

Maverick Sees Himself In Run-Off

"I feel that I am going to be in the run-off with John Tower, the Republican candidate," said Maury Maverick Jr., candidate for the U. S. Senate seat vacated by Vice President Lyndon Johnson. Maverick was in Big Spring to speak to a group of Democrats at the Wagon Wheel Cafe Tuesday.

The candidate said he was making a big swing through the state this week, covering Abilene, Lubbock, points along the Red River, back to Waco, and then into Austin. He said he had not covered the Rio Grande area, including the valley, but would do so before the election.

"I now have organizations set up in 90 counties in the State," he said. "Most of the letters are former Ralph Yarborough supporters and I am glad to have them. I consider myself to be a Franklin Roosevelt, Ralph Yarborough, and John F. Kennedy type Democrat and am all out for the Kennedy five-point program."

The five points emphasized in President Kennedy's program are: the \$1.25 minimum wage boost; stimulation of the housing industry; federal aid for teachers' salaries and for building schools; helping depressed areas, and social security for medical care for the aged.

"I feel that the main thing the present administration needs to emphasize is that America must identify itself with the hopes and aspirations of the new, uncommitted nations of the world. We are going to have to give them a choice between the United States

and Russia, or we are in for trouble."

Seated at the head table with Maverick were Frank C. Harcaric Executive Committee; Ed Carpenter, Howard County Judge, and Jess Slaughter, Justice of the Peace.

He was ordained a minister in 1895, served pastorates in Ohio and held various offices in the church. When the Joint Synod of Ohio merged with the Iowa and Buffalo synods to form the American Lutheran Church in 1930, he was elected third vice president and later first vice president and president. He was born in Dundee, Ont.

JFK, Editorial Topics For Senate Candidates

The Kennedy administration and a Washington newspaper editorial were principal topics this mid-week in the special U.S. Senate race in Texas.

The lone Republican in the April 4 election, John Tower, said at Dallas that the Kennedy administration plans to hamstring business even more.

"I think the real solution to unemployment in depressed areas can be found in removing burdensome controls, taxes and competition imposed on private business by the government," he said.

Support by 22 members of the State Democratic Executive Committee was claimed by U.S. Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth. Earlier Ed Connally of Abilene, committee chairman, announced his support of interim Sen. William A. Blakley.

Blakley, a target of criticism by a Washington Post editorial for his opposition to the confirmation of a Negro to a top housing position, said Tuesday "Texans are capable of deciding for themselves whom they want to represent

them in the United States Senate."

State Sen. Henry Gonzales was the principal speaker at a dinner of the Mexican Chamber of Commerce in Corpus Christi Tuesday night. He plans to campaign in the Galveston area Friday and in Houston Saturday and Sunday.

Endorsement by the editor of the Alamo Messenger, official Catholic newspaper for the Archdiocese of San Antonio, was announced by Maury Maverick Jr.

Better Bracero Relations Sought

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexico will seek more harmonious relations between its braceros in California's Imperial Valley and U.S. workers, Foreign Minister Manuel Tello said Tuesday night.

Tello expressed his regrets for the current conflict between crop harvesters of the two nations in the Imperial Valley, which recently led to a strike by American workers.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Wallis H. Clark, 75, veteran stage and screen actor, died Tuesday. Clark, who was born in England and came to the United States in 1920, made his last New York stage appearance in 1945-46 in "Life With Father."

Spending Speedup May Be News Parley Subject

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy is reported planning to announce tonight a speedup in spending of some federal funds in a fresh effort to spur the lagging economy and reduce unemployment.

Informed officials said they understood the President intends to make such an announcement at his news conference scheduled for 7 p.m. EST. The conference will be broadcast live on nationwide television and radio.

On the international front, Kennedy faces questioning about his views on the crises in the Congo and in the United Nations resulting from the assassination of deposed Congo Premier Patrice Lumumba. Heightening the tension are Soviet demands that the matter be dealt with on Soviet terms.

The domestic anticrossfire measures Kennedy is said to have decided upon would not require action by Congress. There was no immediate word regarding details, but the Kennedy plans are reported to call for issuing new administrative orders to a few federal agencies for

spending money faster than planned on some government programs.

