This school design is the result of a "second look" by the school board, administrators and architects.

Originally, the school board wanted to simply build a new junior high in a separate location, as suggested strongly by the Texas Education Agency.

But the separate junior high would have required separate music rooms, auditoriums, media centers, librarians and administrative staffs. Also, a separate new junior high would have cost more than twice as ams much - about \$600,000.
