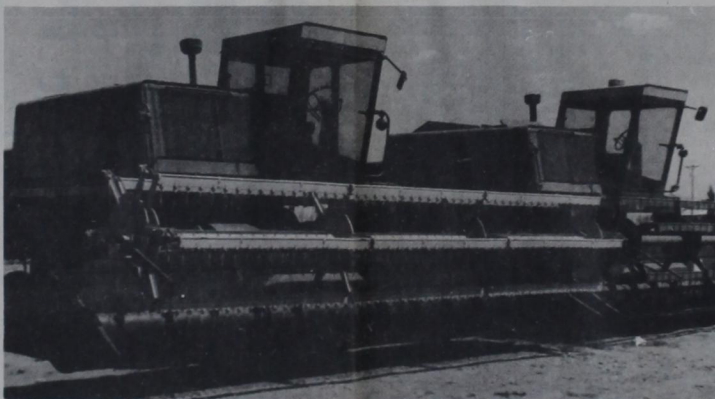

HD notes

70 girls enroll for dressmaking

Our 4-H tri-county Dress Revue training will be held June 14 at 2 p.m. in the Friona High School auditorium. This session will prepare our girls for the county dress revue to be held July 6 at Hart.

We have 70 girls enrolled in clothing projects this summer. I appreciate the leaders who are working with the girls. Some leaders who are busy with clothing now are Evelyn Hill, Sara Hart, Sue Smith, Beverly Cole, Della Hutchins, Marilyn Smith, Nell Ingram, Sandra Bagwell and Pat Bagley.

Others who are leaders are Sue Tischler, Pat Higgins, Patricia Powell, Geneva Dobbs, Mona Acker and Catherine Hochstein. There may be others I don't know about. I certainly do appreciate these volunteer leaders. If any of you women are interested in helping with this or any other 4-H projects please let me know.

IT IS time again for our garden calendar.

1. Watch for symptoms of powdery mildew on crepe myrtle, roses, evergreen euonymus and other susceptible plants. Control with Karathane, folpet, wettable sulfur or Paron.

2. Provide supplemental irrigation for your choice plants. The hot, dry, windy, summer weather can be damaging to many plants unless extra moisture is provided. Light summer showers can be misleading in the amount of moisture they supply. It is usually much less than it appears.

3. Do not allow mums plants to become tall and leggy. Pinch out the top of each stem as soon as three or four sets of new leaves appear.

4. Bearded iris need fertilizer after blooming. Use about three pounds of a 12-12-12 fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed areas.

5. Check plants closely for spider mites. A hand lens is helpful in checking for the troublesome pest. When used as directed on the label, these trouble makers can be controlled with one of the following: Kelthane, diazinon or cygon.

6. If you want attractive roses this fall don't let up in blackspot controls just because the weather is dry and hot.

7. Check those hanging baskets and container plants as they need more frequent watering during the summer period. Increased water also means additional fertilizing is needed. Apply fertilizer only to moist soil.

8. If your petunias are getting tall and unattractive, cut the plants back to five or six inches, water and fertilize and wait for a new crop of flowers which will usually appear within a few weeks.

9. This is a good time to make cuttings of your favorite plants, using mature wood of the current seasons growth. Four or five inches of a damp peat and perlite mixture in a plastic bag is excellent for rooting a few cuttings. Tie the top shut and place in a north window out of direct sunlight until rooted.

10. There is still time to plant seeds of zinnia and portulaca for summer color.

11. Still not too late to thin the fruit on your fruit trees.

12. Set lawn mower about 1/2 inch higher to provide more shade for roots and stolons during hot weather.

13. Make plans for proper yard care while you are on vacation.

Goose Ramey and Edgar "Unk" Ramey.

It was the earliest first load Wright has ever cut, and elevator manager P. O. Goodwin said it was also the earliest load he could remember Castro County Grain ever receiving.

WRIGHT'S first 1972 wheat came from the same plot of ground where the county's first combine also harvested the first load back in 1919.

"Unk and I cut the first load with a new McCormick No. 2 combine on July 3, 1919, on that same ground," Goose Ramey said, "so you can see that they've bred wheat up to mature a full month earlier since then."