Indications are that such speedier spending would not be on any massive scale. The idea is to pump some additional money into the economy, pending congressional consideration of the Kennedy legislative program, aimed at business recovery, easing of unemployment hardship and reduction of joblessness.

Both Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg and House Speaker Sam Rayburn have indicated that mounting concern starts at the top, with Kennedy. The Cabinet officer and the speaker have told reporters that the President will have something to say about the situation at his meeting with newsmen.

After Cabinet members and Democratic leaders from the Capitol conferred with Kennedy Tuesday, Rayburn said the need for action to cut unemployment is more urgent than at any time since the great depression of 30 years ago.

Special Tax Rules On Sale Of Residence

The sale of a personal residence is subject to special federal income tax return rules, Ben M. Hawkins, administrative officer of the local Internal Revenue Service, said today.

The general rule, he explained, is that any profit from the sale of your home, or any other personally owned item of property such as an automobile, furniture, securities or real estate is subject to tax. On the other hand, federal tax law does not permit a deduction from the loss from the sale of a home or other personal asset which was not held for the purpose of producing income.

The Internal Revenue Service representative added: "There is, however, a special rule which allows you to defer paying a tax if you sell your residence at a gain and, within either one year after or one year before the sale, you buy and occupy another residence costing as much or more than the sales proceeds of your old residence."

"The same rule applies, if instead of buying, you begin construction of a new home within one year before and one year after the sale of the old residence and occupy it within 18 months after the sale."

"If the sales proceeds of your old residence exceed the cost of your new residence, the gain on the sale is taxable to the extent of the excess. For example, if you paid \$10,000 for your old residence, sold it for \$15,000, and invested only \$13,000 in a new one, you would pay tax on a gain of \$2,000."

"The sales proceeds are computed by deducting any sales commissions and any expense of redecorating and fixing-up the property for sale. The work of redecorating and fixing-up must be performed within the 90-day period before the house is sold, and must be paid for within 30 days after the date of the sale."

Taxpayers with questions on this subject may get Document No. 5107, Selling Your Home, by contacting the Internal Revenue Service office.

New Complaint Filed Against Pioneer Gas

Three residents in the 400 block on Birdwell Lane Tuesday filed separate damage suits against the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. The suits, lodged in 118th District Court, ask that each plaintiff be paid \$4,500 actual and \$50,000 exemplary damages.

The petitions allege that leakage of natural gas from lines owned and operated by the defendant corporation caused shrubs, flowers and plants on their property to die. They ask the heavy exemplary damages because they contend the leaking case posed a hazard to their safety.

The suits were filed by James L. Johnson, who lives at 406 Birdwell; T. C. Richardson, 402 Birdwell; and H. H. Steele, 404 Birdwell.

Last Oct. 20, a similar suit was filed against Pioneer by Travis Carlton and others. The plaintiff recited a similar complaint against the defendant, asserting that he lived at Lot 1, Block 10, College Park Estates.

This suit was settled out of court on Feb. 3 just a few days before it was scheduled for trial. Carlton had asked \$2,250 damages. No announcement has been made as to the actual settlement reached by the litigants. Judgment in the case has not as yet been filed.

2 Men Arrested For Sit-In Photo

SUMTER, S.C. (AP)—Two men, one a television photographer, were arrested Tuesday as they attempted to photograph a Negro sit-in demonstration.

The two men and three Negro youths were charged with breach of the peace. All of the men were jailed in lieu of \$100 bond each.

The two men were George Carr, a reporter-cameraman for WSOE-TV, of Charlotte, N.C., and Boyce Stradley, a pilot for Southeast Air Motive.

Also arrested and jailed on similar charges were three Negro students of Morris College. They were identified as Herman K. Harris, 20, of Lancaster, S.C.; Ivo G. Moore, 19, of the Bronx, N.Y.; and Eddie Drummond, 18, of Greenville, S.C.

The arrests occurred near a pharmacy, one of three locations of sit-in demonstrations by the Negroes.

Police Chief E. E. McIntosh did not spell out how the photographer and pilot allegedly breached the peace.

TV Will Carry News Conference

NEW YORK (AP)—All three major television networks plan live coverage of President Kennedy's news conference tonight.

The Columbia Broadcasting System, which earlier had said it would rebroadcast the 7 p.m. EST conference at a later hour, said Tuesday night it had changed its mind.

