Project That Should Be Well Received

Announcement was made this week of plans to construct an apartment center at Westover and Marcy.

As with any business venture, a history of operation is required to evaluate the prudence of such an investment. However, there is every reason to believe that a project of this nature will be well re-

Plans call for eight apartment units at the outset, and these will provide 32 living units. Twenty-four of these will be twobedroom apartments and eight one-bedroom units. The over-all facility will have refrigerated air-conditioning, central heat, terraces and other recreational refinements which will add to the liveability of the center. In so many words it will be designed to provide all the comforts of home, yet without the responsibility of maintenance, yard work, etc.

There are many couples who would prefer this sort of arrangements, particularly those who are here on moderate-term assignments. More mature couples, too, frequently find this sort of an arrangement far more satisfactory. The single units will make it possible for those who want privacy, but in proximity to others, to share in a congenial neighborhood experi-

Until this plan was announced, there, was no suitable answer to these specifications. We have a feeling that this will attract support as well as interest.

Should Demonstrate A Need

Rep. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa announced in Austin that his interim committee on saving taxes has stepped up its investigations. Speaker Waggoner Carr was before the committee Monday and urged an accelerated tempo of study. He also hoped that the committee will recommend to the legislature that a permanent group be named to study tax savings.

Tax savings is certainly a field everyone should be vitally interested in. Therefore it will be of more than passing interest to note what the committee has to recommend when it makes its report Jan.

than a "one-time, meat axe process. . . ' Significant economy is more apt to accrue from sustained effort over a long period

Yet, the ability of a committee to demonstrate an essential need for its work should be one of the requisites for its continuation. If this would amount to nothing more than an abdication of the responsibility of the legislature to a committee, then there would be little justification for such a panel. It may be that the pin-pointing of certain areas of potential saving will be useful and profitable to the legislature, but the final responsibility of tax savings is squarely upon the shoulders of those elected to represent the people.

David Lawrence Looking At Kennedy's Cabinet

WASHINGTON - The Cabinet gives advice. It doesn't run the government if there's a man of strong personality in the presidency with opinions of his own.

Hence the question of whether President-elect Kennedy has appointed a good kind of chief executive the new incumbent of the White House is himself going to make.

Few people except his intimates know whether Mr. Kennedy follows the advice of experts or forms his own conclusions. Opinions differ on this point, but the fact remains that the President-elect is relatively inexperienced in governmental operations as such. So he has made a wise decision in gathering to his side a number

BEFORE Warren Harding was inaugurated President in 1921, he had promised the nation he would pick for his Cabinet the "best minds." He did get some-arnong them, as Secretary of State, Charles Evans Hughes, who later became Chief Justice. Today it might be said that Mr. Kennedy has at least tried to get "bright minds."


In this category can be put the new Secretary of State, Dean Rusk. The same is true of the men whose names are in the headlines-for Secretary of the Treasury, Douglas Dillon, and for Attorney General, Robert Kennedy.

ABRAHAM RIBICOFF is regarded in Connecticut as an able governor, and is being talked of as likely to be appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court some day. The new Secretary of Defense, Robert S. Mc-Namara, is reputed to be agile-minded and energetic. The new Secretary of Agriculture, Governor Orville Freeman of Minnesota, always has been in the thick of the farm-policy controversy. Arthur Goldberg, the new Secretary of Labor, is regarded as an astute lawyer.

Governor Luther Hodges, who is to be Secretary of Commerce, is an able man with a business background, but it remains to be seen whether he will offset in Cabinet councils Mr. Goldberg's pronounced partisanship for the labor-union viewpoint. The latter was responsible for much of the strategy of the last steel strike, since he is general counsel of the steelworkers union. He is also special counsel of the AFL-CIO, so the labor-union leaders who helped Mr. Kennedy get elected ought to

THE NEW SECRETARY of the Interior, Stewart Udall, who has served Arizona in Congress, is given high praise by a political opponent-Senator Barry Goldwater of the same state. The one Cabinet appointment about

BUT THE QUESTION being asked today is whether the President-elect considers political reward more important than any other factor in deciding whether to choose his brother for Attorney General. The often-extolled concept of this office is that it should go to a man prominent in the legal profession who can impress the Supreme Court of the United States and judges generally because of an outstanding record in the law. It has not been explained why Governor Ribicoff was not selected for the post of Attorney General instead of that of Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Politically, too, criticism naturally would arise whenever any President appointed his own brother to a Cabinet post, the argument being that family interest is allegedly put above the national interest.

FOR THE IMMEDIATE future this type of criticism may be lost in the excitement of the new administration, but eventually it will recur, especially since every act of the Department of Justice may be construed as having a political motivation. Such criticism will to some extent be offset by a reminder that Herbert Brownell Jr., a Republican national chairman and an able politician, became Attorney General in the first Eisenhower administration. His acts in "civil rights" cases were

deemed political by critics. The Cabinet as a whole will receive favorable comment. But the so-called "honeymoon" period in politics, when a new administration comes in, is supposed to last only a few months anyway, after which the critics begin to examine the hard realities of actual performance. Hit-'em-on-the-flank George Romney is hitting again. His latest maneuver in the battle for a larger share of the multibillion - dollar automobile market establishes him once again as a master

When American Motors Corp. started to come up from nowhere to a billion dollars a year in sales. Romney couldn't afford full-page newspaper advertisements, magazine displays, or TV commercials.

HE GAINED headlines-free advertising -by attacking General Motors, Ford, and Chrysler for producing "gas-guzzling dinosaurs." The compact car flanked their

Now he has modernized an old idea in a new sortie on Big Three bigness. Back in August, 1914, Henry Ford the First got nationwide publicity by offering to rebate \$40 to \$50 a car if more than 300,000 Fords were sold in 12 months. Sales came to 308,213 vehicles. Ford refunded \$50 per car, more than \$15,000, 000. It was a great success, which confounded competitors.

PROJECTING himself in the role of Knight Protecting the Consumer, Romney is seeking to "create" news to re-attain Rambler's sales momentum. Rambler sales in the recession year of '58 doubled those of the preceding year. In 1959, a near doubling took place. 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'Sit-In' Drama Was Effective **But Loaded**

NEW YORK (AP)-"Sit-In." the second of NBC's excursions into strongly editorial broadcasting in a series called "NBC White Paper," Tuesday night proved to be a powerful and sympathetic account of the Negro lunch-counter demonstrations in Nashville

It told clearly and graphically the story of the successful efforts by young Negro students to force local stores to serve Negroes food. It included film shot during scuffles between blacks and whites and filmed interviews with leaders of both factions and community officials. Often the camera work was imaginative and shockingly effective, and the earnest statements of the Negroes, marked with a religious flavor, were moving.

Sometimes, however, the scenes -such as the one in which a group of young Negroes were gathered in a gymnasium singing and talking-looked rigged and showed signs of careful stage

The principal difficulty with the program was in its failure to give the other side as fair a break as it provided for the pro-integration forces. 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
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