Although the '72 crop is earlier than ever, it isn't going to be better. It's suffering from the effects of dry weather; "whitecaps" in the fields indicate damage from the late freeze; and many fields received hail damage earlier this month.

CHARLIE HILL, manager of the ASCS office in Dimmitt, said there's no way to tell yet how many acres will be harvested this year since many farmers opted to graze out their wheat.

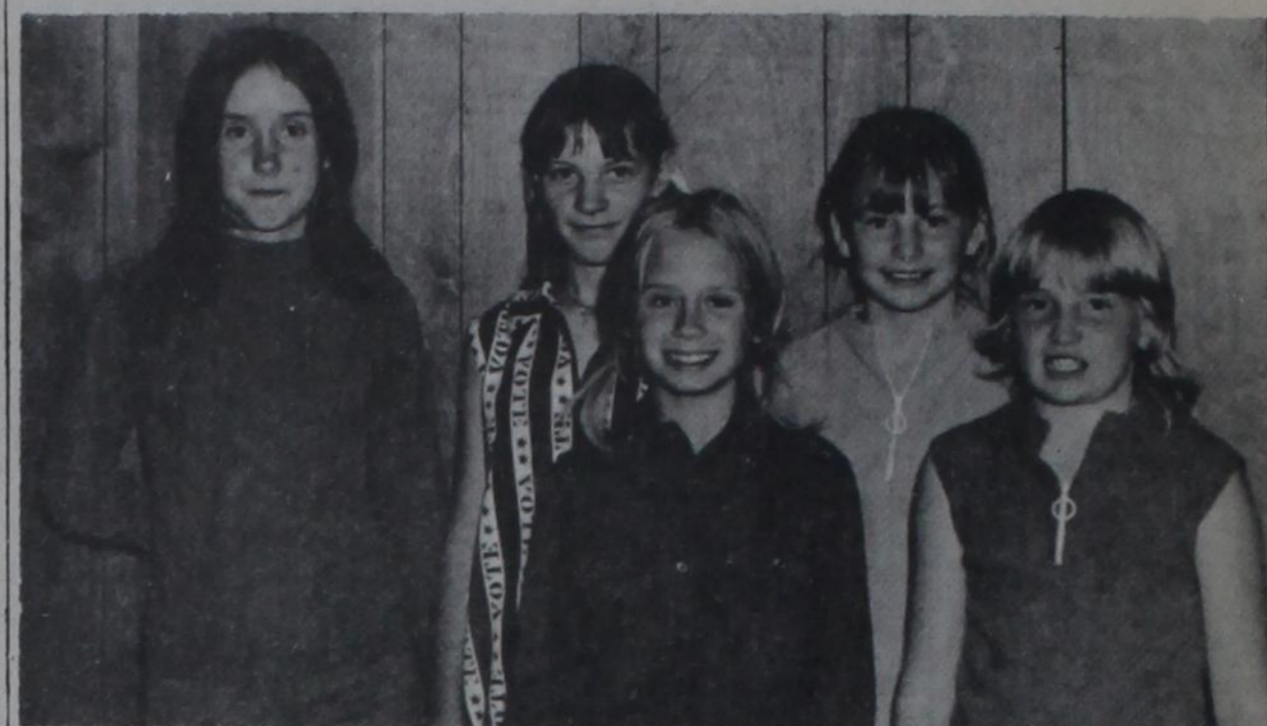
'Intern' joins Methodist staff

ability of city employees made the new policy necessary commissioners felt.

The commission okayed a lease for \$30 a month on a small strip of land owned by Odus Hastings located near the city dump grounds. The land will be used to drive on and dump into the pit and to allow excavation of a small ditch for drainage.

THE Satellite School Board and Castro County Jaycees requested permission from the city to build a playground for the Satellite School on city property behind the firehouse. Commissioners said that site was set for future use and offered the school another site on the same block.

The commissioners told the Jaycees that the city would allow them use of the lot, would furnish water for grass and level the land for the playground project.

Acting on a letter from Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., commissioners voted to allow the plant to designate as no-parking zones the south side of Jones Street from East Fifth eastward to DAT's property line, the west side of Seventh Street from Bedford to Jones, and the north side of Jones from Fifth to Seventh Streets.