The network cited "overriding reasons" for the change—the situation in the Congo following the death of ex-Premier Lumumba, and the announcement that Kennedy will make a major statement on the nation's economy.

The National and American broadcasting companies announced last week they would carry the half-hour conference on a live basis.

The news conference also will be carried live on NBC and ABC radio, and rebroadcast by the CBS radio network at 8:15 p.m.

Testimony Is Expected In Second Trial For Jones

WEATHERFORD, Tex. (AP)—Testimony was expected to start today in the trial of Curtis Lee Jones, charged with the armed robbery of Mrs. Walter Sears, 24, of Parker County.

The woman was robbed, the state claims, during a crime-filled dash by Jones across the state last fall.

The state contends Jones stole

a car by use of threats and force when he abducted Mrs. Sears and her 2-year-old daughter, Cynthia, last October. They were released unharmed at San Antonio.

A 8th District Court jury at Boston, Tex., convicted Jones of murder and sentenced him to life in prison Feb. 3 for the killing of ex-convict Doyle Jackson, 45.

Musicians Face Narcotics Charges

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Two members of Duke Ellington's Band face preliminary hearings April 19 on narcotics charges.

Saxophonist Paul Gonsalves, 40, and trumpeter William R. Nance, 41, were arraigned Tuesday on charges of illegal possession of narcotics.

Arraignment was delayed for a third musician, trumpeter John Willie Cook, 36, also arrested with the others in a raid by sheriff's deputies last week.

Eastern Half Of State Due Rain; Cool Air Exits

Light rains fell Wednesday near the Texas coast and the U.S. Weather Bureau said on-and-off showers could be expected during the week in the eastern half of the state.

A weak cool front that had penetrated the state switched direc-

tion and backed out of the state Tuesday. The five-day forecasts called for slightly warmer weather Wednesday with a cooling trend the latter part of the week. Scattered showers were predicted for the eastern half of the state.

Common Cold Is Uncommon Thing

Common colds, uncommon climates and a strange fever in Singapore turn the focus on health.

WHAT'S IN A COLD

The trouble with the common cold is that the only things common about it are the symptoms.

Any of a handful of known viruses and bacteria can cause the common misery of the common cold.

But no cause—either bacteria or virus—has been identified for at least 80 per cent of the common sporadic diseases seen in adults, says Dr. Alfred S. Evans of the University of Wisconsin.

Bacteria are responsible for only some 5 to 7 per cent of respiratory diseases, he says in an article entitled, "Sneezes, Wheezes and Other Diseases." Flu viruses and adenoviruses, prevalent among military recruits, account for less than 13 per cent of such illness in adults.

WEATHER TO LIVE

Your health, good or bad, may be made by the weather—in spite of coats, radiators, air-conditioning, medicine and all.

Researchers find strange correlations between climate and disease.

Colds reach a peak in winter, and in stormy climates with changing temperatures and pressures.

Digestive disorders are most frequent in hot climates and in hot summer months.

More diabetes is found in winter—and in winter insulin requirements increase.

Skin infections increase in summer, and in high temperature and humidity. Skin cancer is most prevalent in the sunny South.

Multiple sclerosis occurs most often in cool climates and in spring and fall weather changes.

FEVER IN SINGAPORE

An epidemic of fever broke out in Singapore last summer, striking all races and ages.

Fever runs as high as 104 degrees. Immediate symptoms were headache, severe body aches and vomiting. Patients usually recovered in a week.

But the disease had another strange effect: Patients broke out in patches of bleeding rash. Small blood vessels became more fragile, and there was a decrease in the blood's ability to clot.

AGAINST BLOOD FAT

A new drug to lower levels of cholesterol or fat in the blood can

be prescribed in Canada to aid heart disease victims.

The drug, which has the trade name, Choloxin, is derived from thyroid hormones, and lowers cholesterol, the waxy substance some doctors believe collects on the inner walls of blood vessels, causing blocking of the arteries and heart attack.

It may be used on men as young as 24 with high cholesterol levels as protection against future heart or brain catastrophes, says Dr. Campbell Moses of the University of Pittsburgh.

