
Continued rains have delayed being combined.



Proof of age is not difficult, especially the kind of proof required by the social security board accepts many kinds of proofs of birth, the policy is least very cooperative. The difficulities of securing adequate proofs of birth are not insurfact that none of the many thousands of claims filed since January 1 of this year have been

There are various ways of prov ing one's age, such as: Registration of the birth of a child by its parents in the

family Bible Baptismal record.

Date of birth as it appears on a life insurance policy if issued prior to Ausust 14, 1935. Date of birth as shown on an individual's application for group, or labor union, if dated stated;

prior to August 14, 1935. Affidavits by sisters or broth-

Affidavits by parents, of course are sufficient of date of birth. There are few 65-year old persons whose mothers and fathers are living, but middle-aged and young workers might well secure proof of date of birth from their parents and file the proof away with theih social security account number.
