump" McLain next Jan. 1. McLain did not seek re-election.

> Bennett and another newly elected commissioner - Jimmie Howell of Precinct 3 - will join Dale Winders of Precinct 2 and Al Maurer of Precinct 4 to make up the new commissioners' court next year.

THT BIGGEST surprise here in the state Democratic runoffs was Barefoot Sanders' victory over former US Senator Ralph Yarborough. Sanders, a Dallas attorney, outpolled Yarborough 802-727 in Castro County and went on to post a convincing victory margin state-

In the first primary May 6. Castro Countians had given Yarborough a clear majority over four other candidates, and the veteran lawmaker had come within 500 votes statewide of avoiding the runoff as almost two million Texans cast ballots.

Sanders added only 80 votes to the 722 he received here in the first primary, but it was enough to carry the county as Yarborough's total dropped by 357 votes, down to 727 Satur-day from 1,084 in May. ONLY 1,543 Democrats and

17 Republicans voted in the county Saturday, compared with 2,074 Democrats and 32 Republicans in the May 6 primary. It was a 40 percent turnout Saturday vs. a 56 percent showing in the earlier elections. The county has just over 3,700 registered voters.

In the governor's races, the county's Democrats gave Dolph Briscoe a 1,104 to 802 nod over Mrs. Frances "Sissy" Farenthold to help him gain the nom-ination. The county's Republicans also went with a winner giving Henry Grover a 9-8 de-cision over Al Fay to help the veteran state legislator ice the GOP nomination.

But the county's Democrats bucked the state trend in the lieutenant governor's race. Castro Countians favored Wayne Connally of Floresville over Hobby overtook Connally's firstprimary advantage and gained the nomination.

In the only other runoff race, the county's Democrats helped State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert return to office by giving him a 798-685 nod over challenger James Wilson.

## 70 girls enroll for dressmaking

By IRENE KEATING

Our 4-H tri-county Dress Re-vue training will be held June 14 at 2 p.m. in the Friona High School auditorium. This session will prepare our girls for the county dress revue to be held July 6 at Hart

We have 70 girls enrolled in clothing projects this summer. I appreciate the leaders who are working with the girls. Some leaders who are busy with clothing now are Evelyn Hill, Sara Hart, Sue Smith, Be-verly Cole, Della Hutchins, Ma-rilyn Smith, Nell Ingram, San-dra Bagwell and Pat Bagley.

Others who are leaders are Sue Tischler, Pat Higgins, Patricia Powell, Geneva Dobbs, Mona Acker and Catherine Hochstein. There may be others I don't know about. I certainly do appreciate these vol-unteer leaders. If any of you women are interested in helping with this or any other 4-II projects please let me know. IT IS time again for our gar-

den calendar. 1. Watch for symptoms of bowdery mildew on crepe myrtle, roses, evergreen eunonymus and other susceptible plants. Control with Karathane, folpet, wettable sulfur or Parnon.

2. Provide supplemental irrigation for your choice plants. The hot, dry, windy, summer weather can be damaging to many plants unless extra mois-ture is provided. Light summer showers can be misleading in the amount of moisture they supply. It is usually much less than it appears.

3. Do not allow mum plants to become tall and leggy. Pinch out the top of each stem as soon as three or four sets of new leaves appear.

4. Bearded iris need fertiliz-

thane, diazinon or cygon.

6. If you want attractive roses this fall don't let up in blackspot controls just because the weather is dry and hot. 7. Check those hanging bas-

kets and container plants as they need more frequent watering during the summer per-tod. Increased water also means additional fertilizing is needed. Apply fertilizer only to moist

8. If your petunias are getting tall and unattractive, cut the plants back to five or six inches, water and fertilize and wait for a new crop of flow-ers which will usually appear within a few weeks.

9. This is a good time to make cuttings of your favorite plants, using mature wood of the current seasons growth. Four or five inches of a damp peat and perlite mixture in a plastic bag is excellent for rooting a few cuttings. 10. There is still time to plant seeds of zinnia and portulaca for summer color.

11. Still not too late to thin the fruit on your fruit trees. 12. Set lawn mower about 1/2 inch higher to provide more shade for roots and stolons during hot weather.

Ramey. It was the earliest first load. Wright has ever cut, and elevator manager P. O. Goodwin said it was also the earliest load he could remember Cas-tro County Grain ever receiv-

WRIGHT'S first 1972 wheat came from the same plot of ground where the county's first combine also harvested the first load back in 1919.

"Unk and I cut the first load with a new McCormick No. 2 combine on July 3, 1919, on that same ground," Goose Ramey said, "so you can see that they've bred wheat up to mature a full month earlier since then."

Although the '72 crop is ear-lier than ever, it isn't going to be better. It's suffering from the effects of dry weather; "whitecaps" in the fields indicate damage from the late freeze; and many fields received hail damage earlier this

CHARLIE HILL, manager of the ASCS office in Dimmitt, said there's no way to tell yet how many acres will be harvested this year since many farmers opted to graze out their wheat.


## 'Intern' joins **Methodist staff**