FLUORIDE LOZENGE

A new lozenge aimed at lessening tooth decay is available by prescription. It contains sodium fluoride and is for use in areas where fluorides are not at a level deemed sufficient to inhibit dental decay.

The lozenge which has the trade name Enzifur, acts by applying fluoride directly to the teeth, and perhaps by dietary means, the manufacturer says.

Tiny Hearing Aid On Display

A new hearing aid no bigger than a thumbnail has been developed by Oticon Listener Corporation of Ossining, N.Y.

The aid is flesh-colored, weighs but 1/4 of an ounce, and when tucked into the ear it does not project beyond the tragus—the small piece of cartilage at the entrance to the ear canal. The aid was displayed for the first time at a recent meeting of Oticon dealers and is handled locally by Cizon's Jewelers.

There are no cords, buttons or external tubes to the aid. It is self-contained and has a microphone, battery, receiver, and complete volume regulator. Its components include tiny transistors which boost power to serve those having a hearing loss as high as 50 decibels. This covers a majority of people with a hearing problem. The unit is so compact that when it is fit into the ear, it cannot be seen from front or back.

More than 1,350 4-H'ers attended the annual meeting, sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service, the National 4-H Service Committee and about 50 leading business firms.

The Texas youth's community work has included charity, health, and safety drives, public speaking and church work.

Carl was graduated fourth in a class of 43 and was among the nation's top one per cent in scholastic testing.

Winning the community relations was his second state-wide recognition. In 1958 he was picked as Texas outstanding 4-H'er in citizenship. In addition, he was county public speaking champion for three straight years.

On his parents' farm, he has raised bees, turkeys, cattle, swine and a vegetable garden.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Thomas Wilson, 37, an inventor who likes to do things for himself, must send his children to school.

That's what a jury in Justice of the Peace Tom Maes' court said Tuesday in fining Wilson \$5 for not sending one of his six youngsters, Carol, 12, to school.

"I think I can do a better job of teaching my children," Wilson told the jury. "When kids get out of school these days they don't know anything and they can't do anything."

Wilson was fined on one of three charges. He was also accused of keeping Floyd, 11, and Dennis, 8, out of school. The jury didn't rule on these cases.

Wilson's lawyer, Homer Cox, said he plans to appeal.

All of Wilson's six children—three of them delivered by him without a doctor's help—were in the courtroom.

C. J. Everitt, assistant principal at the East Houston Elementary School, said he warned Wilson in December to enroll the three older children.

"He told us he preferred to keep them at home and teach them because he could do a better job," Everitt said.

Wilson said he was an electrician, electronics technician, bricklayer and studied medicine.

"I like to do things for myself and I like to teach my children to do likewise," he said.

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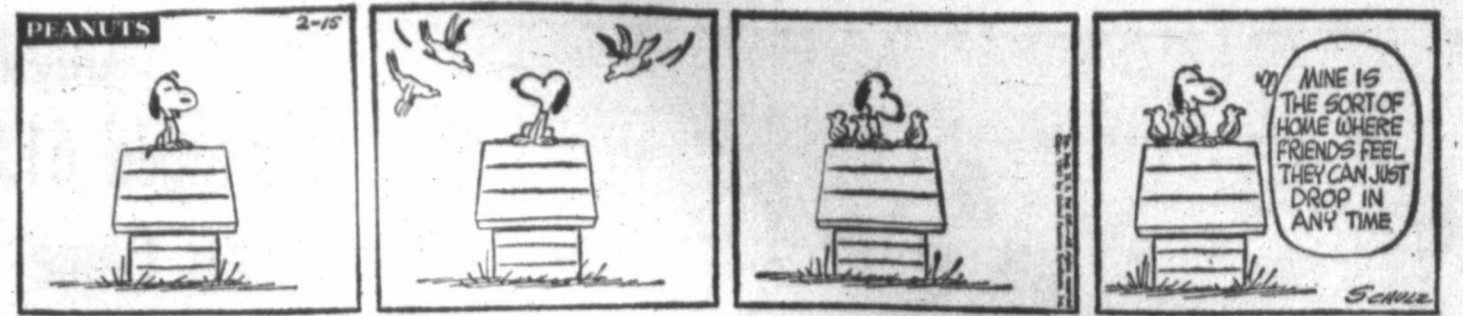
